Santa & Reindeer To Parade Here Saturday, Dec. 1, at 2:30 p. m.

Boys and girls and grown-ups, too, will be in Clarendon to see Santa Claus and his Arctic Reindeer on the afternoon of Saturday, December 1st at 2:30 P. M. when they are brought here for the second Annual Christmas Parade. Santa Claus and his Arctic Reindeer are being sponsored by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce. Jimmy Faulkner, Chamber of Commerce Manager said, "He won't have his reindeer except on December 1st but Santa Claus plans to be in Clarendon every Saturday in December until Christmas and also on Christmas eve to talk to all his little friends from this section of the country."

Dancer, Prancer, Dunder and Blitzen are all primed for the trip and they'll prance down the street and pop their ankles to the tune of the sleigh bells with Santa Claus waving to all his friends as he rides in the sleigh. In fact, Santa Claus will be a very busy man as he waves to everyone because he will be driving his reindeer as they make their way down Clarendon streets that afternoon.

Rudolph, the Red-Nose Reindeer, who has the title of "George" will lead the parade. The name of "George" was given him by the Eskimos. In fact, all of Santa's reindeer have a pet name that their Bering Sea friends have given to them. Some 6,000 miles separate these reindeer in Texas from their native homeland, but they thrive at the Central Texas Ranch where they make their home. The only concession made to them is to provide a large fan in their corral. It is used on the warm days when no breeze is stirring. Santa Claus sends a special invitation to all his young friends of this section to be in Clarendon for the parade. Mothers and fathers likewise have the same invitation. "I want to see everyone from the whole area on my trip to Clarendon," Santa says.

The local sponsors, The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, assures the people that all arrangements are being made to provide the greatest event to ever come to Clarendon, even bigger than last year. After seeing it this year, they believe you will say, "There's never been anything like it here before."

"No boy or girl, or adult for that matter, can afford to pass up this opportunity of seeing Santa Claus driving his live reindeer down our streets," Jimmy Faulkner, Chamber of Commerce Manager said.

To top it all off, Santa Claus promises to take time to listen to Christmas requests and wants to see every boy and girl for miles around and talk with them about Christmas.

The reindeer are already ready to get into their shiny new harness and pull Santa's sleigh down the streets of Clarendon. No matter how cold the weather, the parade will be held on time, at 2:30 P. M., December 1st. In fact, the colder the weather and the more snow we have, the better it will please Santa and his reindeer. It will remind them more of the deep snow and raging blizzards in their Alaskan homeland.

Just how the parade will form and from where Santa and his reindeer will emerge to begin their long procession remains a deep, dark secret; however, plans are already well mapped out. As the moments wear away and suspense grows thin, suspense will grow on the crown and then suddenly, Santa in his sleigh, with the bells jingling out "Merry Christmas", will materialize from out of nowhere. The reindeer will be pulling the sleigh with old Santa Claus as they prance and shake their huge antlers. That's the Christmas Spirit, and you can see it in Clarendon when the afternoon of December 1st rolls around.

Blue Birds Are Back In Palo Duro Canyon

CANYON—The bluebirds are back in Palo Duro Canyon, officials of Palo Duro State Park reported this week. Annually in November thousands of Western Blue Birds migrate into the Can-

yon to spend the winter. Seeds and berries from certain species of cedar and shrubs seem to be their favorite foods.

A few bluebirds nest in the canyon, but the heavy migration seems to be from points North and West each winter.

The bluebirds make a bright and happy addition to color-

splashed Palo Duro, the "World's Most Colorful Canyon." Their color contrasts with the predominant reds, tans, purples, pinks, and greys of the Canyon Walls. It also complements the brilliant cardinals who spend the entire year in the Canyon.

The Palo Duro Canyon is a migratory bird paradise, more than 160 species having been identified by nature students.

Unlike the swallows of Capistrano who have a regular timetable for their migrations the bluebirds can be counted on about the time of the first real cold spell in Colorado and New Mexico. There is no mass flight either in Winter or Spring.

ing the original. They both asked questions regarding our new preservation processes.

