Donley County Shows Interest In "Salt Fork of Red River" Dam Project

At a meeting of Donley County Representatives of the "Salt Fork of the Red River Basin Association" last Friday night at the C of C Office great interest was reported by the citizens of Donley County. "Cap" Morris, President of the Association; Rayburn Smith, Secretary of the Association; Clifford Johnson, of Hedley, a Donley County Chairman of the Association; and Edd Mooring, Judge Jack Gray, Maurice "Butch" Lane, Johnny Allen, and Bob Harris of Hedley; interested citizens of Donley County. J. R. Porter, one of the Donley County Committeemen, was out of town and unable to attend.

The primary purpose of the meeting was to elect a County Chairman to replace Joe F. Jones, who has moved away and have this Chairman to appoint a Committee to serve with the previously appointed Committeemen. C. B. Morris was elected Chairman and in turn appointed Carroll Knopp to serve with Clifford Johnson and J. R. Porter as Donley County Committeemen for the Association.

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Doak Smith, who died in McLean, May 15th, were held at the McLean Methodist Church on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. She was 77 years and two months of age at the time of her death.

Officiating at the rites was Rev. C. W. Parmenter, Methodist pastor. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery in Clarendon under the direction of Claborn Funeral Home of McLean.

Mrs. Smith had been in ill health for many months. She died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Paul Mertel, in McLean Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

Pallbearers were George Orlick, Johnnie Mertel, S. A. Cousins, Chas. Cousins, Ernest Beck and Wilson Boyd.

Mrs. Smith was born March 15, 1876 in Milan, Missouri, and came to Texas in 1885. She was the daughter of Rev. H. B. Doak, a pioneer Methodist minister.

In 1909 she was married in Clarendon to Frank Ross Smith, local contractor. Mr. Smith died in Clarendon in 1929.

In 1941, Mrs. Smith moved to McLean from Clarendon. She has been making her home with Mrs. Mertel for some time.

Survivors include one son Doak Smith of Warren, Arizona, two daughters, Mrs. Adaline Brown of Douglas, Arizona and Mrs. Mary E. Mertel of McLean. She was the foster mother of Mrs. Ava Marie Hardin of Amarillo; two grandsons, Robert and Marvin Brown of Douglas; also surviving are one sister and two brothers.

Post Office Box Rents To Advance July 1st

Rents for post office boxes will be advanced July 1, 1953, according to a joint announcement by the Post Office Department and Postmaster J. C. Estlack when the new order was received the first of the week.

Rent advances here will amount to 30 to 75 cents per box for the quarter period, the postmaster stated.

There are four types of boxes used in the local post office, Estlack stated. The 60-cent boxes will be 90 cents after July 1st. The 75-cent boxes will be \$1.10, the \$1.00 boxes will be \$1.50, and the \$1.50 boxes will be \$2.25, according to the new schedule.

This is the first advance in box rents since 1907. Under the present system, box rents are to advance according to the gross post office receipts, the plan being adopted after 46 years.

Just recently a new box section was installed in the local post office to take care of the overload that has existed for years. This section consists of 11.10 boxes after July 1st.

There has always been a long waiting list due to the scarcity of boxes in the local post office. It is believed now that the installation of the new section will meet the demands of the public.

Box rent payments may be made any time during office hours after June 20th.

