# Judge McCoy hears pleas in four cases

Judge David McCoy heard four pleas from defendants in Donley County on April 13, 1998. Randall C. Sims represented the State of Texas.

Michael Daniel Mitchell pled guilty to the charge of possession of a controlled substance and received five years deferred adjudication probation, a \$500 fine, and was ordered to pay \$140 restitution.

Deanna Kay Gasser pled guilty to the charge of possession of marijuana and received two years in a state jail, probated five years, and was ordered to pay a \$10,000 fine up-front, and \$140 restitution

Richard Sanchez pled guilty to charge of driving while intoxicated and received five years in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice — Institutional Division, a \$1,000 fine, and two years drivers license suspension

Michael Marney pled nolo contendere to the charge of impersonating a peace officer, received seven years deferred adjudication, and was ordered to pay a \$700 fine.

# Local man went down with ship

While the major motion picture, "Titanic," has taken the world by storm, some folks may be unaware of the Donley County connection to the

A local pioneer and founder of the RO Ranch, Mr. Alfred Rowe, was among the passengers who did not survive the ocean liner's iceberg collision on April 15, 1912.

Alfred Rowe was an Englishman who came to Donley County in 1879 and established his ranch in the northeastern part of the territory near Skillet Creek

According to the book Panhandle Pilgrimage, Rowe "won the affection and respect of all, cowboy and stockman alike. For a Britisher he was remarkably adaptable, and the Plains people liked his willingness to work and his enjoyment of living. He had dignity, a sense of responsibility, business principals, and a genuine interest in the community.

Upon researching Rowe's death for this report, two historical works the 1990 History of Donley County and Virginia Browder's Donley County - Land O' Promise - claim he went down on the Titanic. However, Panhandle Pilgrimage claims he died in 1915 when the Germans sank the Lusitania.

Internet sources appear to have settled the matter though. Several websites about the disaster contain passenger lists.

Mr. Alfred G. Rowe is named as a first class passenger on the maiden voyage of the HMS Titanic. He is not listed among those who survived.



#### Clarendon to White Deer: Get over it

Sometimes one person can make all the difference.

Last Wednesday, one person's complaint generated a front page story in the Amarillo Daily News criticizing Clarendon High School's One-Act Play. Must have been a slow news day.

The play dramatizing the beginnings of the hospice movement contains some mild profanity. Clarendon's performance has won the district and area competitions and is advancing this week to the regional level.

Nena Grilley of White Deer had not seen the play but was nonetheless offended by it. She contacted the Amarillo paper which in turn ran a story about the matter thus making the proverbial mountain out of a molehill.

The week after the district competition, the Enterprise received a letter from another gal (whose name was illegible) in White Deer who was also offended by the play. I didn't print her letter because I saw no reason to let this woman's sour grapes spoil our kids' victory.

One has to wonder why the people of White Deer are so concerned about this matter. Do you think anything would have been said about CHS' performance if White Deer had won the district competition. I think not. It certainly would never have made the Amarillo paper.

The play is approved by the UIL, and local people haven't complained about it thus far. I haven't seen the play yet either. I could not attend Tuesday's performance due to the Hospital Board meeting. I would not have anticipated being offended although I would have enjoyed what was reportedly a good piece of serious theater.

The letter sent to the Enterprise was intended to motivate people here to complain about the play. Ms. Grilley told the Amarillo paper that the people of Clarendon should be offended by the play saying that if we "knew what was in the play, [the people of Clarendon] would never have allowed it. Or I hope so, at least."

People are easily offended — that's a given — and what offends one person may not bother another person at all. But if you want some really "offensive" stuff, look at some of the greatest works of literature. The Grapes of Wrath, for instance, ends with a teenage girl breast feeding a grown man. Weird? Yes, definitely. Offensive? In the context of the story, no. Some of Shakespeare's stuff has some good examples, too. Check out Romeo and Juliet. And let's not even get started on all the fornication and adultery going on in the Old Testament. No doubt several of the Enterprise editorials would offend these ladies.

I'm sorry that my alma mater's win in this UIL competition has been mired by some sore losers, but perhaps our students can take from this an important lesson about the their God-given right to freedom of speech. CHS should not be punished or derided for this play simply because a handful of people were upset by it.

White Deer should let Clarendon worry about Clarendon's own morality. This town was founded on Christian principals, and we certainly do not need to be lectured by self-righteous whiners from

# Don't just lower taxes, make it harder to raise them

Next week. the House of Representatives is scheduled to vote on a proposal that should sit well with most

people this time of year. It's a proposal that will make it harder for Congress to raise your taxes. Called the Tax Limitation Amendment, the proposal would essentially prevent Congress from passing any tax increase unless it has the two-thirds, or supermajority, support of both the House and the Senate.

Fourteen states across the country currently duced to the level they were at before the 1993

have such an amendment, and two more are making plans to try to add them to their constitutions, as well. It's easy to understand why. If the Tax Limitation Amendment had been in effect five years ago, the largest tax increase in our Nation's history would never have gotten through.

