Commissioners Court For July 28th

The 51st Texas Legislature at its Regular Session, 1949, passes a bill providing that effecti January 1, 1951, the levy of the 30c ad valorem tax by the State would be discontinued and authorizing the counties to levy this tax of not exceeding 30c on each for flood control. This bill provides that before such a tax can such an election to be held in Donley County on July 28, 1951.

The adoption of this levy will not increase the taxes in this county as the amount collected will be the same amount that was formerly collected by the State of Texas: instead of the tax being paid to the State it will be retained in Donley County for construction and maintenance of Farm-To-Market and lateral roads.







Might Say The Birds Got "Nettled"

Had dinner with Tik Bradley the other day, and over a frosty bottle of beer I found out about his job with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

"Now just exactly what do you do?" I asked him. "Shoot birds with a cannon" he calmly replies.

Seems they actually do use a cannon-to shoot out a net over a flock of birds feeding on the ground. The birds start to take off at the sound of the shot, but the settling net brings them back to earth. Then they're banded around the leg so more can be

learned about their migratory habits. Afterwards, they're let loose-and everyone's happy.

From where I sit, it was a good example of how when you learn the real facts they're often not as bad as they may sound at first. Like with people. Get to really know your neighbor and chances are you'll be more tolerant of his preferences-even though they're not your own. Take a good look, before you jump to conclusions.



Some Facts about Texas' New Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Law 1. What Is The New Texas Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility J.aw? This law, effective January 1, 1952, is designed for the protection of persons injured or whose property has been damaged as the result of the operation of a motor vehicle. Under it, motorists may be obliged to give proof of their ability to pay damage claims, which may be awarded against them for bodily injury or property damage caused to other persons by a motor

vehicle owned or driven by them. 2. Who is Affected By This Law?

Everyone who owns or drives a motor vehicle in Texas is affected.

3. How Does The Law Work?

The Department of Public Safety is required to suspend the license and registration of any person who fails to satisfy, within sixty days, any judgment against him because of bodily injury or death, or damage to property due to the operation of a motor vehicle. The license shall remain suspended and shall not be renewed, nor shall any such license be thereafter issued in the name of such person, unless and until every such judgment is satisfied to the extent provided for in the law and until the said person gives proof of financial responsibility.

4. What Is The Best Way For A Motorist To Avoid Such Suspension?

By having in full force and effect at the time of the accident, out of which the judgment arose, a motor vehicle liability insurance policy with limits of \$5,000/\$10,000 bodily injury and \$5,000 property damage, issued by an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of Texas.

5. Are There Any Other Reasons For Which Evidence Of Financial Responsibility May Be Required?

Yes, in the event the motorist is convicted of or pleads guilty to certain violations of law. Upon failure to furnish evidence of financial responsibility, the motorist's privileges to register, or operate a motor vehicle, as chauffeur or otherwise, are revoked and terminated

6. How Can A Motorist Furnish Proof Of Financial Responsibility? Evidence of financial responsibility may be furnished by delivering to the Department of Public Safety:

(a) A certificate of motor vehicle liability insurance, with limits of \$5,000/\$10,000 bodily injury and \$5,000 property damage, issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of Texas; or

(b) A real estate bond in amount and form to be approved by a judge of a court of record, and conditioned for payment in the same manner as a Motor Vehicle Liability insurance policy for the payment of claims against the motorist; or

(c) A receipt or certificate of the State Treasurer showing that an equivalent amount of cash or securities has been deposited with the State

7. What Is The Penalty For Operating A Motor Vehicle In Violation Of

Upon conviction, any motorist operating a motor vehicle, after his driving privileges have been revoked, shall be subject to fine, or imprisonment, or
