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Chisum meets with parties about feedlot

State Rep. Warren Chisum came to Donley County last Friday to attempt to start a dialog between representatives of the Greenbelt Water Authority and the Hommel family.

The two parties have been at odds for several months now over the Hommels' proposed cattle feedlot near Kelley Creek, a tributary of the Greenbelt Reservoir.

"We're not asking anyone to make any long term decisions," Chisum told a group of about 40 concerned citizens who gathered at the Clarendon Country Club for the meeting. "But we all live here, and we're just asking everyone to lay their concerns on the table."

Gene Hommel was asked to give his side of the situation. He said that his family had

started feeding cattle on their land west of Clarendon in 1947, and that he wanted to start a starter feeding operation. Hommel said he consulted with a top engineering firm which told him he could build a 6,000 head feedlot on 50 acres with no threat to the water supply.

Hommel stated that he really didn't want his operation to be that large, only between 2,000 and 3,000. His financing is based on a 3,000 head operation.

Under current laws, a cattle feedlot can operate with up to 999 head without obtaining a permit from the Texas Natural Resources Commission (TNRC).

William Allensworth, an attorney for the Greenbelt Water Authority, said his client's

primary concern is the safety of water supply. "We don't want our drinking water threatened due to a cloud burst, levy failure, etc.," he said. "We'd like to see a buffer zone between feeding operations and drinking water."

Greenbelt Lake provides drinking water for about 25,000 people, Chisum said. Attending Friday's meeting were citizens and officials from Clarendon, Howardwick, Memphis, and as far away as Quanah.

Allensworth said his clients are not opposed to the cattle industry or cattle feedlots. They are requesting a stream flow buffer zone of 10 miles.

Ross Wilson, representing the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, said the

Hommels' yard has been built to state specifications. He also pointed out that the only existing buffer zones which are similar to the one Greenbelt Water wants are those for coastal resources. Those zones are about one mile.

Wilson also said that the TNRC has the authority to require permits for any sized operation, even those under 1,000 head. Chisum agreed with the statement but said the TNRC would have to have a really good reason to stop Hommel from what he is currently doing.

There are currently about 970 head in Hommel's pens, and the family has about \$200,000 invested in building the operation not including the land, wells, and grain stor-

age that he already owned.

Kathy Hommel said the family is willing to comply with additional regulations because they drink the same water too. "That's why we consulted these engineers. We're not out to hurt anybody or anything. We have to live here too," she said.

The Hommels and Wilson said they would be open to discuss reducing the number of head in the yard and/or building more or higher berms upstream from the feedlot in order to settle the matter.

No real solutions were accepted at Friday's meeting, but Chisum urged both sides to find some middle ground saying, "It's better if we can address this here rather than in a courthouse."

Extension Service's Money 2000 Credit Fair provides area with wealth of information

Clarendon College was the site of the regional Money 2000 Plus Credit Fair held last Thursday, April 23. This event offered an opportunity for consumers to listen to seminars, visit exhibitor tables and view credit related videos. Sponsoring this event were Texas Agricultural Extension Service - Donley County, Community Bank Clarendon, The Donley County State Bank, The Herring National Bank, Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Amarillo and Clarendon College.

Dr. Lynn White, Family Economics Specialist for Texas Agricultural Extension Service - College Station, kicked off the event with an overview of the Money 2000 Plus program. She explained the value of the program and how it has been adopted as "...A Texas-Size Challenge" for those organizations committed to the project. Later in the day she spoke on the subject of tax breaks for

those earning less than \$28,000.

Mike Isley of the Credit Bureau of Amarillo addressed the issue of how important it is to maintain a good credit history because credit reports do follow consumer through life. Participants at the Credit Fair heard Dan Allen of Successful Money Management Seminars discuss the "Six Main Reasons People Fail Financially."

Jerry Courtney and Jim Shelton, local attorneys, conducted seminars on wills and some of the fine points individuals need to keep in mind when writing one. Bobby Burrus, a financial advisor affiliated with Herring National Bank, discussed some of the myths and realities of investment tools available to consumers.

Mika Clay, manager of the Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Amarillo, informed participants of the services available to consumers through her organization. Additionally, Janna Serrano of the Better Business Bureau of Amarillo

and Gregg Haire of the Texas Attorney General's Office discussed being alert to consumer frauds and scams.

Those attending had the opportunity to learn more about the credit application process from David Magar of Herring National Bank. He discussed what information lending institutions were looking for in credit applications.

For those interested in learning the basics of a financial software package, Cynthia Ewing, an instructor at Clarendon College, demonstrated the user friendliness of Quicken. She discussed the timesaving aspects of this program for an individual or family, especially at tax time.

