Reader says:

Selling Medical Center is viable option

Dear Editor,
I want to clarify what I am about to impart to you, the reader, are my opinions and conclusions based on experience as a former member of the Donley County Hospital District Board of Directors and from discussions I have had with members of the community. I have also attended some of the public meetings held by the Board of Directors.

The conclusion I have reached is that the majority of the people want to maintain the status quo (leave things as they are), regarding disposition of the Medical Center Nursing Home. To do so would require the continued use of tax monies for the operation and maintenance of the facility as has been the practice in the past. It has been stated that the facility will soon be paid for (final payment will be made in 1999) so why should we get rid of it? It will be ours, and we can operate it in a way that we will be sure that our elderly and infirm are taken care of in the manner that they have always been cared for — with dignity and love.

That would be great if we can afford it. The facilities are getting old and require frequent repair, the equipment is beginning to wear out and fail, requiring expensive repair and replacement. Insurance (workmen's compensation and liability) costs are prohibitive. If the People desire to maintain the status quo and are willing to make even a larger sacrifice, it can be done. It would entail the pro-

urement of a large sum of money to make the necessary repairs and replacement of equipment and expansion of the facility to put it in a self-supporting position, to preclude the aforementioned use of tax monies.

We have one other viable option in my opinion. That is to sell the facility. I know that is not what most folks want to hear, based on what I have heard. It is not what I want to see happen either, but we have to be realistic. I don't feel that the citizens of Donley County are willing to obligate themselves to a large financial debt that would have to be satisfied through more taxes. There have been three offers to buy Medical Center Nursing Home. All three were made from organizations from out of county. Two of these organizations have indicated major changes resulting in expanded facilities, more efficient operations, and a reduction of personnel. The third representative, the present administrator of the Medical Center Nursing Home, has indicated that he would maintain the facilities as is with gradual improvements and expansions, allowing reductions in personnel through normal attrition. That would be my choice.

Well, I have stated my opinion. Soon you all will be asked to state yours to the Board. I encourage you to take this opportunity to express your feelings on the disposition of Medical Center Nursing Home.

Government Proposal Limits Water Heater Choices

Hold on to your wallets, homeowners, the federal government has found a new way to spend your money. If you like to take a hot shower, or wash clothes or dishes, get ready to pay more for that privilege.

After many years of study, the US Department of Energy (DOE) has released a proposal to raise the efficiency standards for water heaters. In plain English, DOE wants consumers to use less energy to heat the water in their homes. The goal is praiseworthy, but DOE seems hell-bent on failing to achieve it.

Instead of tightening efficiency standards for all types of water heaters, DOE appears to be inclined to change only gas water heater standards,

thus placing natural gas water heaters at a competitive disadvantage with their electric and oil counterparts.

Why punish gas? This is a puzzler. The full energy cycle for a gas water heater already is more efficient than that of electric models. In addition, gas water heaters are the most economical choice — over their lifetime, electric water heaters cost twice as much as gas water heaters to operate. And natural gas is the most environmentally friendly fuel.

By changing the standards for gas water heaters only, DOE could cause these heaters to be priced right out of the market, at the expense of both the

consumer and the environment. It seems that the new standards won't reflect the most efficient energy technologies. There may be energy savings achieved — by shoppers, faced with fewer affordable choices in water heaters. Maybe they'll save their energy by just staying home.

DOE was supposed to take several factors into consideration before releasing its ruling. The "new" water heater was supposed to use less energy to heat water than in the past, be technologically feasible to produce and save money. This rulemaking fails on all counts.

Assisted living facility now under construction in Claude

Construction is underway for Hudson House, a licensed assisted living facility in Claude.

Located at 301 Trice, across the street from the post office, within walking distance of medical facilities, grocery store, and several churches. The new facility is scheduled to open in March. Reservations are now being taken.

The 18 apartment facility is designed for people who are still independent, yet want the feeling of security that 24-hour staff provides. Hudson House offers three meals a day, laundry assistance, weekly apartment cleaning, and medication supervision.

One of the main focuses of Hudson House is to provide a residence that enables people to live in a rural community. There will be a variety of weekly activities as well as

scheduled transportation to appointments.

Hudson House is being built by three local sisters and their husbands in memory of their grandmother, Alda Hudson. Owners include Sharon and Ron Wetzel, who owns Palo Duro Nursing Home in Claude; Sandra and Glen Metcalf, of Canyon; and Gary and Vickie Wood, of Olton. Mrs. Metcalf plans to manage the facility.

