Local Baseball Club Makes Arrangements For Permanent Field

The Clarendon Baseball Club has made arrangements with the Donley County Outdoor Entertainment Association for a permanent field. The Baseball Club is planning to improve the field with bleachers to seat 160 people and complete screening from first base around to third base. With this physical plant the Clarendon Baseball Club will be in a position to furnish a first-class baseball season for its supporters and the followers of the Caprock Baseball League.

The Club has decided to sell reserved parking spaces behind the screened section from the bleachers to first base and from the bleachers to third base to help finance the building of the screen and the bleachers. A minimum of 24 protected parking spaces will be offered for sale for the entire season; the name of each purchaser will be placed on his individual space to reserve it for him. Those fans who would like to reserve their space now may contact Mr. F. Phelan who will have the field layout.

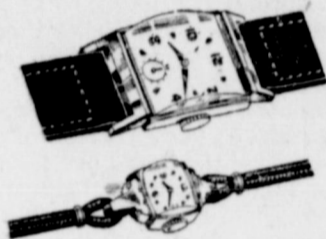

From The Office of Price Stabilization

Several members of the Lubbock district office of the Office of Price Stabilization are in training and preparing to assist in a nation-wide business survey to get under way later this month.

The survey is to be a study of percentage markups in use by

wholesale and retail grocers on products bought and sold in the period immediately preceding the outbreak of war in Korea, according to district OPS officials.

The nation-wide survey, which will be conducted by the OPS in cooperation with the Bureau of Labor Statistics, will be used to determine how the markups used in the agency's wholesale and retail grocery ceiling price regu-

tions compare with the markups resulting from the margins grocers were using in the pre-Korea period, May 24 - June 24, 1950.

The present OPS grocery markups permitted are substantially the same as those used during World War II by the Office of Price Administration. The survey is designed to determine whether there should be any changes in these markups due to

changes in food marketing practices since OPA days.

On the basis of statistically selected samples, the survey will cover all major types of food retailers and wholesalers operating under the grocery regulations in large and small cities throughout the country.

Both food items and non-food items handled by grocers will be covered. The information will be

gathered during actual visits to business establishments by trained interviewers operating out of OPS field offices.

To insure consistency of data, interviewers will use detailed forms designed jointly by OPS and BLS in the national office.

Individual company information will be held in confidence. Jarvis Witt of the Lubbock district office is the supervisor of the project in this area and will be assisted by interviewers from the district OPS office.

All personnel for the survey are from the OPS, but training is under the direction of the Bureau of Labor Statistics. BLS will review the collection of data. BLS will also do the tabulation work and make the information available to OPS in a form to make it usable in re-examination of the markups in the grocery ceiling price regulations.

Hormone Sprays Kill Undesirable Growths

AUSTIN — Ranchers now can use hormone sprays to clear pastures of mesquite and other large brush as well as weeds, a special lecturer at the University of Texas reports.

He is Dr. George Sherman Avery, Jr., Brooklyn, N. Y., Botanic Garden director and famed plant scientist, who is a visiting instructor for a graduate course in botany.

"Such hormones, or chemical substances which are growth factors, won't harm pasture grasses," Dr. Avery said. "Two effective hormones for improving pastures are 2, 4-D and 2,4,5-T, which will kill cactus, elm, black brush, blue brush, sand sage, huisache, and yaupon, as well as mesquite.

He also described how hormones can be used to control weeds in wheat, rice, and strawberry fields; keep citrus fruits from dropping off trees prematurely; and prevent rosebud growth in stored nursery stocks.



"Ranchers, farmers and gardeners can find the correct hormone spray for their needs by contacting agricultural agents, hardwaremen, feed dealers or nurserymen," Dr. Avery said.

He predicted scientists will perfect hormone sprays for killing weeds in most field crops, preventing freeze damage to fruits, speeding peach and pear growth, and producing seedless apples and pears.

