## Boy Scout Camporee Scheduled May 16-17

Approximately one hundred Boy Scouts and leaders from the four Counties comprising the Southern District, Adobe Walls Council, are expected to assemble on the banks of Buck Creek, five miles southwest of Wellington, Friday and Saturday, for their annual Spring Camporee, Henry Sullivan, Chairman of the District's Camping & Activities Committee announced this week.

The Camporee will open officially Friday night with a public campfire to be held at the Camporee site. Saturday morning will be spent in instruction periods on Scout Skills, including: Axeman-ship, Signalling, First Aid, Compass use, Map Reading, Map Making, Determination of Directions without a Compass, Hiking Methods and Equipment, Camp Layout and Equipment, Instructors for these subjects will include: Sandy K. Parsons, Jr., Scoutmaster, Troop 32, Wellington; Dr. Tom R. Hunter, Chairman of District Health & Safety Committee; John H. Pound, District Scout Executive; Dr. Dale V. Watkins, Mr. Dan Henard, and Mr. Sullivan.

## Mesquite Control Demonstration To Be Held June 5th

Mesquite control on ranges is getting a lot of attention in Donley County and County Agent H. M. Breedlove will hold a demonstration on the JA Ranch on June 5th to show the results of spraying of two years ago and last year. 2-4-5-7, diesel oil and water was used for the spraying. All persons interested in mesquite control are invited and county agents, PMA, SCS and all committees from over the Panhandle are invited to attend. The area covered with spraying will be about seven thousand acres and also spraying for this year will be in operation.

Mr. Fisher, superintendent of the Spur Experiment station will be present to discuss mesquite control with chemicals and range management. He is considered one of the foremost authorities on these subjects in the nation.

The demonstration will last for a half day and start from the office of the county agent at 1 P. M. Final plans for the field day will be seen in this paper at a later date before the field trip to look over the demonstration.

### Control of Weeds Demonstration Slated For May 19th

The latest information from the Texas A&M College experiment stations deals with premerger spraying of cotton for control of weeds. County Agent H. M. Breedlove will hold a demonstration on the E. R. Myers farm northeast of Lelia Lake next Monday, May 19th at 2 P. M. Mr. Hargrove, a specialist in this new field, will assist the county agent in the demonstration.

The ground is sprayed with dinitro compound at the same time the cotton is planted and this will kill weed seed and form a crust that prevents growth, but the cotton will come on through and have protection from weeds for a period of about three weeks or longer. If cotton is hailed out it can be planted over without harm.

This new chemical we are trying in this section could be of a great labor saving to the farmers in hoeing cotton. Breedlove said. It has worked with good results in other sections and the county agent says that he is anxious to use it in this higher altitude.

Every one is invited to attend this demonstration, and another demonstration will be held at this same place several weeks later to see the results of the weed control.

## FARM NEWS

From the County PMA Committee

### DEEP PLOWING:

The Deep Plowing practice has proven to be a very good practice this year. Due to so much wind and dust the practice received its real test. Up to date, there has been 3,895.0 acres plowed under the CMS program. The major part of this was plowed 18 inches or deeper. There is no doubt that this practice will prove to be one of the most valuable soil conserving practices of this County.

### PRACTICES:

The following producers have carried out practices since May 1, 1952. Those producers who have been issued approvals for grass seeding are: H. K. Leathers, Gordon Bain, James Gould, Lovett Nobles, Joe R. Leathers, W. L. Jordan, W. E. Grimsley, W. R. Harris, J. D. Swift, W. S. Montgomery, Fontayne Elmore, Vance Gray, C. L. Harris. Bill Thornberry is the only producer who received an approval for Erosion Control Dam.

