the "worlds" of science and religion. the "worlds" of science and religion
Since the time of Galileo, religion has been in conflict with science has been in conflict with science. sequent theories regarding evolution and the origin of species intensified the battle between science and reli gion. Contemporary claims about en counters with extraterrestrial, sighting
of UFO's, and NASA's discoveries of possible life on Mars, all combine to pour more fuel on this fire of contro versy between science and religion.
Religious skeptics cite scientific discoveries and theories as evidenc that a divine creator is an unnecessar hypothesis to explain the origin of the universe. Such persons do ask, "How can humans on earth be considered the 'Crown of Creation' if more sophisticated and intellectually superior be
ings exist elsewhere?" by Sue Nelson

Resolutions of a conflict between ntil both sides are willing to discuss the issues honestly, fairly, and unemotionally.
A beginning point for persons on Aoh sides is for all of them to speak from within their own realms of expertise. It is altogether proper for scientists to speak of causes and effects in the natural world. Likewise, it is appropriate for theologians to speak realm of religion. It is only when sci entists go beyond their area of expertise and make statements about the meaning and purpose of life and theoogians go beyond their realm of e pertise and make statements about sc entific processes that religion and science get into conflict.
Rather than fighting each other science and religion should acknowl edge a dependence on each other Religion persons need science and they go to a doctor use a computer they go to a doctor, use a computer,
or watch television by satellite. On the other hand, scientists need religion, as seen whenever scientific possibilities raise moral, ethical issues. Sci ence can clone humans; but should it? Science can prolong the life of brain
dead persons; but should if? dead persons; but should it? The one major concept on which
both science and religion agree is that
f truth. The genuine scientis searches for the truth regardless of ous perceptions. The same should be ous perceptions. The same should be
true for religion. For example, Christianity has long quoted Jesus' statement, "The truth will set you free," as foundational for its beliefs. The Hebrew Bible states in Psalms 19, "The heavens declare the glory of God." This psalm asserts that the universe itself speaks God's truth. Jews and Christians alike would interpret this statement as declaring that whatever
is true in science is God's truth, which should not be feared or denied but cherished.
The search for truth is always limited by persons who arbitrarily presuppose what can or cannot be. Presupposing that there can be no Creator or that there can be no life beyond earth are equally intolerant. Such presuppositions reflect yet another form of prejudice. The preferred stance is to whether in science, religion, or anywhere else. Indeed, the truth can set us free - free from the controversies which result from statements of persons who claim to know more than is known.

assistance.

Burt, State Conservationist for USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), "EQIP is not like former Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) or Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). This program is extremely limited and is for persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production who would provide the least cost to the program.
"Applications will be prioritized after August I, 1997, according to specific criteria," Burt continued. "After Farm Service Agency (FSA) determines producer eligibility, NRCS conservationists and the producer will make an inventory of the natural resources, identify natural resource problems and concerns, determine treatment needs, and agree upon the land management and structural" Burt added that the extent of the conservation practice, fields and acres to be treated, and cost-share rate and incentive payment levels the producer will accept, as well as the total Field Day set July 24 by Leon J.
