## Quail Season To Open Saturday

Sportsmen from all over this area are looking forward to the opening of Quail Season Saturday, Dec. 1st and the county is expected to be saturated with hunters Sunday from all over the Panhandle area. The report is that the birds are plentiful, but hunting restrictions in the county are more binding and each hunter had better know where he is hunting and have permission to hunt there.

On October 8th of this year a new organization was formed in Donley County which was named the Donley County Game Association. Membership in this association takes in several thousand acres of land that is governed by the association. To hunt on any of the members land a hunter must first secure a permit from the secretary who is Sid Pointer and pay the required fee. These areas will be patrolled throughout the hunting season and all places in the association will have signs displayed. A hunter is violating the law if he hunts on any place without permission or along any public road.

A good example of what can happen was brought to light here Wednesday afternoon when Sheriff Guy Wright reported that a prominent business man was turned in for pot-shooting birds on a farm southeast of town Wednesday morning out of season. Sheriff Wright picked up the violator and found six birds in his car. Charges were being filed Wednesday afternoon. The offense carries a fine of \$10 to \$50 for each bird, with each bird being a separate offense and also suspends the violator's right to hunt for a year.

If you do not intend to stay within the law and do not want to pay a heavy fine and have your hunting privileges taken away for a year, it is best that you just stay at home, for farmers in this area are going to be on the look out for such violators and will turn you in without any argument.

The limit this year has been raised back to 12 birds per day. The limit last year was 10.

## Donley Farmers Sign Up To Raise Castor Beans

County Agent H. M. Breedlove stated this morning that communications were under way with the Baker Castor Oil Company of Oklahoma City for a contract for Donley County for a market for castor beans planted next year by farmers in this county. Breedlove has been advised by the company that direct information on the 1952 program by the company will be available after the first of the year.

Farmers in the county have signed up over 600 acres at the present time and Breedlove is urging that all farmers who want to try castor beans in 1952 to come by his office and sign up the acreage they intend to plant. This information is necessary so that he can give the company the acreage that will be planted next year and enough acreage must be signed up to justify a contract with the company. Farmers who have signed up acreage of castor beans for next year will be called into a meeting before the contract is signed with the Baker Company and they will be given all available information and then they can decide if they want to accept the contract.

Castor bean production runs from 300 to 1200 pounds per acre depending on the type of land where they are planted and the rainfall. The price paid for the hulled seed last year was eleven dollars and forty cents per hundred pounds.

Be sure to drop by the office of the county agent in the next two weeks and sign up if you intend to try castor beans next year.

The parade will move through the downtown area of Clarendon at 2:30 P. M. with the reindeer prancing and tossing their antlers from side to side and popping their ankles as Santa Claus drives them and they pull his bright, red sleigh. "Santa Claus will be very busy that afternoon but he has assured me that he will find time after the parade to talk to the children," Jimmy Faulkner, Chamber of Commerce manager said.

The reindeer will be wearing bright, red harness with their names imprinted on brass nameplates. Picking out the names of the reindeer as they parade slowly down the streets of Clarendon will be a special thrill for the children and grown-ups, too.

Santa Claus has been very busy since last Christmas making toys and gifts for little boys and girls all over the world. He is about caught up. He and his reindeer are taking time off Saturday afternoon, December 1st, to be in Clarendon at 2:30 P. M. and parade down the streets as he did last year and see all his little friends again.

The Retail Promotions Committee of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce and the civic minded citizens of Clarendon have joined forces to bring this special attraction to town in connection with the Second Annual Clarendon Christmas Parade. **Examination Announced For Rural Carrier**

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Hedley, Texas.

The examination will be held at Clarendon, Texas.

Receipt of applications will close on December 13, 1951.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the closing date for receipt of applications.

**Salary**

On a standard daily route of 30 miles, the salary of a rural carrier is \$3,158, with \$20.00 per year additional for each mile or major fraction in excess thereof. Salaries on shorter routes or routes with less frequent service are proportionately less.

**Promotion**

Rural carriers whose services are satisfactory receive regular promotions.

**Vehicle Equipment**

All rural carriers must furnish and maintain, at their own expense, sufficient vehicle equipment for the prompt handling of the mails. They are allowed an equipment maintenance of 9c per mile on the basis of the daily mileage scheduled (this amounts to \$823.50 per year for a 30-mile route).

