### Core Drilling Now In Progress At Greenbelt Dam Site

According to Clifford Johnson, Secretary - Treasurer, core drilling is now progressing rapidly at the site of the Greenbelt Dam which is located about 8 miles north and 4 miles west of Hedley.

After being delayed by heavy rains the crew is now working 10 hours a day seven days a week. Coreing was started on the north banks of the river at the site and they are working south. Five more holes will be drilled if necessary ranging from depth of 80 to 170 feet.

The drilling is by a core drilling contractor of Houston under the Direction of the Amarillo office of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation. Formations encountered have been as expected which are very good.

Wheat Growers Vote July 21 On 1961 Program

The State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee announced that the annual marketing quota referendum for wheat growers will be held July 21 as the first step in the wheat program for 1961 required by present law. The purpose of the referendum is to determine whether or not wheat growers wish to market their 1961-crop wheat under a marketing quota system. Quotas have been proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture, as required whenever the wheat supply is more than 20 per cent above normal. They will take effect if approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum.

It has been announced that the minimum national average support price for 1961 wheat will be made known before the referendum on the basis of the latest available supply information. Based on the present wheat supply and the present law, the legal minimum wheat support for 1961 would be 75 per cent of parity, the same percentage as this year. If marketing quotas take effect, a grower who complies with his allotment will be entitled to market his total 1961 wheat crop without penalty and will be eligible for price support at the full rate.

A grower who exceeds his acreage allotment will be ineligible for price support and will also be subject to marketing quota penalties if he harvests more than 15 acres of wheat. A grower who obtains approval (exemption) to produce 30 acres or less of wheat to be used exclusively on the farm will not be subject to penalties.

If marketing quotas are disapproved in the July referendum, all wheat produced will be eligible for marketing without penalty. Price support will be available at 50 per cent of parity to those who comply with their acreage allotments.

Voting in the referendum will be done at polling places to be done at polling places to be announced later by the county ASC committee. Every wheat grower who expects to have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest in 1961 will be eligible to vote, except those who participated in the up-to-30-acre feed wheat program in 1960.

The wheat referendum is required, the Committee said, by the fact that the national wheat supply is at almost twice the normal level. If quotas are approved for 1961, this will be the eighth successive year in which they have been used for wheat.

A little tillage or cultivation expense by you now may save you quite a bit of money later.

Don't wait for someone to tell you how to maintain your Conservation Reserve cover. You're a good farmer or you wouldn't be farming.

### Highway Travel Map Is Now Available

Austin, Texas, May 15 — Texas' Official Highway Travel Map, 1960-style, is now available to the general public. Free copies of the big, colorful map may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, or at the highway district offices and travel bureaus. County tax offices have map cards on hand for requesting copies of the map.

The map reflects 1,933 miles of multilane-divided highway now completed, and includes the finished sections of the seven National System of Interstate and Defense Highways located in the state. More than 1,500 farm-to-market road miles have been added to this year's map. Approximately 20,000 miles of the state's 30,000-mile Farm-to-Market Road System are shown on the map. All of the 26,378 miles of State and U.S. highways are shown.

Three new lakes have been added to the 1960 Travel Map, bringing the total shown in the major-lakes-and-reservoirs category to 64. New water attractions recorded are Buffalo Lake in Lubbock County; Champion Creek Lake in Mitchell County; and Lake Tawakoni in Hunt, Rains, and Van Zandt Counties. Countless rivers, creeks, and streams are also charted on the Travel Map.

The 816 roadside parks pegged on the map are those having full picnic facilities. Their locations are marked by a green dot. State Parks are indicated by a green triangle.

"All of Texas Welcomes You" banners the pictorial side of the map — reflecting, in eleven full-color pictures, some of the outstanding recreational, scenic, and historical attractions in Texas.

A section entitled "Facts About Texas" telescopes information on Texas' terrain, history, and industrial and recreational diversity. Cities and towns shown on the map total 1,826. City route maps for the state's twelve largest cities are also included — Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock, San Antonio, Waco, and Wichita Falls.

More than half a million Official Highway Travel Maps of the 1959 edition have been distributed — in-state, out-of-state, and to dozens of foreign countries. The map is used by all state and governmental agencies in the state for determining official highway distances, mileages, zones, and like information.

### Moisture Total For May Is 6.81 Inches

The big blow Saturday night left very little moisture but practically every exposed item coated with dirt and mud. Monday, we received .24 inch moisture, another .03 Monday night and a 1.14 downpour with some hail Tuesday evening. The hail damage was said to be much heavier to the west and south of town. The total moisture for May 1959 was 6.50 inches.

Most farmers are looking forward to more sunshine and the right kind of weather that will allow them to get their crops up and to a size that the average rain will not hurt. Wheat farmers are certainly looking for sunshine as cutting time is only a short distance away.

**PERSONAL ARTILLERY** is provided the modern U. S. Army infantryman with the development of this shoulder-fired 90 millimeter recoilless rifle—arming him with the punch of a medium-sized tank gun. Known as the MAW (Medium Assault Weapon), the 35-pound four-foot long weapon is de-

signed to be carried into battle and used by two-man teams. In emergencies, it can be carried, loaded and fired by one man. Firing a shaped-charge shell which penetrates the heaviest armor known, its effective range of 500 yards is twice that of the 3.5 bazooka of Korean War fame.

We now read that the New York Board of Education sanctions a short course for junior and senior high schools next year, the purpose of which is to teach how to have a happy home. The course will include "group dat-

ing, double dating, single dating, steady dating" and the development of "qualities that make one popular."