In addition to the seminar presenters, other exhibitors included Knorpp Insurance Agency, Merrill Lynch, Sun America Securities, Hastings Books, Music and Videos, Early Birds FCE Club, and Donley County Extension Service.

Thornberry tax relief bill gains endorsement

WASHINGTON, DC — The Better Bracket Act, a bill authored by US Rep. Mac Thornberry that would cut the federal income tax rate on middle income Americans, picked up more support his past week with the April 14 endorsement of American for Tax Reform (ATR).

This is the second key endorsement of The Better Bracket Act in less than a month. The National Taxpayers Union endorsed the bill March 24.

"I welcome this endorsement," Thornberry said, "and I like to think it's indicative of the growing support that exists for providing across-the-board tax relief to middle income Americans — as opposed to the targeted tax cuts the President is proposing that will let people keep more of their money only if they jump through bureaucratic hoops and do what the

government wants them to do.

"True tax relief puts money in your pocket and power in your hands. This is one of the things that The Better Bracket Act will provide. It's also one of the reasons I think both Americans for Tax Reform and the National Taxpayers Union have chosen to endorse the bill."

Thornberry introduced The Better Bracket Act in early February. The measure would raise the income threshold under which the government applies the 15 percent income tax bracket. For people filing individual returns, the threshold would increase from its current level of \$25,350 a year to \$35,000. For married couples filing joint returns, the threshold would increase from \$42,350 to \$58,000. And for heads of households, the income threshold would increase from

\$33,950 to \$47,000 per year.

In his letter to Thornberry endorsing the measure, ATR President Grover Norquist wrote: "The Better Bracket Act is truly an important bill. It will let over 21 million Americans keep more of what they earn by cutting their federal income tax rate from 28 percent to the lowest federal rate of 15 percent."

"Under your bill, a married couple with a taxable income of \$48,000 a year would receive a tax cut of approximately \$800. This is money that they can spend on whatever they choose without government interference."

"It is time to provide meaningful tax relief for American families who work hard and deserve to keep more of what they earn — something that The Better Bracket Act will achieve."

