The coldest temperature recorded during the year was 6 defrom the 6th thru the 19th of August with 14 straight days temperature of 100 to 103 degrees. The first killing frost for the fall was November 16th with 19 degrees.

We had considerable variation in the temperature during the month of December with the highest temperature recorded at night was 35 on the 9th; the low was 14 degrees on the 9th and the warmest low was 54 degrees on the 7th.

With a dry year like 1956 on record we certainly can look forward to more moisture and a better crop year in 1957.
