Thomberry introduced The Better Bracket Act in early February. The measure would raise the income
threshold under which the govemment applies the 15 percent income tax bracket. For people filing individual returns, the threshold would increase from its current level of $\$ 25,350$ a year to $\$ 35,000$. For married couples filing joint returns, the threshold would
increase from $\$ 42,350$ to $\$ 88,000$ increase from $\mathbf{\$ 4 2 , 3 5 0}$ to $\mathbf{\$ 5 8 , 0 0 0}$. And for heads of households, the in-

In his letter to Thomberry endorsing the measure. ATR President Grover Norquist wrote: "The Better It will let over 21 million Americans keep more of what they earn by cutting their federal income tax rate from 28 percent to the lowest federal rate 15 percent
