Nursing Home Now Up For Sale To Bidders

The hospital board voted Tuesday night, 5-2, in favor of selling the Medical Center Nursing Home.

The action came on the heels of a opinion poll last week in which a majority of Donley County taxpayers indicated their willingness to sell the facility. In that poll, 856 of 1,080 respondents were in favor of selling.

Now the board is taking steps to interview potential buyers. The Donley County Hospital Board will meet again on March 3, 1998, at 6:30 p.m. for face to face interviews with prospective bidders. The interviews will be held in Closed Session. After the board selects a bidder

and announces a sale date, opponents of selling the facility have 31 days to submit a petition with the names of 10% of the registered voters in Donley County to force the district to let the people vote on the matter. Such a petition is only valid after

a buyer is selected and date of sale is officially set. The board will have to vote to select the buyer during an Open Session.

Approximately 20 people attended Tuesday's regular meeting of the board, and many voiced their concerns about selling.

Onita Thomas spoke during the open floor. She said she opposed selling the facility because it is nearly paid for and that the current administrator

Go see feedlot before criticizing

Dear Editor:

Several weeks ago a group of people were soliciting signatures of **Donley County residents objecting to** the location and operation of the new feedlot operation going in west of Clarendon. The concerns of the promoters of this "Letter of Objection" itemized several conditions that would exist if the feedlot was allowed to become operational such as odors and contamination by water runoff into Greenbelt Lake which would decrease the value of the recreation and property on and around Greenbelt Lake.

After visiting the location of the feedlot and talking to the owners about the operation, it was very obvious that the Hommel family have not entered into this feedlot venture without a lot of careful thought, planning, and the proper investments in design and construction of the facility to inhibit surface water contamination of the lake and underground intrusion to the water tables. Not only have they designed and met the engineering requirements of the State of Texas, they have surpassed the minimum design criteria by adding an additional reservoir for added insurance that surface water does not flow into feeder

streams to the lake.

Before visiting the 3-H Feeder's operation, I had some of the same concerns as many other individuals of Donley County have only voiced and evidently have not taken the time to go and talk to the operators and see for themselves exactly what kind of operation the Hommels are creating.

Because this feedlot operation was nothing like what the solicitors for signatures originally led me to believe, I once again talked to the solicitor to see if he had visited the feedlot location and/or talked about water runoff and other factors were as much of a threat to the community as the letter had made it out to be and the solicitor said "no." In essence, I told the solicitor that the Hommel's are putting in an operation nothing like what the letter of concern had portrayed. The solicitor's response was that I had my right to my opinion.

Maybe everyone in this Agriculture community should take the time to visit the 3-H Feeder operation and see for themselves what the Hommel Family is trying to do in Donley County. (Move forward with cows and plows, not stand still.)

I'm not one to voice an opinion on public issues very often, but I would like to tell you about an incident I observed several years ago.

I lived on Coldwater Ranch, located north of Sunray, for several years. There is a very nice private lake, located on Coldwater Creek, on the ranch. This lake had good fishing, swimming, skiing, etc. During the spring the creek's considerable watershed would put the lake over the spillway on a regular basis. Usually the that summer. only ill effects would be some debris and numerous broken water gaps. But, once, back in the early seventies, the creek came down one night, and, as I recall, it didn't even rain at the ranch. The next morning when we went to check on things, we found the covered with dead fish.

After some investigation and water sample analysis, it was determined that the contamination had come from

the containment ponds of a feedlot located several miles upstream on the Coldwater Creek watershed. A severe storm, (probably not unlike the one that hit Clarendon last spring), had overflowed the ponds into the creek, and this runoff made it all the way to the ranch lake. The owners of the feedlot paid to have the lake restocked, after the lake water recovered from the contamination. Needless to say there was no fishing, swimming, or anything else for the rest of

I do not know what the effects of a similar event would have on Greenbelt Lake, but I do know that, like the bumper sticker sort of says, "NATURE HAPPENS." And too, this issue may be moot anyway. PETA used to be a lot like gangs, drugs, and prostitution — only found in big cities. But now, they are in Amarillo protesting beef producers at the Oprah trial. Just last week, PETA activists Marin Goldstein and Jennifer Schneider, both of California, decided it would really be cool if they hung by a thin rope from the Khiva Shrine Temple across from the courthouse. Goldstein was situated above a fake giant meat hook and a banner that looked blood-splattered and said, "Hooked on beef? Get

As expected, the California weirdos were arrested and hauled to the Amarillo jail. Just for once, why couldn't the rope unravel (like it always does in the movies) and the two tumble to the street below? Just a little wishful thinking on my part, I

Before joining Clarendon College, I worked for an international agricultural organization that dealt with PETA on a regular basis. I quickly learned that most PETA activists are clueless regarding the day-to-day activities of animal producers. They assume that we beat our animals and keep them locked away in tiny and dirty cages. Hello... if producers did this, then we would not have a beef industry at all because we all would go

You know and I know that beef producers take care of their stock. We get out in the cold and break ice on tanks and troughs, feed supplemental nutrients, and doctor. Heck, we've even had an orphan baby calf live in our bathroom for several weeks. I can't begin to count the number of baby calves who grew up, being bottle fed, in our backyard. How about that, PETA?

