Breedlove, in charge of the meeting, says that three specialists from College Station will be on hand to give farmers. first hand information about the cotton acreage prospect for this year.

The department of agriculture is asking that each farmer cut his cotton acreage a small percent this year and thereby try to eliminate acreage control in 1954. The secretary of Agriculture has asked county agents to hold meetings in their counties on cotton for this year due to the fact that our foreign markets have fallen off and try to bring the production in line with average consumption and demand.