The examination will be open only to citizens of, or persons who

owe allegiance to, The United States who are actually residing in the territory served by the Post Office where the vacancy exists, who have been actually residing there for one year next preceding the closing date for receipt of applications, and who meet the other requirements set for in Form AN-1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles.

Form AN-1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the vacancy office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington 25, D. C. Applications must be on file with the Commission at Washington 25, D. C., prior to the close of business on the date specified above.

Depositing an application in the mail by the closing date is not sufficient to meet the date of filing; the application must actually be received by the Commission on or before the closing date specified.

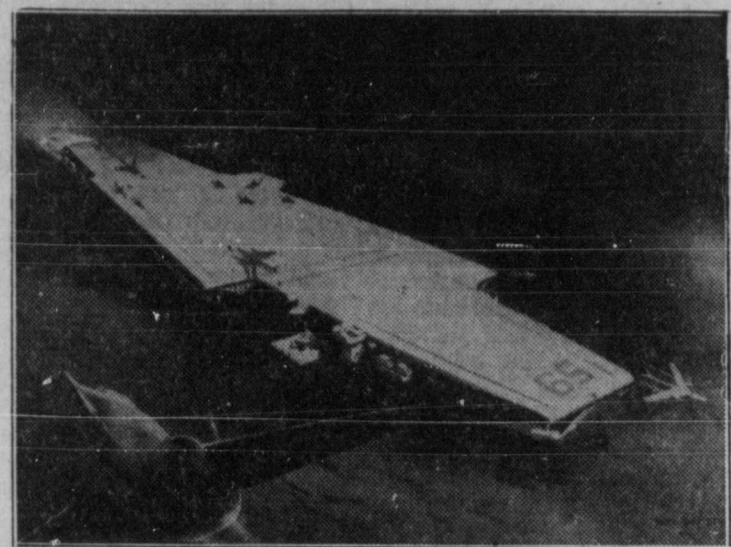

NEW AIRCRAFT CARRIER COULD ACCOMMODATE FOUR FAMOUS SHIPS ON ITS FLIGHT DECK

Plans for USS Forrestal Would Have Space for Frigates Hartford and Constitution and the Ironclads Monitor and Merrimac



Above is an artist's conception of the Navy's newest aircraft carrier USS Forrestal, the 59,900-ton flush deck vessel which will be built at Newport News, Va. The ship will have an over-all length of 1,040 feet, a beam of 128 feet on the waterline and an extreme width of 252 feet at one point on the flight deck. Some idea of the ship's immense size may be gained when it is realized that the old Constitution, 175 feet over-all; the Hartford, 225 feet; the Monitor, 172 feet and the Merrimac, 178 feet, could be placed side by side on its flight deck with room to spare for destroyers and other smaller boats. The USS Forrestal will be the Navy's first carrier with a retractable bridge. Her four catapults, four elevators and a large flight deck will enable the ship to handle the heaviest carrier aircraft of latest design. Designed to accommodate approximately 3,500 men, including her air group personnel, more comfort and efficiency for her crew will be provided by air conditioned quarters, while escalators will quickly carry pilots to the flight deck from ready rooms below. The Forrestal will cruise at a speed of 30 knots plus and will be capable of remaining at sea for three months without replenishing.