Each private, locking apartment will have a full bath, kitchenette, and emergency call system. Common living areas include living room, dining room, and two separate family rooms. For the enjoyment of residents as well as visitors there will be a gift shop.

The owners of Hudson House hope to provide a place to call home with caring staff who believe retirement years should be lived in a comfortable home environment.

Colts teams lose to Quanah

The seventh and eighth graders dropped two contests to tough Quanah squads Jan. 12 in Quanah.

They hope to rebound this weekend in the Bushland Junior High Tournament in Amarillo. The seventh graders will play at 6:30 Thursday against River Road in the Bushland Elementary gym, and the eighth graders will start at 6:30 against Vega in the Middle School gym. The Colts' next regular season game is against White Deer Monday in the Clarendon Gym. Tip-off is set for 5 p.m. and 6 p.m.

The eighth grader trailed 14-9 after one quarter behind Antonio Wilson's five points. Quanah went on a scoring spree in the second period for a 30-14 halftime advantage. Wilson added four more points in the third quarter for a 10-point effort, but Quanah scored 11.

Cody Watson nailed three baskets and was 4-for-5 in the final period from the charity stripe as Clarendon outscored Quanah 12-11 for the 52-

36 loss. Scoring for the Colts were Watson, 12; Wilson, 9; Brian Thompson, 5; Austin Sears, 4; Anthony Jaramillo, 2; and Jarad Lax, 2.

The seventh graders had a tough time offensively with Quanah as they managed 10 points to Quanah's 42. Jacob Mondragon scored one point from the free throw line in the opening period as Quanah led 8-1. The Indians pushed the lead to 21-7 in the second quarter as Mondragon made four points and Judge Smith scored two. Richard Rodriguez made a free throw in the third period as Quanah led 38-8 and Mondragon capped off the scoring with a basket for the 42-10 loss.

Scoring for the Colts were Mondragon, 7; Smith, 2; and Rodriguez, 1.

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Seniors can make installments for taxes

Taxpayers who are over 65 years old may make installment payments on some of their taxes.

Other than being at least 65 years of age, the individual must be paying on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead. The taxes are to be paid in four equal installments, the first being due before February 1. The other payments are due before April 1, before June 1 and before August 1.

Another available payment plan

allows a taxpayer to make escrow payments in order to pay taxes in advance. For example, a taxpayer may enter into a payment contract this month and make nine equal monthly payments toward the 1998 taxes. The advantage in using this method is that the taxes are paid by the time the statement is mailed in October.

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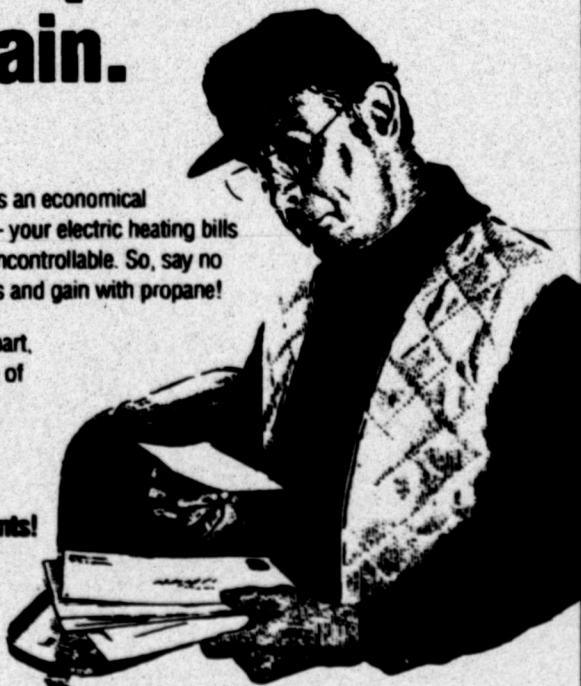
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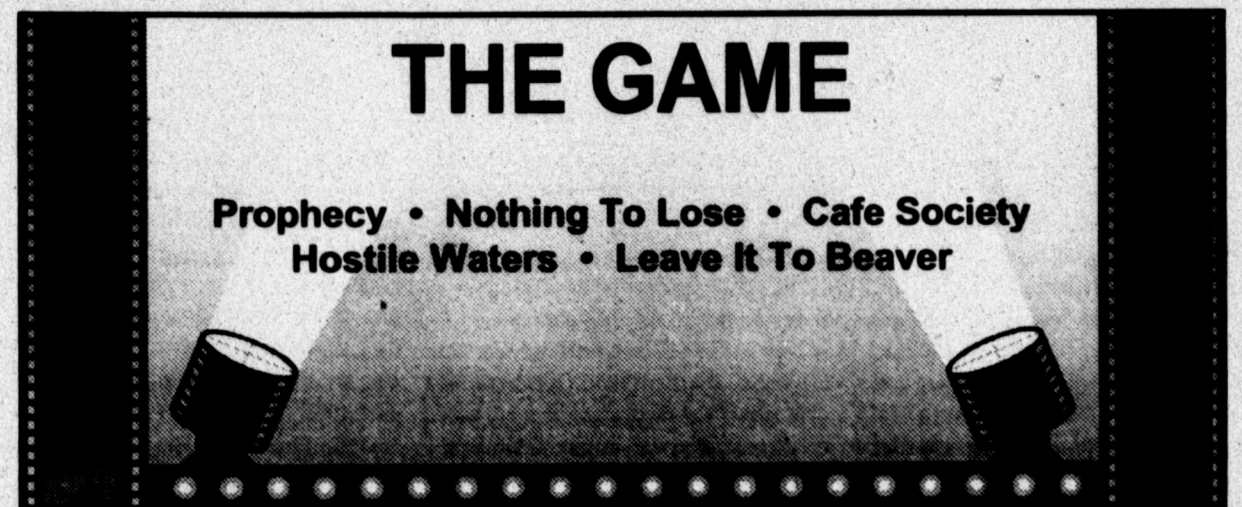


