





INCREASE IN GRAIN SORGHUM PRICE SUPPORT

Mr. Vance, Chairman of the Texas PMA State committee announced an increase in the price support for the 1951 grain sorghum crop on Wednesday, May 2. The support level was increased from \$1.88 per cwt to \$2.17 per

This announcement was made in a meeting at Amarillo, Texas. The meeting was attended by Texas Panhandle farmers and was called for the purpose of discussing the planting of grain sorghum on wheat acreage which has been abandoned due to drouth. A meeting was also held at Abilene, Texas on Thursday, May 3 at which time the announcement was also made.

Indications from both meetings are that much of the acreage planted to wheat last fall and since abandoned, will be planted to grain sorghums this spring and summer.