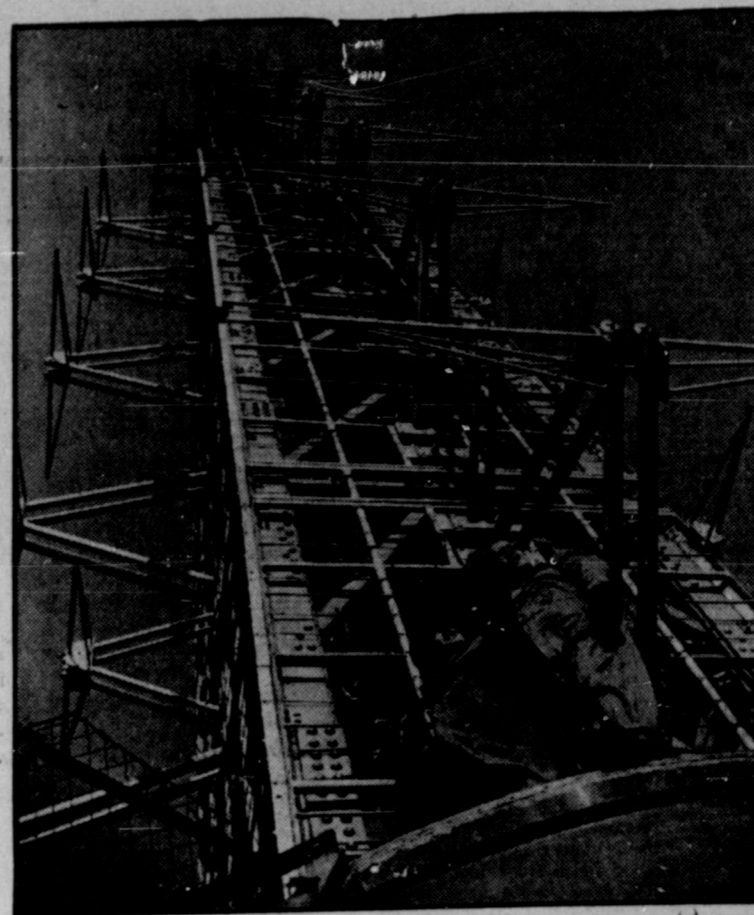

Palo Duro State Park Outstanding Tourist Mecca In Texas

CANYON, Texas — Palo Duro State Park, "The World's Most Colorful Canyon", was the outstanding tourist mecca in Texas for the travel year ending August 31, 1951, a compilation of the Texas State Parks Board House Organ "S-PARKS" reveals. In the period beginning September 1, 1950, and ending August 31, 1951 there were 6,077 out of state cars registered at the park. There were 22,059 Texas cars and periodic checks reveal that 50 per cent of the Texas cars came from 200 miles or farther. These to all intents and purposes are classified as tourist cars. Paid attendance for the travel year was 105,104.

Extremely bad winter weather and a flood with resulting road damage slowed attendance during the spring months of 1951. However, with the completion of paving on an eight mile stretch of road into the canyon there has been a steady increase in attendance over a comparable period in previous years since June.

in San Antonio was second in attracting out of state cars with 5661 to its credit. Kerrville State Park with 4983 ranked third.

Palo Duro Canyon also topped Big Bend National Park in attendance by a considerable margin. Big Bend reported an attendance slightly in excess of 82,000 for the travel year.

The attendance by calendar years shows the vaulting popularity of Palo Duro Canyon State Park. In 1948 the attendance was 51,488; in 1949 it was 85,336; in 1950 it was 110,050 and in 1951 indications are the calendar year will show an attendance of close to 125,000 persons.

Methodist Home of Waco To Broadcast Thanksgiving Day Program Sunday, November 25th

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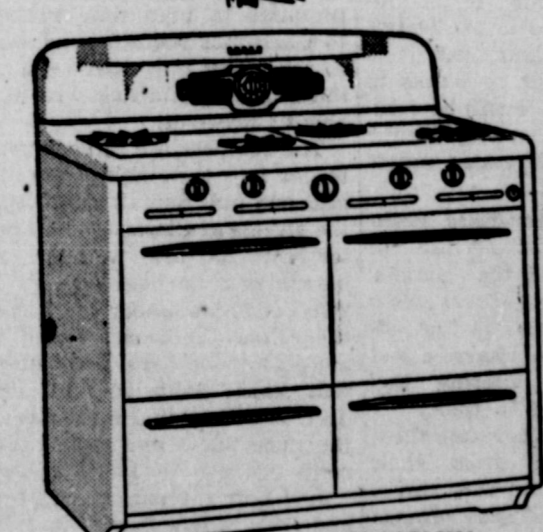

Donley County Soil Conservation District News

This column although normally addressed to farmers and ranchers is for this issue directed to the urban population in the Donley County Soil Conservation District.

