In the way of equipment, Dr. Stewart has added a Basil Metabolism machine, Electrocardiograph equipment, supplementary laboratory and X-ray equipment.

Farm Road 1260 Now Completed

The new Farm to Market road No. 1260 was completed and turned over to the Highway Department for maintenance last Thursday, according to information released by W. A. Riney, local department head. The new road which begins approximately 3 miles east of Clarendon on highway 287, extends north and east a fraction over five miles.

Mr. Riney stated that maintenance of the road would require considerable attention until we receive a good rain, for the blowing sand has been pouring into the bar ditches every time the wind blows. People living in that area are highly appreciative of the road and it will likewise be appreciated by others who travel out that way.

Regulations On Beef Go Into Effect

OPS officials of the Far West Texas district, which includes Donley County, prepared this week to put into effect the new beef regulations.

"The new orders covering beef, which makes up nearly half the nation's meat diet," District Price Executive C. J. Taylor said, "were the highlights this week of the rapidly expanding and developing government price program."

"The new regulations will regulate the price of beef from cattle on the hoof to the steak and hamburger at the corner grocery," he said. The only unregulated prices will be those between producers. The program begins with the pricing at the stockyards.

The wholesale ceiling prices became effective May 9, and the retail prices will go into effect May 14. However, retail stores have until June 2 to post their ceiling prices in their stores for beef.

Veterinary Hospital Will Be Open For Business In June

The Clarendon Veterinary Hospital will be open for business about the eighth of June says county agent H. M. Breedlove. Ranchers met in the office of county agent Breedlove on April 7th and organized and put up the money for the building of a veterinary hospital building, Dr. C. E. Deyhle of College Station, Texas, will be the practicing veterinarian to take over the hospital building and has signed a contract to practice in Donley County and surrounding area when the building is completed. The hospital will be just east of the Donley County Consumers on the highway in Clarendon.

Forrest Sawyer was elected trustee for the group building the hospital; Emmett Simmons was elected treasurer and H. M. Breedlove, secretary. These are the men who will look after the building of the hospital and get it ready for Dr. Deyhle. The building of the hospital by the ranchers was to get things started and Dr. Deyhle will buy the unit by the first of the year.

Bill Lane, Clarendon contractor is building the hospital and the building will be completed in the next few weeks at which time the work on the pens will start. This is a big help to the livestock industry for this area and every one is urged to help make this a big success by having all your veterinary work done at your local hospital.

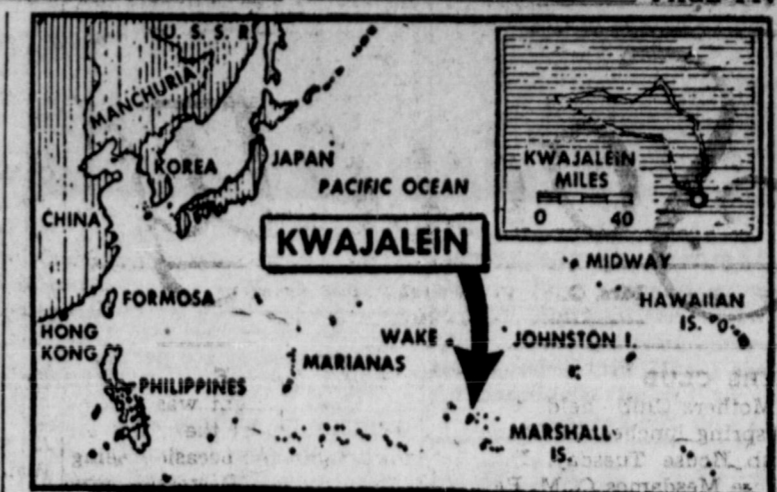

vision in the new law for benefits to wives of retired workers who are now receiving old-age insurance payments. The wife of a present beneficiary who has under her care a child under 18 qualified for benefits may now have monthly payments herself.

In these cases, the wife's payments continue until the child under her care reaches 18 or is otherwise disqualified as a beneficiary, according to Sanderson.

He suggests that wives who believe they are entitled to benefits under this provision of the new social security law get in touch with the Social Security office at Amarillo.

