Students meet Titanic discoverer

Clarendon fifth-graders met the man who discovered the wreckage of the *Titanic* during a videoconference originating from West Texas A&M University in Canyon last Friday, October 9.

Dee Ann Perryman's students met in the Video Conference Room at Clarendon Junior High School and tuned into the Panhandle Information Network (PIN), on which Dr. Robert Ballard addressed five Panhandle-area classrooms regarding one of his latest endeavors, the JASON Project.

Ballard, whose discoveries also include the Bismarck and the *Lusitania*, spent 45 minutes on PIN with the Clarendon pupils as well as with classes from Sunray, Dalhart, and Canadian. A class from Happy was on location in the University's PIN room at the Hastings Electronic Learning Center on the first level of Cornette Library.

Advanced you-are-there telecommunications technologies are the key to the JASON Project, which Ballard founded in 1989 to let fourth-through ninth-graders go on annual scientific journeys all over the world without leaving the regions

in which they live. Funded locally through the Amarillo National Resource Center for Plutonium and administered by WTAMU this year's project is titled "Rain Forests: A Wet and Wild Adventure."

The expedition, which requires months of training, culminates for area students at the WTAMU campus March 1-5 and March 8-12 with four interactive broadcasts per day originating from three selected rain forest research sites -- Castle Rock, Colorado; Hoh River Valley, Washington; and the Amazon Center for Environmental Education and Research, Peru.

"The JASON Project is a wet and wild adventure in the rain forest that will give Panhandle kids an opportunity to do real live research," Treasure Brasher, WTAMU project coordinator and physics instructor, said.

"This is a really exciting program, the kind of thing that can have an impact on kids. The opportunity is available, and right now it's up to the parents of eligible students to encourage school administrators to take advantage of the opportunity.

Once schools are signed up, we'll begin training the participating teachers, who will, in turn, prepare their students for the experience."

Brasher said the project involves a lot more than simply watching television.

"The JASON Project involves an approved, hands-on, integrated curriculum," Brasher said. "Students are encouraged throughout the school year to perform local field investigations using the same scientific methods employed by scientists at the expedition sites and to interact with field scientists and other students via the Internet."

Training of area educators began in September when science teachers Leslie Philipp of Happy High School, and Gail Sanchez of Horace Maim Middle School (Amarillo) attended primary training sessions at the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee. Their job is to train other area teachers, who will, in turn, train others. The deadline for teacher-training applications is October 15.

Early voting starts Oct. 19 in clerk's office

Donley County voters can get acquainted with the candidates running for county offices thanks to candidate profiles printed in this week's ENTERPRISE.

Local positions up for election this November are county judge; county/district clerk; county treasurer; commissioner, Precinct 2; commissioner, Precinct 4; justice of the peace, Precinct 3 & 4; and justice of the peace, Precinct 1 & 2.

The ENTERPRISE first published candidate profiles for the primary elections earlier this year, and the newspaper submitted new questionnaires for the candidates for the General Election.

"The primaries were our first attempt at these profiles," said ENTERPRISE publisher Roger Estlack. "We had a good response from the candidates and the voters in the spring and decided to continue the profiles. We

believe this is a good service for the citizens and it leads to a more informed electorate."

Readers are encouraged to write or call the newspaper to offer feedback as to the format of the profiles.

Early balloting starts next Monday, October 19, for this year's General Election for local, state, and congressional offices.

Registered voters can go to the county clerk's office in the Courthouse Annex during regular business hours, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

In addition, County Clerk Fay Vargas says her office will be open on Saturday, October 24, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for early voting. This is for those who work out of town or cannot make it during the week, Vargas said. Early voting continues through October 30, 1998.

Clarendon sales tax rebate up 18 percent for September

AUSTIN - State Comptroller John Sharp last month delivered a total of \$180 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,092 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 4.5 percent increase over the \$172.7 million allocated in September 1997.

