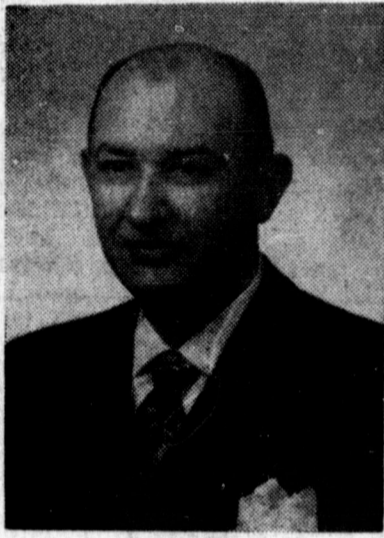

Eligible Voters In Wheat Vote Explained

Just who is eligible to vote in the July 21 referendum on 1961 wheat marketing quotas?

Any grower in a commercial wheat State who will produce more than 15 acres of wheat as grain in 1961 will be eligible to cast a ballot in the quota vote.

Growers who will have smaller wheat acreages in 1961 and those who are taking part in the feed wheat program are not eligible to vote, since the wheat from such farms would not be subject to marketing penalties under a quota program.

The County Committee reminds farmers that those who vote in the July 21 referendum will be the ones who decide what kind of program will be in effect for the next wheat crop. They urge that every eligible voter cast his ballot, so that the result may truly reflect the desires if growers themselves. At least two-thirds of the total votes cast must be favorable if the 1961 wheat marketing quota is to remain in effect. "Growers who like to make their own decisions should remember that date — Thursday, July 21 — and be sure to register their opinions by voting at the local polling places."

Pioneer Donley County Lady Dies Tuesday

One of Clarendon's first settlers, Mrs. Lena Leoti Antrobus, died Tuesday afternoon, July 12, at her home in Clarendon. She was 93 years old. Funeral services will be held Thursday morning at 10 a. m. at the First Methodist Church with Rev. Conrad M. Ryan of Ralls, Texas and Rev. E. Lee Stanford officiating.

Mrs. Antrobus was born April 13, 1867 at New Richmond, Ohio. She and the late George Antrobus were married January 9, 1887 in Kentucky. The couple came to Clarendon in a covered wagon in July of 1887 and Mrs. Antrobus soon became the first school teacher in the then new settlement. The couple lived in Clarendon until 1888 when Mr. Antrobus bought a section of land southeast of town. Later he operated a hardware and implement company until his death in 1938.

Mrs. Antrobus was a charter member of the First Methodist Church of Clarendon and was one of the oldest members of the Missionary Society of the church. She was one of the first members of the Clarendon Garden Club and a member of the Pathfinder Club for 45 years. She was also a delegate to the 62nd annual convention of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs in Lubbock.

Surviving are four daughters, Mrs. O. Watson of Clarendon, Mrs. Florence Maedgen of Lubbock, Mrs. Edith Mercer of Fort Worth, Mrs. Lucy Stargel of Oklahoma City; two sons, B. C. Antrobus of Clarendon and Ed Antrobus of El Paso; 13 grandchildren and 30 great-grandchildren.

A continuous string of voters went to the polls last Saturday to register the largest vote ever recorded here in a school election of any type.

The vote was almost unanimous for both issues, a better than 7 to 1 vote in favor of better schools for Clarendon and the maintenance thereof.

It was the combined vote of those who have children attending school and our senior citizens who are greatly interested in seeing that their grandchildren and generations to follow will have a better opportunity than they or their own children had.

It is gratifying to live in a community where there are tax-paying citizens of this calibre who will rise up when the vital time comes and put a momentous issue of this nature over in grand style.

With this great turn-out of voters, we know most everyone is interested in seeing our schools progress and will lend more support in setting a standard of policies to continue the reputation of Clarendon as an "Outstanding School Town." In the earlier days numerous old settlers moved to Clarendon mainly for the purpose of educating their children. We are proud to know this same thought has not died.

In the vote Saturday, a total of 850 votes were cast. On the issuance of bonds, there were 717 votes for with 95 opposed and on the question of the levy of a maintenance tax, 730 voted for as compared to 100 against.

Plans are already in progress toward the building of new schools but actual work on construction will not begin for at least two months. Architects plans must be drawn up and approved and preliminaries taken care of before construction is begun.

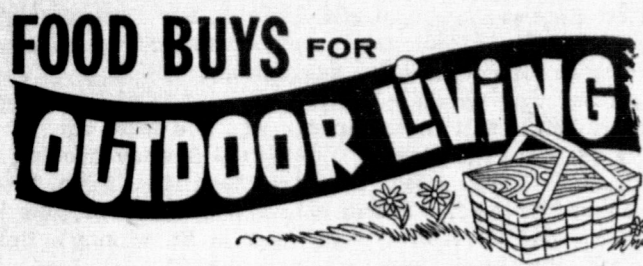

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

By Congressman Walter Rogers

For this week's newsletter, I am taking the liberty of passing on to you an article which was placed in the Congressional Record by my good friend, Congressman Frank Bow of Ohio. You will note that this article was published in the Rotary Graph, a publication of the Weslaco Rotary Club. Having been a long time and ardent member of the Rotary Club and a good friend of Frank's, I have no hesitancy in passing this story along, together with some comments of my own. Here it is:

"DO YOU HAPPEN TO KNOW THIS MAN?"

