Boys Ranch Rodeo Set For Labor Day Holidays

Two hundred sixty-one boys at Cal Farley's famous Boys Ranch are working hard every day to complete plans, preparations and practice for the biggest Labor Day event of its kind in the Golden Spread . . . the 16th Annual Boys Ranch Rodeo . . . September 4th and 5th.

All indications are that this nationally-famous rodeo will be the fastest, most competitive and thrilling the boys have ever had and in anticipation of record-breaking attendance at the two-day show, 1000 more seats are being installed.

Only Boys Ranchers will participate in the riding and special events and through a series of elimination contests, the top eighty riders will be selected to compete for the points and prizes to be awarded under R.C.A. rules.

L. B. (Lew) Hartzog Is Illinois Coach

It always gives us a good feeling to write a success story for anyone raised here in our own community. L. B. (Lew) Hartzog, brother of Mrs. Thomas Perkins of this city, and a former Broncho star player, recently moved from Northeast Louisiana State to become coach at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Ill.

Hartzog succeeds Leland Lingle as track coach at Southern Ill. He will coach only track and cross country and teach a few physical education courses. He will have one full-time assistant and two or three graduate assistants.

At Northeast Louisiana, Hartzog's thimbleclads won their conference track meet in 1959, defeating all of the South's major track powers including Louisiana State.

L. B. graduated from the local high school in 1941. He attended Texas Western College and graduated from Southeast Missouri State in 1949. He served five years with the Marine in World War II and his first coaching job was at William Christian High in Independence, Mo., leaving there after three years for Rocky Ford, Colo. Hartzog coached at Rocky Ford for three years, his unbeaten team winning the state championship in 1956 and his 1955 club finishing second by a point. In 1957, he went to Wheat Ridge, suburb of Denver and went to Northeast Louisiana the next season.

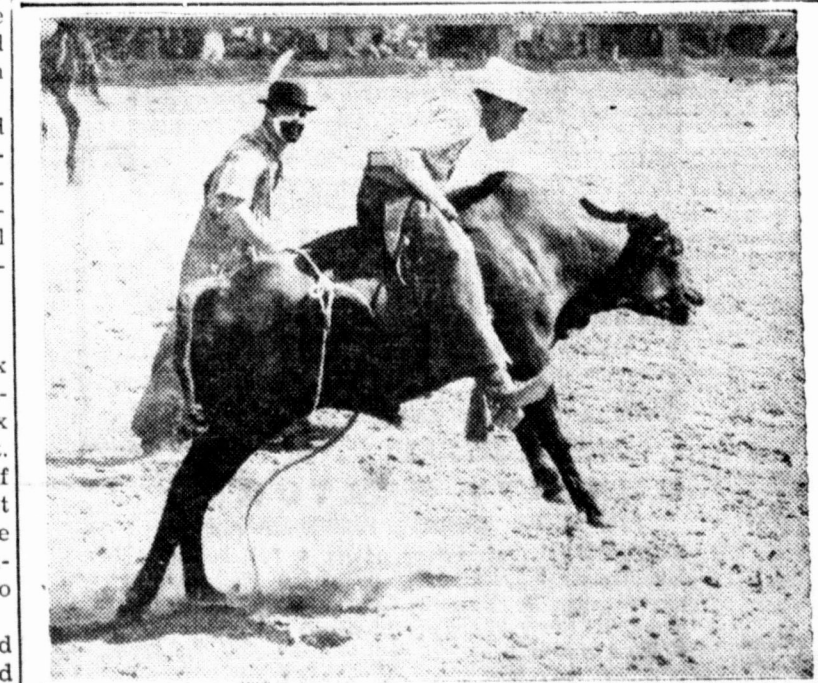

Pond Construction

Each year in Donley County there is a growing interest in constructing farm ponds. Last year the Donley County Soil Conservation District there were twenty-five ponds laid out and constructed. It looks like even more will be built this year.

Among those more recently completed or are in the process include Mrs. C. Griffin, Lyodd Shelton, Jack Roach & Son, Hugo Riemer, J. H. McMurtry, Wes Kelly, and L. R. Hagy.

The ponds on McMurtry and Hagy will be built under the Great Plains Conservation Program. The remainder will be constructed under the ACP.

J. H. McMurtry and Hugo Reamer ponds were constructed for the purpose of erosion control. The others were for livestock water.

The primary purpose for which most ponds are built is livestock water. And through additional livestock water more even distribution of grazing can be obtained.

Also another reason for a pond is for erosion control. If these types of ponds are put in they will equal to or more than pay for the cost of construction.