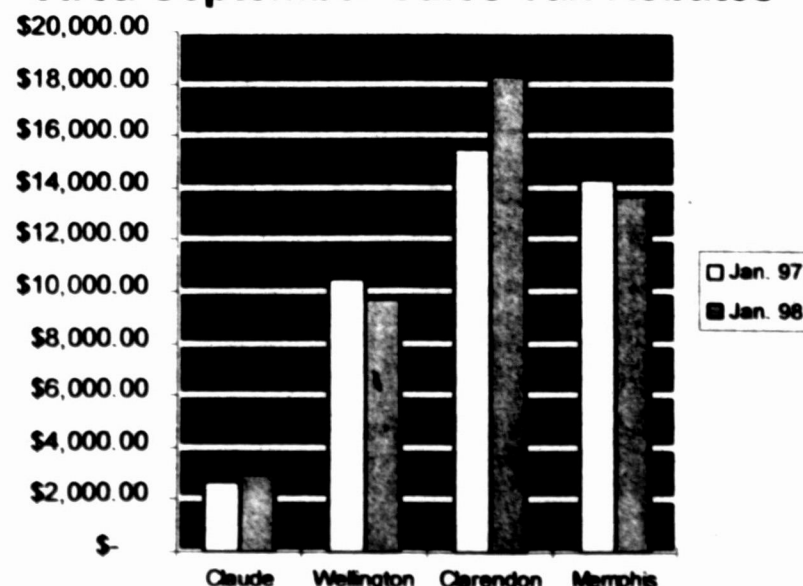
September's rebates include local sales taxes collected on July sales and reported to the Comptroller in August by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

"Sales across nearly all of Texas

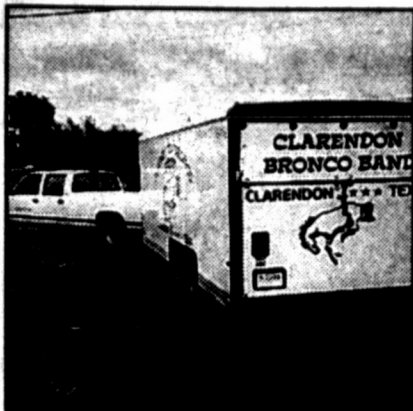
picked up the pace in July," Sharp said. "Rebates to cities and counties are up 10.7 percent over the first nine months of last year."

Rebates to cities in Donley County were mixed. Clarendon's rebate increased more than 18 percent for a total of \$18,307.02. Howardwick, on the other hand, dropped 6.18 percent for a rebate of \$1,224.08, and the City of Hedley saw its September rebate plummet nearly 83 percent to \$200.56.

Claver kids have true chuck wagon experience

 Helen Ann Riggs and Russell Keown presented a demonstration on the "Chuck Wagon." They brought their restored chuck wagon and talked to the Claver Kids about the history and importance of the wagon to the life of a Texas Cowboy.

Colonel Charles Goodnight invented the chuck wagon in 1866. The supplies needed for the trail drive were carried in the wagon, and the cook also had a medical supply drawer. The chuck wagon was drawn up with the tongue pointed to the North Star so that the next morning the herd would be pointed in the right direction.

A demonstration was watched by the Claver Kids on the preparation of "Stir Crazy Cake" which included see-

ing this authentic recipe made and then cooked over coals on the ground in a Dutch oven.

After the cook called the cowboys to supper, the cook would often entertain them with his harmonica, banjo, or fiddle. Jimmy Adams portrayed the cook and entertained the Claver Kids with music that could settle any herd. The Claver kids were served biscuits and drinks for snacks representative of food served along the trail.

The Claver Kids then worked on the Social Skill of "Receiving an Award." They learned how to walk up to the stage, pause, use the right hand to shake the presenter's right hand, accept the award with the left hand and exit the stage area. The

award they received was the Fall Claver Kids schedule and an invitation to the 4-H Recognition Banquet.

After exiting, the students tasted the "Stir Crazy Cake." Extension Agents Sue and Leon Church are in charge of the Claver Kids program. Adult leaders are Jennifer Tubbs, Karla Devin, Michele Ray and Donna Ford. Parents are encouraged to stay and participate.

