# CISD board honors local newspaper

The Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees has named Roger Estlack of The Clarendon Enterprise to the Media Honor Roll, a program sponsored by the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB).

The Media Honor Roll recognizes media representatives statewide who deserve recognition for fair and balanced reporting of news about public

Reporters representing more than 300 Texas newspapers and radio and television stations were honored by their local districts.

Criteria for the nomination included the media representative's efforts to get to know the superintendent, board president, and the district's mission and goals; report school news in a fair, accurate, and balanced manner; gave a high profile to positive news about schools; visit the schools; and maintain a policy of no surprises by sharing information with school officials.

"Districts across Texas appreciate these reporters for their balanced and accurate approach to sharing both the challenges facing our schools and the successes achieved by local teachers and students," said Jannis Hayers, TASB president.

"Their work aids local communities in focusing on the goal of providing the best public schools we can for every child."

The Clarendon school board passed a formal resolution to add the name of the local newspaper.

The Media Honor Roll will appear in the August/September issue of TASB's Texas Lone Star, and a certificate was presented to the Enterprise at last week's school board meeting.


TASB is a voluntary, nonprofit association established nearly 50 years ago to serve local Texas school districts. It includes 1,048 school districts and county school boards, 45 junior colleges, 56 tax appraisal districts, 63 cooperatives, and 20 education service

School board members are the largest group of publicly elected officials in the state.

The districts they represent have a combined annual budget of \$20 billion and employ more than 460,000

The raise will go into effect with the new fiscal year on September 1, 1997.

At his own request, CC President Scott Elliott was excluded from the increase. CC Dean Janie Noble was also not included in the raise.

"There hasn't been an across-theboard raise since about five years ago," said board secretary Delbert Robertson. "People just can't keep living without

In addition to awarding the raise, the board committed to conducting an indepth study of the college's faculty salary schedule over the next school year.

"The board wants to take a hard look at the salary schedule to assess whether the college is truly competitive with comparable institutions and community standards," Elliott said.

# Commissioners name Bennett to replace Smith

Carissa Bennett was named as the new treasurer for Donley County when the Commissioners Court met Monday, July 14, 1997, at the Courthouse Annex.

After deliberating for nearly four hours in a closed session, Commissioner Randy White made a motion, seconded by Will Chamberlain, to appoint Bennett as treasurer. The motion carried with a three to one vote. Ronnie Hill voted against the motion.

According to the Texas Constitution, the current county treasurer, Wanda Smith, automatically resigned from her post when she declared herself a candidate for the Donley County Hospital

More than 30 people turned out for the commissioners' meeting in a show of support for Mrs. Smith, hoping to keep her in

Before making his motion, White addressed the vacancy in the treasurer's position.

"I don't believe we've ever questioned Wanda's job as far as her being able to do her job," he said. "We think she's done a great job. This is a matter of the [state] constitution being broken, and it's not anything we have personally against Wanda."

Commissioner Hill said he did not vote against the motion questions about Bennett's qualifications for the job. "I believe in the constitution," Hill said.

Bennett will assume the treasurer's duties as soon as she is bonded and takes the oath of office.





#### The Case For American Space Exploration

July has been an exciting month for America's space program with the landing of the Pathfinder spacecraft on Mars.

While the national media has been generally enthusiastic about the robotic explorer, there is always some grumbling on the part of nay-sayers who complain that NASA's programs cost too much and benefit Americans too little. It's a waste of resources and a waste of time. We should spend the money on social programs. Blah, blah, blah, ad nauseum.

For my part, I think NASA is precisely the type of program on which our federal dollars should be expended. The exploration of space rekindles the pioneer spirit of America and causes us to take a look at the big view of the role of our nation and our world.

Everyone has heard stories about how hard it can be for people to find their way around the federal bureaucracy. Unfortunately, most of these stories are true.

The federal government can be a cold and uncaring place for people who have a question about their Social Security check or are wondering what happened to their refund from

One of the lesser known parts of my job in Washington is to help people cut through government red tape when problems like these occur. In addition to helping people out with their Social Security checks and IRS refunds, my office can also help people with questions and concerns relating to immigration, welfare, veterans benefits, Medicare, and a host of other federal issues.

While I can't tell a federal department or agency how they should rule on a particular case or inquiry, I can make sure that a person's problem or concern gets the attention it's due and the consideration it deserves.