Ponds in this section of the country need to be at least eight feet deep. If any shallower than this then there is a strong possibility that evaporation will be so great that it can't be depended on for permanent water.

Supplemental benefits can be obtained from farm ponds. Among these are fish production, recreation and fire protection. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service furnishes stocking fish for each pond free of charge. These fish furnish not only the pleasure of catching them but some good eating.

A pond should be designed to do the job for which it is intended. Soil Conservation technicians assisting the Donley County Soil Conservation District are trained to design these structures and will be glad to assist you in planning and construction.

Waterway Development Waterway construction has been completed on the H. A. Harrison, Hester Shields, A. B. Ivey, R. O. Osborn, Richard Cannon, and F. L. Thomason farms. These are some of the cooperators in the Donley County Soil Conservation District that have or are in the process of developing waterways.

A waterway is a means of conducting runoff water to a safe point of release with a minimum amount of erosion. It is designed to carry this water at a non erosive velocity. Such waterways are usually

used as outlets for diversions, for terraces, or for taking natural drain water through a field at a safe velocity.

An ideal situation for developing a planned waterway is to construct and establish grass in the waterway before turning the outside water into it. Say for example to have the waterway constructed and established before a planned diversion terrace was built to turn water into it.

However the above conditions cannot always be met. If this is the case then the waterway can still be constructed. But immediately following construction a close drilled annual crop should be sown in the waterway. This close drilled crop will then furnish the needed protection as soon as possible. Then as conditions permit native grass should be sown to insure a permanent vegetative cover present at all times.

Any person interested in such waterways can receive assistance from two sources. Either through the Great Plains Conservation Program or from the Donley County ASC office. Cost share from the above sources are from 70 to 80% of the cost of constructing and establishing such a waterway.

If you have a water problem or would just like to acquire more information concerning waterways contact any Soil Conservation Service technician assisting the Donley County Soil Conservation District. They will be glad to give what assistance they can.

Civil Defense Meeting Held For SCS Employees

Civil Defense survival training for local Soil Conservation Service employees was held at Pampa on July 27. Local employees and their families that attended were:

Richard Finch and family, Don Davis and wife, Bland Draper and family, and Earl Willard. The training meetings were conducted by Duane Bartee, Jack C. Williams, and Pat Neil, all of Pampa. Williams and Neil recently attended a one week Civil Defense training school in Abilene.

Purpose of the Civil Defense meetings were to outline what to do in case of an atomic attack. Subjects that were discussed were: (1) The possibility of atomic attack, (2) Atomic explosions and the resulting fallout and radiation, (3) Symptoms of radiation sickness, (4) Preparation and stocking of suitable shelters, and (5) Post attack conditions.

Radiation dangers were stressed. Radiation is a by-product of atomic explosions. It is particularly dangerous because we cannot detect it with our five senses. It is detected by special instruments that can measure the X-ray type rays that are given off.

Suitable shelters should have 2 feet of concrete or 3 feet of earth to shield the occupants from radiation. Length of stay in a shelter may last from one day to two weeks. The importance of the Conelrad frequencies, 640 and 1240, on the radio was emphasized. Only on these frequencies will the local radiation level be given. The local radiation level determines the time that shelters will be needed.

Following an atomic attack, foods that are canned or packaged are safe for consumption. Vegetables and fruits can be thoroughly washed or peeled before being cooked and eaten. Food and water that is normally exposed to dust should be checked with a monitoring instrument to see if they are safe to eat.

The Soil Conservation Service is to maintain a series of 35 monitoring stations in Texas. These stations will assist local and national civil defense officials in case of an attack. Four of these stations are located in this area: Wellington, Pampa, Spearman, and Follett. SCS personnel at these locations will receive further training in radiological monitoring in the near future. — By Jack C. Williams, Soil Conservation Service.

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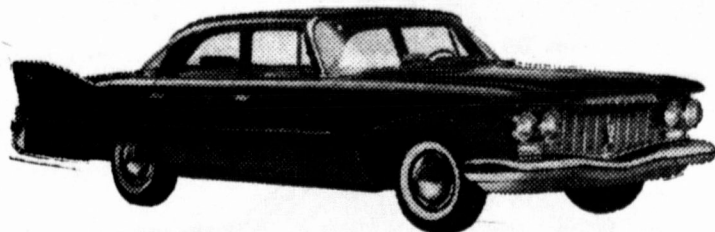

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive for each Regular Session an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days."

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State. The election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of interest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum; and that no regulatory agency acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and grant a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 6, 7, and 8, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding the following Sections which shall read as follows:

"Section 6. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 6(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Wichita County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Lamar County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation."