Entertainment program coming October 29

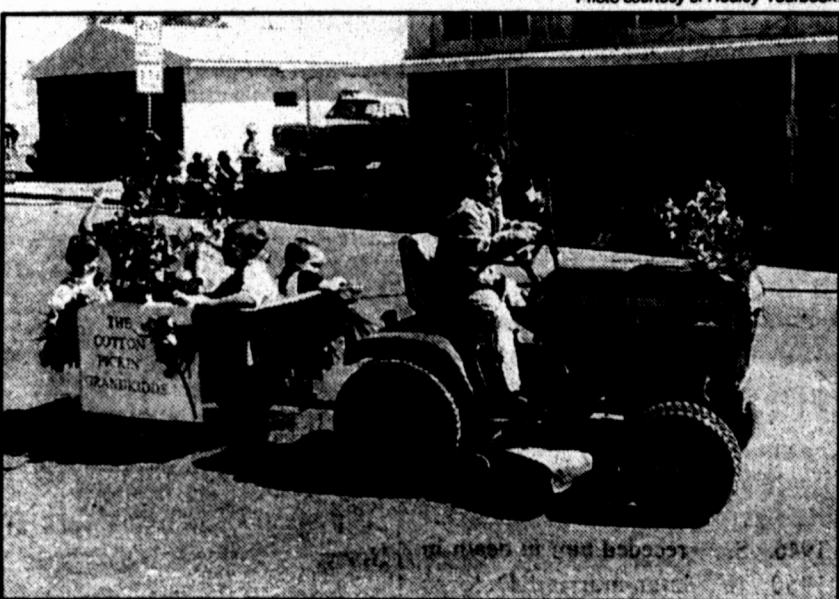

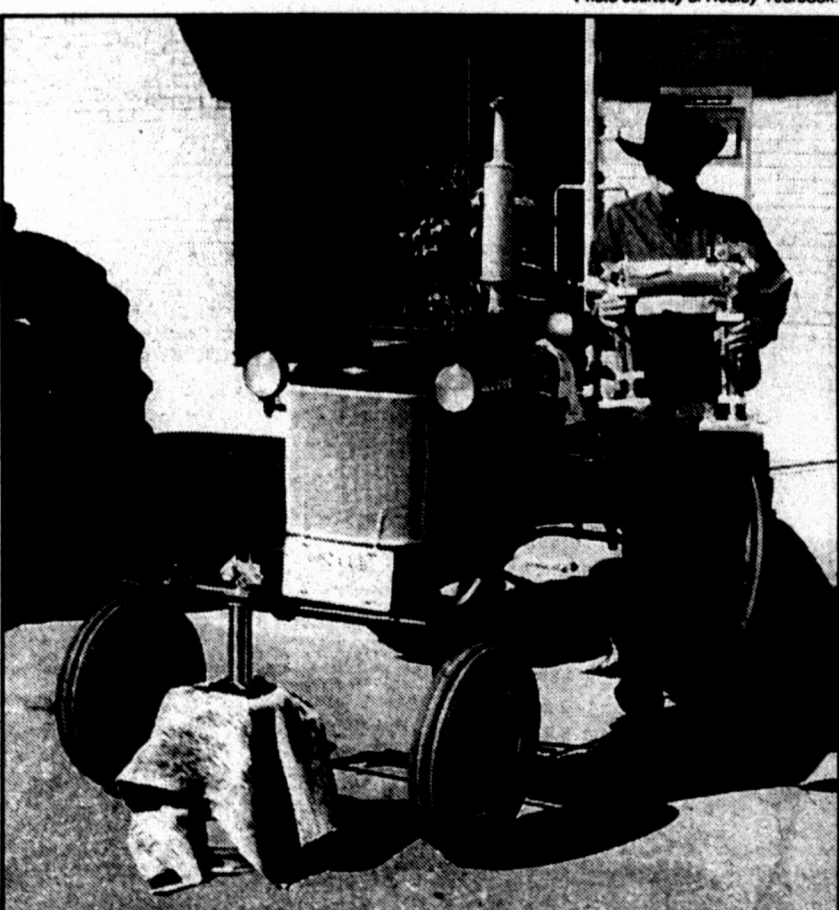

Defense again held tough and forced a punt. Dusty Martindale returned the ball for a touchdown, but it was called back on a penalty.

