## Cotton Tour to be held in Donley Co. June 23

Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Donley County is sponsoring a cotton tour on June 23.

Dr. Randy Bowman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Cotton Specialist, and Dr. Jim Lesser, TAES Entomologist, both out of the Texas A&M Center in Lubbock will be here for the tour on June 23rd.

Dr. Bowman will discuss management issues of current interest, and Dr. Lesser will discuss insect problems and control methods.

We will hold the event in two locations so that folks won't have to drive too far. We will begin at 1:00 p.m. at Bob Cole's Farm, located 5 miles west of Clarendon, and then meet at 3:00 p.m. at the Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake. Discussion will be similar at both meeting places, so participants can make either, or if you choose, take advantage of the entire afternoon.

This should be a very timely tour, in light of the counts we are getting in our boll weevil traps. Come on out and hear what the experts are recommending.

## Market Steer Validation to be held June 25

All 4-H or FFA youth planning to show market steers at fall, winter, or spring shows must have their steers validated with the official Texas Steer Validation procedure. The Donley County validation procedure will take place on June 25 at the Rodeo Grounds/Community Center in Clarendon, located behind Chamberlain Motors.

Steers will be ear tagged, tattooed, nose printed, and photographed. Scales will be available for youth who wish to weigh their steers. This validation will make these animals eligible for any show in Texas. Steers without this validation may not enter Texas shows. Any questions may be directed to the County Agents office at 874-2926.

## Clarendon to commemorate American Independence for 119th consecutive year

Plans are shaping up nicely for the Annual Saints' Roost Celebration to be held on July 3, 4, and 5 this year.

This will be the 119th consecutive year that Clarendon has commemorated the anniversary of American Independence, the first being in 1878 shortly after the founding of the town.

The celebration will kick off on Thursday, July 3, with a Hamburger Lunch at noon on Kearney Street across from The Nook.

The lunch will cost \$5 for adults and \$3 for kids, and proceeds will benefit the United Methodist Youth who are sponsoring the event. Tickets are available in the church office at the First United Methodist Church.

Clarendon's TCRA approved rodeo will be July 3, 4, and 5 at the Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Arena. The rodeo starts each night at 7:45 p.m., and each night will be followed by an open air dance featuring Single Tree from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Books for the Clarendon Rodeo will open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on June 30, 1997. Call 874-2782.

The annual Shriners' Barbecue will start at 11 a.m. and will last until the food is gone. Tickets may be purchased in advance from any Shriner or may be purchased on the Square the day of the event.

The Western Parade will begin at 2 p.m., and line up for the parade will be a 1 p.m. at the City Park. Parade Chairperson is Linda Gray, and a form to enter the parade is located on page two of this week's Enterprise. The annual bicycle parade will be included with the July Fourth parade this year.

The Chamber of Commerce will hold its Cow Patty Bingo following the parade at approximately 3 o'clock, and the cash prize this year is \$500. Tickets are on sale now from Chamber Directors.

On Saturday, July 5, the annual Turtle Race will be held at the intersection of Third and Kearney Streets at 3 p.m. Contact Hensons to enter your fastest terrapin.

## Aldermen turn down fire agreement with Howardwick

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session June 10, 1997, at 7 p.m. in the Board Room of City Hall.

The Howardwick Fire Department was discussed and Alderman Mac Stavehagen moved, seconded by Shawn Barker, not to extend the agreement with Howardwick, but to turn over coverage to the Fire Chief.

Howardwick will still be covered by the Clarendon Fire Department, as it always has been, since the department covers all of Donley County.

"As long as we go to the aid of our neighbors, I don't think we have to have a formal agreement," said Clarendon Mayor Tex Selvidge.

Todd Knorpp spoke on behalf of the Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association on the need for funds to be used for advertising for the 4th of July. The board approved spending an amount not to exceed \$2,000 from the Motel Bed Tax to advertise the July 4th activities.

