

Issue Update with Mac Thornberry

Showdown with Iraq reminds us of need to reduce dependence on foreign oil

With the whole world watching what happens in Iraq, the importance of reducing our dependence on foreign oil cannot be stressed enough.

As it stands now, our Nation imports more than half the oil we use every day. This translates into nearly nine million barrels of oil every day and is more than two million barrels more than we imported in 1981.

Earlier this year, I introduced legislation that would help increase how much oil and gas we produce here at home. Called The Inactive Well Recovery Act, the bill would give oil and gas producers a federal income tax exemption for bringing inactive wells back on line. In addition to helping our economy, the bill would also cut down on the amount of oil we import from

Every barrel of oil we produce here at home is one less barrel we have to buy overseas. It's also one less barrel we have to defend.

We've got to be prepared to hit Saddam Hussein and hit him hard. This means responding with force if he shoots at our planes and making sure he doesn't terrorize the world with weapons of mass destruction. In the longer term, it also means taking steps to boost our production of oil and gas so we're less dependent on oil from the Middle East.

Energy independence is a critical part of our national security. It's also a part that's missing. The Inactive Well Recovery Act won't solve all of our problems in this area, but it can help cut down on the amount of oil we get from overseas.

In the process, it can also help take away at least some of the leverage Saddam Hussein has over the rest of the world.



On November 16, the team placed sixth overall in the American Royal Junior College Livestock Judging Contest.
