CC to break ground on new Pampa campus

Groundbreaking for the new Clarendon College-Pampa Center \$2.6 million complex will be held at 1:30 p.m., Friday, December 11 at the building site, 1600 West Kentucky, Pampa. The public is invited.

Participating in the 30-minute program will be Dr. Raymond Hawkins, interim president of Clarendon College; Joe Kyle Reeve, Dean of CC-Pampa Center; and Don Lane, chairman of the Pampa Center Foundation.

BGR Architects-Engineers of Lubbock designed plans for a building just over 28,000 square feet to meet current needs. The complex will provide 14 classrooms, two science labs, and an electronics lab. The facility will be equipped to provide long distance learning. Provisions have been made for future expansion on the 12-acre site.

The AP Tech branch of the college opened in June on Price Road in Pampa, a mile west of the proposed building site. High school graduates and those with a GED can complete the 14-course study offered in academics and industrial training in one year. They can then enter the workforce as an entry-level machinist.

Pampa Center Foundation board members reached their final goal in October. Bids will be submitted in December, and plans are to begin construction after the first of the year, according to Don Lane, Foundation chairman.

Bull selection, management seminar set

The selection, purchase and management of the herd bull battery impacts the cow-calf enterprise in terms of genetic merit and economic performance. This is especially important when we consider that approximately four-fifths of the genetic make-up of the current calf crop is the result of the last three generations of sires used in the herd.

To address the importance of this phase of the cow-calf operation, The Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Donley County will be hosting a "Bull Selection and Management Seminar" in Clarendon on Monday, December 14. The program will be held in the Ranch and Feedlot Operations Building on the Clarendon College Campus beginning at 7:00 p.m.

This seminar is the second in a series of four that are addressing Beef Production Management. Future seminars will include: January 4, 1999 "Vaccinations & Immunology" and January 18, "Range Resource Management". These seminars are free of charge and are open to anyone interested. RR construction will temporarily close Hedley road

"Producers currently grazing CRP acreage may continue to graze the same acreage for no additional cost but stocking rates may need to be reduced to avoid damaging the cover," said Steven Orr, County Executive Director. "Producers can graze new or additional acreage but they must come to the FSA office and file a request and grazing plan prior to any grazing."

Haying of CRP acreage is not authorized.

Local resident honored at AQHA conference

AMARILLO — Clarendon resident Janice Knorrp, along with her nine female partners, received the AQHA Racing Council Mildred Vessels Special Achievement Award at a presentation on Saturday, November 14, at the Arlington Hilton in conjunction with the AQHA Racing Conference.

In 1994, the AQHA Racing Council awarded its first Mildred Vessels Special Achievement Award. This award recognizes special achievement in Quarter Horse racing during the past year and is voted on by the AQHA racing committee.

From their red nail polish to the red lips adorning their silks, blinkers, banners, bumper stickers, pens and jewelry, the 10 women known as "The Girls" have reminded all of us just how much fun a day at the races can be. Especially when you own a racehorse, and especially when you own a racehorse with a bunch of friends.

Representing five states and years of family ties and newfound friendships, "The Girls" own

leading two-year old Quarter Horse Old Habits.

They purchased the Apollo (TB) gelding for \$18,500 as a yearling and this year raced him to win the Governor's Cup Futurity at Los Alamitos, set the fastest qualifying time to the All American Futurity (01) and finish second in the Labor Day classic at Ruidoso Downs in New Mexico.

So far, Old Habits has earned \$387,008. Not bad for a horse that originally cost the girls \$18,500—that's \$1,850 for each 10-percent share.

The original partners - Sue Hukari and Bonnie Vessels of Bonsall, California, Janice Knorrp of Clarendon, and Mary Thead of Poway, in 1993. The syndicate then grew to include Connie Cobb of Tidewater, Oregon; Glori Ekker of Hanksville, Utah; Sharon Gordon of Orange, California; Melodie Knuchell of Los Alamitos, California; Cathy Monji of Long Beach, and Leslie Schwabacher of Daniel, Wyoming.

After Old Habits got rolling at Los Alamitos, he and the girls generated a great deal of interest from the media, including the Sprint Award-winning article that appeared in the widely read *Orange County Register*. Within the industry, the girls influenced other individuals to form partnerships to buy racehorses, including partnerships called The Boys and Las Ruidas.

Under Millie Vessels' leadership between 1974 and 1984, Los Alamitos Race Course in Orange County, California became the nation's leading American Quarter Horse racetrack in terms of attendance and handle.