Mike Johnson spoke about the

animal control problem. The board voted to ask Mr. Johnson to gather and pen his guineas.

The Community Pride Signs were discussed. James Owens moved, seconded by James Kuhn, to have Roger Estlack form a committee and design the sign. Motion carried.

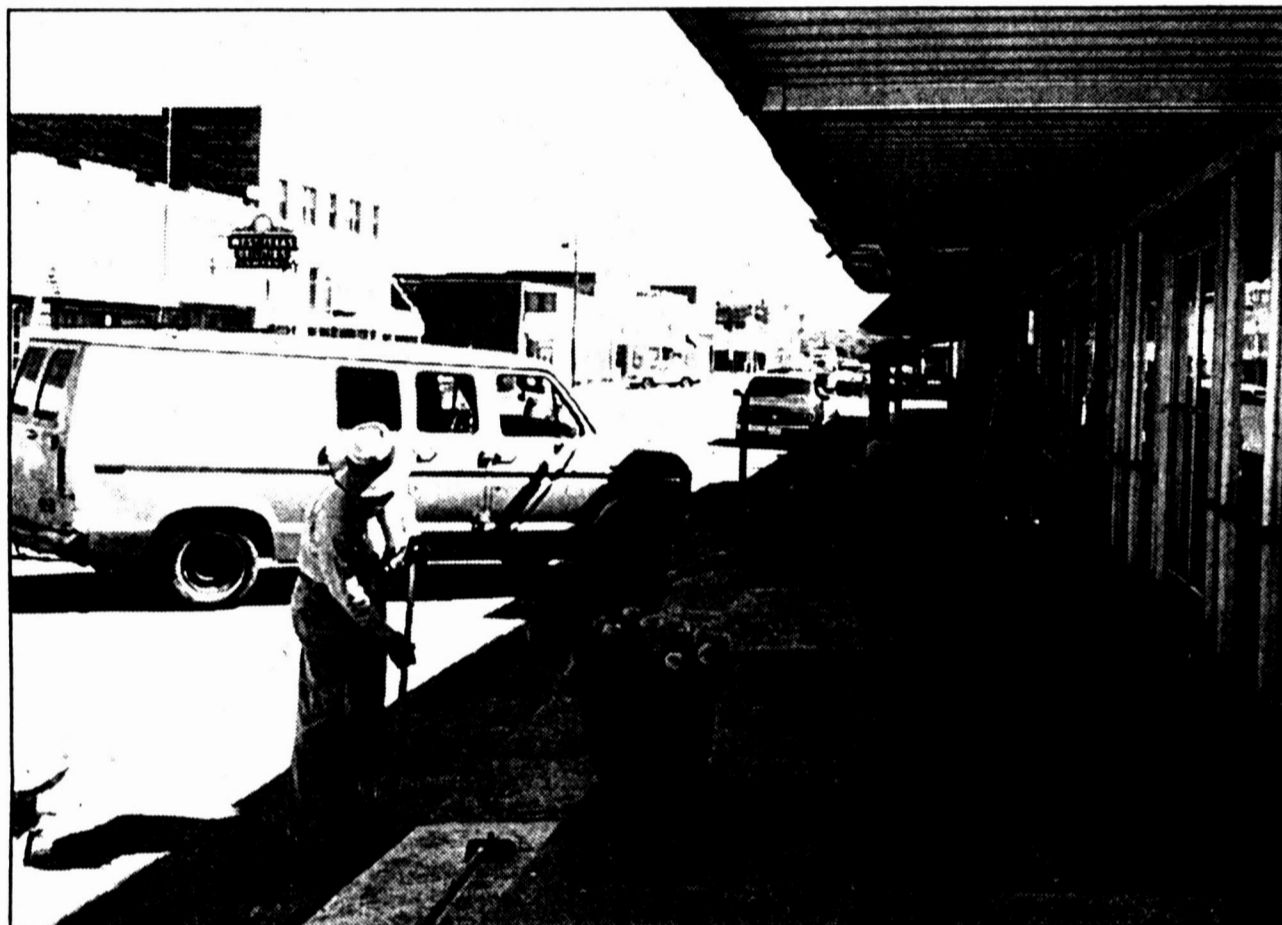
The Aldermen also voted to write a letter of support for Grant Funds for improvements at Greenbelt Lake.