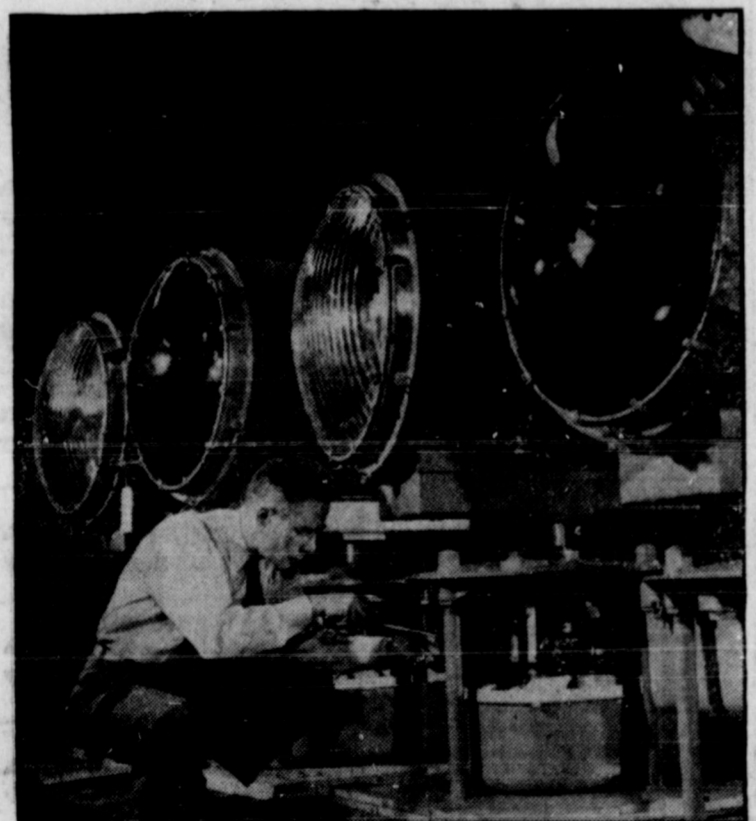

Solution to Teacher Pay Problem Bogs Down

AUSTIN—Officials of the Texas State Teachers Association said today administration leaders had consistently refused to consider any reasonable solution to the teacher pay problem and had insisted on increasing local property taxes to finance any raise.

TSTA officials advised the organization's 53,000 members that no real compromise was ever offered by those opposing the \$600 teacher pay raise bill. President R. L. (Bob) Proffer of Denton, Executive Secretary Charles H. Tennyson of Austin and H. W. Stilwell of Texarkana, chairman of the TSTA legislative committee, also outlined several compromise overtures made by supporters of the \$600 bill.

They noted that the Legislature apparently felt the \$600 recommendation made by TSTA a reasonable figure because both the House and Senate passed the \$600 bill, Senate Bill 24, by top-sided majorities. Many administration leaders voted for the bill but refused to raise taxes to finance it. "Soon after Senate Bill 24 passed out of the House," they said, "it became obvious that administration forces in the legislature would

not permit passage of a tax bill which would raise enough money to finance Senate Bill 24, thereby making the legislative act a futile and useless one. We immediately contacted administration leaders in the house and senate to see if something could be done. These conferences were futile."

Proffer said he had called on Gov. Allan Shivers on May 14, in the hope that some solution might be found, but that the "Governor flatly refused to cooperate."

The TSTA leaders pointed out that they opposed the so-called Kilgore bill, which would have given teachers a \$306 raise if and when the natural gas tax is upheld by the U. S. Supreme Court, because it would have increased local property taxes and would have eliminated some of the services under the Gilmer-Aikin program.

Administration leaders flatly refused to support any pay raise measure which did not include a provision to increase local property taxes. They also insisted on eliminating state financial aid for supervisors and counselors. An attempt by House sponsors of the \$600 bill to take those features out of the Kilgore bill was rejected.

"TSTA should not be and has

not been in the position of being willing to cripple or sacrifice its school program for the conditional promise of a small salary increase," the organization's members were told, "when the principles involved were so far-reaching."

House sponsors also offered administration forces another compromise which was rejected. It would have given teachers a \$306 raise Sept. 1, 1953, plus an additional \$90 on Sept. 1, 1954. It also would have put a dedication tax on natural gas reserves to pay for the raise and the tax would have become inoperative if the Supreme Court upheld the gas gathering tax. Governor Shivers, although he fought the gathering tax and favored this type in 1951, refused in 1953 to consider this tax, which was designed to collect a great deal of revenue from out-of-state consumers of Texas gas. Administration leaders again insisted on local property tax increases instead of a tax on long-line natural gas pipelines.

The TSTA spokesmen said their cause is not lost because there will be another session of the Legislature. They mentioned the possibility of a special session, which they noted the governor can call "for the express purpose of solving this vital problem at any time he desires."

