CC Women Win National Title

Kansas Wesleyan may have stripped the National Small College Athletic Association's crown away from the Clarendon College Lady Bulldogs last year. But the Salina, Kan., school would not repeat as national champion as Clarendon held off a late charge from the Kansas team in the opening round of the national tournament Thursday in Salina.

Two games later, the Lady Bulldogs brought home the national championship crown that slipped through their fingers last year.

"It was a good feeling," head coach Joel Zehr said. "I was really happy for the kids because of the work they put into it. We started in mid-Au-

gust and it's mid-March. There's been a lot of blood, sweat, and tears going into it."

Clarendon trailed two-time winner Kansas Wesleyan 24-21 at halftime in the opening round March 5 after losing a 9-point lead in the first 20 minutes. Both teams traded baskets in the second half before CC prevailed 54-52.

"It was a good ballgame," said Zehr, the 1996-97 NSCAA coach of the year. "We were down three at half, but we had blown a 9-point lead in the first half.

"They had a chance to win it at the buzzer and their shot fell short."

Scorers were Stephanie Miller, 15, of Louisville, Ky.; Kirl Neptune, 12; Korey Knorpp, 10; and Maxie Flores,

A tough Arkansas Baptist team, which featured Charmaine Alfred - a 1996-97 Clarendon College player - faced Clarendon Friday in the semi-final round.

"I thought they had the best chance of winning it," Zehr said. "They were the most athletic team in the tournament. I think we were confident but pretty nervous."

The Lady Bulldogs didn't have any cause for nervousness as they led 37-13 at

halftime before pulling away with a 62-42 win. "We hadn't run a zone

defense all year, and I decided to run it right before the game," Zehr said. "I didn't think they could shoot the ball real well, and this would keep them from penetrating. I knew

(Alfred) could penetrate, but she couldn't shoot outside. We were doing whatever we could do to keep them outside. It worked great."

Neptune had 17 points and 10 rebounds; Miller, 16 points and 8 rebounds; and Knorpp had 5 points. NCAA Div. 3 school Centenary out of Hackettstown, N.J., led Clarendon 27-26 at halftime in the tournament finals.

"We were real tentative," Zehr said. "We didn't play our game. We were turning the ball over too easily. (Neptune) didn't have a good first half. We just didn't do anything. (Knorpp) kept us in the game. She hit three 3's one at the buzzer.'

Trout over Chamberlain in primary

Despite contested local races, less than 27 percent of Donley County's registered voters turned out to vote in Tuesday Primary Elections — 442 in the Democratic Primary and 214 in the Republican.

In the race for county commissioner for Precinct 4, challenger Bob Trout got the nod for the Democratic nomination over incumbent Will Chamberlain, 97-70. In Precinct 2. Donnie Hall re-

ceived the GOP nomination over Lynn Mays, 98-39. Hall will face Democratic incumbent C.W. "Dude" Cornell in the general election in November.

County Treasurer Becky Jackson ran unopposed in the Republican primary. She will face the Democrat's nominee, former county treasurer Wanda Smith, in November.

Mac Thornberry easily won his party's nomination for the 13th Congressional District. Local Republicans chose the Donley County incumbent over challenger Richard Amon, 271-5.

On the Democratic side, local voters favored journalism professor Mark Harmon over attorney Ed True for their party's nomination for Congress.

What's the deal with Puerto Rico?

Just prior to the dawn of the 20th century, the United States won Puerto Rico fair and square as the spoils of the Spanish-American War. For years now, it has been ballyhooed about as potentially becoming the 51st state in the Union.

Last week, the US House of Representatives passed a bill that would allow Puerto Ricans to vote for one of three options on the future of their territory: 1) to continue like they are as a commonwealth of the United States — they don't get a vote in Congress, they have no Electoral vote for the presidency, and they pay no income tax; 2) to become a state — they would get to vote and pay income taxes; or 3) to become independent — they would vote for themselves and keep the money at home, so to speak.

We took the Phillipines and Cuba away from Spain, too, and just look at the troubles they've given us since they became independent — particularly Cuba. Food and beverages are not allowed in the Auditorium so there will be no concession stand.

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
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Howardwick sues former firemen
