Lighting Contest Winners Announced



Two entries did not meet the contest requirements as they were only inside Christmas trees without any outside decorating visible to the judging committee. 'There are numerous other residential lighting displays over town that would have received high consideration had the owners entered them in the contest," Jimmy Faulkner, Chamber of Commerce manager, quotes a member of the committee as sayng.

There was no selection of winners in the Commercial Store Front Window Contest because of the lack of interest by Clarendon merchants in entering their windows in the contest.

Faulkner expressed disappointment in the contest this year, not because of the lack of decorated businesses and residences but for the failure of so many to enter their lighting displays by sending the official entry blank to the Chamber of Commerce office.




Legends concerning New Year's are as numerous as there are countries in the world. Many of them are similar in many details. One of the most beautiful is an ancient Swiss legend.

Therefore, a bowl of fresh milk is placed upon the dining table and each member of the household carefully lays his spoon upon the table cloth.





Bethlehem Rites Feature March To Nativity Cave CHRISTMAS is observed in Bethlehem on December 25 by the

Iehem on December 25 by the noman Catholics and Protestants.

on January 6, by the Greek Ortho-dox and affiliated churches, and on January 18 by the Armenians. All Bethlehem, however, turns out on December 24 for the arrival of the Patriarch of Jerusalem-Cardinal of the Holy Land-who each year brings an ancient effigy of the Infant Jesus to Bethlehem which he lays in the manger with in the cave where Christ was born. Dramatically the procession approaches: heralded by a single rseman, his banner streaming aloft. A corps of native police mounted upon fiery Arabian horses follow and then another single norseman upon a prancing black steed carrying the cross on high; the Patriarch in his cardinal and ermine, mitred bishops, clergy in embroidered vestments and white robed acolytes-swinging golden

censers—precede the jeweled pavilon of the Holy Child. Magnificent corteges of government officials, foreign embassies, bands, religious organizations follow, and finally, American made auto tobiles mingle with native two-wheeled carriages.

The procession enters the Church of the Nativity. The public is not permitted to witness the actual placing of the effigy, as that part of the Church-built above the Cave of the Nativity-is under the jurisdiction of the Greek Orthodox church.

The grotto-like Cave of the Nativity in no way conforms to the modern conception of a "stable:" in biblical times, however, shelters for man and heast were begin in

New Year Open House Introduced by Dutch

The custom of making short calls on New Year's Day was in full swing in the United States around the turn of the century.

Newspapers carried columns of "at home" notices specifying the hours during which visitors would be received. Hosts and hostesses, having duly received, closed their open house to become guests at somebody else's.

"Open House" on New Year's Day was introduced into America by the Dutch who settled in New Amsterdam. Friends were accustomed to dropping in to offer the compliments of the day and refreshments centered around homemade snacks, plus the host's favorite concoction of punch.

The custom grew with the country, finally attaining the newspaper announcement stage, with its eventual time-table and scurrying from one "open house" to another. It was inevitable that some guests, after a succession of nine or ten punch bowls, sometimes embarrassed their tenth or eleventh hostess; and receptions sometimes were "crashed" by total strangers.



sively a Burns' product, nor did he claim it to be In a letter to George Thomson, a publisher, Burns explained:

"It is an old song of olden times, which has never been in print. I



took it down from an old man's singing.'

Modern scholarship has discovered that Burns was wrong when he told Thomson "Auld Lang Syne" never had been in print. Its re-frain, at least, was printed obscurely long before Burns heard his "old man singing." Further, the original song often

has been credited to Sir Robert Aytoun (1570-1638). Aytoun was one of the earliest Scots to use the lowland dialect as a literary medium. Multitudes of Americans descended from non-British stock are perpetually mystified by this dialect, nor does it seem to make much sense in the standard English translation.

Regardless of its original author and origin, it was Burns who gave "Auld Lang Syne" its immortality.