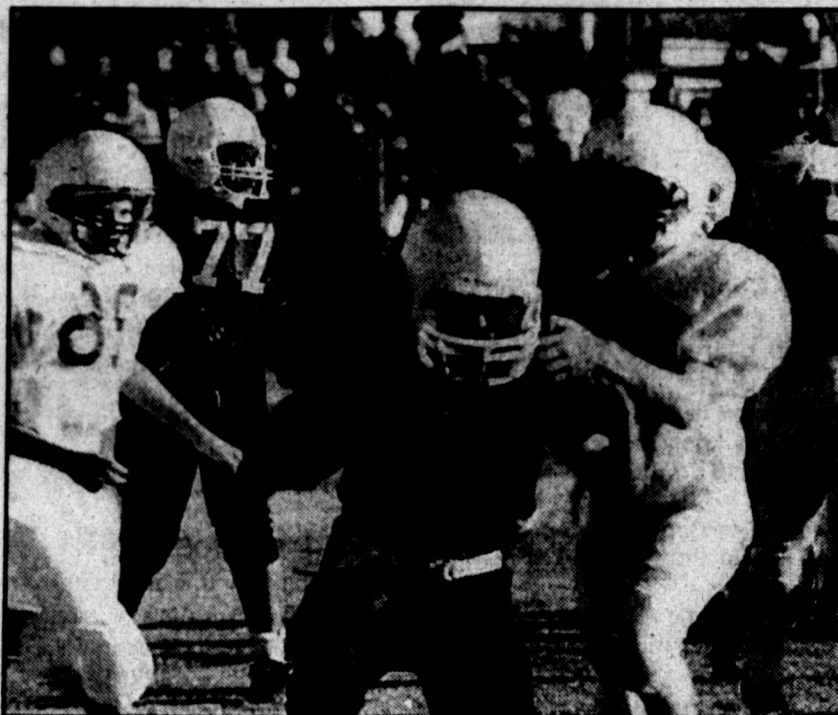
The Colts began their next drive on the 22-yard line. Their progression down the field was capped off on an 8-yard touchdown run by Justin Johnson.

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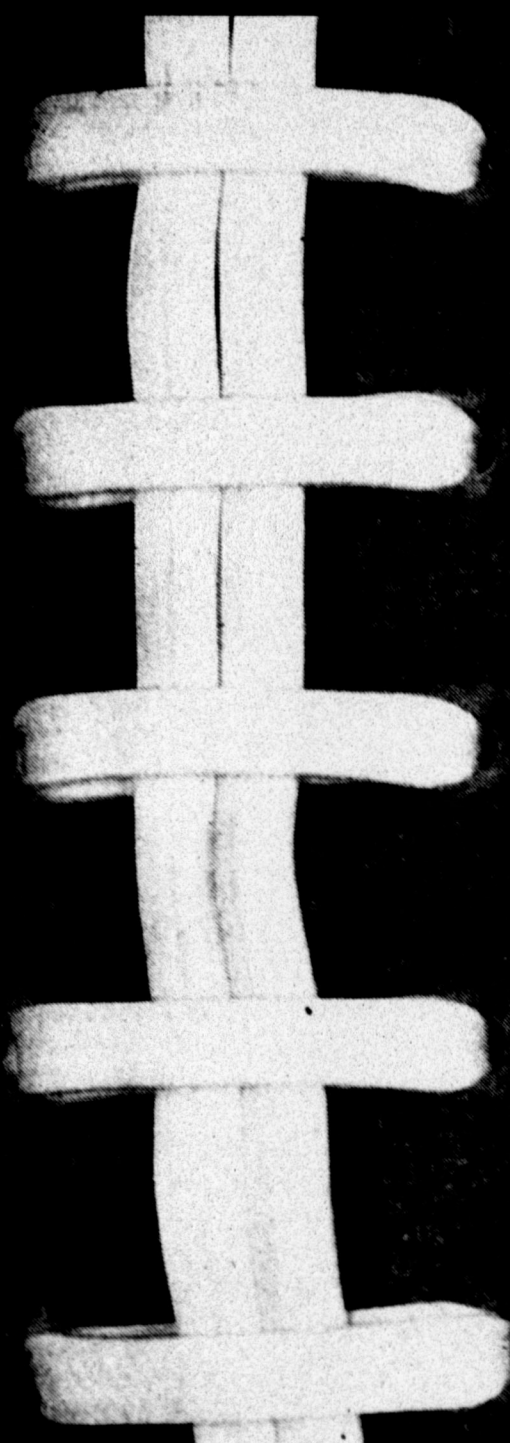

