### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

#### Individual's Privilege Against Self-Incrimination Explained

The privilege or rule against self-incrimination makes news from time to time in connection with court proceedings and legislative committee hearings. The statement, "I refuse to answer on the grounds that it may tend to incriminate me", has become familiar to many. Some do not understand the background of the legal principle which allows a person to remain mute in such circumstances.

Lawyers say this is one of the most important basic rights of the individual in this country. The Fifth Amendment of our Federal Constitution provides that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself." The early American statesmen insisted that this guarantee become a

laws. The privilege against self-incrimination is not only incorporated in the Federal Bill of Rights, but is also guaranteed under the constitution of all but two of the 48 states. Our Texas Constitution provides that an accused "shall not be compelled to give evidence against himself."

The right of a witness to refuse to answer on these grounds has been repeatedly sustained by the courts of the United States. Although the U. S. Supreme Court has not directly passed on the question of self-incrimination before a legislative committee, there is a fair inference that the privilege established by the Fifth Amendment protects witnesses in Congressional investigations as well as in judicial proceedings. ## FARM NEWS

From the County PMA Committee

### CONSERVATION NEEDS SERIOUS

In spite of good conservation work in recent years, we are still losing soil productivity, B. F. Vance, Chairman, Production and Market Administration, State Committee, pointed out recently.

"Many of our acres are slipping under the pressure of intensive high-level production," Mr. Vance said. "Instead of improving the basic productivity of our total farm plant, we are cutting into fertility reserves and losing ground."

"This is a very serious thing, not only for farmers but for the entire country. Every business man, every industrialist, every wage earner has a direct stake in this question of soil productivity. We must see that the present trend is reversed—that we conserve our soil and water resources. We must not only maintain but where possible build up these resources, both for the large production needed now and also for the greater production which will be needed in the future."

"This calls for constructive, coordinated programs of assistance for farmers and ranchers—education and demonstration based upon the results of research, and the special aids which are needed to get the job done in time."

"As I see this problem, the real question is not what type of aid to use. It is rather whether, with the coordinated assistance of all available programs and services, we can get the needed conservation results before it is too late."

**DID YOU KNOW THAT**  
Out of a total of almost 3 million farmers who received ACP

assistance in 1950, more than 76 per cent received less than \$100 and 92% less than \$200? There were almost one-half million farmer payees who received between \$40 and \$90, and over 177,500 farmers received assistance amounting to only \$10 or less. Less than one-tenth of 1 per cent of the payees received \$2,000 or more. The maximum payment permitted under the Act is \$2,500.

Not only was wide distribution of assistance made to farms of all sizes but the amount of assistance per acre increased as the size of the farm decreased. For example, farms from one to ten acres received an average of \$3.68 per acre; farms from 20 to 40 acres received 46 cents per acre, and farms over 38,000 acres received less than one cent per acre. The average assistance per acre for farm land of all sizes was thirty-six cents.

These payments were made to aid and encourage farmers to conserve their land against soil depleting forces and to achieve greater immediate and enduring farm production. Practices stimulated by ACP include improved pastures, meadows and ranges; terracing; contouring; range land improvement through increased water facilities for livestock and crops; and other proved practices aimed toward continued high production.

A special chartered bus left Clarendon this morning carrying a group of farmers, ranchers, business and professional men and women to attend the SAVE THE SOIL AND SAVE TEXAS awards banquet in Ft. Worth. State winners in the Fort Worth Press awards program will be presented their awards at this banquet.

Thomas C. D'Spain, farmer 15 miles northeast of Clarendon, will receive a \$500.00 cash award as the outstanding Conservation Farmer in the State of Texas.

D'Spain, a member of the Board of Supervisors of the Donley County Soil Conservation District, has done a commendable job of soil conservation work on his own farm and has been very instrumental in encouraging oth-

er district cooperators to apply conservation practices on their farms and ranches.

Highlights of the soil conservation work done by D'Spain on his farm include range improvement on 2500 acres of native range land, reseeding 180 acres of land back to grass, providing better distribution of grazing by constructing 4 farm ponds and digging 4 wells, constructing 17 miles of terraces and 9200 feet of diversions, using stubble mulch tillage on all cropland and farming all cropland on the contour.