Christmas Rose Enhances Yule's Festival Mood

A MERICANS usually decorate their homes at Christmas time with holly, evergreens, or hothouse plants. Recently, however, they have found a new friend in the Christmas-rose. Nurserymen say this plant's popularity has skyrocketed in the last few years. The Christmas-rose is not really a rose at all but belongs to the crowfoot family. It is a small plant no more than a foot high when mature. Nevertheless, it can put forth seven or eight small white roselike blooms tinged with pink. Called by botanists Helleborus niger or black hellebore, it gets this name from its black stalks. The Christmas-rose is no freak, super-precocious flower or early-blooming plant. This ligiti-mate child of winter flowers nat-urally in December or January. It withstands snow and low temperatures, demanding only some sort of shelter from the snow. Helleborus niger does not propa-

gate well in the United States. Hence, most of the tiny plants are imported from Belgium and the Netherlands. They develop best only in the western part of those countries where they thrive in soil peculiar to the region. The ancient Romans knew about

Everyone in the household had to have a new wardrobe for Christmas and, since tailors and cobblers and dressmakers could not be at all places at once, it was necessary to get an early start.

When the butchering was finished-in October or No the suet was melted and the candles were made. The children always had a hand in making the little ones for use on the Christ-mas tree. And they usually made one which had three prongs which, placed at the very top of the tree, represented the three wise men.

THE Christmas rose blooms at an unusual season, from December to March, with white, sometimes pinkly colored blooms. Because of the soft tinge of pink, the flower has been given the name Christmas rose.

Legend iells us that when the Wise Men were journeying to-ward Bethlehem, they came upon a young girl who was tending her sheep. The girl complained to an angel that she had no gift for the Wolk Child, whereaver the action Holy Child, whereupon the entire pathway to Bethlehem was flowered with glistening white Christmas roses. Madelon, the girl, offered the

flowers, and when the fingers of Jesus touched them they became the Christmas-rose and eagerly suffused with pink.

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Pasadena's world famous ament of Roses started out in 1886 as an informal procession of carriages bedecked with the blossoms at hahd and driven over a prearranged route.

The idea was the brain-child of Charles Frederick Holder who, as the new zoology teacher from the east, was impressed by the abundance and beauty of flowers blooming in mid-winter. Mr. Hunter's suggestion that the Valley Hunt club of Pasadena sponsor an informal display thereof was received enthusiastically and New Year's Day was selected as appropriate and convenient.


So, what developed into the Tournament of Roses began as "an informal procession of carriages" on January 1, 1886. It was such a success that preparations and formalities increased. Floral floats made their debut and the order of the day-the parade, competitive sports, climaxed by the grand ball in the evening-was established.

Dedicated in 1923, the original seating capacity of the Rose Bowl Stadium (85,000) exceeded the total permanent population of Pasadena and recent enlargement permitted a paid attendance of 100,234 for the football classic January 1, 1950

Likewise, the Tournament of Roses has attained world renown as a floral festival, with literally millions of blossoms bedecking an ever-increasing number of floats, annually thrilling hundreds of thousands of spectators along a parade route seven miles long.

Unusual New Year's Customs Are Still Observed by Scots

Village children heard the priest and teacher singing the song and learned it. From there it spread throughout the world. Today, it is regarded as the greatest Christmas hymn and wherever there are men of good will they sing:

"Silent night, boly night— All is calm, all is bright, Round you Virgin, Mother and Child;

Holy Infant, so tender and mild, Sleep in beavenly peace— Sleep in beavenly peace."

History of Christmas Seals

When you see the Christmas seal do you ever wonder how it started? It was born in Denmark, home of the fairy tales of Hans Christian

Then, in the autumn of 1907, Emily Bissell, a public health worker, concerned about the fate of a small sanatorium, recalled the article and sat down to sketch America's first Christmas seal, a wreath of holly encircling the words "Merry Christmas." With 50,000 stamps printed and nowhere to sell them, Miss Bissell at last enlisted the aid of a columnist on a Philadelphia newspaper. The idea caught and within a few weeks \$3,000 was collected. The first nation-wide sale was held the following year and was backed by newspapers all over the country, religious and civic groups,


