



> AN IMPROVED U. S. Army Nike Hercules air defense guided missile, in an engineering feasibility demonstration, destroys a Corporal ballistic missile fired at White Sands Missile Range, N. M. While the Corporal has much less range and speed than the inter-continental ballistic missiles, the test yielded valuable information pertinent to the development of an anti-missile defense, the Army said. Closing at a speed of thousands of miles per hour, the Hercules intercepts and destroys the Corporal in the first known kill of a guided missile by another. A previous kill was made by the Army's Hawk against the Honest John, a ballistic missile. In the sequence above, the Hercules appears on top as a flash of light as it approaches the Corporal for the kill. At left is the Hercules at take-off and at right is the Corporal which served as the target.

Every spring young boys wish that the school would burn down, you can bet. But what if ours really did! June issue of Parents' and third floors within eight to Magazine reports that a group of educators through the Ford Foundation literally turned firebugs.

eleven minutes. However, the smoke from those basement fires made first floor corridors untenable within two to three minutes: the second floor within four minutes, and the third floor withis six minutes. In Chicago's Lady utes lapsed between detecting the fire and sounding the alarm.
