

he healing hands which Judy Thomas uses to care for patients at Crown of Texas Hospice recently were lent to her by community members who nursed her back to emotional and physical health after a debilitating back injury.

In late September, Mrs. Thomas - the mother of seven children - was putting the finishing touches on a home the family was building in Clarendon when she slipped off a ladder.

Thomas fell 5 1/2 feet while installing insulation on the 11foot ceilings. "Gary

(her husband) had just walked in the door," she recalls. "He may have startled me. I don't know. But I fell and my lower back hit the floor. I fell flat on my lower back.'

"It was kind of like how you fall flat in a cartoon. It was the worst pain I had ever had in my life.'

But there were several blessings. If she had fallen two inches over, she would have hit her head on a cabinet.

As a registered nurse, she knew she was in trouble but thought she could work through it.

"I wanted to catch my breath, but it was hurting so bad. Gary wanted to take me in the ambulance, but I kept telling him 'Let me catch my breath.' He made me sit, but I couldn't hold my shoulders up, and he made me sit down."

X-rays revealed that Mrs. Thomas suffered a compressed fracture of the L-1 veterbra. She also broke a bone at the base of her thumb during the fall.

Nearly a week later she was released from the hospital, but the family already had begun moving into a home that still was not completed. Between work at the Baten corrections facility in Pampa, visiting his wife in the hosthat's fine," Mrs. Thomas said. "I'm blessed to have the house." When Mrs. Thomas returned home from the hospital, women in the community brought

meals for two weeks. "Every night we just knew that there would be a meal," Mrs. Thomas said. "And I'm talking good food. We usually eat real well, but this was really good food."

> And there was a lot of it. The Thomas' children range in age from 18 months to 11 years old. With that many children, that meant there was a lot of laundry and other chores to be done, but Mrs. Thomas said that's never a problem.

"We have them rotate out chores, and the kids know what they're supposed to do," she said.

But she couldn't have made it without the help of her mother, Carolyn Bruce of Arizona, and her mother-inlaw, Onita Thomas of Clarendon.

"There's no way we could have done it," Gary Thomas said. "A big thanks goes out to those two women." But even though the community has reached out and helped her in ways she never thought imaginable, life in a



Safety tips offered for cold weather

- When re-lighting a pilot light, strike the match and hold it to the opening first, then slowly turn on the gas.
- The pilot light on gas appliances should always be blue. If the flame is yellow or red, call a certified heating and

air-conditioning contractor immediately · Use a gas appliance only for

- its intended purpose. An oven, for example, should not be used to heat a room.
- · Clean space heater before using; remove cobwebs, dust, accumulated during the warmer months
- Be sure the space heater, if it is vented, is operating properly.
- If the space heater doesn't have a vent or oxygen cut-off
- open window your space heater's flame. 817-8090

- Make sure the grille is intact and in place.
- Keep space heaters away from furniture, drapes, and other combustible materials.

Gramm: People would rather be robbed than audited

Dear Editor,

Don't worry, Bulldog fans. They're already champions.

Ever since Clarendon College decided to rejoin the Western Junior College Athletic Conference (WJCAC) arguably the toughest JUCO basketball league in America - there have been a host of armchair critics opining that the Bulldogs would never be champions.

I've heard all the dread speculation ten times over.

Our gym is a crackerbox. Our scholarship and recruiting budgets are woefully inadequate. We don't have chartered buses. Heck, we don't even have school buses. So, there's no way the Bulldogs can be champions

For the next few paragraphs, let's examine that issue. Starting with two Thursdays past.

It was about 2 p.m., and I was nervously pacing in an Amarillo hospital emergency room in the aftermath of a much-publicized wreck of one of our 15-passenger college vans near I-40. Six Bulldog basketball players were injured, two rather severely. Miraculously, and I use that word pointedly, no one perished in the mishap. All of the young men have been released from the hospital.

All save one will play basketball this season. That one is Daniel Owiti, a lanky freshman from Kenya. Daniel sustained a dislocated foot, severely sprained ankle, and laceration on one arm. His twisted foot required surgery, abruptly and cruelly ending his 1997-98 season.

Now, I've toiled in this increasingly perilous school business about 14 years, and been associated with hundreds and hundreds of students over that time in two different states. Never, ever have I been more impressed with a young man than Daniel Owiti.

He exhibited more character in one night than most could muster in a lifetime.

Please understand that Daniel is brand new to the United States. He didn't even own a winter coat when I first met him because he probably never needed one in his native land. I wouldn't be surprised to learn that Daniel's recent sojourn to Amarillo marked his first experience in a hospital.

Daniel's native tongue is Swahili, and he is still in the process of mastering the English language. Suffice it to say, Daniel, through no fault of his own, was thrust into a situation a couple Thursdays ago fraught with stress and pain, and totally unfamiliar in his life's experience. How strange all the stainless steel apparatus, mirrors, and bright lights must have been in that sterile ER.

Faced with such circumstances, I feel certain I would be the most frantic, absolutely whiniest baby on the block. Daniel was anything but. His actions redefined the meaning of the word "humility."

When I arrived at the emergency room, Daniel's foot had already swollen to watermelon proportions. He had been given some medication, but was nevertheless experiencing considerable pain. I extended my hand to Daniel, and he gripped it like a vice.