Vessels died in 1992 and left management and ownership of Vessels Stallion Farm a San Luis Rey Downs training center to her son Frank "Scoop" Vessels the third. Frank "Scoop" Vessels made the presentation to "The Girls." Presented to "The Girls" was a bronze of a racing American Quarter Horse by Texas artist Lisa Perry.

PGWCD to conduct annual winter water level measurements

Beginning in the middle of November and lasting through February, the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District will begin conducting its annual winter water level measurement program throughout the District. Winter water level measurements help not only the District, with vital data and information for their record, but it also helps out the general public, farmers, and ranchers.

Winter water level measurements are gathered by using an E-line or a

steel tape down the casing of the well. An E-line consists of a long measuring tape with a battery-powered circuit running through it. The end of the E-line that is first placed in the hole purposely has a short in it. When this short is submerged into water, a buzzer will sound on the reel telling the operator that it has found the water level. The steel tape is used in much the same way. The tape is first covered with a blue or yellow chalk for four to five feet. This end is then inserted into the

casing. The operator must know what the previous depth was in order to put the right amount of tape into the well. The tape is then pulled back out of the well. The operator then finds the area where the chalk has been washed off the steel tape. From this reading the operator can then calculate the water level.

Now that you are more familiar with the procedure, here are some benefits that come from the gathering of this data. The PGWCD will be able

to make saturated thickness maps that are useful in locating the amount of water under the ground in a particular place. Many farmers and ranchers use these maps to locate the best places to drill irrigation wells or windmills. Other maps prepared from this data are water level and depletion maps. The water level maps tell us where the present water level is located. The depletion maps tell us how many feet the water table has risen or fallen in

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Leia Deyhle of Canyon has been selected to attend The National Young Leaders Conference from January 26-31, 1999, in Washington, D.C.

The National Young Leaders Conference is a unique leadership development program for high school students who have demonstrated leadership potential and scholastic merit. Leia, who is formerly from Clarendon, will be among 350 outstanding National Scholars attending the conference from across America.

The theme of the National Young Leaders Conference is The Leaders of Tomorrow Meeting the Leaders of Today. Throughout the six-day conference, Leia will interact with key

leaders and newsmakers from the three branches of government, the media, and the diplomatic corps.

Highlights of the program include welcoming remarks from the floor of the United States House of Representatives and a panel discussion with prominent journalists at the National Press Club. Scholars will visit foreign embassies and receive policy briefings from senior government officials. Leia may also meet with her Senators and Representative or an appointed member of their staff to discuss important issues facing Canyon and the nation.

To complement these special meetings and briefings, Leia will participate in a number of leadership skill-building activities. In one activ-

ity, "If I Were President," students role-play the President, members of the Cabinet and representatives from Capitol Hill who must respond to an international crisis. The National Young Leaders Conference culminates with the "Model Congress," in which Scholars assume the roles of United States Representatives by debating, amending and voting on proposed legislation.

Each year, only 7,000 outstanding youth nationwide may participate in the 20 sessions of the National Young Leaders Conference.

As you can see, this is not a new program. The PGWCD has been measuring water levels on many different wells throughout the District. On some wells, as much as 30 years worth of data has been collected. 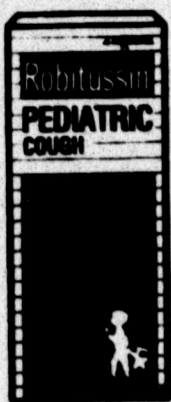

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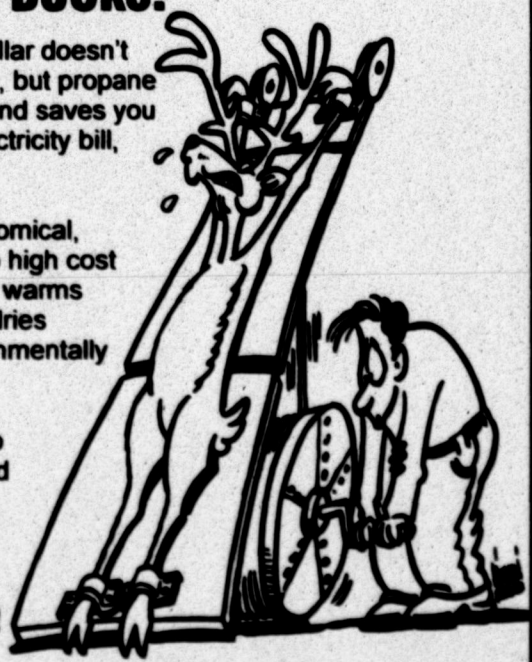

The Lady Broncos will travel to the Abernathy tournament December 10-12 and to Memphis on Tuesday, December 15.