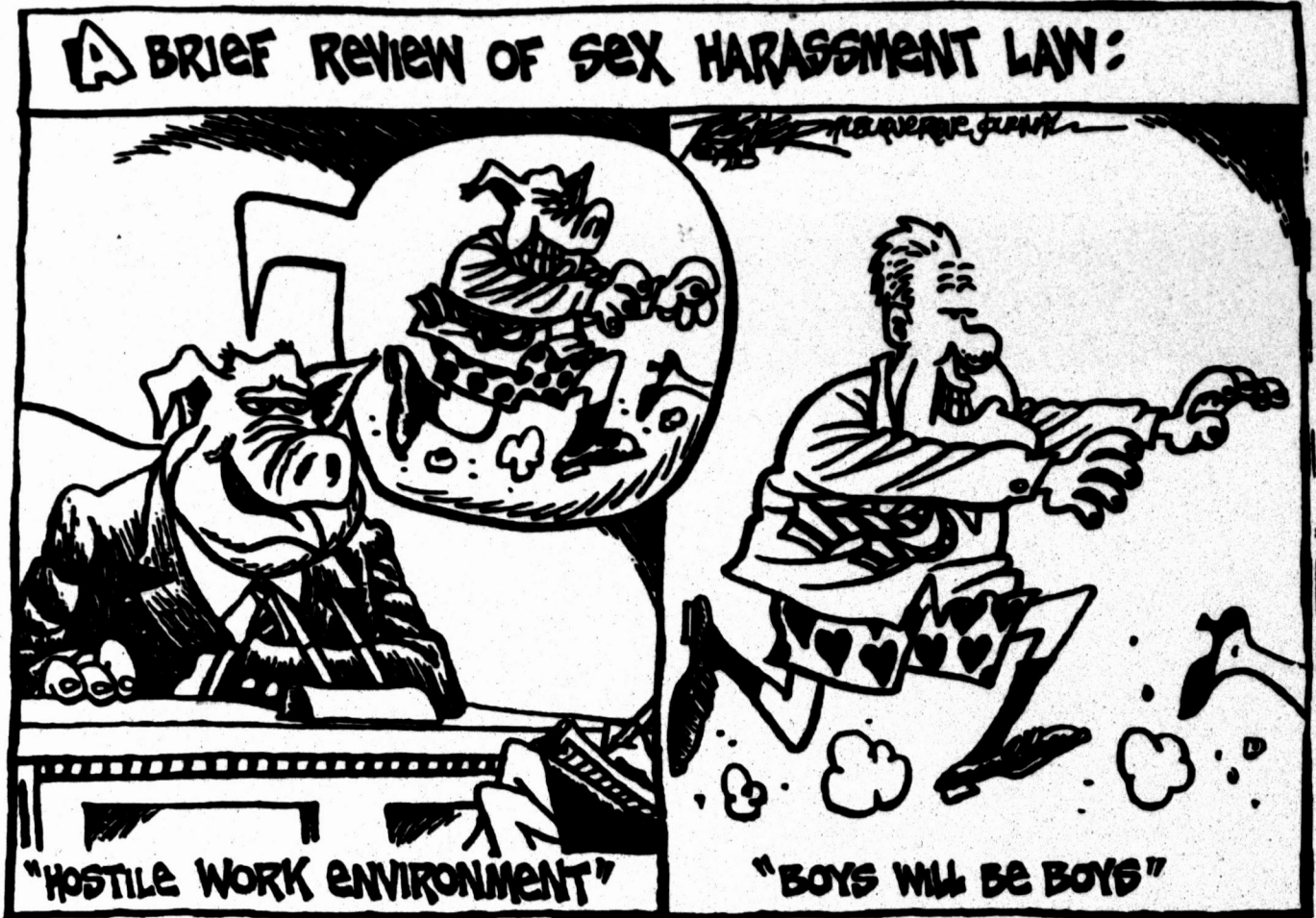

It is wrong to spend federal tax dollars giving free needles to drug addicts

I've talked some over the past few weeks about how important it is to have role models, and to set a good example for young people in our lives. Nowhere is this more important than in the war on drugs. Just six years ago, we were making progress in this war. Since that time, however, drug abuse among teenagers has more than doubled.

Now, different people have different explanations as to why this increase has occurred. But I believe that at least part of the explanation has got to be laid at the doorstep of the White House, and the failure of the President to send a clear signal to young people that drug use in America is wrong and will not be tolerated.

Recent reports that the Administration is planning to lift the ban on the federal funding of needle exchange programs is a good example of this failure. In case you're not familiar with them, needle exchange programs essentially give free syringes to drug abusers. The intent is to control the spread of AIDS among addicts. But in reality, many people believe they encourage the use of illegal drugs.

Moreover, according to the Office of National Drug Control Policy, while eight persons are infected by the AIDS virus each day as a result of using borrowed needles, more than 350 persons die each day as a result of injecting heroin. The President's chief drug advisor, General Barry McCaffrey, opposes lifting the federal ban on needle exchange programs. I oppose it, as well.

However well intentioned, it is wrong to spend tax dollars giving free needles to drug addicts. It not only promotes drug abuse but also sends a signal to our young people that the federal government somehow expects they're going to use drugs and wants them to do it safely.

That's the wrong signal to send, and one I have no doubt Congress will try to reverse in the coming weeks.

Texas leading the nation in advancing student achievements

AUSTIN — Efforts to improve student achievement in Texas public schools are drawing wide national attention and praise according to the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB). TASB applauds the work being accomplished in the state's public schools and has stepped up efforts to increase awareness of public school successes.

"I am proud that Texas public schools have become the role model for public schools nationally," said TASB President David Sublasky of

Fabens ISD. Sublasky points to a recent issue of *Policy Review* (March/April 1998) from the Heritage Foundation in Washington, DC, as a prime example. It contains an article, "The Golden Star State," that notes "Texas has become one of the highest performing states in the nation" and details how Texas "jumped to the head of the class in elementary school achievement."

"Last year people all over the nation began noticing what was happening in Texas," Sublasky said.

"An article in the *Orange County* (Calif.) *Register* was headlined 'Lone Star Lesson for California' and stated that California 'lags far behind Texas, which boosted test scores with early starts, smaller classes, and accountability.' In October, *Education Week* gave Texas an 'A' for its system of standards and assessments. Later that month, Texas was again in the spotlight when several presenters at the Columbia University Teachers College Conference praised the Texas

accountability system." Sublasky said all these accolades do not mean Texas' work is done. "Texas may be the vanguard of an accountability movement sweeping the states, but there is still much work to do. We must continue to honestly gauge where we are, recognize the problems, and work diligently towards the goal of leaving no student behind," he said. "However, Texas public education is on the right path, and Texans have every reason to be proud of our students and our schools."

The girls relay teams warmed up for the regional meet with a Regional Qualifiers competition Saturday in Clyde.