"How are you, Dr. Elliott?" were his first glassy-eyed words. (How was I, for Heaven's sake? But that's just the way Daniel is.)

As I tried to make small talk with Daniel, groping money from people who, by and large, as investigator, grand jury, prosecutor, for the right words to say, he continued to express concern for others. Example - he asked if the Lady Bulldogs were still playing that night. When I told him their game had been canceled, Daniel apologized, incredibly.

could write one of them a message. Laying flat on his back with his still swelling, dislocated foot propped up and iced, Daniel carefully printed his note, telling his ailing teammate that he "loved him" and that he hoped he would get well soon.

About that time one of Daniel's teammates, a young

man named "Zim" (short for Zimbalist) from Albuquerque, N.M., entered the room. Zim, a very nice, articulate fellow, took the cross and chain from around his own neck and gave it to Daniel. My wife, Claudia, told Zim that if Daniel had to undergo surgery that the doctors probably wouldn't let Daniel

wear the cross. "That's okay, Mrs. Elliott," Zim insisted. "They can put it on Daniel's bed."

Later on the orthopedic surgeon came in and showed Daniel his X-rays and explained that corrective surgery would be required and what procedure would be employed. I'm not certain how much Daniel really understood. With his Dad and Mom on the other side of the world, Daniel just had to trust somebody.

Through it all, Daniel remained totally unassuming, and his humbleness humbled me - right down to my shaking knees. I don't think I've ever been so impressed with somebody and, at the same time, ashamed of myself. Ashamed that I'd lived four decades-plus and not learned so much of how to honorably conduct myself under duress as one who'd been on this Earth less than half that time.

Something else about that night - I just thought I knew what "The College That Cares" inferred. Now, I understand more fully.

I saw big, strong, tall young men unashamedly in tears out of concern for others. I saw young people praying openly. I saw Coach Joe Mondragon and Coach Joel Zehr running from room to room, hospital to hospital, checking on players and calling loves ones.

I saw Rev. Truman Ledbetter, who had driven all the way from Clarendon, consoling parents and others. I saw Michelle Schmidt and Claudia Elliott drive to the mall to buy clothing for one of the young men who didn't have apparel to stay the night in the hospital. I saw other Clarendon folks, like Geary Martin and his wife, standing watch in the ER waiting room, just hoping for some good news about the injured players.

I saw a cluster of people, including Financial Aid Director Raymond Jaramillo, catnapping into the wee hours of the night on the floor at Panhandle Surgical Hospital, refusing to leave until Daniel had come out of the recovery room and they were assured he was all right.

Before I left campus that afternoon, I saw students hugging one another and weeping. I saw employees who could hardly continue their day's work for worry about the students.

Yes, I observed all that and more. Much more: Few of the people who endured that chaotic evening were related; yet, they were family.

And it made me think. Young people today tend to get a bad rap. All we read about is illicit drugs, AIDS, beer parties, premarital sex, and the dirty laundry list goes on and on. We contend youth are irresponsible, that they don't care about anything. All that can be reduced to unfair generalities. When one gets down to cases, there's a lot to be said for today's young people. So, as this basketball season progresses, let us remember that there will be no bad games from here on out, irrespective of the score. Not even the most died-inthe-wool Bulldog fan need worry about whether our players will be champions. Believe me, they already are.




Fourth, Fifth grades to present program

Hazardous waste management tips for in the home and on the farm

by Leon Church, County Agent

Consider the variety of products we commonly use in the household and around the farm: paints, solvents, oils, cleaners, wood preservatives, batteries, adhesives, and pesticides. Handling and disposal of excess or unwanted chemicals can become a big problem. Some common disposal practices not only threaten ground water but may be illegal.

Small, unusable amounts of these products often wind up spilled, buried, dumped, or flushed onto a property. Minimizing the amounts of these substances used on the homestead, along with practicing proper disposal practices, can reduce both health risks and the potential for ground water contamination. Some people are familiar with the hazards of pesticides, but they may be less aware of the hazards of other commonly used chemicals.

Improper use of hazardous products may cause toxic health problems. Improper storage may allow chemicals to leak, causing potentially dangerous chemical enter drinking water through surface burning also contains significant The phone number is 874-2141.

Two key steps to minimizing the risk of pollution on your property from farm and household wastes are to reduce the amount of waste produce and to recycle when possible. Hazardous wastes are defined as materials that are ignitable, toxic, corrosive or explosive (TWC, 1990). Lists of wastes are contained in 40 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 261.31 through 261.34.

Some hazardous materials, such as lubricating oils or solvents for cleaning metal parts, are an unavoidable part of life. Examine your use of hazardous materials to make sure you really need all the products you are using. Keep in mind that hazardous waste must be managed in accordance state and federal rules.

Pesticide containers, including household or those used for yard care, are classified as acute hazardous substances because of their toxicity. Handle all pesticides as directed on the label to prevent health and environmental problems. The label will contain instructions as to what the best disposal method is that should be used. If label has been removed give the Extension Service a call for additional information. Pay careful attention to any pesticide that has the toxic

In uncontrolled diabetes, glucose and fats remain in the bloodstream and, with time, damage the body's vital organs and contribute to heart or getting a tingling feeling in the feet, disease.
