The amount increases each month thereafter until the tax is paid. Accounts not paid by July 1 will incur an additional 15 percent collection penalty.

This notice is a reminder to those who have not paid their 1997 taxes. In an effort to cut office costs, second notices will not be mailed to individual taxpayers during January. Delinquent notices will be mailed in February to those who still owe 1997 tax at that time.

Parts of the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Act passed by congress in 1996 have been incorporated in Texas' 1997 welfare reform legislation.

Basically the law requires employers in Texas to report to Austin every time they hire or re-hire an employee. Currently, the reporting system is voluntary, but effective October 1, 1998, it will be mandatory to turn in the "pertinent information."



## Seniors can make installments for taxes

Taxpayers who are over 65 years allows a taxpayer to make escrow old may make installment payments payments in order to pay taxes in on some of their taxes.

Other than being at least 65 years of age, the individual must be paying on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead. The taxes are to be paid in four equal installments, the first being due before February 1. The other payments are due before April 1, before June 1 and before August 1.

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# **Broncos stomp Panhandle Panthers**, 48-28

Clarendon senior Chris Bruce stole several Panhandle in-bounds passes right before half-time, sparking a Bronco rally and giving Clarendon the opportunity to go into a fourcorner stall the second half and roll to a 48-28 win before a raucous crowd Friday in the Clarendon gym.

The Broncos also coasted by Quanah 65-36 Jan. 13 at home for a 14-6 record and 2-0 in District 2-2A. Clarendon travels to Memphis Friday for an 8 p.m. showdown.

"Memphis is very athletic and their gym is a tough place to play," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "We will have to play well. We have Wellington at home on Tuesday, and they are the most athletic team in our district. Every game is tough."

Clarendon led 11-7 after one quarter and held onto a small lead until a minute before half. Bruce stole several Panhandle inbounds passes under the Bronco basket dishing them off for easy Clarendon scores.

"That really sparked us and the crowd," Avery said. "They just kept throwing them to him, and (Bruce) is such a good athlete he could just get them and make the play. We had great momentum heading into the locker room."

Panhandle scored the first basket of the half to close the lead to 28-18. Then Avery opted to slow the pace down.

"I knew they were going to make a run at us

and I didn't want them to get any momentum," Avery said. "I thought we would just slow them down and take them out of their rhythm. When I told Kareem (Abdullah) to hold back, Panhandle never attacked us. They stayed back and about 2:00 ticked off the clock.

"I knew we were better ball handlers, and I knew we could make our free throws. It kept working, so we stayed in it."

Panhandle went to a smaller, faster line-up but the ball-handling skills of Brent Gaines, Abdullah and Scotty Elliott were too sound as the trio turned the ball over only four times during the entire game. Abdullah made two free throws and a basket in the third period for Clarendon's only scores as they increased the lead to 32-18. 
