April has been designated Cancer Control Month by Presidential proclamation. Throughout the month volunteers will distribute life-saving information to every home in Donlye County, the American Cancer Society chairman said, and continued:

"Of course cancer control is a year-round program. But this is the time of the year when we go all out to try and save more lives. And it's the time when we collect funds to sustain the ever-increasing momentum of war against this ancient enemy of mankind. A war that must ultimately end in the defeat of cancer and the saving of countless lives in the generations to come. At the present rate 265,000 lives every year!

Problems growing out of the population explosion and rapid urbanization of Texas were the 4. Controlled access entrances subject of a two-day Austin conand exits to ease cars on and off ference for newspapermen, civic leaders and planners.

Texas newspapers were commended by Steve Matthews, executive director of the Texas Municipal League, for their efforts in keeping the reading public informed on complex and changing city problems.

Conferees pondered how to plan orderly, pleasant communities for the two million additional residents expected to be added to Texas cities in the next ten years. Also, how to correct the all-too-prevalent bane of "acres of hot asphalt and cold stone," congested streets and the "grotesque suburban sprawl."

ONE WORD MAKES DIFFER-ENCE - Because of a slip of the tongue or typewriter in Potter County, Court of Criminal Appeals dismissed appeals in three cases mistakenly addressed to the Court of Civil Appeals.

A court order from the district court in Amarillo said the defendants had given notice of appeal to the Court of Civil Appeals, Austin.

Since the cases were criminal cases - driving while intoxicated, contributing to the delinquency of a minor - the civil court could not handle them.

TRINITY PERMIT GRANTED-After the longest and probably most patience-straining hearing in State Water Board history, Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston were granted permission to build a \$40,000,000 dam at Livingston.

larger portion But when the hearing came before the Water Board, the San Jacinton River Authority, North Texas Municipal Water District and affected landowners protest-

SJRA dropped its opposition when Houston agreed to use Trinity water for industry only and to step up buying of San Jacinto water for domestic use. Water Board order provided that the rights of upstream users in North Texas should not be cut into by the new dam. That left only the landowners to satisfy - probably

HOME HELD UP - Highly controversial \$100,000-plus home for the Sam Houston State College president will not be built unless the governor and legislative budget board give the green light.

Henry Sears, chairman of the board of regents for teachers' colleges, made this promise to the Senate cost of government committee. If budget board opinion follows that of many legislators' recent comments, it will take a dim view of the project.

Senators told Sears they were rked with the teachers' college board for what they regarded as a "complete breach of faith" and an apparent by-passing of legislative intent to keep a check-rein on college building programs. What does DEFERRED GRAZ-ING mean to you? It is postponing grazing for a period long enough to improve the vigor of your grass or to let it mature a seed crop.

ment to be effective, it must be done during the growing season. If improved vigor and increased growth is desired, deferment should begin in early spring. If a seed crop is needed, defer later in the summer. All grazing animals should be removed since one cows or hirse might destroy your scarcer tall grasses such as Indiangrass, Sand Bluestem, or Switchgrass.

LENGTH OF DEFERMENT -Short grass need 3 to 4 months of deferment, mid-grasses 4 to 5 months, and tall grasses 5 to 6 months. Years of high rainfall and ood growth are the most effective times to defer. Periodic deferment is good even on ranges in excellent condition.

DEFERRED GRAZING should be a part of any range management plan. Cost sharing for this practice is offered by the Donley County ASC office.



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

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