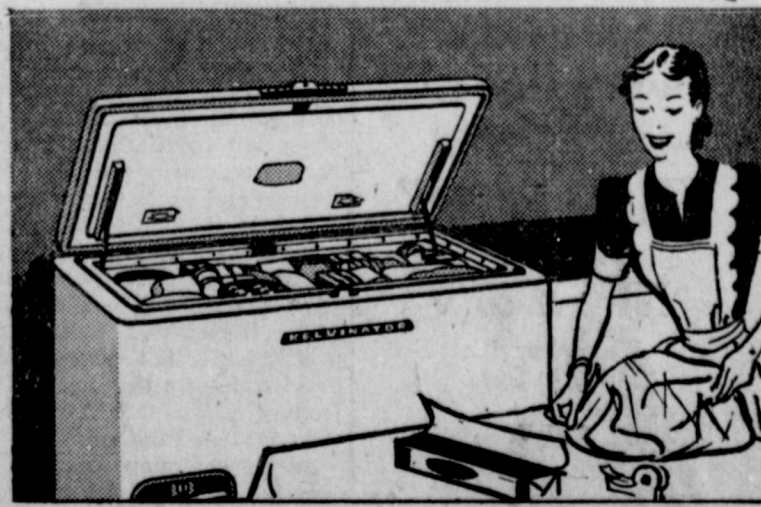

**FARM NEWS**  
From the County PMA Committee  
**1952 COUNTY PMA COMMITTEE**  
The County Convention was held on November 23, 1951 at the County Agents Office. The County Committee was elected in the following order: James B. Smith, Chairman; C. P. Hamilton, Vice-Chairman; and Walter I. Lowe, Regular Member. These men will take office December 1, 1951.  
**COTTON ACREAGE**  
Cards were mailed out last week to each cotton farmer in the county. Be sure to fill these cards out, and mail them back to the office as soon as possible.  
**1951 ACP BUDGET**  
There is still money in the 1951 ACP Budget if you want to carry out some permanent practices and can get them completed by December 31. If you need some terraces, a waterway, earthen dam or a well and are ready to go to work any time, come by the office and let us help you.  
**PMA CHAIRMAN STRESSES CONSERVATION JOB**  
The job we face is one of bringing the land now in use - - to a high level of economic production on a sustained basis. We need to offset soil deterioration generally, and on many soils go even further and build them up to higher levels of productivity.  
According to B. F. Vance, Chairman of the Texas State PMA Committee, that statement of Dr. Robert M. Salter, new Chief of the Soil Conservation Service, briefly sets out the objectives of the 1952 Agricultural Conservation Program.  
As the chairman sees it, the first job of ACP is to check deterioration to prevent the soil from becoming less and less productive as the thin layer of topsoil is washed or blown away. But hand in hand with this is the job of restoring and improving the productivity of the land.  
Cropping as well as erosion depletes the soil of plant food. He points out that on an acre of fertile soil growing a cultivated crop such as corn, the productivity decline may be as great as when 20 tons of topsoil are lost through erosion.

Chairman Vance stresses that the nation is faced with the challenge of producing enough to meet defense needs and at the same time keeping our land productive to meet even greater demands in the future. The Agricultural Conservation Program, he points out, is one of the tools available to farmers to help them protect, preserve and build up the soil on their farms.  
Progress will continue so long as we have enough venturesome people, impatient people, people with faith in the future.  
Under the 1952 Agricultural Conservation Program each farmer will develop a specific conservation program for his own farm. The program for each farm will be pin-pointed to the needs of that particular farm.

### U. S. Defense Bond Sales Total \$16,887 In Donley County

Donley County's sales totaled \$16,887.50 during the first U. S. Defense Bond drive, Nathan Adams of Dallas, state chairman, informed Judge J. R. Porter, local county chairman. The drive was held from Sept. 3 through Nov. 13th.

Final sales figures showed that Series E bonds accounted for \$13,387.50 and Series F and G for \$3,500 of this county's total.

Sales of \$27,778,453.25 in Texas during the drive were almost 50 per cent more than normal, Mr. Adams said. "Normally sales for this period would have been about \$18,000,000 or \$19,000,000," he said, "and the fact that sales were so much higher is definite proof that the people of Texas are responding as they always do, to the country's need in national emergencies."

The sales total for the state included \$22,665.25 in Series E bonds and \$5,318,788 in Series F and G. There were no state or county quotas, the goal being the "largest possible" volume of sales.

Mr. Adams expressed appreciation to the thousands of citizens who served as volunteers in the drive, but urged that they continue their efforts.

"The need for buying Defense Bonds still exists," he said. "With our country engaged in a gigantic preparedness program, these bonds form an important economic link in our defense."