### CONTROL OF SAGEBRUSH:

A few of the producers have been in to the County Office asking about the sagebrush practice. The specifications are as follows: The practice may be approved only for those areas where it is determined by the county committee that the density of sagebrush is such that it is preventing a desirable growth of native pasture grasses. The practice will not be approved if the county committee determines that the area is overgrazed. Prior approvals will not be given which will result in a total payment under the 1949, 1950, 1951 and 1952 programs of more than \$5 per acre for eliminating or controlling all varieties of competitive plants or shrubs

in an area. Sagebrush must be controlled on an area of sufficient size to permit the growth of native pasture grassed. The farm or ranch operator must agree to effectively control grazing during the year. If the county committee determines that the control of sagebrush under this practice will reduce the vegetative cover to such an extent as to increase soil erosion, artificial reseeding will also be required.

Where control is by mechanical means (bulldozer, roller-cutter, etc.) treatment must be done between June 1 and July 31.

Where control is by means of spraying with formulation of 2,4-D the area must be sprayed between April 20 and June 10. Best results are obtained when spraying is done in early morning when dew is on sagebrush. Care should be exercised not to let the 2,4-D spray or mist get on susceptible plants, such as cotton, legumes, truck crops, ornamental shrubs, fruit trees, or other valuable tree.

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Self-employed persons who failed to file Schedule C with their 1951 income tax returns are now delinquent with respect to their new social security taxes. This means they are subject to penalties and interest. Furthermore, they are thus far failing to receive credits toward social security benefits.

"We have every reason to think that the vast majority of self-employed have properly filed Schedule C with the Collector of Internal Revenue in connection with their 1951 income tax returns," John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office said today. "Nevertheless, our public contacts indicate that a considerable number have failed to do so despite widespread publicity that has been given the new provisions of the law by the press," he added. He advises all such delinquent social security tax payers to file Schedule C immediately with the Collector of Internal Revenue. This will save them trouble and expense and will insure them against future loss of benefits to which they and their families would be entitled. "The social security tax requirement applies to self-employment earnings from \$400 to \$3,600. Farm operators, certain professions, and funeral directors are exempted," Sanderson added.

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that valuable protection is afforded the self-employed and their families under the new social security program, in some cases with as little as a year and a half of work covered by the law. Monthly payments to a family group can total as much as \$150, or the retired individual may be entitled to as much as \$30 a month.

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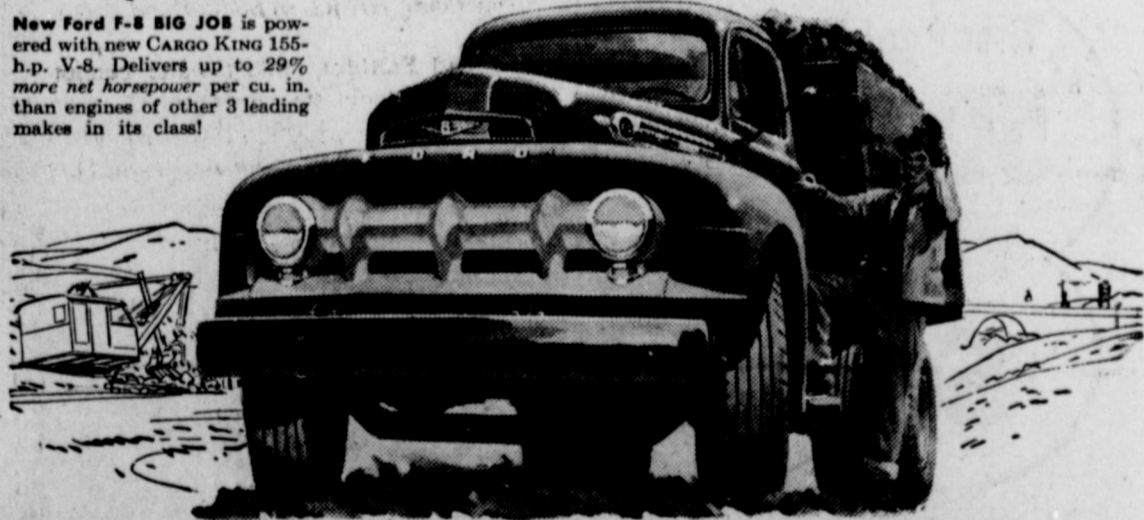
