IT SHOULD BE quiet in our town Saturday night, since more than 1,000 Baird residents will probably be in the stands at Coleman when the Bears go against Goldthwaite.

It will be the first Class A playoff game ever for Baird and, if ticket sales are any indication, the Bears should have almost as much hometown backing as they would on their own field.

But, reports we get from Mills County say Goldthwaite is also planning a big turnout to support their Eagles.

Prolonging of the football season for Baird automatically puts the boys basketball schedule into the deep freeze. As long as the grid season continues, the boys games will be rubbed out.

TWO MINISTERS WITH strong Baird ties have been selected for mission work in Geneva, Switzerland. Plans call for the two and their families to begin work there next September.

Heavy Rains Put Water in Tanks

Heavy rain which swept Callahan County this week brought moisture amounts totaling up to more than seven inches. The rain began Sunday ahead of a cold front.

Many stock tanks in the county, which were getting dangerously low on water, were filled by the continuing heavy rains through Wednesday.

The rain is expected to prove beneficial to wheat and other small grain crops in the county. And, although pastures will green up after the rain, the moisture is not expected to materially affect growth because of the nearness to frost time, going over the spillway Tuesday and Baird Lake was nearing its spillway level Thursday. Should the latter fill, it would be the first time in more than a year for it to be full.

Heaviest amounts -- more than seven inches -- fell in the Baird area. At Clyde and Putnam, the amounts were nearer four inches, while at Cross Plains amounts were even lighter -- generally less than two inches.

needing just three plays after getting hold of the ball. Their first effort was an incomplete pass, but the second was a sparkling 34-yard beauty by Steve Stanley which gained to the Clyde 10.

From there Richard Windham bowled through the middle to score. The point failed but Baird was ahead less than three minutes deep.

Clyde fought back after the kickoff to reach the Bear 38, but Stanley intercepted a Buddy Howe pass and returned it 55 yards to the Clyde 25.

Baird's drive from there only gained 15 yards before sputtering out, however.

The delay was short-lived, though, as Clyde ran three plays and booted to the Bulldog 36. That drive took longer, but the result was the same when Stanley steamed into the end zone from six yards out.

The try for points again failed to leave it 12-0 just before the end of the first quarter.

Even Quarters
In the second period, Clyde drove to the Baird 10 before bogging down, and later Baird fought to the Clyde 28 before losing out. After Baird's first-quarter flurry, the second and third stanzas were played on even terms.

Early in the fourth, Clyde hammered to the Baird 35 before Kelton Jones latched on to a Buddy Howe pass and carried it 61 yards to the Bulldog 19. But the Bears couldn't move deeper than the 18 before giving up on up downs.

Clyde then made its last bid for a touchdown, moving from their own 18 to the Baird 18 in one of the best Bulldog drives of the night. Jones again intercepted a Howe pass, however, to chill the effort.

Windham got the call for 32 carries against Clyde, gaining 172 yards. Stanley had 61 yards in 11 plays.

For Clyde, Connie Amos made 41 yards in 10 plays and Rick Dennis had 34 steps in 11 assignments.

Wildcat Is Completed Southwest Of Baird in Callahan Oil Field

James P. Dunigan, Abilene, has completed a wildcat in the regular field of Callahan County.

No. 1 J. E. Evans, located five miles southwest of Baird, is spotted 1,787 feet from the most northerly north line and 1,787 feet from the east line of Section 2, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 29 barrels of 38.6 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water, pumping through

eight perforations at 1,563-65 feet after treatment with 250 gallons of acid.

Operator set 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,646 feet. Total depth is 4,541 feet, plugged back to 1,616 feet.

Second Morris lime well has been completed in a new producing area six miles west of Clyde in Callahan County regular field.

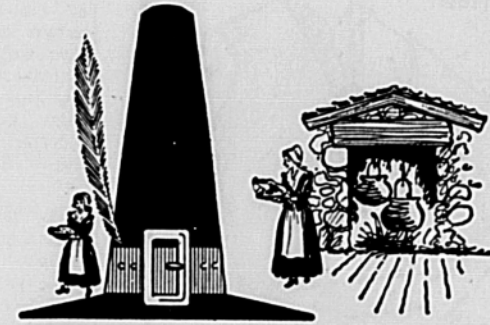
The well is Dixon Drilling Co. of Abilene No. 1 N. A. Estes. Location is 330 feet from the south and west lines of Section 4, Block 8, SP Survey.

No. 1 Estes had a daily potential of 10.5 barrels of 43 gravity oil. Flow was through a 16-64-inch choke with packet set on the casing and 270 pounds tubing pressure.

It is producing from six perforations at 3,419-22 feet. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 3,475 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 1,675-1.

The confirmation is a north offset to Dixon No. 1-A Oscar Rose, wildcat re-entry completed.

National Service Life Insurance Program Will Re-Open Next May

The Veterans Administration is preparing to handle next May's flood of applications for the re-opening of National Service Life Insurance, Glyndon Hague, manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said today.

More than three million veterans with service-connected disabilities may do this under terms of the law signed October 13 by President Johnson, the VA manager said.

Opening date on which VA will accept applications is May 1, 1965. They must be in on or before May 3, 1966.

Hague said an unknown number of veterans who up to now have not applied for service-connection but can do so in order to obtain insurance, may also now be eligible to buy up to \$10,000 in permanent GI insurance.

The VA is planning before May 1, 1965 to mail full details and application forms to all veterans receiving monthly compensation payments.