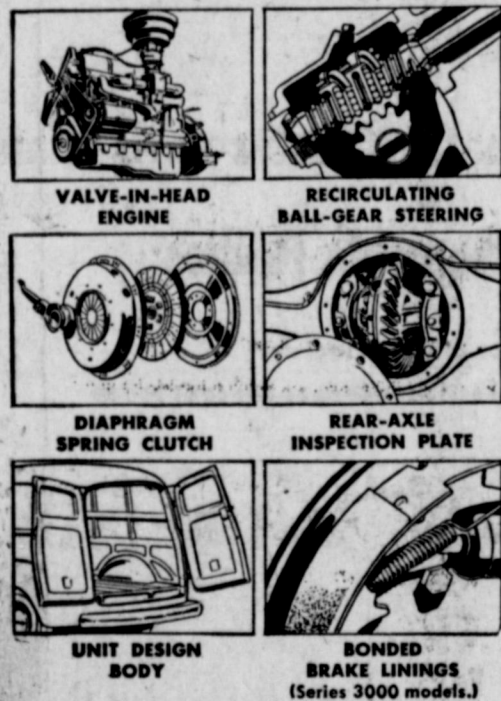

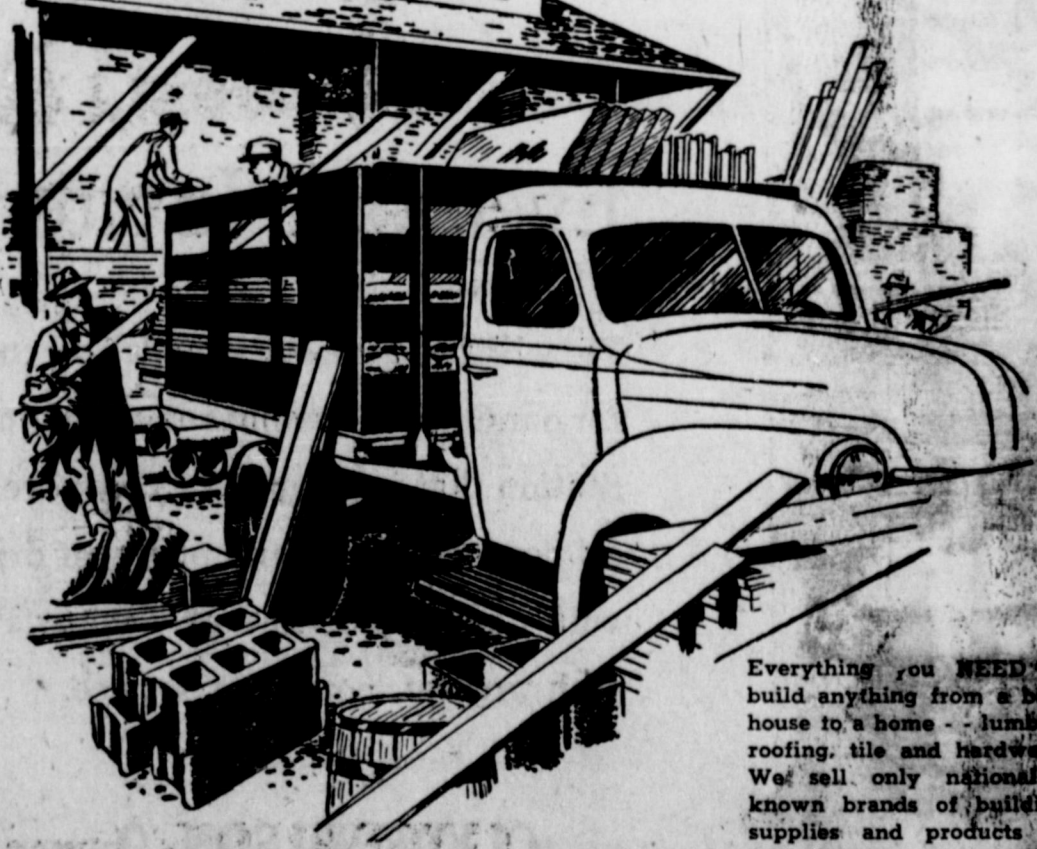

**Plains Hunters Contribute Most Dope**

Panhandle and Lower Plains Sportsmen contributed almost half of the total information to the Texas Bobwhite Quail study carried out by the Texas Game and Fish Commission during the 1950 hunting season.

Hemphill County, with a total of 498 quail wings turned in, led the State. It is believed that almost this many wings are needed from each county each year if the effects of local weather and other factors controlling quail populations are to be properly measured. The wing analysis last season reflected a good hatch and

a healthy outlook for the coming opening December 1st.

