A birth defects study center, the first of its kind designed to combine clinical treatment with research and teaching, has just been officially opened at Columbus, Ohio. It is supported by funds from the New March of Dimes, which is now engaged in its January campaign for contributions to fight three major crippling diseases including, besides birth defects, arthritis and polio.

Medical experts say that birth defects are the biggest unmet childhood medical problem in the United States today. There are more than 600 different kinds of birth defects, as they are called by doctors. They range all the way from harelip and clubfoot to mental retardation.

Some 250,000 American babies are born each year with one or more significant birth defects; and about half of this number are doomed to a lifetime of serious illness or crippling. About 34,000 infants each year are stillborn because of these afflictions, or die within the first month of life. Medical science as yet has few clues to the causes of these disorders that occur before birth; and there are few known methods of prevention.

# Will D. Boydstun Enjoys Plane Trip To Corpus Christi For Holidays

Texas motorists will not be assessed points under the Safe Driving Insurance Plan for certain, specific types of collisions, according to a clarifying statement issued by Joe P. Gibbs, Member, State Board of Insurance.

"In order to be as fair as possible, the Plan excludes accidents involving your vehicle while you are legally parked. Also excluded are accidents for which you have been paid by the person held responsible for the acident. No points will be assessed in accidents in which only the other party has been convicted of a moving traffic violation, or in rear-end collisions in which you have been struck by another vehicle and are not convicted of a moving traffic violation. If you are the victim of a hit-and-run accident and report the accident to the proper authorities within 24 hours you will not be charged any points. Regardless of fault, motorists will not be assessed a point when the damage is limited solely to Medical Payments," Gibbs stated.



# Increase Jan. 1

Persons in work -- employ-ment or self-employment -- covtax rate will be increased begin-ning with 1960, R. R. Tuley, Jr., of Beaumont spent the district manager of the Abilene their parents that I will with social security office, announced

When employed people get their first pay envelopes or pay checks in January, they will find 3 per cent instead of 2½ per cent deducted for social security tax purposes. When self-employed persons file their 1960 tax

returns early in 1961, they must pay 4½ per cent instead of 3¾ per cent social security tax. This increase will not apply to self-employment returns on 1959 earnings which must be filled on or before April 15, 1960. The or before April 15, 1960. The above increases in social security tax rates to wages or self-employment income for 1960 through 1962.

The increased social security taxes which become effective as of January 1, 1960, were enacted by Congress to assure continuing self-supporting nature of the old-age and survivors trust fund in which the social security as of smplayers their emity taxes of employees, their employers, and the self-employers are deposited.

Before amending the law to provide for the increased tax rates, Congress appointed an ad-visory council on social security financing to investigate the trust funds. This council was made up of representatives from business, education, Govern-ment, and leading insurance companies. They recently report-ed, "It is our judgment, based on the best available cost estimates, that the contribution (social security tax) schedule enacted into law in the 1958 session of Con-gress, makes adequate provision for financing the program on a