The time has come for business men or women, equipment dealers, bankers, educators, clergymen, local government officials, and other non-farm people to do some serious thinking about their local Soil Conservation District and what it means. You have a personal stake, a family and business stake—both in the District and in the soil and water conservation job being done by it.

Your business whatever it may be is based primarily on the farmer operating a profitable business. If the productivity of the soil is eroded away by wind and water, or reduced by bad cropping practices, the farmer makes less profit. When the farmer follows modern conservation methods in his operations, he will have a greater profit and a more permanent income. He will have more money to educate his children. He will be able to provide better medical care for his family, as well as better housing

and farm buildings. He will have more money to support the program of his church, and other items which help to raise the standard of living for the entire community.

The local Soil Conservation District—farmer organized and farmer administered—is in business to help land owners and operators plan, apply, and maintain conservation on their land. The District receives help from the Soil Conservation Service and other federal and state agencies to carry on this work.

The District also needs your help to get this job done. What can you do? First of all you should learn more about your District Program.

If you do not already know the supervisors of the District, get acquainted with them and let them know you are interested and are supporting them in their conservation program.

Encourage your farmer and rancher customers to practice conservation and to become co-operators of the District.

Remember that the assistance you give is not only helping the farmer but also your community and you.

George Washington once said, "I know of no pursuit in which real and important service can be rendered to any country than by improving its agriculture."

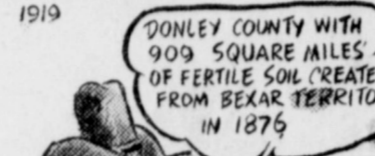

At the Farm Bureau meeting at Lelia Lake Monday night, Nov. 12th, officers were installed, and resolutions were drawn for the State convention in Houston Nov. 19, 20, 21.

Lee Shaller was re-elected President; Holly Wood, Vice Pres.; Mrs. Glen Williams, Sec.-Treas., and of course Mr. B. F. Wolford is the Service Agent. By the way Mr. Wolford is attending the Farm Bureau Convention in Houston. The rest of us were too busy to attend. We thought we would just let the other fellow go, including me. Well he didn't go. Nobody but Mr. Wolford, and there should have been at least a car load.

That is going to be what will happen to Farm Bureau if we do not develop more of an interest in it. Farm Bureau is doing a good job for us and will continue to do a greater job for us if we put forth more effort ourselves.

(Resolutions adopted by County voting delegates is the basis of the operation of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation.— J. Walter Hammond, Pres.)

The Resolutions that were adopted for presentation to the State Convention were as follows:

It is resolved that our representatives continue to fight for the refund on non Hi-way gasoline, and use his or their influence to promote the Farm to Market road program.

Be it resolved that the State (Texas) Farm Bureau permit each District that so desires to use a part of their District funds for District radio advertising, of Service Program and Farm Bureau.

Be it resolved that steps be taken to control the smoke from carbon black plants in areas where cotton and other crops are grown and being damaged by it.

A report was made from our former Sec.-Treas. Mrs. Butler and a brief outline of what Farm Bureau means to us was given by Lee Shaller, assisted by Mr. McBrayer, Mr. Wood, and Mr. Wolford.

I have obtained a few forms for application of gasoline tax exemption. At present, I have not decided upon the proper place to leave them for your convenience. Mr. Robert S. Calvert your Comptroller has politely informed me that a copy of the form is returned with each exemption check, and that they are to be filed away for you to have when you are ready to make your next application.

Of course Mr. Calvert is being directed by the Legislation and that Legislation is directed by the people with the most influence.

In this case it isn't likely to be the Farm Bureau.

Stewardship Revival To Be Led By Laymen During Next 4 Years

WACO—The Texas Methodist Planning Commission has adopted plans for an all-Texas stewardship revival to be led by laymen during the next four years.

The Commission was in session at the Methodist Home here Nov. 6. The report was presented by Dr. D. L. Landrum of Palestine and authorized the executive committee to name a steering committee and secure a full-time leader for the revival.

"The object is to create a greater sense of stewardship in the Methodist Church," said Dr. Landrum, "and not to raise funds for any specific cause." The emphasis will be stewardship of

life, time and money, he pointed out.