Game technicians need to know the rate of quail turnover or what the life span is for a given generation of quail. When and only when these things are known about a quail crop can the relative importance of hunting as a limiting influence be measured.

What hunters need is a sustained yield with fair to good hunting every season. To provide this kind of hunting is the purpose of game management.

Bobwhites hatched the preceding spring and summer carry their age within ten day limits on certain feather patterns found on their wings. The sex is of

course easily determined by the different color markings on the head and neck of males and females. By use of these indicators, the quail biologist can determine the make-up of all quail populations as surely as the rancher knows the make-up of his range herds.

Last hunting season, for the first time, hunters throughout Texas were asked to help in a state-wide inventory of the quail population. Panhandle and Lower Plains Counties were the source of almost half the wings turned in. Even so, many counties in good quail range were not represented at all, and others could not be treated separately because of insufficient information.

Among 1,964 quail from the

hunter kill in the Lower Plains Counties last year, 85.6 percent were young birds hatched the preceding spring and summer. Among 1,663 quail from the Panhandle Counties, 85.2 percent were young birds. In both cases, the percent of adult cocks bagged was almost twice the percent of adult or parent hens. It is plain, therefore, that the incubating or brooding hen is subject to heavy losses during the nesting season. The result is shown in the ratio of young quail to old hens in the winter population. By December first last year, there were approximately 14 young quail to each adult hen.

Panhandle and Lower Plains hunters reported finding four-

tenths of a covey per man-hour of hunting. They killed one quail per man-hour, and took an average of 2.7 quail for each covey flushed. These are averages and include of course many beginners at quail hunting.

In every region of the State, the bulk of the 1950 Bobwhite hatch came off prior to August 15th.

The study confirms that the bobwhite quail ordinarily has a short life span—off-set by a high rate of replacement when things go well with the breeding season. When the breeding season is poor, the population of bobwhites falls off rapidly. And, this happens whether or not hunting has been allowed. Thus, the hunter is always dependent on young birds each year for his sport.

The assistance of hunters is again solicited in carrying on this study. Postage paid envelopes for use in collecting quail wings can be had from the local State Game Warden or by writing direct to the Texas Game and Fish Commission in Austin, Texas.

### News From The Office of Price Stabilization

Some complaints have been received from re-refiners of crankcase drainings and other used lubricating oils, alleging that many retail service stations, garages and commercial establishments, from whom the re-refiners purchase these products, are charging higher prices than charged during the base period of December 19, 1950 to January 25, 1951, according to the Lubbock District Office of Price Stabilization. OPS ceiling prices are predicated on prices charged during the base period.

The Fuels and Chemicals section of the district OPS office plans a campaign to notify sellers of crankcase drainings and used lubricating oils sold for re-refining or reclaiming purposes that such sales are subject to Ceiling Price Regulation 63. This establishes their ceiling prices at the highest prices they charged between December 19, 1950 and January 25, 1951, to buyers of the same class.

Several re-refiners of used oils have reported to the national OPS office that the prices which they are charged by retail service stations, garages and other sources of supply, have increased significantly since the base period. They expressed the opinion that these charges are above ceilings.

### Donley County Soil Conservation District News

J. R. Porter has been chosen as the outstanding Supervisor of the Donley County Soil Conservation District for 1951. This selection was made by a Conservation Committee from the local banks in the Donley County District, according to Carroll Knorpp, Chairman of the Banker's Committee.

Supervisor Porter's name has been sent in as the local District's nominee for an award to be given by the Texas Bank & Trust Company of Dallas to the outstanding Soil Conservation District Supervisor in Texas.

The winning Supervisor and his wife will be sent on an all-expense trip to some chosen area within the U. S. or its possessions to study soil conservation methods.

This award program will be an annual affair, the Dallas Bank said, and it was designed to create a better understanding and closer relationship between bankers, farmers and ranchers and Soil Conservation Districts in the State.

Jimmy Faulkner, Secretary of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, Jack Gray, accountant for the local Board of District Supervisors, and Carman Rhode, Soil Conservation Service, have been asked by Knorpp to prepare a report on Porter's activities as a District Supervisor.

This report will be sent to the Judges of this award program to substantiate the claim of the local bankers that Porter is the outstanding Soil Conservation District Supervisor in the State of Texas.