"We stand ready, now as in the past, to discuss this problem at anytime with the governor or members of the Legislature and to help in every way possible to try to solve it," they added.

pose or volunteer wheat reaching maturity) was grown for the 1951 or 1952 or 1953 crops will be entitled to a 1954 allotment as an "Old" farm.

A farm on which there was no wheat acreage for the 1951 or 1952 or 1953 crops may receive a 1954 allotment as a "new" farm upon proper and timely application to the PMA county committee by the farm operator or owner.

4. Question: When will a decision with respect to 1954 wheat acreage allotments and 1954 wheat marketing quotas be made?

Answer: The Secretary of Agriculture is required by law to make a decision with respect to marketing quotas for the 1954 crop of wheat on or before July 1, 1953.

5. Question: Who is eligible to vote in the July wheat referendum if one is held?

Answer: Each person who, as owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper, will be entitled to share in the proceeds of the 1954 crop of wheat on a farm on which more than 15.0 acres will be planted.

6. Question: Will all wheat farmers be notified of 1954 farm wheat acreage allotments prior to the date of the referendum?

Answer: Yes.

7. Question: How many farmers must vote in favor of marketing quotas on the 1954 crop of wheat before such farm quotas would be in effect?

Answer: More than two-thirds of all wheat farmers in the United States who vote in the referendum must vote in favor of quotas on the 1954 crop of wheat before the program could be put into effect.

**Draft Law & Its Laws
And Regulations**

Editor's Note: This is one of a series of 10 short articles on the draft law and its rules and regulations.

How does a local draft board consider a draft registrant's case when it comes before the board in the manner governed by law and regulations?

The members of a board sit around a table—and the file containing the man's papers are placed before it by the clerk.

The board then considers the man from the following standpoints, based on information in the file:

1. Is he on active duty in the military service? (1-C)
2. Is he a conscientious objector who has been ordered to a civilian job? (1-W)
3. Is he too old for service under the law? (5-A)
4. Can it be determined at the board level whether he is physically, mentally, or morally unfit for service? (4-F)
5. Is he a minister of religion or divinity student? (4-D)
6. Is he subject to exemption as an alien? (4-C)

7. Is he a public official deferred by the law? (4-B.)

8. Is he a World War II veteran as defined by the law? (4-A.)

9. Is he subject to deferment because of his dependents? (3-A.)

10. Is he eligible for deferment as a member of the armed forces reserve or a student taking military training? (1-D.)

11. Is he a student in a college or university deferrable under local board authority? (2-S.)

12. Does he meet the requirements for farm or other civilian job deferment? (2-C and 2-A, respectively.)

13. Is he a college or high school student subject to deferment by law for a short period? (1-S.)

14. Is he one of the two types of conscientious objectors? (1-O and 1-A-O.)

If the evidence in the file indicates to the satisfaction of the local board that he is eligible for none of these, then the registrant is considered available for military service. (1-A.)

**June Is Dairy Month
In Texas**

AUSTIN—A state-wide effort to explain the nutritional and economic value of milk and dairy foods was launched in Texas this week, Loy Gandy of San Angelo, state chairman of the 17th annual June Dairy Month in Texas, announced.

Gov. Allan Shivers has officially designated June as Dairy Month, pointing out that the health and economic welfare of all Texans was a subject of continuing grave interest to all in the State of Texas.

"Milk and dairy products are recognized universally as essential to the health of every human being," he said.

"Some 50,000 Texans earn a livelihood from the production, processing, distribution and sale of dairy products with a resultant contribution of \$400 million annually to the commerce of Texas."

The Dairy Products Institute of Texas, which is co-ordinating June Dairy Month activities, has compiled figures showing the importance of dairying and dairy products to the economy of the state, Gandy said.

Dairying last year produced more than \$200 million in farm income for three of every four farms in the state. About 12,000 commercial Grade A dairies depend on milk as their chief in-

come, and some 60,000 farm units depend upon milk and milk products for their income.

Milk, cheese, butter and ice cream are all important items on every family's budget, Gandy said. DPI surveys showed. The average housewife spends more than 15 per cent of her food budget for dairy foods.

And just to show how economical dairy products are, 30 per cent of the food consumed in Texas are milk and dairy products. Thus, the housewife gets twice as much food for half the cost.

