According to Justice Department allegations, the price of 17 jewel Swiss watch movements set by a Swiss cartel at \$4.00 each. Present import duties on foreign 17 jewel watch movements brings the price up to \$6.00 each landed in this country where they are then cased, and sold to public at prices ranging from around \$40 to \$100 or over.

In American plants, it costs \$10 to make a 17 jewel watch move ment. Thus, even with present tariff, Swiss watch movements enter nation for 60% of the cost of American made movements.

While Justice Department is investigating legality of an American firm procuring merchandise at cartel pegged prices, deeper significance appears in issue.

First there is this question: Does the public benefit by the fact that 17 jewel Swiss watch movements land in nation for 40% less than U. S. cost?

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

This guarantees producers the right to indicate how they feel about keeping supplies in line with demand. Had a referendum on quotas and allotments been called in 1952, the problem of unmanageable surpluses might not exist now. The amendment takes some of the politics out of national farm legislation.