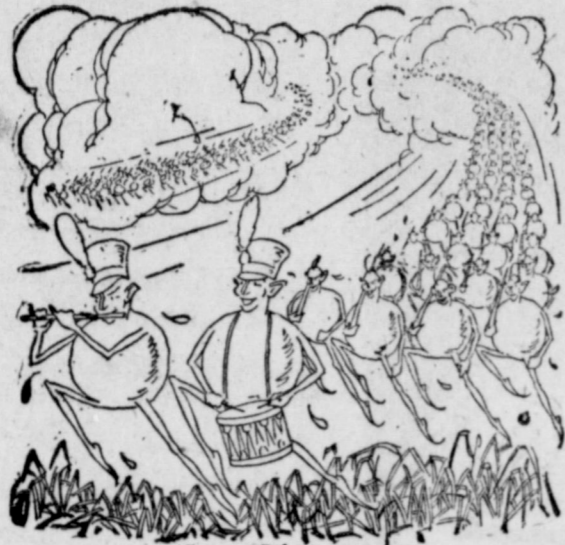

**Second Place Essay  
On Soil Conservation  
Merits Your Interest**

EDITORS NOTE — This is the second place winner in the essay

contest sponsored by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce and the Donley County Soil Conservation District. The essays have been forwarded to Washington, D. C. for entry in the national contest.

**CONSERVATION FARMING FOR ABUNDANT LIVING**  
Donley County seems at this time to be in great need of soil conservation. One of the best ways of conserving the soil here is by planting grasses. Clover has been found to be very good here. Biennial sweet clovers are about the best. They are planted in the spring and will live two years. The Madrid type yellow blossom sweet clover is shorter, leafier, and finer stemmed than the others. Sweet clover is valuable as a legume. It penetrates the subsoil and brings up the nitrogen and the minerals. It has 117 pounds per acre of nitrogen fixing ability. Clover like this is sometimes

used in pastures. The forage is high in protein. It is especially beneficial in mixtures with grasses.

To get the most profit from the grass and to protect it, moderate grazing is best. The grass cannot help the soil if it has been over-rushed before. The thinning and invasion of plants isn't good for the forage. If the first growth is grazed too soon, the leaf surface will not be sufficient and the total forage production will be lowered. Few seed will be produced and there will be little plant food if there is continued overuse of the clover. A range improvement program would increase desirable vegetation and decrease in undesirable plants.

Different methods of plowing is another good way of conserving the soils. Long, narrow, contour strips are very good. They are about 80 to 120 feet in width and run the entire length of the field. Regular rotation of contour strips help in conserving the soil. Terraces are broad, shallow, gutters, placed 60 to 150 feet apart. They hold the water when heavy rains come. Deep plowing has been tried recently here in Donley County. It cost ten dollars an acre to have the field plowed eighteen to twenty-four inches deep. It is done with a disk plow. Only a few farmers are having this done because of the expense.

Cover crops might help conserve the soil, too. Alternate crops of corn or cotton, cowpeas, and soybeans could be used. Winter legumes are not too favorable for this area. Where winter legumes are used, insects sometimes injure stands so much that crops have to be planted over. The use of winter legumes for

cotton production may result in later planting of cotton. Boll weevils are greater hazard where cotton is planted late. Early planting is desirable where boll weevils are present.

Of the fertilizer used in Donley County, nitrogen has been found to be very effective. On the soils which were low in phosphorus and potash for cotton production, nitrate of soda was decidedly superior to all other sources of nitrogen. However, mixed fertilizers play about the most important part of all fertilizers in Donley County. The term complete fertilizer is applied to fertilizers containing nitrogen, phosphorus, and potash. Incomplete fertilizers are referred to as fertilizers which supply only two of the elements, nitrogen, phosphorus, and potash. "Balanced fertilizer" is a term applied to mixed fertilizers, which implies that the fertilizer supplies the three elements, nitrogen, phosphorus, and potash in the ratio needed by the crops

on the particular soil. If the people of Donley County would realize that we do need soil conservation and that people will go on using this soil for generations to come, perhaps one of the five things I have discussed here could be used better. Perhaps the things I have discussed here will be of great benefit to the present and future of Donley County.

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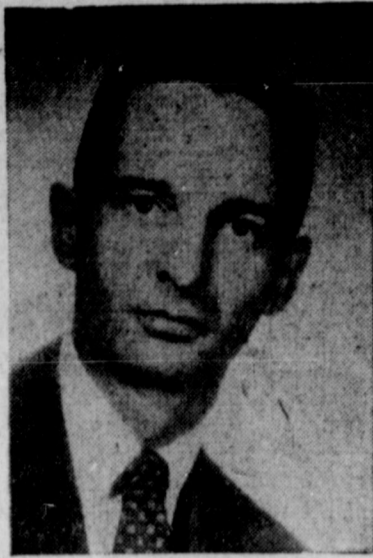
