Local Residents Warned Regarding Killing Dogs

An incident came up here in town last Wednesday which prompted Dr. Ben K. Humphrey, J. D. Mansfield and Rev. A. B. local health officer, to issue a statement regarding the killing of dogs which have bitten someone or possibly suspected of having rabies.

"A dog which has bitten someone should not be killed but penned up and put under observation, for there is no way of learning whether the dog might be Jackson of Lakeview. rabied or not if it is killed immediately," Dr. Humphrey stated. Kill Bagworms Now Before They Hatch

A cone-shaped bag hanging from your plants is the cue to destroy the bagworm now before they ruin your plants.

Bagworms are usually found on arbovitae and cedar-like plants, but some species munch flags for two reasons: First, we on althea, elms, roses, and oaks. At this time, a spray or dusting will kill the bagworms. Later

when they are grown, the pests must be removed by hand and burned. Two sprayings of 10 percent chlordane, applied a week apart, will kill the bagworms, says H