The ensuing kick-off with 1:08 left in the first half proved to be the

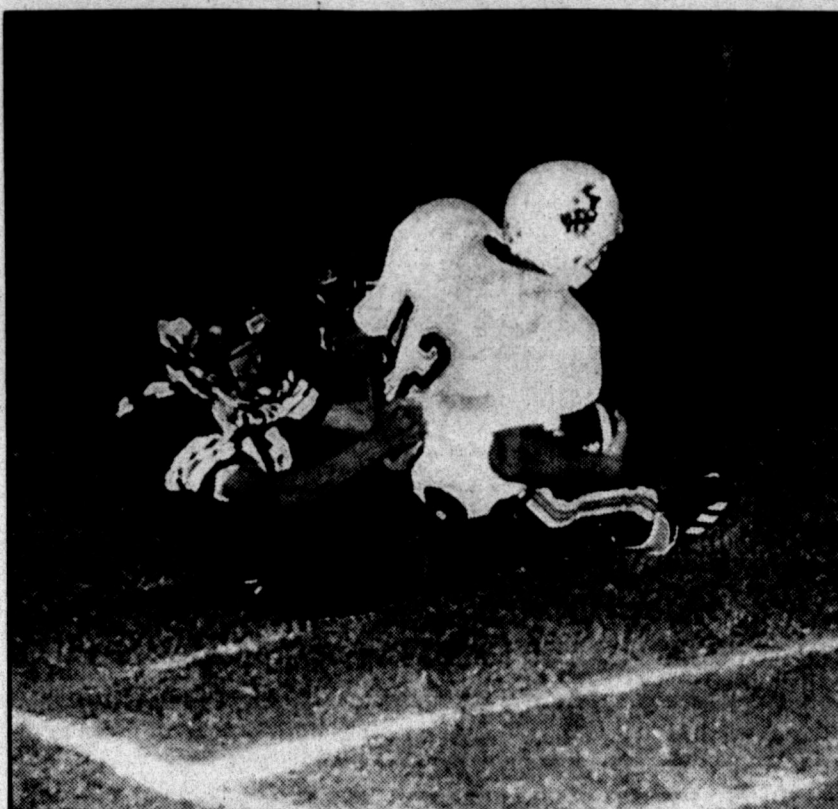

Boyce House, humorist, specialized in Texas humor. His 123-page book consists of 500 tall tales, jokes, and wisecracks about Texas. It is a type of book that you can put down after a few pages and return to later without feeling interrupted. If you appreciate good Texas humor, you may want to read it more than once.

Sports fans will especially enjoy the section, "On the Gridiron." The politically minded will appreciate the "Politician" chapter and "Order in the Courtroom." Journalists will relish "The Press," and "Cowboys" will amuse cowboys. Other chapters are entitled "Meet Some of the Folks," "Hither and Yon," "Chaparral Philosopher," "Getting Acquainted," and "Texas-Con and Pro."

Mr. House authored ten other books plus various magazine and newspaper articles. It is easy to understand why this freelance writer has been much in demand as a

speaker. His wit and hilarious humor delight many audiences.

The name, Henry Stagg, may not be familiar to you, but his biography, *Papa Was In A Hurry*, written by his daughter, reveals his colorful 93 years of life. Rice farming, experience in a Galveston storm, invention of unusual mosquito repellent, significance of a special pony, "Bodiddle," Model T, and Model A cars in which Mama refused to sit in front, silent movies, Sunday School teaching, foreman experience of a road building gang at age 80, requesting and receiving a typewriter for his 90th birthday, and other engaging incidents are sure to hold readers' interest.

Even though "Papa" uprooted his family of ten children and Grandma by repeated moves, they still sustained a permanency with each other, and he set an honorable example for them.

These two books are definitely not new. Mr. House's book was first printed in 1955, and Mrs. Carruth's in 1967. However, they confirm the fact that good books will always remain good books.

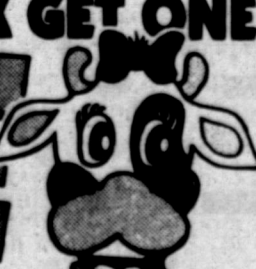

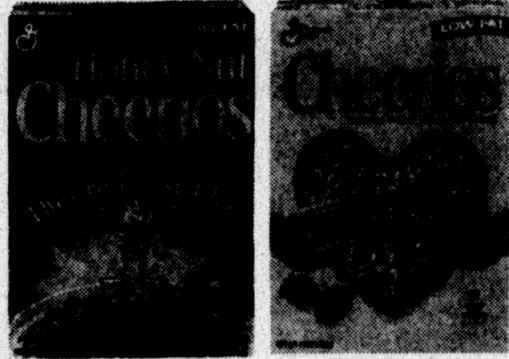