You remember this increase. It's the one that raised gasoline taxes, income taxes, and taxes on Social Security, and passed the House by only one

That one vote cost us all a lot. It helped push the federal tax burden to an all time peacetime high, and IT took more money out of your pocket and sent it to Washington. If federal taxes were reincrease, the average American family would receive a tax cut of \$2,500 each year.

But as it stands now, the typical two income family pays over 37 percent of their annual household income on taxes. This is more than they spend on food, clothing and shelter combined, and IT is one of the many reasons why we need to lower taxes in America even more.

It's also one of the reasons we need to make it harder for Washington to raise your taxes to begin with, which is why I'm a cosponsor of the Tax Limitation Amendment, and why I plan to support it when the proposal comes up for a vote next week.

# NASA makes a significant fiscal, educational impact

Recently, at the Johnson Space Center, I released the latest issue of Fiscal Notes, the widely acclaimed publication of the Comptroller's office that explores an array of economic issues affecting our state.

manned space flight program. JSC's appropriations have totaled \$61 billion, much of which has flowed directly into the Houston area economy and this amount continues to grow. While you can't say NASA put Houston on the map, it certainly helped Houston become recognized internationally.

JSC has led human space flight operations for NASA and trained all the nation's astronauts. Currently, 128 NASA astronauts work at JSC — and live in the area as do approximately 3,400 federal employees. There are an additional 15,000 other employees and contractors who live and work in the Clear Lake/Houston area. In addition, it is estimated that JSC directly generates more than 36,000 additional jobs.

When President John F. Kennedy pushed to expand the race to the moon, he knew the costs would be high, but he also looked forward to high rewards. This was an act of faith and vision, for no one could know what awaited us. Kennedy

knew that the first rocket to the moon was made of metal alloys and that new inventions would follow that would supersede any previous substances

But Kennedy couldn't have know that NASA Since 1961, JSC has assured control of the US would contribute over 30,000 commercial uses for their space technology. This technology includes ergonomic chairs, acoustical alarms used to locate airplane "black boxes," robotics wrenches, and even technology that helped create heart pumps the size of ball-point pens.

> We in state government sometimes become complacent about the importance of NASA and JSC to the Texas economy. If a large corporation shops around for a new home, it seems there's no limit to the financial incentives people will offer the company to stay. But when Congress talks about cutting funding of the International Space Station, or focusing NASA's resources on unmanned space programs, we don't hear much from state government. That attitude has got to change. NASA and Washington need to know that Texas is the space program's best friend. The state should do whatever it can to provide the infrastructure, education, and services that JSC needs to thrive and grow


We must recognize the significant fiscal and educational impact NASA and JSC have made to the state. JSC funds educational programs from elementary school to postdoctoral studies. This includes funds for scholarships and provides intern positions enabling students to work "handson" at the space center. They also donate surplus items, mostly computers, to schools and universi-

In 1997, NASA spent almost \$40 million on higher education in Texas, for a variety of research and educational programs. Funds totaling \$4.5 million went to the University of Houston, \$3.9 million to Rice University, \$5.1 million to Prairie View A&M, and close to a million dollars each to UH-Clar Lake, UT Health Science Center at Houston, and Texas Southern University.

As with all government agencies, NASA and JSC have had to tighten their belts. They have found innovative ways to utilize the technology that put the first man on the moon. Even with congressional budget cuts being suggested, JSC has kept that spirit of innovation alive. Fortunately, the spirit of adventure and quest for knowledge has not waned as Americans have ventured into space time and time again.

# Small business group leading charge to abolish IRS code WASHINGTON, DC — Texas has been flooded drive. A goal of 250 volunteers initially was set with volunteers gathering petition signatures for

the National Federation of Independent Businesses (NFIB) Campaign to Abolish the IRS Code. The state is on track to contribute 12,500 signatures toward the national goal of one million.

NFIB, the nation's largest small-business advocacy organization with 600,000 members, is calling on the president and congress to sunset the current tax code by Dec. 31, 2000, and propose a simpler, fairer tax coed that rewards work and savings. NFIB plans to present its signatures to congress as one million reasons to stop talking about the code and do something about it.

Texas already has 704 volunteer captains charged with collecting signatures for the petition for the state.

"Our volunteer response has been extraordinary," said Robert Howden, state director of NFIB/Texas. "It demonstrates the grassroots appeal of our campaign. The IRS Code is clearly broken and what we're telling our lawmakers is it's time to stop talking about it and do something to fix it. Hundreds of thousands of everyday citizens have embraced this message.'

Other supporters of the NFIB campaign so far include more than 120 US senators and representatives, including the majority leaders of both houses, who have signed a pledge promising to do their best, as legislators, to abolish the current

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



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# Hedley golf teams qualify for Regionals

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