Or what about those of us who've gone out every hour to check calving heifers? It's definitely not my favorite pastime, but you've got to do what you've got to do. Perhaps PETA activists could take a look into any producer's home refrigerator. I know in my icebox they would find more horse, cattle, and dog medicine than regular people food.

Let me explain a few more common misconceptions to PETA supporters: Dehorning is like getting your fingernails trimmed, branding prevents thieves from stealing your animals and is no worse than a high school kid getting a tattoo. Ear tagging is like getting your ears pierced, and growth implants are like allergy shots while artificial insemination is no different than in vitro fertilization in humans. Even worse, PETA is dead set against medical testing on animals. In a 1994 USA Today interview, PETA spokesman Dan Mathews was asked what PETA's view was on medical research to find cures for deadly diseases. His reply was simply, "Don't get [diseases] in the first place, schmo!" PETA is so misinformed that it boycotts contributions to reputable health organizations such as the

Red Cross, March of Dimes, and the American Cancer Society. By taking such an ignorant stand, PETA is promoting an organization whose leader once said that even if animal research resulted in a cure for AIDS, "we'd be against it."

How many PETA supporters suffer from diabetes, heart disease, cancer, HIV, arthritis, or other maladies? How many PETA family members or close friends have suffered from these diseases? Okay, I back your plea to release all the lab animals only if we can test on humans - beginning with PETA supporters, of course.

PETA needs to get all the facts before rushing off to protest companies or industries. Why don't they spend the day with a rancher or a kid working with her 4-H or FFA livestock project? They won't even consider these options because it would prove their "beliefs" wrong.

Meat lovers, we must band together and defeat PETA. Did you know that they are lobbying for a meat tax? This tax would be similar to cigarette and liquor taxes that "punish the user" by making him pay more for the product.

Before we go to war with PETA, I hereby offer a peace gift to the organization. Give me a call and we'll do supper. I'm cooking, and the menu will be medium-rare steak and calf fries (if you don't know what these are, then they taste a lot like peanuts). No potatoes will be served because they have "eyes," nor will corn since they have "ears." Forget about lettuce, too. We can't be eating any "heads" now.

Is the Government Really Its Smallest Size in 25 Years

Is the era of big government really over? President Clinton made that claim last

week when he said in his State of the Union Address that "we have the smallest government in 35 years." But is this really true? Is big government really a thing of the past? After looking at the President's budget proposal for next year, I'd have to say it is not.

If we look at how much of our national output

the federal government consumes, it is now at the highest level since 1945, and the third highest ever.

If we look at the tax burden being placed on the American people, it is now at the highest level it's ever been, with nearly 40 percent of the typical family's income going to pay taxes.

If we look at how much the government will spend, it is now at the highest level ever, and will grow even more if the President's proposal to create 89 new federal programs at a cost of \$150 billion dollars goes through.

The truth is, the only part of the federal government that's getting any smaller is our

national defense. Defense spending has been going down for 13 straight years and - when measured as part of our Gross National Product - is at its lowest level since before World War II.

Now, what does all this mean for you and me? In a nutshell, it means we're less free and less secure because the federal government is too big and is exercising too much control over our lives.

It also means that the era of big government is far from over and that we've got to keep working for a smaller and smarter government that trusts the American people more than federal bureaucrats to solve the problems which face us as a Nation.

should be given a chance to continue to improve it. In 1999 when the bonds are paid, she said that tax money could be used to update the building.

Board member J.D. Shanks said the Donley County Hospital District issued bonds in the amount of \$590,000 in February 1971 to build the Medical Center. To date the district has paid over \$1.3 million for those bonds, he said. "We've invested a lot in this place."

"Alan Graham was hired [as administrator] to

get the place financially sound," Shanks said. "He's a good administrator and deserves a chance to do more work. To do less would be just blowing it out the window."

But other board members disagreed. Don Thomberry said he did not think the quality of care would suffer under a corporation. "I feel that private enterprise can beat government care any day of the week," Thornberry said.

Board member B.B. Osburn said it was strange

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to think that the home could be run better if the county runs it. "I can see no advantage to keeping it," he said.

Shanks moved, seconded by Sue Leeper, to defer action on selling until July 1998. Motion failed — Osburn, Dikki Howell, Judy Synek, Thornberry, and David Strange voting opposed.