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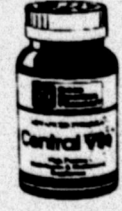

Special lease sale nets more than \$5.3 million for school fund

AUSTIN — Oil and gas leasing from the state continues to generate money for the Permanent School Fund (PSF), with a special sale last week adding more than \$5.3 million to the fund, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said.

"Over the last two years our lease sales have shown dramatic gains," said Mauro, who is chairman of the School Land board that oversees General Land Office (GLO) leasing functions. "Overall, returns are also up. This last fiscal year, the General Land Office deposited more than \$198 million to the Permanent School Fund, the highest total since 1986 when oil was bringing more than \$30 a barrel.

"This special sale brings us \$5,368,171 in oil and gas high bids and \$1,383 in bids on bentonite, a clay used in everything from oil field downhole fluids to kitty litter," said Mauro.

The land commissioner, who

oversees 18,000 oil and gas wells on state lands, said the results of last year's state lease sales indicate strongly that Texas is pulling out of the oil-gas exploration doldrums it has experienced in recent years.

He said oil company bonus bids offered in the April and October lease sales for the right to drill on state property had been the highest since the mid-1980s — \$25.5 million in April and \$23.7 million in October. In addition, the GLO has deposited \$59.5 million into the PSF since the new fiscal year began on September 1.

"The first four month's deposits of almost \$60 million means the income from PSF lands is running very close to last year's," Mauro said. During fiscal year 1997, the GLO put \$198.1 million into the PSF, and in FY1996, \$155 million. "We expect this year to exceed or at least match last year's PSF deposits as a robust energy industry continues on a roll."

TransTexas Gas Corporation was the big bidder at this special lease sale, picking up a total of 1,488 acres in three tracts, all straddling Galveston and Chambers counties. Included were a 308-acre tract in Galveston Bay for a high bid of \$1,873,241.20; a 320-acre tract in Galveston Bay for a high bid of \$1,322,876.80; and a 860-acre tract in Dickinson Bay for a high bid of \$2,007,231.40.

IBC Enterprises, Inc. picked up a 320-acre tract in Corpus Christi Bay in Nueces County with a high bid of \$101,028.

Caplan Corporation won 13 bids as the most active bidder on bentonite mineral tracts in Brewster County in far West Texas, Mauro said. Caplan won the right to lease 13 tracts totaling 68,908 acres for a total high bids of \$1,383.65.

The total oil and gas lease sale brought \$5,368,171.15 in high bonuses on 2,154.4 acres in 11 state


tracts, while the \$1,383.65 for the 68.9 acres of bentonite leases brought the overall sale total to \$5,369,554.80.

The General Land Office, headed by Mauro, manages 20.4 million acres of state land and mineral rights, with 13.3 million acres dedicated to the PSF.

The land office has deposited more than \$6.9 billion into the fund since it was created in 1854, mostly from oil and gas leases. The land office also has an in-kind natural gas program which not only benefits the PSF but provides a reduction in gas utility costs to numerous state agencies and institutions.