Veterans' News

Payments to veterans for benefits administered by the Veterans Administration are tax-free and need not be considered in computing Federal income tax, VA reminded veterans today.

Also, VA added, dividends which veterans have received on their GI insurance policies are exempt from taxation, and need not be reported.

Among the tax-exempt VA payments are the following:

Subsistence allowance for veterans training in schools, on farms and on-the-job under the GI Bill and Public Law 16 (for the disabled).

Payments by VA to be applied to veterans' GI loans. Under the GI Bill, VA pays the leader an amount equivalent to four per cent of the guaranteed portion of the loan, which is credited to the veteran's account.

Disability compensation and pensions paid to veterans for both service-connected and non-service-connected disabilities.

Grants for seriously disabled veterans for homes designed for wheelchair living.

World War I emergency officers' retirement pay.

Death benefits to families of deceased veterans are also exempt from taxation, VA said. These include compensation, pension and all GI insurance payments.

Veterans who sell their homes and let the purchaser assume the 5 per cent GI loans remain personally responsible for the payment of the loan, Veterans Administration warned today.

VA said World War II veterans should not sell their property without making certain that their interests are protected. The best way to do that, VA stated, is to have the purchaser pay cash or arrange a loan in his own name.

VA points out that property is more easily sold with the favorable 4 per cent GI mortgage remaining in effect—a factor that should influence the selling price.

However, a veteran selling his property with the GI loan intact runs the risk of later having to pay all or part of the debt result-

ing from a default by the new owner.

Should the new owner of the property fail to keep up the mortgage payments, the holder of the GI mortgage can foreclose.

When the proceeds of the sale resulting from the foreclosure do not cover the amount of the GI loan outstanding, the difference may remain a debt against the veteran. The VA has to pay the holder of the mortgage for the guaranteed portion of the debt. The veteran will then owe the government the next amount of that payment, plus interest.

In many areas throughout the country, foreclosure may take place without notice being given directly to the original veteran-borrower (for example, foreclosure by publication) even though the veteran remains liable for the debt.

For this reason, the veteran is urged to keep the holder of the GI mortgage and the Veterans Administration advised of any change of his address. He should also request the lender to notify him if the new owner defaults.

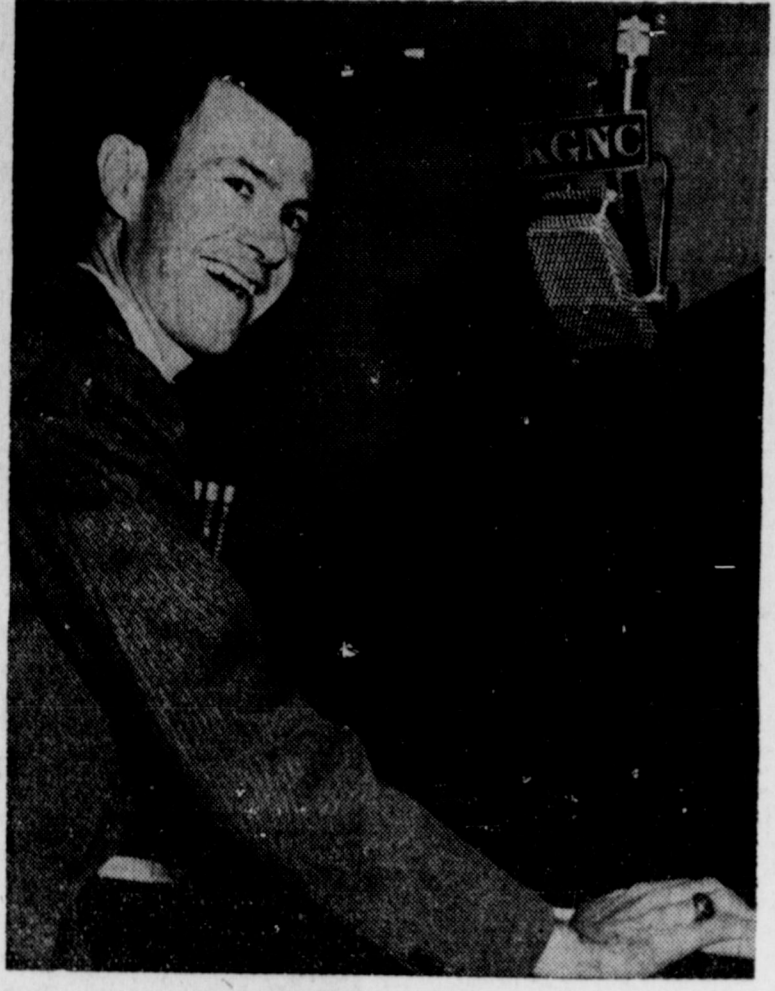
VA, when notified of property sales and of any change of address, will inform the veteran when it learns that the loan is in serious default or in danger of foreclosure. The veteran can then contact the holder of the GI mortgage and the owner of the property to protect his interest.