"The Rotary Graph, a publication of the Weslaco Rotary Club, has passed along this little story, source unknown. It is almost as funny as it is tragic.

"A young man lived with his parents in a public housing development. He attended public school, rode the free school bus, and participated in the free lunch program. He entered the Army, then upon discharge retained his national service insurance. He then enrolled in the State University, working part time in the State Capitol to supplement his GI education check.

"Upon graduation, he married a public health nurse and bought a farm with an FHA loan and then obtained an RFC loan to go into business. A baby was born in the county hospital. He bought a ranch with the aid of the veterans' land program and obtained emergency feed from the Government.

"Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and the payments soon paid out his farm and ranch. His father and mother lived very comfortably on the ranch on their social security and old-age assistance checks. REA lines supplied electricity. The Government helped clear his land. The county agent showed him how to terrace it; then the Government built him a fishpond and stocked it with many fish. The Government guaranteed him a sale for his farm products at highest prices.

"Books from the public library were delivered to his door. He banked money which a Government agency insured. His children grew up, entered public schools, ate free lunches, rode free school buses, played in public parks, swam in public pools, and joined the FFA. The man owned an automobile so he favored the Federal highway program.

"He signed a petition seeking Federal assistance in developing an industrial project to help the economy of his area. He was a leader in obtaining the new post office and Federal building, and went to Washington with a group to ask the Government to build a great dam costing millions so that the area could get 'cheap electricity.'

"He petitioned the Government to give the local air base to the county. He was also a leader in the movement to get his specific type of farming special tax write-offs and exemptions. Of course, he belonged to several farmers' organizations, but denied that they were pressure groups.

"Then, one day, he wrote his Congressman: 'I wish to protest these excessive governmental expenditures and attendant high taxes. I believe in rugged individualism. I think people should stand on their own two feet without expecting handouts. I am opposed to all socialistic trends and I demand a return to the principles of our Constitution and the policies of States' rights.'

Thus ends the story that appeared in the Congressional Record. We do not know who was

the original writer of this story, but it is obvious that he was deeply impressed by many of the government programs that seem to get all of the attention and publicity, since he made no reference to some of the hidden subsidies which are being passed out daily. Under the circumstances, I think his story should be amended by inserting in the center of the story the following paragraph:

"When his children grew up, one of them obtained a Federal scholarship in order to attend college. Another obtained a job in a factory producing heavy machinery under a contract with a foreign government which was receiving foreign aid out of the pockets of the taxpayers of this country, with which it paid off its obligations to the factory where this son was employed. Another son obtained a position in charge of negotiating contracts for the government with manufacturing concerns under the terms of which the government agreed to pay a higher price for certain products than that for which these products could be obtained under competitive bidding, the purpose being to provide employment and profit to the manufacturing concern because it was located in an area which had been declared a distressed area under a yardstick applied by another government agency in which one of the daughters worked. Another son operated a business which would have gone bankrupt had he not been able to obtain a small business loan from the Federal government, and the business produced by workmen employed at an urban renewal project which was being financed and paid for by the Federal government. Incidentally, all of the family learned about rugged individualism and free enterprise from what they read in a national magazine which had an annual subsidy from the Federal government of about \$9,494,000."

GRASSROOTS OPINION

Huntington, N.Y., Times: "Those who believe that government can 'outlaw' fundamental economic laws and can legislate corrective measures are deluding themselves. The idea of legislating the economic law of supply and demand is hogwash.

"In modern times we have seen all manner of governmental efforts to apply such corrective measures, including price controls and other economic strait jackets—and these efforts have almost invariably produced worse problems than those they were designed to cure. The hope is that we will profit from this experience . . ."

Surface Irrigation Systems is controlled by furrows or borders. Although not as popular in the Donley County Soil Conservation District as sprinklers, surface irrigation is still important—especially in that portion of the district that is in the High Plains.

The most widely used method of surface irrigation is furrow irrigation—running the water down the rows. Cotton and grain sorghums are usually watered by this method. These furrows may be either level or graded with the length being dependent upon the type of soil and the amount of water being applied. Furrows should be fairly level as too much grade invites erosion. Furrow lengths should be shorter on sandy soils to give even distribution of the water.

Another method of surface irrigation is by using borders. These borders are level from side to side and are used mostly for alfalfa and small grain.

Land leveling is necessary on most surface irrigated fields to smooth out soil irregularities and to give proper grade to the furrows or borders.

Surface irrigation systems, when properly installed and maintained, are the easiest and cheapest to operate and use. However, where the field is irregular or too steep, they are expensive to install. A system improperly installed and used can cause severe erosion and waste water. Contact the Donley County Soil Conservation District supervisors

or the local Soil Conservation Service office for help in properly installing your surface irrigation system. The component parts of most systems, land leveling and irrigation pipelines, are approved for government cost-share under the ACP and GP programs.