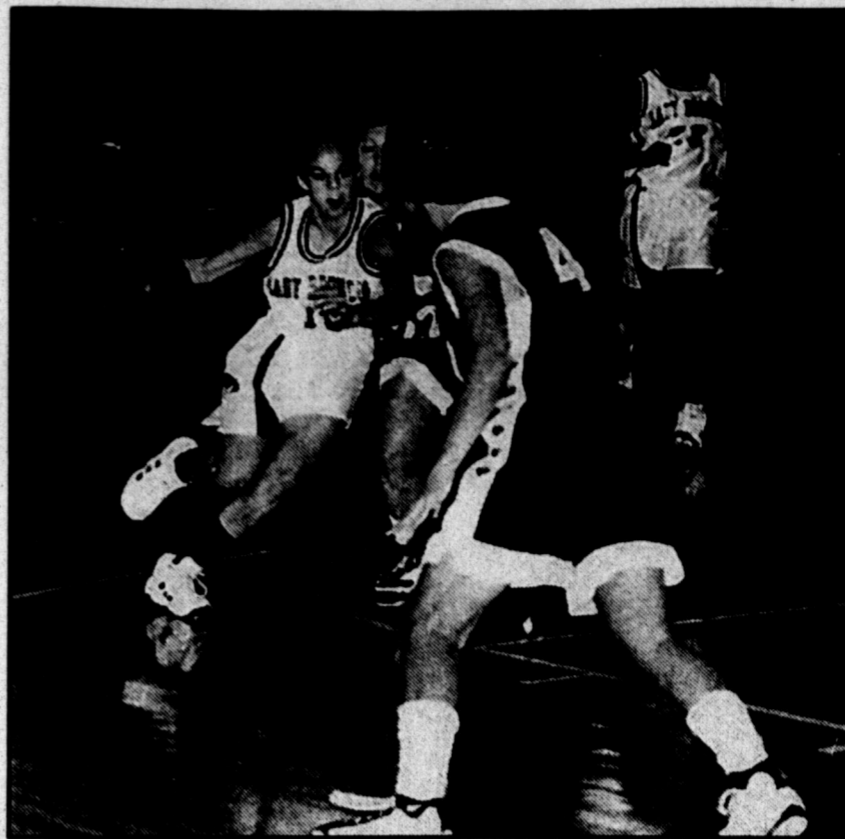

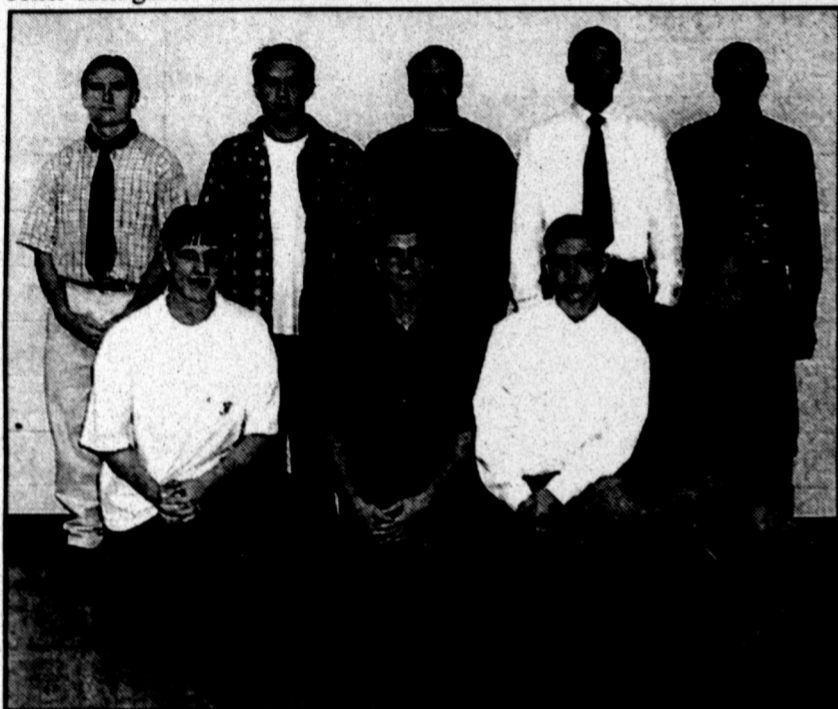