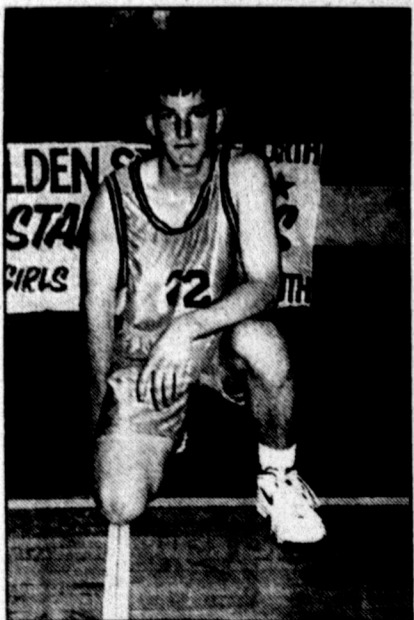

Temporary Ghost, and Dick Francis' suspenseful Decider included with other mystery writings in the large print section.

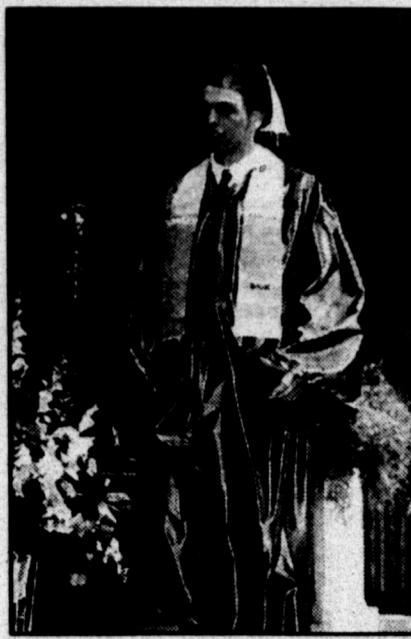

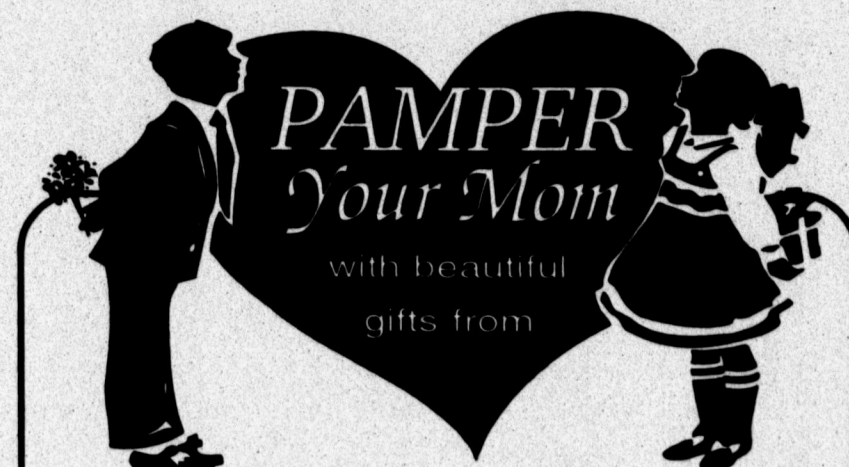

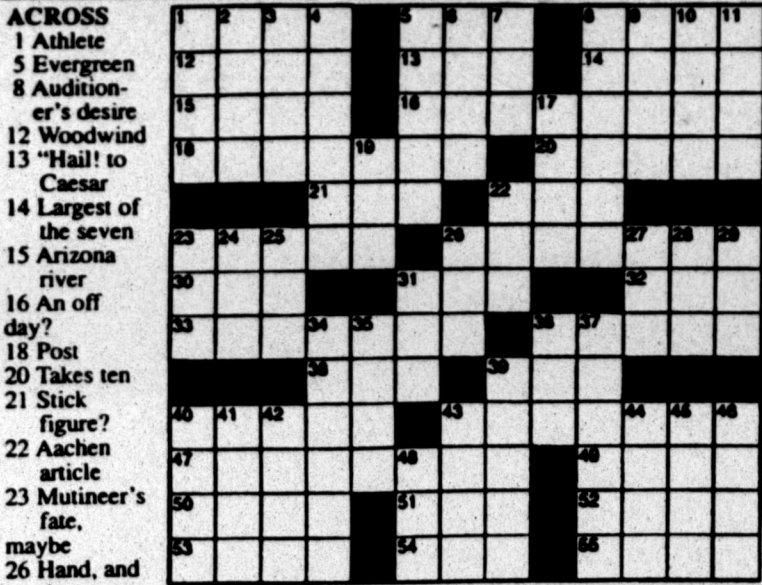