In many respects, this can be one of the most satisfying parts of my job. When everything goes right, you can really see the results of your work and the difference it makes in people's lives. But it can also be frustrating, as well, because it lets you see up close just how messed up the federal gov-

If you have a federal concern where you think I might be of some assistance, please contact me at one of my two district offices. In Wichita Falls, I can be reached at (940) 767-0541. In Amarillo, the number is (806) 371-8844.

While I can't promise you'll get the answer you're hoping for, I can promise that you'll at least get an answer - which from Washington, is often half the battle.



The motto that guided Hal Davis throughout his long career in broadcasting was "do something for your community." This motto guided him in early broadcasting when he heard the Seattle, Washington, symphony was about to fold for lack of funds. He immediately took over; and doing a 24 hour radio marathon broadcast from a downtown store window, he successfully raised \$16,000 which helped save the Seattle Symphony. That was the first of many "community" promotions spearheaded by Mr. Davis which left an impact on his comthon to save the Hall County Hospital in Memphis.

Staying with this motto, Hal over his broadcast years was active in Rotary, Lions Club, Little League, Pop Warner Football, Chambers of Commerce, and YMCA's.

Hal started his broadcast career in Seattle, Washington, before World War II. After serving in the Army Air Corps from 1941-1945, he again picked up his career in broadcasting. Over the past fifty-two years, he held many positions in this media. He was founder and owner of Hal Davis Advertising as well as operating two health studios in Garden Grove, Cali-

# Farmers, ranchers sign up for new conservation program next week

TEMPLE — Farmers and ranchers may apply for the new Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) July 14, 1997, through August 1, Areas (GPA), encompassing 167 1997. The new conservation program, a result of the 1996 Farm Bill, offers a limited number of producers who have serious soil, water, and other natural resource problems with technical, financial, and educational assistance.

Conservationist for USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), "EQIP is not like former Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) or Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). This program is extremely limited and is for persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production who would provide the greatest environmental benefits at the least cost to the program.

"Applications will be prioritized after August 1, 1997, according to specific criteria," Burt continued. "After Farm Service Agency (FSA) determines producer eligibility, NRCS conservationists and the producer will make an inventory of the natural resources, identify natural resource problems and concerns, determine treatment needs, and agree upon the land management and structural practices the producer will install." Burt added that the extent of the conservation practice, fields and acres to be treated, and cost-share rate and incentive payment levels the producer will accept, as well as the total one year of cost-share is needed.

#### **Emergency farm** loan applications being accepted

Wheeler, Donley, Carson, Armstrong, and Gray county were declared eligible for Farm Service Agency disaster emergency loans on April 29, 1997.

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain and flooding conditions that occurred from April 2, 1997, through April 30, 1997, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office in Clarendon, Larry Goetze said today.

FSA Ag Credit Manager Larry Goetze is urging farmers who are interested in receiving an emergency loan to get their applications in to FSA as soon as possible. Goetze said, 'We hope farmers will get their applications in early rather than waiting until near the deadline which is March 2, 1998. The longer they wait the more chance there is for long delays in getting their checks. If the applications come in early, we can avoid backlogs and speed up the process.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Clarendon is open from 7:30 to 5:00 Monday through Friday. The office is located at 321 Sully in Clarendon. The phone number is (806)-874-3552.

Twelve Geographic Priority counties, are the primary target for over \$8.7 million EQIP funds allocated to Texas. Each GPA has similar natural resource problems and concerns which EQIP can address. Water conservation, excessive wind and water erosion, limited water According to John P. Burt, State supply, and brush invasion are a few of the specific resource concerns identified in the GPAs.

Producers in counties outside of the GPA are also eligible for the remaining \$4.7 million EQIP funds provided it will solve identified statewide natural resource concerns, such as excessive erosion and ground and surface water quality.

Each application will compete with other applications in their GPA, while those outside of the GPAs will compete against each other. "Contracts will be awarded base don their ranking, regardless of location," cautioned Burt. "That means some counties may not have any contracts, even though they are located inside a GPA," he said. Burt added that applications for a single conservation practice on an individual field addressing a single natural resource concern may not be competitive in a GPA or with the statewide natural resource concerns.

Acceptance into EQIP will require a 5 to 10 year contract, even if

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

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




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