Those veterans whose disabilities are service-connected but who are not drawing compensation will not be included in this mailing. For these, and for other veterans who believe they may be eligible, full explanatory material and explanation forms will be on hand at all VA regional offices by April 1, 1965.

No application can be accepted before May 1, 1965, Hague said. Because of this, the VA requests that veterans do not write, phone or call for applications until after April 1, 1965.

Persons now on active duty with the Armed Forces and certain Philippine veterans are not eligible to take part in the insurance re-opening. Expenses of all medical examinations must be borne by the applicant, the VA manager said.

To buy this insurance, the veteran must:

a. Have been originally eligible for National Service Life Insurance between Oct. 8, 1940 and Jan. 1, 1957.

b. Have now either no GI insurance or less than the \$10,000 in authorized coverage.

c. Be in one of the following three groups:

(1) Veterans with service-connected disabilities who meet standards of good health.

(2) Veterans whose service-connected disabilities alone do not permit them to meet standards of good health.

(3) Veterans whose non-service-connected disabilities as of Oct. 13, 1964, the date the bill was signed into law, prevented them from buying commercial insurance at the highest rates.

Higher premiums will be charged those veterans in groups two and three. In all cases, the premium rates will cover administrative costs as well as the policy value.

The new policies will be issued at low non-dividend premiums which will compare favorably with the net cost of World War II GI insurance.

In addition to the re-opening of NSLI, the new law allows veterans who already hold existing World War II or Korean Conflict type term policies to convert to a modified life plan.

This plan is an inducement to term policyholders to convert to a lifetime level premium plan before the premiums on renewable term insurance become prohibitive with increasing age.

The advantage of this new modified plan is that it permits conversion to permanent type insurance at lower premium rates than possible before, but the face value of the policy will

be automatically reduced by 50 percent when the insured reaches the age of 65.

Hague said that the policyholder has the option at that time to restore the full amount of coverage by purchasing ordinary life insurance without medical examination.

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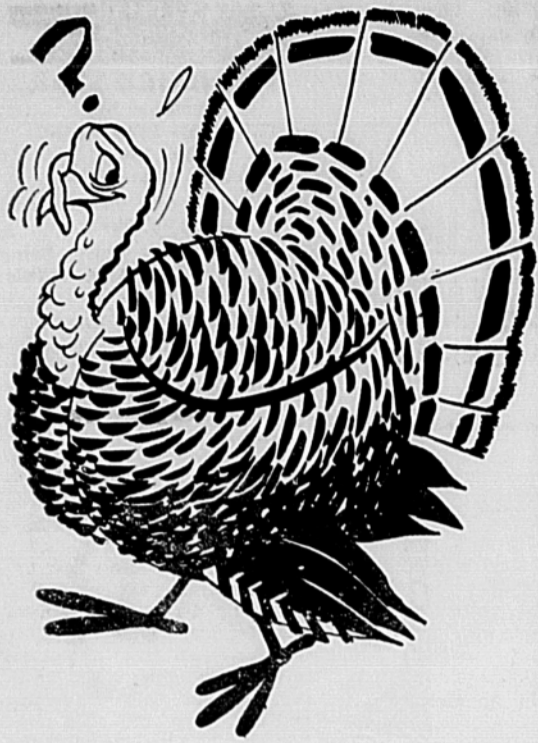
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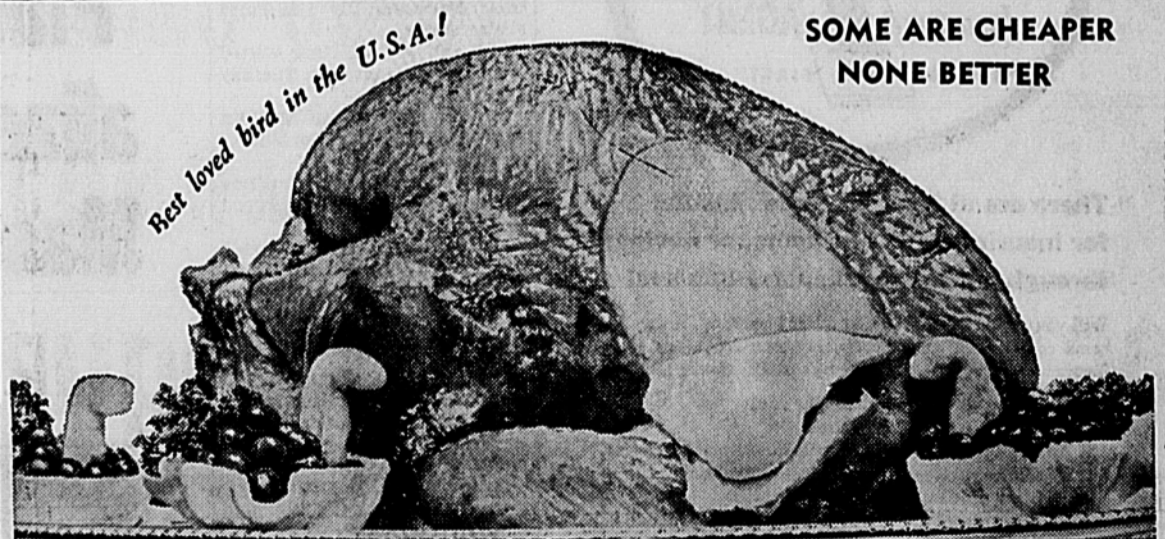
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