The PSF now has a market value of \$16 billion. Interest and dividends from its investments are deposited into the Available School Fund which makes distributions to school districts on a per-student basis. These investments currently generate about \$215 per student per year.

Clarendon steamrolled over Quanah in their district opener before losing a close contest with no. 7-ranked Panhandle Friday in Clarendon.

The Lady Broncos are 13-7 and knotted at 1-1 in District 2-2A. They travel to Memphis Friday for a 6:30 p.m. tip-off before hosting Wellington Tuesday. Clarendon got off to a 9-8 lead against Quanah Jan. 13 behind Melissa Campbell's 3-pointer, basket and two free throws. They increased the lead to 23-21 as Lindsey Eads threw in three baskets and Campbell hit two treys.

Scoring for the Lady Broncos were Eads, 14; Kasi Ashcraft, 14;

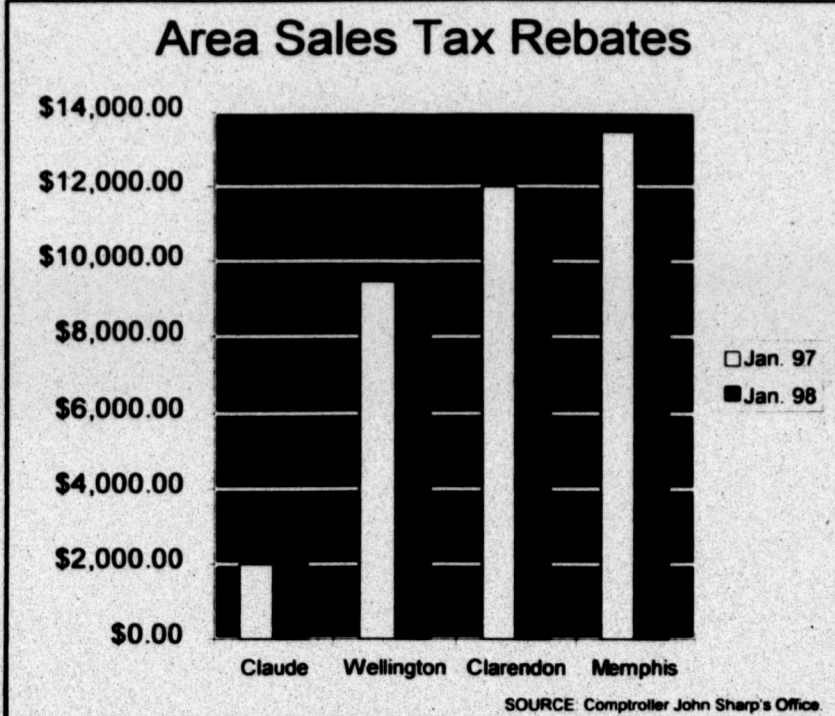
Campbell, 13; Kim Alexander, 4, Gefe Butler, 3; America Santos, 2; and Catherine Chamberlain, 1.

State sales tax rebates up, many local cities see drop off

AUSTIN — State Comptroller John Sharp recently delivered a total of \$155.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,090 Texas cities and 118 counties.

"We're beginning another promising year. Sales tax rebates to cities and counties are 12 percent higher in January than those for the first month of last year," Sharp said. "Consumers continue to show increased confidence in the Texas economy."

This month's payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers in November, at the start of the traditional holiday shopping season, and reported to the Comptroller in December.

Locally, Clarendon's rebate was down 3.16 percent from last year for a total of \$11,619.34. Hedley dropped 33.15 percent to \$147.25. And Howardwick gained 163.55 percent to reach a total of \$624.90.

"That really sparked us and the crowd," Avery said. "They just kept throwing them to him, and (Bruce) is such a good athlete he could just get them and make the play. We had great momentum heading into the locker room."

Panhandle scored the first basket of the half to close the lead to 28-18. Then Avery opted to slow the pace down.

"I knew they were going to make a run at us

and I didn't want them to get any momentum," Avery said. "I thought we would just slow them down and take them out of their rhythm. When I told Kareem (Abdullah) to hold back, Panhandle never attacked us. They stayed back and about 2:00 ticked off the clock.

"I knew we were better ball handlers, and I knew we could make our free throws. It kept working, so we stayed in it."

