



GUARANTEES NALIENABLE PRIVILEGES

The American "Bill of Rights". consisting of the first ten amendments to our federal constitution all adopted at one time in 1791 specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and jealously guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected

by our governing bodies today. Among the most familiar of our constitutional guarantees are those relating to freedom of religion, of speech, and of the press. The same article protects the right of peaceable assembly and the privilege of petitioning the government for redress of griev-

Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment VIII. Other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time.

Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the underlying intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.'

The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the