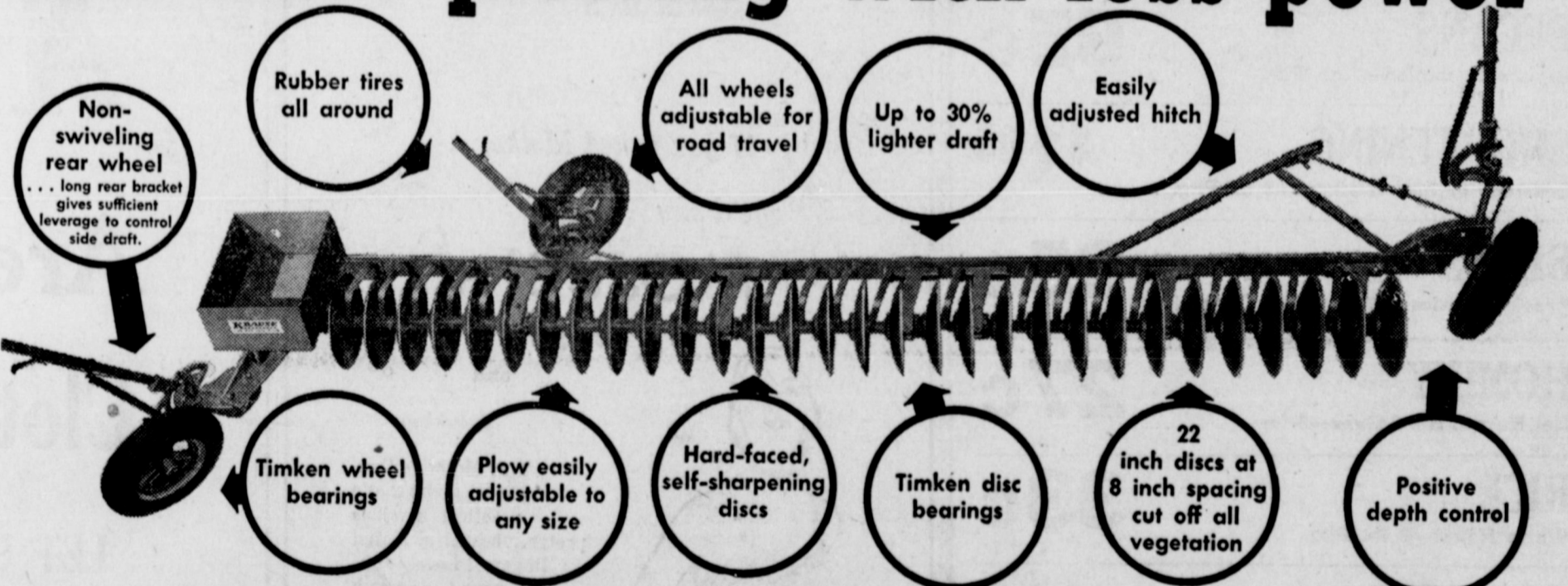

FARM NEWS From the County PMA Committee

INCREASE IN GRAIN SORGHUM PRICE SUPPORT

Mr. Vance, Chairman of the Texas PMA State committee announced an increase in the price support for the 1951 grain sorghum crop on Wednesday, May 2. The support level was increased from \$1.88 per cwt to \$2.17 per cwt.

This announcement was made in a meeting at Amarillo, Texas. The meeting was attended by Texas Panhandle farmers and was called for the purpose of discussing the planting of grain sorghum on wheat acreage which has been abandoned due to drought. A meeting was also held at Abilene, Texas on Thursday, May 3 at which time the announcement was also made.

Indications from both meetings are that much of the acreage planted to wheat last fall and since abandoned, will be planted to grain sorghums this spring and summer.

ACP AIDS IN MAINTENANCE OF FARM PLANT

Maintaining the farm production plant in good condition for turning out an abundance next year as well as this is vitally important to the welfare of the country.

There should be no "let up" in the production of essential food, feed and fiber crops this year but equally high or higher production may be needed in the years ahead. This means that special attention must be given to the maintenance of the farm production plant.

This includes not only the machinery and equipment for seeding, cultivating, harvesting, storing and marketing of the crops but the care of the basic production plant itself—the land.

In helping farmers maintain the productivity of the land, the Agricultural Conservation Program plays an important part. Under this program farmers are helped in obtaining materials and services which are essential in keeping the farm production plant in good condition.