Panhandle went to a smaller, faster line-up but the ball-handling skills of Brent Gaines, Abdullah and Scotty Elliott were too sound as the trio turned the ball over only four times during the entire game. Abdullah made two free throws and a basket in the third period for Clarendon's only scores as they increased the lead to 32-18. 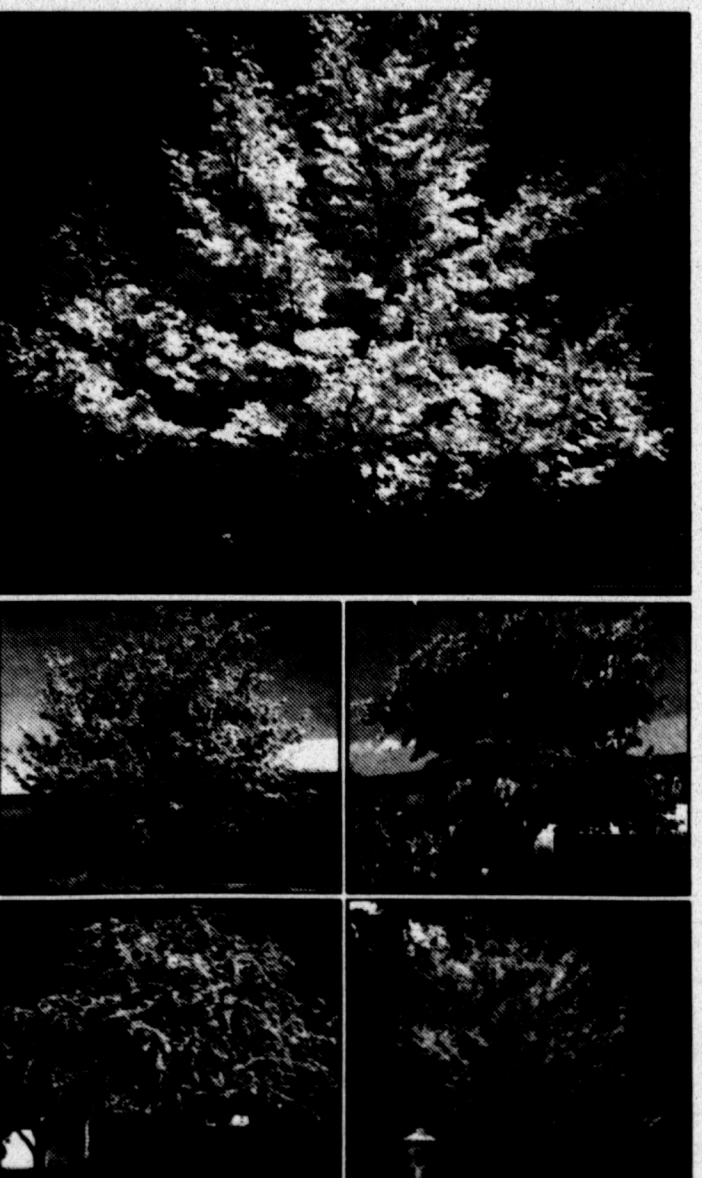

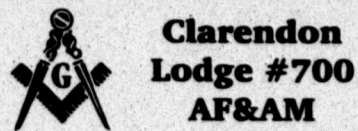

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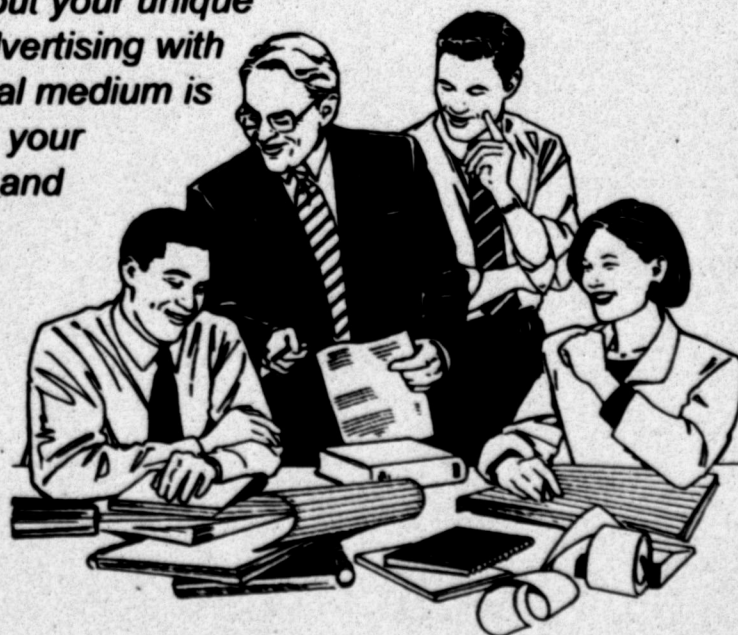