By spending as little as 15 per cent of the food budget for dairy foods, the housewife can provide her family with three-fourths of its calcium, one half of its riboflavin and substantially large quantities of every important nu-

trient vital to human development, Gandy said.

The state chairman said it was hoped during the month to impress upon the seven and a half million Texans the importance of keeping dairy foods on the table for every meal not only throughout June, but 365 days of the year.

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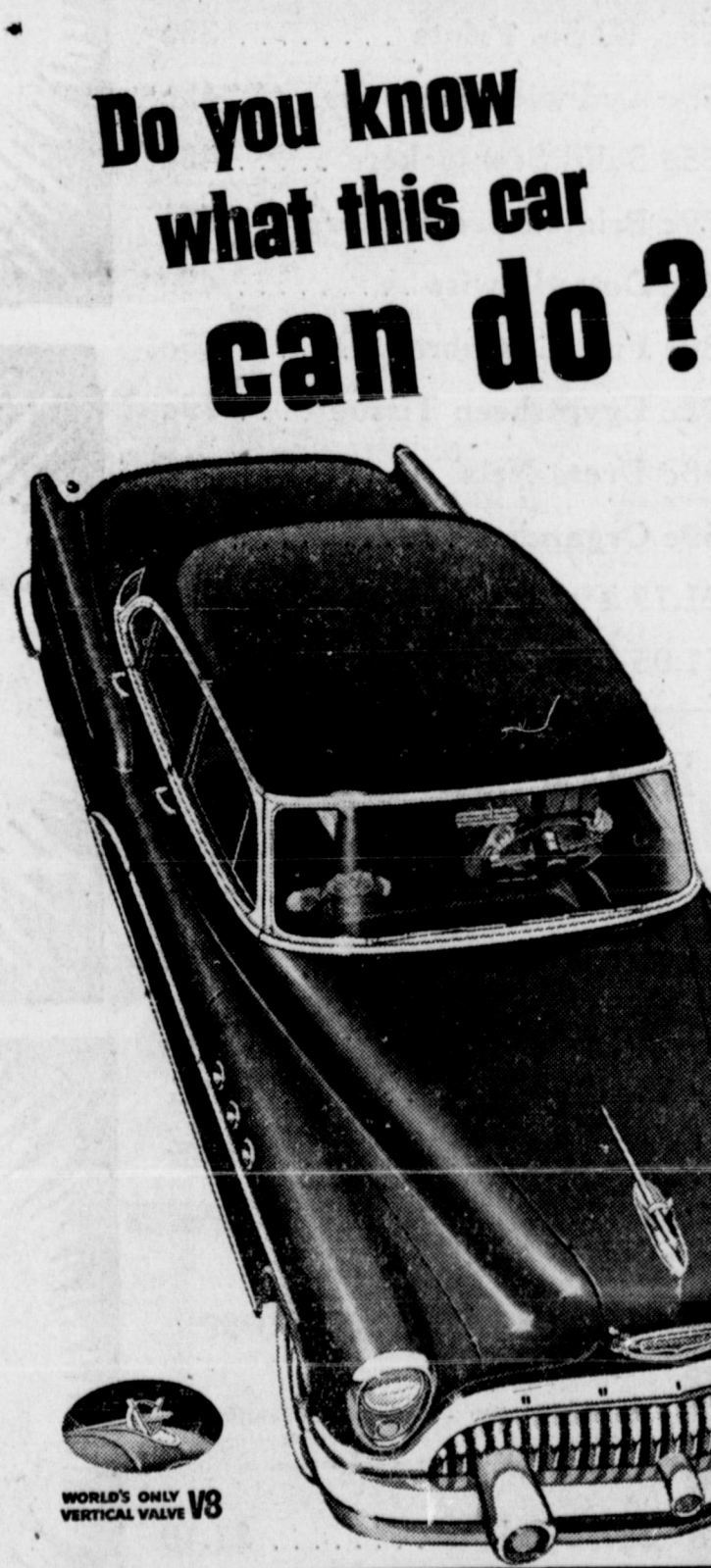