"Section 7. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Hidalgo County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 6(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidalgo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District subject to district taxation."

"Section 8. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District to be co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, Texas."

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cent (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the Commissioners Precinct

No. 4 of Comanche County.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within the District may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospitals (other than the District) or by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the District to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially acquiring the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said seventy-five cent (75c) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the District."

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Comanche to render financial aid to that District by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the District (whether assumed or created by the District) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the County but without the County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the District shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the County in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries co-extensive with the District, and the County shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the County."

"(c) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election, to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

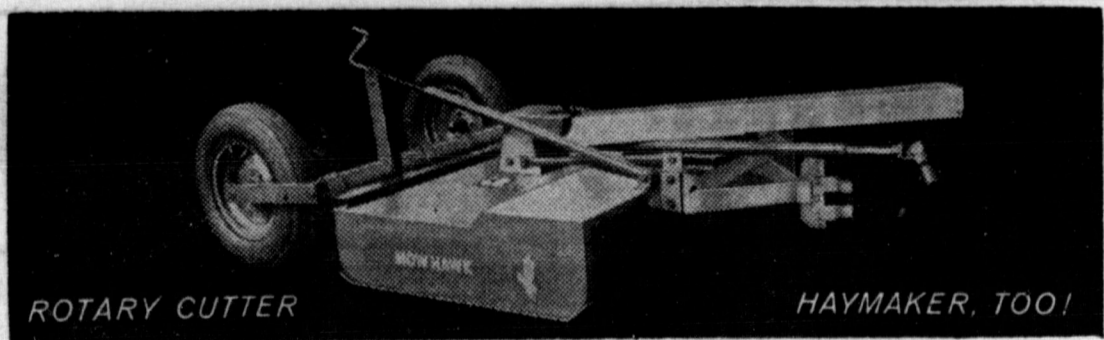

**TECH RED RAIDERS 1960 SCHEDULE**

LUBBOCK — If there's a home stadium advantage in football, Texas Tech's Red Raiders could spoil the Southwest Conference title chances of two teams prominently mentioned for 1960 laurels.

Baylor University, the dark-horse choice of many, will be played in expanded Jones Stadium Oct. 15, and defending co-champion Arkansas will be met here Nov. 19. A third Southwest Conference member, Southern Methodist, is slated for the Red Raiders' homecoming Oct. 22.

Rounding out a home card of six games are West Texas State Sept. 17, Tulane Nov. 5, and Wyoming Nov. 12. West Texas State and Baylor are the only night games at home.

On the road the Raiders play Texas A&M, Texas, Texas Christian, and Rice.

Coach DeWitt Weaver's Red Raiders will be making their Southwest Conference football debut, a goal set back in 1927.

For the first time in history, Texas Tech will have a major All-America first team selection

in the person of center E. J. Holub. The choice of the Football Writers Association and NEA Service last year, Holub, 6-4, 215, has been picked on the pre-season All America teams of about a half dozen magazines.

Leader—Out-of-County Rate, \$3.50 a year.



AUSTIN — About a dozen state agencies thus far have presented their budget requests for the 1961-63 biennium.

As yet, none has failed to ask for more money than it's presently getting.

Many agencies cite Texas' growing population as justification for expansion. They, in effect, that they are in the same position as the housewife who has to put another potato in the pot to set another place at the table.

Others seek to woo state funds with a "bread cast upon the waters" approach. They contend that money spent on developing the state's resources will come back multiplied in the form of increased state revenue.

Almost all emphasize the difficulties of luring and holding highly trained personnel at present state salaries. Some say, too, that they've been working with a too-short stick for years and

need some "keep up with the times" improvements.

Budget proposals are presently being studied by the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's budget staff. Each will make recommendations, and the final decision will be made next year by the Legislature.

With a money-shirt, tax fighting session ahead, it won't be easy for anyone.

These budget requests have been added to those already under study:

**STATE PARKS** — An investment in state parks is an investment in the Texas tourist industry and a potentially rich source of additional funds for the state treasury.

This is the theme of the State Parks Board in asking for a \$2,000,000 appropriation for the next two years. This is almost double the present spending level.

Of this million-dollar-a-year appropriation, the Board proposes to use \$700,000 a year for improvements, \$300,000 a year for administration.

Texas, says parks director Bill Collins, spends less on its state parks than Rhode Island. He cited figures showing that Texas would get \$81,000,000 a year more in tax revenue if each out-of-state visitor stayed in the state one more day.

**GENERAL LAND OFFICE** — A bigger budget is asked by the General Land Office and Veterans Land Board to assure the state's realizing full value from

the resources of state-owned lands.