The Commission also heard Bishop A. Frank Smith say that "the recent all-state evangelistic mission was the greatest thing that ever came to Texas Methodism." About 25,000 commitments to Christ and church membership were reported and the ne winter in evangelism among laymen is marked, Bishop William C. Martin pointed out.

Roy Farrow, executive secretary of the Texas Methodist College Association, reported that he had assisted 100 churches in planning their budgets or in building campaigns, and that they had increased their finances by at least \$1,000,000.

The Texas Methodist Historical Commission reported that Dr. Robert W. Goodloe, professor of church history in Perkins School of Theology, SMU, had been elected to write the history of Texas Methodism since 1900 and is at work. W. B. Rider of Ennis, treasurer of the Central Texas Conference, was elected treasurer of the Commission.

Officers elected for the Planning Commission are chairman, Pres. Umphrey Lee, SMU; vice chairman, Dr. Hubert Johnson, superintendent of the Methodist Home; secretary, Dr. Landrum. Dr. Lee succeeds Pat Thompson of Bay City who has served as chairman the past year.

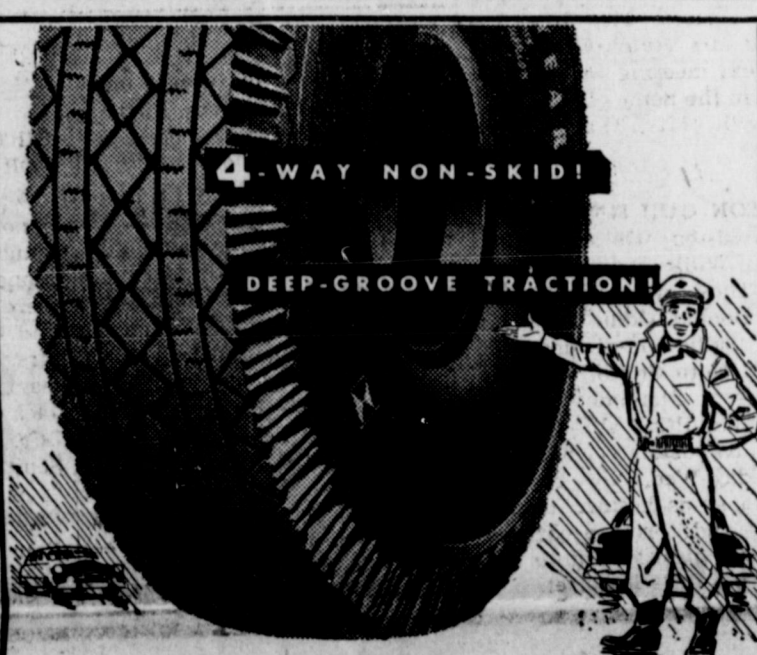

A MODERNIZED ART

News From The Office of Price Stabilization

The Office of Price Stabilization this week issued a new dollars-and-cents ceiling price regulation covering sales of used passenger automobiles, according to Hoyle Bowles, chief of the Industrial Materials and Manufactured Goods section of the Lubbock District Office of Price Stabilization.

The regulation sets dollars-and-cents ceilings for each body style, line or series, of each make of used passenger car, for the years 1940 through 1951, and are listed in the regulation. These ceilings are to be reduced at the rate of

2 per cent every calendar quarter beginning on January 1, 1952.

The dollars-and-cents ceiling prices portion of the regulation goes into effect December 20. In the interim, current ceiling prices as established by the guide books adopted by dealers remain in force, Bowles said.

For models for 1940 through 1950, the new ceilings reflect a 6 per cent depreciation from the January 1951 price level, representing a 2 per cent depreciation for each of the first three calendar quarters of 1951. This depreciation rate is in accord with standard trade practice, Bowles pointed out. Ceiling prices for 1951 model cars are determined on the basis of current market prices.

Used cars offered for retail sale must bear a tag or label stating the make, model, line or series, and the ceiling price, including any extra, special or optional equipment. Also the price at which the car is being offered for sale must be stated.

Efforts will be made to get copies of the used car regulation (CPR94) to every dealer in the 69-county district as soon as they are available.

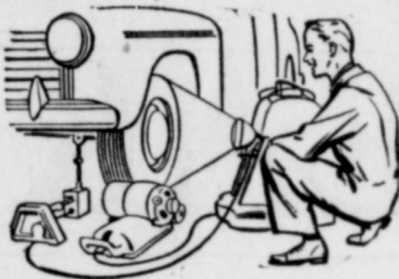