# Coordinating Board salutes CC for making notable progress

Representatives of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board conducted an on-site, comprehensive review of Clarendon College last week and thereafter saluted the institution for making "notable progress" since going through its 1995 reaccreditation process with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

Each of Texas' 50 public community colleges must undergo periodic on-site reviews by the Coordinating Board.

The reviewing team was headed by Dr. Charles Cook, Director of Instructional Programs, who announced the committee's findings on Friday with Clarendon College Board Chair Dr. R.L. Gilkey and Vice-Chair Mike Butts in attendance.

"Clarendon's SACS review in 1995 proved a rather sobering experience," Cook assessed. "However, notable progress has been made since

that time. More remains to be accomplished."

Among areas reviewed by the seven-member team were all vocational/technical programs; the college's admissions policies; business office procedures; compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act; counseling and testing; Pampa Center operations; continuing education programs; developmental programs; Tech Prep programs; etc.

During Friday's exit interview, Cook made special note of progress made in the following areas:

- The establishment of an Institutional Effectiveness Committee and the beginnings of an assessment program that seeks to gauge the college's progress through both quantitative and qualitative measures.
- The establishment of a Technology Committee as well as beginning

to incorporate new technology into the curriculum.

- The college joining the Harrington Library Consortium, thus considerably increasing resources available to students. Cook urged that the college also move forward with its plans to construct a new library facility before the turn of the century.
- The establishment of a new core curriculum. Cook acknowledged that the college's new core was more reflective of the basic skills needed by students to compete in today's global economy.
- The expansion of student activities.
- The expansion of new continuing education programs.
- The development of Tech Prep programs, i.e., Computer Maintenance Technology. Cook encouraged that more Tech Prep programs be developed by the insti-

tution.

- Plans to construct a new center in Pampa. Cook said this project needs to be a high priority for the college, as Pampa is the largest center of population in the college's service area.
- Partnerships with other area agencies to provide new learning opportunities for the college's constituents.
- The development of a more comprehensive personnel evaluation program that features quantitative measures and covers components of the institution up to and including self-assessment by the Board of Regents.

Some of the other specific areas that Cook suggested need attention at the college included:

- The development of a college-wide assessment policy for student

placement.

- A professional development assessment program for faculty and staff to insure that employees remain contemporary.
  - Greater involvement of advisory committees with occupational programs.
  - Stronger efforts in remedial education to involve computer-assisted instruction.
  - More training programs for area industry.
- "The Coordinating Board site review confirmed two things for us," Vice-Chairman Butts said.
- "First, it confirmed that we've made a lot of progress over the past couple years, and that we need to be proud of that.
- "Second, that as far as we have come, we have that much further to go if our college is to remain viable into the next century."

Reece of Canyon competes and has won numerous awards in the Panhandle Cutting Horse Association and the National Cutting Horse Association.