A two-year budget of \$3,042,339 is asked.

Land Office noted the state now has clear title to 8,000 square miles of tidelands. It wants to employ three oil scouts and a geological director to explore the development of the tidelands' mineral resources. Altogether, 29 new land office employees are being asked.

Land Office claims that for every dollar it has spent in the past 22 years, \$90.18 has been returned to the state treasury in revenue.

**AGRICULTURE** — Complexities of increasingly scientific farming put greater demands on the State Department of Agriculture, says Commissioner John C. White.

His "sink or swim" budget request is for \$3,061,421 for the coming two-year period. This compares with a \$1,930,966 appropriation for the present period.

White said the "chemical revolution" in agriculture today puts heavy responsibilities on his department. He also asked for more equipment and more salaries for personnel to check weights and measures.

**HIGHWAYS** — State Highway Department is asking for a two-year allocation of \$698,600,000.

Of this, \$348,300,000 would be for the 1961-62 period; \$350,300,000 for the 1962-63 period. This compares with \$337,000,000 spent by the Highway Department in 1959.

Most of the highway revenue comes from special earmarked sources, such as the gasoline tax license fees, etc. Department is asking \$600,000 from the general revenue fund to be used for tourist advertising.

**GAME AND FISH** — Game and Fish Commission is asking for what it calls a "status quo" budget, except for salary raises for some of its top technical personnel.

Commission is asking for \$12,034,945 for the coming two-year period compared to \$11,593,651 for the present biennium.

Executive Director Howard Dodgen declared the commission's top echelon employees are "grossly underpaid" for highly trained persons, some with master's degrees.

**STATE COLLEGES** — Three colleges, East Texas State, Stephen F. Austin State and Sam Houston State Teachers College, have told the Commission on Higher Education they need more money.

Expected enrollment increases, need for higher faculty salaries and need to lower the student-teacher ratio were cited as reasons for the requests.

East Texas is asking \$2,446,555 for the first year, \$2,547,125 for the second year of the 1961-63 period. This compares with a present annual budget of \$1,676,424.

Stephen F. Austin asks \$2,063,719 the first year, \$2,048,603 the second, compared to the present \$1,244,370 a year.

Sam Houston wants \$2,970,261 the first year, \$2,992,190 the second. Present annual spending is \$2,040,677.

These requests, along with all those from state-supported colleges and universities, will be studied and screened by the Higher Education Commission before a recommendation is presented to legislative and executive budget officials.

**WHERE TO GET IT** — With new spending requests piling up, the search for new money-making plans is ranging far and wide. Four broad-based tax plans are being considered by tax hunting sub-committee of the Governor's State Finance Advisory Commission.

They are: (1) a payroll tax, paid half by employers, half by employees, (2) a utilities customers tax adding a percentage to all utility bills, (3) a business activities tax which would combine some of the features of payroll, gross receipts and corporate income taxes and (4) a transfer which would be similar to a sales tax.

Other ideas suggested to the panel include higher taxes on liquor and beer, sales tax on soft drinks and restaurant meals and a tax on sporting events.

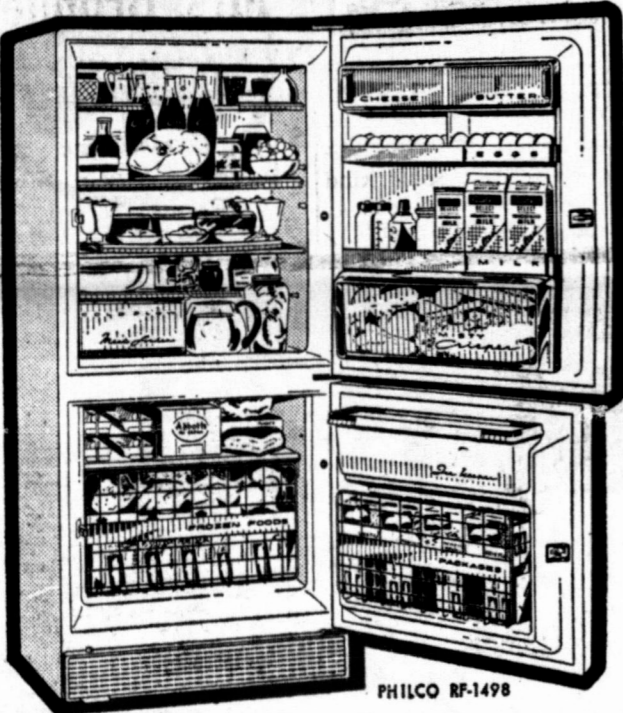