In many instances, the veteran might be able to obtain title back from the owner and either sell the property to cover the unpaid balance or rent the property for enough to keep the loan current.

Veterans faced with the problem of foreclosure on property they have sold with the GI mortgage in effect can obtain assistance and advice from their nearest Veterans Administration Regional Office.

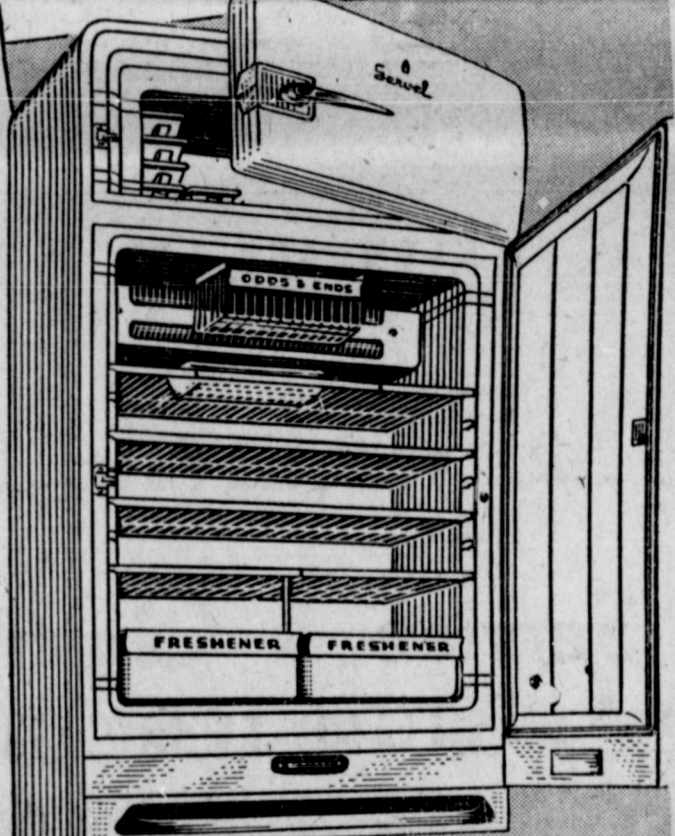

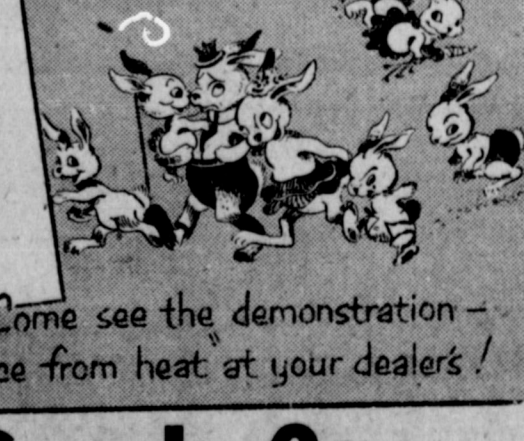

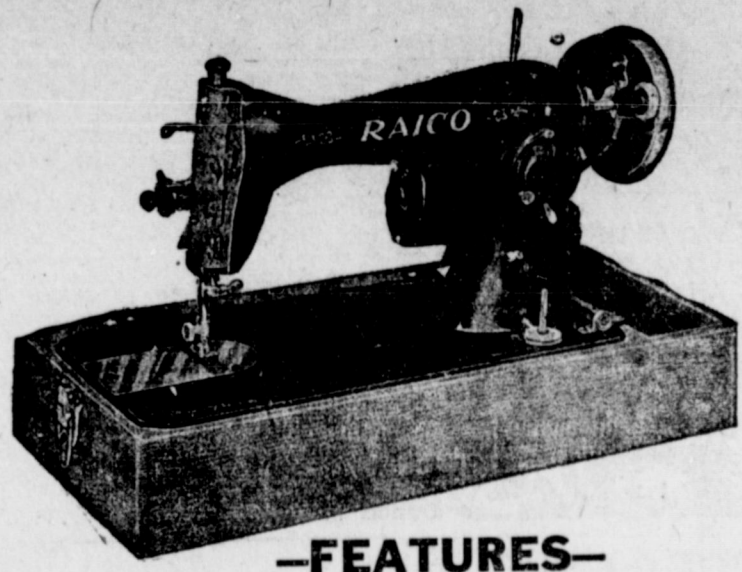

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FARM NEWS

From the County PMA Committee

USDA CHANGES LISTED

Major steps taken by the Department of Agriculture along the lines of the Hoover Report on Government Reorganization were recently detailed by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan. Among such steps have been these:

1. A year ago, the Soil Conservation Service and the Agricultural Conservation Program of the Production and Marketing Administration were geared together at county, State and national levels, with agreement on programs and plans being required before going forward with them.

2. Physical consolidation of USDA offices at county and State levels was started to provide "one-Step service" for farmers, to prevent either duplication or gaps in programs, and to start substantial economies in daily operations. The job is half completed and the rest will be accomplished shortly.

3. In spite of greatly increased services rendered to farmers and the public, the Department's budget since 1940 has been reduced about 25 per cent—from more than 1.6 billion to about 1.2 billion; and the number of part time employees has been reduced about one half, and full time employees from 71,000 to 57,000—about a fifth.