The assumption that normal young people need such instruction is virtually an insult to their intelligence, but it is a good example of state direction of the individual.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

**AUSTIN** — With the main state elections over, statehouse interest now focuses on next January when a new Legislature will meet. Lawmakers will have to hack their way through the same old jungle of state money problems

that faced them in '59. Again the goal will be to find enough tax revenue to pay off the state's debts and provide government services for another two years. Blazing of some possible paths is already under way. Gov. Price Daniel's 30-member State Finance

Advisory Commission begins this week assembling data on the state's future financial needs and how they can be met. Governor Daniel has said he will propose five different tax plans for Commission study. Any one of the plans, said the governor, would wipe out the deficit in the state's general revenue fund and provide for expected future needs without a state income tax or general sales tax.

Secretary of State Zollie Steakley is chairman of the Finance Commission.

**BE NICE TO TOURISTS** — Out-of-state visitors will get the red carpet treatment when they stop for gasoline if Governor Daniel's advice is heeded.

Speaking to the Texas Association of Service Stations, the governor urged the station operators to sell Texas as well as gasoline to the tourists. Everyone will benefit from more tourists and longer visits, he said.

Last year 9,600,000 tourists came to Texas and spent \$431,000,000. Of this, \$77,000,000 went for gasoline, with \$10,000,000 in taxes going to the state.

That's a lot of tourists, but not so many as the state could and should have, says the governor.

He urged the station operators to be salesmen for the communities and areas and encourage travelers to do more sightseeing. **MR. TEXAS MOVES TO TOWN** — Early studies of Texas' 1960 census figures indicates that while Texas cities are getting bigger, the wide open spaces are getting less and less cluttered with people.

Much of the explosive growth of cities apparently has been at the expense of surrounding rural areas, either by annexation or by the moving of country dwellers to the nearby city.

Fast-growing Abilene is an example. Abilene population has grown by 96 per cent since 1950, from 45,570 to 89,248. Taylor County, in which Abilene is located, gained from 63,370 to 100,216. Net result: Taylor County's non-Abilene population dropped from 17,800 to 10,788.

A similar situation exists in the Panhandle where Amarillo's

84 per cent increase outstripped that of Potter County.

Texarkana moved up in population, but the counties in which it is located (in Texas and Arkansas) lost ground.

**WATER STORAGE DOWN** — Despite the usual conversation punctuated with "now that the drought's over," reports show much of Texas short on rainfall this year.

State Board of Water Engineers reports that water in Texas reservoirs dropped from 9,622,230 acre feet in March to 9,481,265 acre feet in April. This is about a 1.5 per cent decrease.

Rainfall for the first four months of the year has been below normal for Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Houston, Laredo, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, Port Arthur, Beaumont, San Angelo, San Antonio, Victoria, Waco and Wichita Falls.

Above average rainfall was recorded by Amarillo, Abilene, Corpus Christi and Brownsville.

**TRUCK REGISTRATION REQUIRED** — State Supreme Court has held that a fleet of semi-trailer trucks operated in Texas must register in Texas even though they are already registered in Mississippi.

Suit was brought by the State Highway Department against a motor freight company in El Paso.

Supreme Court upheld lower court rulings that the company must buy Texas license plates for all 95 of its trucks.

**VACATION BENEFITS DUE TEST** — Supreme Court has set a hearing for June 8 on whether unemployment compensation payments must be made to employees on unpaid vacations.

In the case in point, the company gives a one-week vacation with pay to employees of five years or more. During the summer the plant was closed for two weeks. Some employees received one week's pay, some none, depending on their seniority.

Texas Employment Commission ruled that the employees were not due unemployment payments for the period they were without pay. A Dallas district court upheld TEC, but the Court of Civil Appeals reversed this decision. TEC is appealing to the Supreme Court.

**TRUCKERS ASK RATE HIKE** — In a sharply-contested hearing before the Railroad Commission Texas truckers are asking to be allowed to charge higher rates for shipments within the borders of Texas.

Desired increase would be approximately 7.66 per cent higher than present rates.

Firms that do a great deal of shipping and several local chambers of commerce are opposing the request. They contend that rates within Texas are higher than interstate rates now.

Truckers say they must have the increase because of increased costs of operation are causing them to have substantial losses.

**NO CREDIT UNION BRANCHES** — Attorney General Will Wilson has ruled that credit unions are subject to the same prohibition a banks against setting up branch offices or receiving deposits anywhere except in their main office.

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

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**Fishing Should Be Good In New Lake**

According to the report from the Texas Game and Fish Commission, the water quality of the Salt Fork of Red River below Whitefish Creek, which is the site of the Greenbelt Dam, is good and the new lake should be very productive and the fishing excellent.

The survey was conducted from June 1, 1956, through May 31, 1957. Twenty-eight seine collections presented 9,997 specimens for study. Eighteen species, representing five families of fish were found to occur. Sunfishes, bullhead catfish and minnows were abundant. Only one channel cat, one sucker and one carp were found among the specimens.

The bed of the Salt Fork is braided sand, but quite firm in marked contrast to the quick sands of the Canadian River. The water is clear except in flood periods. At the dam site the river is a braided stream with a broad sandy flood plain about one mile wide. Normally it is shallow (less than one foot), but during heavy rains it becomes a raging torrent washing out bridges and carrying away heavy concrete pilings. You can see flood debris clinging to salt cedars in the valley at the site, indicative of the size of the river during heavy rainfall.

At the present time the river is too shallow to support game fish, but there are concentrations of bait minnows large enough for commercial bait seining.

Mr. Marion Toole, Chief Aquatic Biologist, approved the report that, "If plans to construct the dam materialize, fishing in the new lake should be excellent. There were no rough species found above the proposed dam site and only two species were found in the river below the dam site. All information that was obtained during this survey indicates that the new lake will be very productive."