Osburn moved, seconded by Thornberry, to sell the Medical Center Nursing Home. Motion passed — Shanks and Leeper voting opposed.

"Over the years, we have gotten numerous questions and complaints from Texas citizens regarding telephone solicitations by law enforcement associations," said Col. Dudley M. Thomas, director of DPI. "The DPI does not solicit financial contributions from private citizens. We receive our funding from the organizations to clarify that they are

Some organizations solicit funds "State Troopers," "Texas Highway Patrol" or "Department of Public Safety." While some DPS officers may be members of these organizations on their own time, these associations are not affiliated with the DPS, Thomas said. They raise money brochure about law enforcement to fund their own programs, some of which may benefit officers and

The 75th Texas Legislature enacted a law that requires these

not part of the DPS and prohibits them from implying that the money they raise will go to the DPS. In addition, solicitors cannot use names, symbols, or statements that are similar to those used by the Texas Department of Public Safety or the Texas Rangers to confuse or mislead someone who is being asked to give money.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to charge an additional 26 cents per month per line to recover costs for providing Expanded Local Calling service (ELC) to certain Texas Customers.

The 26 cents per month surcharge would not be billed to customers who receive ELC. However, customers who receive ELC and pay less than the maximum \$3.50 a month residential ELC charge or less than the maximum \$7 business ELC charge will have to pay the additional 26 cents per month charge

Expanded Local Calling was created in 1993 by Texas legislation that requires telephone companies to provide toll-free calling between small towns that share a community of interest such as a school or hospital district. The legislation allows telephone companies to recover costs not paid through customer charges by applying a surcharge to all other customers in the state who do not receive the ELC service or who do not pay the maximum ELC rate. The maximum monthly ELC rate allowed under state law is \$3.50 per line for residential customers and \$7 per line for business customers.

Southwestern Bell estimates that the 26 cents per month per line charge will recover the \$27 million annual cost of providing ELC service that is not recovered from ELC rates.

If approved by the PUC, the monthly statewide surcharge of 26 cents per line per month will begin with the April, 1998 billing cycles, with an agreement to refund all or part of the charge if the PUC does not approve it.

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

Lady Broncos headed for bi-district match-up

The 8-2 district record earned Clarendon (20-8) a berth in a bi-district match-up with Stratford The game has tentatively been scheduled for Friday at 7 p.m. in the Amarillo High School Activity Center.

District 1-2A champion Stratford (22-5) hasn't been to the play-offs since the mid-1980s, and Clarendon head coach Steve Schmidt hopes it will be to the Lady Broncos' advantage.

"They've always had good records going into district and had some problems getting to the play-offs, so I know they're pretty excited about making the play-offs," Schmidt said. "Hopefully that will work in our favor. We're taking it as business this year. Hopefully, our experience in the play-offs will help."

The Lady Elks start four seniors off a squad

that competes in a tough district.

"They have lots of seniors, so that's in their favor. They're not real tall, pretty comparable to our size with the same speed. They go far in cross country each year."

Local man's daughter wins trip to D.C. from Greenbelt Electric by Dee Ann Bushes

Deborah Morrow was recently announced a winner in Greenbelt Electric Cooperative's Washington D.C. Youth Tour Contest. Morrow's

winning essay, entitled, "How Electricity Has Affected My Life" has entitled her to an all expense paid trip to Washington D.C. Approximately 1,000 high school students will convene for a week long tour of the nation's capitol June 4-16, 1998.

Morrow will be among 80 Texas youths participating in the trip which will originate and conclude in Arlington, Texas. After an orientation party there, the group will board three chartered buses and head for Washington where they will meet youths from across the nations, all winners of similar contests sponsored by rural electric companies.

While the contest is open to any high school student in the Greenbelt Service area, Wheeler does not want teachers to have students enter as part of a school assignment.

"We find that the better, brighter students enter this contest," Wheeler says. "This isn't something they are required to do. They write and submit the essay because they want to."

The Youth Tour actually started in 1951 under the encouragement of Senator Lyndon Johnson. As a result of his suggestions, several Texas electric cooperatives sent groups of young people to Washington in the summer to work in Senator Johnson's office to learn about government in action.

The next year, rural electric coops in other states caught on and started sending young people on week-long tours of the nation's capitol. Twenty years later, the Youth Tour is still a popular event among high school students nationwide.

Morrow is, to say the least, excited about the opportunity. "I was so happy to hear I had won the contest. I don't know if I will ever have the chance to go to Washington D.C. again," she says. "I am really looking forward to the being with kids my age from all over the country and seeing the museums and historical monuments. I am anxious to see Capitol Hill, Washington's Monument, and Ford's Theater.

"But you know what I'm the most excited about?" she asks with a smile. "Riding on the subway!"


