One hundred and twenty-five Rodeo Queen Contest farmers and ranchers gathered at the court house in Clarendon on Monday night, June 22nd to disask the Federal Department of The girls who have entered the Agriculture to place Donley County in a drought disaster area thereby making farmers and ranchers of the county eligible for whatever benefits might be available to assist them in this emer-

The following requests were made by the group as suggestions that would help farmers and ranchers in this area to combat the present crisis:

1. Provide through existing channels, or otherwise, a system of credit to enable livestock producers and farmers to maintain possession of livestock herds.

2. Provide necessary long term credit for essential feed, seed and essential operating expenses at low interest rates.

3. That the Federal government and its agencies release for domestic consumption any or all surplus feeds or substances from which feed for livestock is made at a price commensurate with present price of livestock.

4. Due to immediate serious be Monday morning, June 29, condition in the county ranges and farm lands, that pro-

partment of Agriculture initiate a beef purchase and promotion program that will restore confidence, strengthen the market and tide the industry over this emer-

gency. 6. That all farmers and ranchers in the drought area be eligible for the long term loans and low interest rates.

7. That Rye seed or mixtures be made available to farmers and ranchers free of charge by the Government to be planted on land left bare by the drought if sufficient moisture is available this fall and to be used only for cover crop and grazing but not to be over grazed.

The group elected for directors to act for them and ask that the directors go to Lubbock this Saturday and try to get an audience with Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson and impress on him personally the serious situation facing this county. Those elected were Forrest Sawyer, chairman; Spencer Sitter, Secretary and H. M. Breedlove. Mr. J. R. Porter prepared the request to Governor Shivers with copies going to our congressman and senators. The board members elected above will work throughout the remainder of the drought situation with all agencies and assist in helping the farmers and ranchers of the county.
