A member of the Chapter stated: "This is not a Blood Donation Bank. We are asking only that you have your blood typed. This project will be beneficial not only to each of us as an individual, but will be a benefit to the whole county. Each man, woman and child is urged to take advantage of this free service at the same time you come in for your free Chest X-ray which is being brought here by the state. It will take only a few more minutes of your time to get your blood typed. You may have the X-ray taken without being obligated to have your blood typed, but we lope you will want to take advantage of both."





BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:




