THE DROUTH SITUATION:

Congressman Ikard of Wichita Falls, Congressman Mahon, of Lubbock, and myself called upon the Secretary of Agriculture, Ezra A. Benson, this afternoon to discuss with him the possibility of early action in meeting the requirements of the farmers and the ranchers in the drouth stricken areas of the Southwest. On June 1st the entire Panhandle of Texas was shown in the U.S. Department of Agriculture Crop Report as being an area of near failure insofar as crop prospects are concerned and in the same category insofar as pasture-feed conditions are concerned. This situation has grown worse since June 1st and there are no signs of relief from the weather stand-

Several days ago members of Congress representing this drouth stricken area in the Southwest met with representatives of the Farmers Home Administration, The Commodity Credit Corporation, and the Bureau of the Budget. The purpose of the meeting was to speed up the mechanics of bringing some relief to the stricken areas. The Farmers Home Administration has indicated its willingness under its present powers to go as far as possible under its loan program. If further authority is needed to meet the situation, I believe the Congress will provide it with delay. In the meantime, request has been made for use of the Presidential Emergency Fund, which was created to meet dis-Bureau of the Budget indicated that there might be some hesitancy to consider a drouth the type of disaster intended by the law creating this fund. He seemed to feel that there was some thinking to the effect that the disaster intended was an immediate and temporary type of occurrence. We quickly briefed him on the fact that a drouth is not an immediate or temporary disaster and that "drouth" was listed in the major disaster definitions contained in Public Law 875 of the 81st Congress, which is the law creating this fund. I wrote the President that I could not too strongly urge early action as the situation is extremely bad and growing worse. Only recently I was discussing the problem with a lawyer friend of mine from the Panhandle who was in Washington. I asked him to tell me in exact terms just exactly how bad the situation was. He replied that if it was any place except the Panhandle of Texas, a lot of the people would have already moved out. I think this is one of the highest compliments that could be paid to the people there who have fought the elements through the years and have built one of the finest stock of Americans in the United States today.

Just the other day I expressed to the Congress my thoughts on the subject and gave them two petitions that have been forwarded to my office concerning this tragedy. I told the Congress that the people in our section were asking only for fair treatment, to which they are justly entitled; that they had fought the elements for generations and had not been defeated yet, and that they could continue to win their daily battles unless their weapons were rendered impotent by man-made economic measures. I stated further that they could not be expected to meet the requirements of economic measures of purchasing supplies, materials, equipment and their other needs on protected markets and have to sell their products on an open market that has been ruined by a drouth situation over which they had no control.

Three-Year Average Formula Would Give More Cotton Acreage To Donley County

Cotton acreage under crop control allotments for most West Texas counties will be increased if a three-year average on cotton acres in cultivation is substituted for the present formula which is based on a five-year average.

Hearings are due to start in Washington before congressional committees during the coming week on House Bill 5655 and Senate Bill 2106, which propose the substitution widely supported by many western cotton growers.

Information developed by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce from records published by the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that all but 20 of 117 cotton-growing counties in West Texas would gain acreage by passage of these bills, largely because of new acreage put into cotton production during recent years.

The law now provides that allotments be based on an average acreage of five crop years-1947, 1948, 1950, 1951 and 1952. The year of 1949 was specifically omitted.

The new proposal would change the basis to the three years of 1951, 1952 and 1953.

West Texas as a whole would gain 688,900 acres for 1954 if the new formula is approved by Congress. The WTCC urges every grower to give his Congressman his opinion of the more desirable formula.

Donley County would be allotted 37,200 acres on the proposed three-year basis and 33,500 on the present five-year basis.

"Aid to Korea Week" June 28 - July 5th

Throughout Texas this past week, county chairmen have been busy organizing "Aid to Korea Week," which is being held in the Lone Star State June 28 -July 5th. Governor Allan Shivers has appointed a chairman in each of Texas' 254 counties to lead the drive on a local basis. The Governor has proclaimed the period June 28 - July 5 as "Aid to Korea Week," and has urged Texans to give generously to the emergency relief fund to aid Korean civil-

John H. Head is chairman of the Donley County "Aid to Korea Week" committee.

Churches have been asked to aid the campaign on the opening Sunday of the Texas phase of the campaign, by calling attention to the need for funds and. wherever possible, to make special collections to be turned in to the county fund for Korean relief.

The Texas effort is part of a nation-wide observance to raise \$5,000,000 in an emergency campaign to provide immediate aid to millions of displaced sick and injured persons and orphans in Korea. President Dwight D. Eisenhower endorsed the campaign when it was first proposed by The American-Korean Foundation. "Our own fighting men in Korea have been contributing to the cause of Korean assistance much more than we who have remained at home. By contributing to this cause, we can support the personal efforts of our own troops," he said. U. S. Troops in Korea have contributed more than \$13,000,000 in the past three years from their soldier pay to aid the Koreans. Hospitals, homes and orphanages are being maintained solely by funds donated by these men.

Contributions to the "Aid to Korea" fund may be sent to John H. Head, chairman of the Donley County committee. Checks should be made payable to The American Korean Foundation.

These hints and suggestions are just two of the many received each year by a Texas agency which celebrates its 46th anni versary this month.

The Texas Department of Agriculture was created by an act of the Legislature in January, 1907. Its original staff consisted of only four persons whose duties were "to organize farmers' institutes for the purpose of keeping alive agricultural interests in the state." Legislative action since that time has broadened the scope of activities considerably and today more than 140 employees are associated with the department.

But many people are confused about the Department of Agriculture's activities, just as was the gentleman from New York who offered to break the recent drouth with his bottled water-at a neat profit for himself. The department isn't an agricultural purchasing agency-neither is it an experimental station as the Georgia gentleman surmised when he advocated winter watermelon growing.

In a nutshell, the present status of the department is that of an agricultural law enforcement agency. Its duty, primarily, is to administrate and regulate laws passed by the Legislature for the advancement of Texas agriculture. A wide range of activities is included in this definition.

This "guarantee" is the parity program-and it has had many ups and downs on the popularity scale of public opinion. Most of those who understand the workvalue in maintaining a sound farm price structure. The majority of its opponents have a distorted picture as to its operation

When a farmer plants his crop, he starts production on goods which will not be ready for market for months or even years. In the meantime, economic or military events can send the sales price of crops soaring or crashing. The price of cotton, for example will be more affected this fall by talks now going on in Korea than by any other single factor.

Parity price, then, is merely the farmer's equivalent of the laborer's minimum wage law. It helps assure him of a fair price for his time and labor, materials and money, utilized in making a

The AFBF supports a continuation of price support program against radical fluctuations in prices. But the resolutions add:

"It is not, however, the responsibility of the government to guarantee profitable prices to any economic group."

And the resolutions state: "In order to encourage high production per man in agriculture, the emphasis in farm programs should continue to be on adequate prices in the market place rather

The AFBF, in our estimation does not demand anything from the government that is not both advantageous to agriculture and the national economy as a whole. For many years, as an example, some farmers have been paid federal subsidies for conservation practices which any good farmer would use. The Farm Bureau states that, "Payment for practices which have become a normal and accepted part of farming operations of the area in which a farm is located should be discontinued."

These are some of the ways in which the "American" part of the Farm Bureau Federation's program is emphasized. It is a sound plan for agriculture but it is also a rounded economic program for the nation as a whole. -Waterloo (Iowa) Daily Courier.

Simons, executive vice-president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association. At the present rate of production the higher posted price for oil will mean an additional \$37,-500,000 a year paid to royalty holders, farmers, ranchers and land owners.

This, the first price advance since 1947, will add \$250 million a year to Texas' oil income, Simons pointed out - and stimulate the search for more oil.

NEW MACHINE MAKES ECONOMICAL ICE

AUSTIN-University of Texas Researchers John R. Watt and Raymond H. Stewart have developed a new machine to make cleaner, more economical ice for restaurants, hotels, drug stores and other businesses.

The machine manufactures up to 400 pounds of ice per day at 10 cents per 100 pounds. Business establishments must pay 60-80 cents per 100 pounds for ice from commercial establishments, Watt said. The University will receive part of the patent royalties.

In the comparatively short Amarille-history of 21 months, the 589th Air Force Band has chalked up thousands of rootin, tootin miles giving out with sharps and flats to the satisfaction of listeners throughout this section of the country. The band has played in almost every city in the Panhandle within a 75mile radius of Amarillo Air Force

The affable young warrant of ficer is a native of Pennsylvania. He is a graduate of the Indiana (Pa.) Before his assignment to Amarillo AFB last June WO Ventre attended the Air Force advanced instrumentalist school in Washington, D. C.

Warrant Officer Veltre is proud of the men in his band. Many of them are college graduates and a number of them have outstanding musical accomplishments to their credit.

The band's designation as the 589th Air Force Band entitles it to the history, battle honors and decorations belonging to the 589th Air Force Band which was deactivated in December of 1945, shortly following the end of World War II.

The men of the Amarillo band are hoping that they can add more laurels to the 589th's history. They can be sure of one thing. They are adding a lot of musical pleasure for a host of Panhandle listeners.

SHORT - TERM **FARM DEBTS**

Each year, farmers and ranchmen use a large amount of shortterm credit to good advantage. Such credit is usually not secured by a lien on real estate, but is largely repaid within one year, although some runs for a longer period. A quick look at this situation shows that these short term debts increased for 2.9 billion dollars on January 1, 1946, to about 7.6 billion dollars on January 1, 1953.

In the past few years, farm production costs jumped and labor became scarce. This fact encouraged farmers to do more and more of their work with laborsaving machines and to spend more money for fertilizer, farm improvements, and other measures that promote larger output per man-hour of labor.

All this requires money. With incomes favorable, farmers have not hesitated to borrow to supply their needs. Many have found it necessary to increase their short-term debt. The total shortterm debt for the country as a whole has increased until it is now higher than the farm mortgage debt.

There are signs, however, that the upward trend has been halted. Economists point out that short-term debts did not increase as much in 1952 as in recent years and suggest that farmers may be tightening their debt belts.
