### Banks team up to offer Christmas Cash loans

"Christmas Cash" loans are available again this year at The Donley County State Bank and The Herring National Bank of Clarendon.

As last year, local banks are making 0% loans, up to \$3,000, available for "Christmas

Interested parties must make application for a loan with either of the participating banks. Once your Christmas Cash loan has been approved, you will be issued specially printed Christmas Cash Dollars, which may be spent like U.S. currency toward new purchases of products and services (excluding Lottery tickets, gasoline, and tobacco products) at all of the participating businesses. Businesses display posters indicating they are participants of the promotion.

There will be no exchange of U.S. currency to make change. For example, if you purchase items valued at \$72.95 and you give the merchant \$80.00 in Christmas Cash, the merchant can give you \$7.05 in-store credit. You may also pay \$70.00 in Christmas Cash and the remaining \$2.95 in U. S. currency.

Christmas Cash Dollars are available in are two signature lines, the same as there are on traveler's checks. Your signature is placed on then you must sign on the endorsement line centerpieces, clothing and much more. when you spend your Cash.

Christmas Cash must be spent at the participating merchants by December 31, 1997. Unspent Christmas Cash may be applied toward your 0% loan at the bank through Jan. 6, 1998.



The first offense is a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$500, not less than 20 nor more than 40 hours of community service, and the may be suspended (or his privilege denied) for up to 12 months if under 17 years of age. Additionally, the offender must attend an Alcohol Awareness Course, and if the minor is under 18, the parent may be required to attend the course.

Issue Update with Mac Thornberry

#### **Proposed Global Warming Treaty Based on Flawed Logic** and Bad Science

This December, President Clinton is scheduled to go to Japan to take part in a meeting on Global Warming that's being sponsored by the United Nations.

The focal point of this meeting will be a treaty that would require the US to dramatically cut its level of carbon dioxide emissions. Although the President hasn't formally endorsed this treaty, he's giving every indication that he'll support it something which I believe would be a mistake for several reasons.

First, the Treaty is fundamentally flawed. Seventy-five percent of the world's carbon dioxide emissions come from underdeveloped nations. Yet the way the Treaty is written right now, these nations would not be affected. The Treaty's also flawed in another critical way - mainly, it's based on bad science.

For example, global warming proponents would have us believe that the earth is getting warmer. But the truth of the matter is that global satellite data - which is the most accurate measurement of changes in world climate - shows no evidence of warming during the past 18 years.


Perhaps more disturbing than the way the Treaty is written and the bad science on which it is based are the repercussions if it's allowed to go through. Economically, the US would have to cut back its energy usage by as much as 20 percent, leading to a loss of jobs and possibly higher taxes, as well. And strategically, our military would be put at risk having to comply with restrictions that would limit the amount of fuel which our tanks, planes, and ships could burn.

The Global Warming Treaty is a bad idea which the President will hopefully reject when he visits Japan in two months. Even if he doesn't, it still must be approved bythe Senate. And the earlywordthere is this is a treaty we don't need, and one which will never be approved.
