

Issue Update

If there's one tax that's misunderstood in America, it's got to be the capital gains tax

Most people think it's a tax on the wealthy. But when you look at who really pays capital gains taxes, it quickly becomes apparent that it's not.

Nearly 57 percent of those who pay capital gains taxes make less than \$50,000 a year. These are people who are selling a home or small business, or parents who have to sell some of their shares in a mutual fund to help are the people who are affected by capital gains taxes, and these are the people who'll be helped by reducing the capital gains tax

But it's not just working Americans who will benefit from such a reduction. The economy as a whole will also stand to win. This week, the Chairman of the Joint Economic Committee and I will release a report which shows that reducing the capital gains tax would: increase the Gross Domestic Product by \$51 billion dollars each year; create 500,000 new jobs by the year 2000; and, increase business spending by an average of \$18 billion dollars annually.

The study will also show that because the United States taxes capital gains at a higher rate than its major foreign competitors, reducing the capital gains tax will help American businesses compete around the globe.

Fortunately, some relief is in sight. In the next few days, the Ways and Means Committee is expected to announce that capital gains taxes will be reduced as part of the balanced budget agreement. Coupled with a family tax credit and some relief from inheritance taxes, these tax cuts will serve to not only boost the economy, but help working families and businesses as well.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SPECIAL ELECTION

AUGUST 9. 1997 PROPOSITION NO. 1

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

ON THE BALLOT

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons cur-

rently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate. The proposed amendment will

appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."



Tests to be offered at Clarendon College

July testing dates have been scheduled for Clarendon College. Tests to be administered are the CLEP and GED.

GED Testing (High School Equivalency Exam) will be given Monday, July 21, at 8 a.m. in the Bairfield Activity Center. Cost of the exam is \$40. Results will be available in 21/2 weeks. Individuals must call the Counseling Center in advance to schedule for the GED test.
