





I will attempt to focus more closely upon the Chinese life itself later, but at the moment I think it is important to examine the communist leadership and its ideology. The Western mind, and particularly the American, may never really penetrate the Oriental character. The Chinese have devised some of the world's most lovely philosophies and some of its most grisly tortures. They have invented the printing which has spread so many ideas and the gunpowder which has killed so many thinkers. Their millennia of inbreeding have produced, in the broadest sense, some of the most refined and subtle minds the world has ever seen. "The way to have a friend is to be one—and the way to have fellowship is to be a good fellow."

"Let the roses bloom while we cultivate the living. We should keep our hoe sharp, and help cut the weeds out of our neighbors row, as we can cut the weeds out of our own row anytime we

To the above we might add; one of the grandest rewards in life comes in the friends we be in the form of neighbors, folks in our church, or friends from out of our mailbag.

"Grown-up-ness seems to be more than a mere question of age." The above thought comes from an ex-school teacher, Miss Dorothy Johnson of Oberlin, Kansas. Before giving our own ideas on the subject let me give you the gist of Miss Johnson's thoughts:

"As a little girl growing up on a western Kansas farm, I could hardly wait for the day when I would be grown-up. It would be then, I felt sure, that I could solve all my problems, and make all my dreams come true. But it isn't that simple. Growing up is much more than becoming of age."

"I think that it is being able to understand and profit from past experiences. It is to know true values, and to be in possession of one's self. To be at home with the life that has been given to us."

"We need to grow up as fast as we can, but at the supposedly mature age of forty-eight, I don't feel as grown-up as I once expected to feel at twenty."

Each of us can remember how slowly the years passed when we were trying so desperately to grow up. Needless to say, now that the count-down has started, that time is just whizzing by.

It is so very true that growing up is not only a question of age. We know many young people, still in their teens, who have already reached the age of grownup-ness. And each of us know many adults who have never reached this stage. "Grown-upness," could very well be that of being able to learn and profit from advice and experience, and of being able to know and appre-

Those those of us who can remember the wood-chopping days and how that we would carry in the loads of wood for the night will remember that we could stack the chunks of wood on our arms as high as one could reach. But, when we tried to carry some chips to start the fire there would be no room for anything else. So many times it is the little things that ge us down. Someone has put it this way;

"We can sit on a mountain, but not on a tack."

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