4. The organizational structure of the Department has been greatly simplified—in 1940, there were 18 program agencies plus a number of staff agencies reporting to the Secretary; today there are only 10 program agencies, plus a similar number of staff

agencies. Secretary Brannan also corrected a statement being circulated throughout the country that the "bulk of the appropriations of the Soil Conservation Service are administered by another agency, the PMA. Said the Secretary: "Not a single dollar of Soil Conservation Service appropriations is administered by any other agency."

GRAIN SORGHUM AND WHEAT LOANS TO MATURE

Producers who have 1951 crop grain sorghum in CCC loan have until March 31 to pay off their loan and redeem the grain, according to B. F. Vance, State PMA Committee Chairman. Loans that are not paid off by that time will be taken over by CCC in full settlement of the loan note.

Texas grain sorghum growers placed 7,354,223 cwt. of 1951 crop grain under CCC loan program and were loaned 14.6 million dollars by CCC. It is not known how much of this grain has already been redeemed by growers. Market prices have been high enough that growers could pay off their loan plus interest and carrying charges and realize some money on the transaction.

Wheat growers have until April 30 to pay off their wheat loans on 1951 Crop wheat. More than 3 million bushels of Texas grown 1951 crop wheat was placed under CCC loans Program on which growers were loaned 6.5 million dollars. Wheat not redeemed by April 30 will be taken over by CCC in satisfaction of the loans.