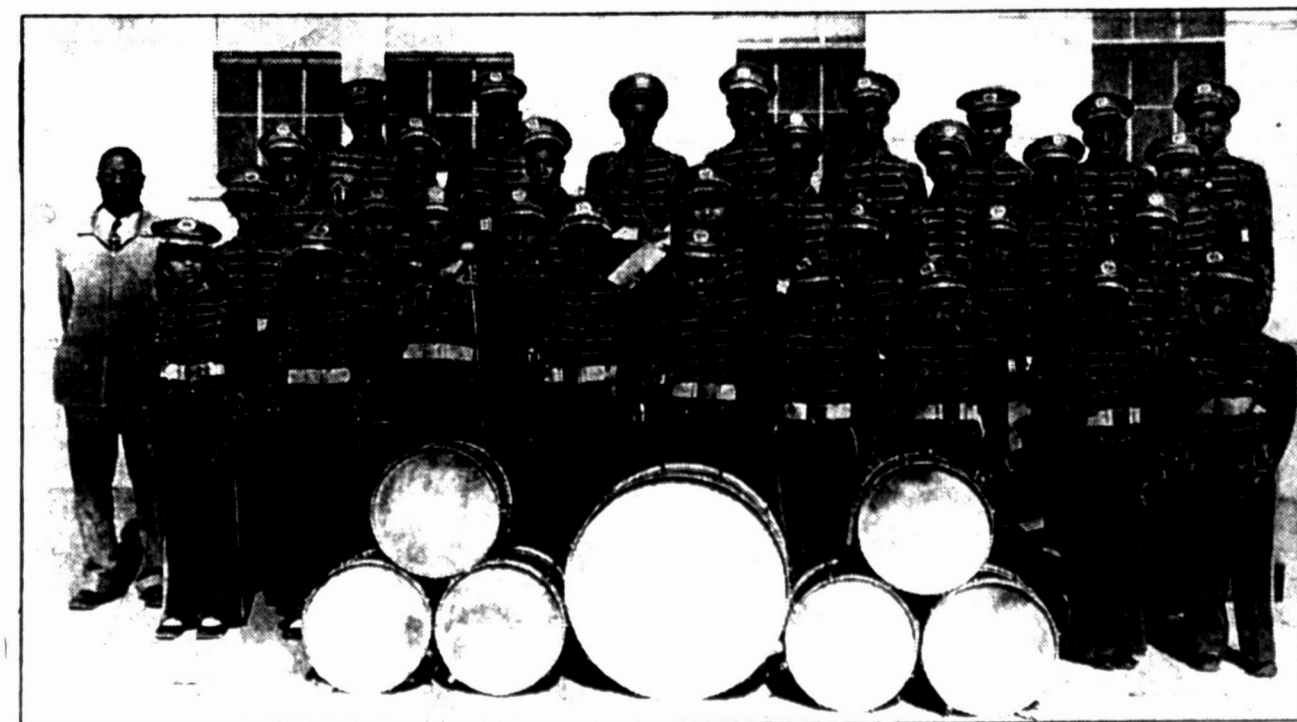
In his demonstration, he will explain the art of cutting and the different training techniques used in preparing a horse for competition.

If there's one tax that's misunderstood in America, it's got to be the capital gains tax.

Most people think it's a tax on the wealthy. But when you look at who really pays capital gains taxes, it quickly becomes apparent that it's not. Nearly 57 percent of those who pay capital gains taxes make less than \$50,000 a year. These are people who are selling a home or small business, or parents who have to sell some of their shares in a mutual fund to help put their child through school. These are the people who are affected by capital gains taxes, and these are the people who'll be helped by reducing the capital gains tax.

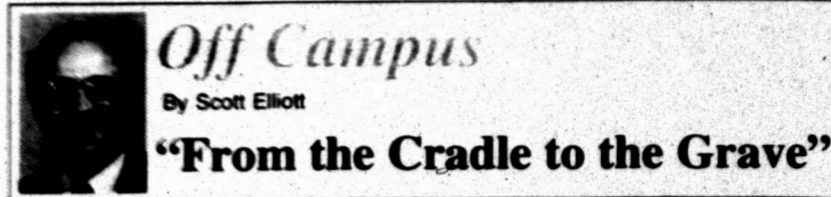
But it's not just working Americans who will benefit from such a reduction. The economy as a whole will also stand to win. This week, the Chairman of the Joint Economic Committee and I will release a report which shows that reducing the capital gains tax would increase the Gross Domestic Product by \$51 billion dollars each year, create 500,000 new jobs by the year 2000; and, increase business spending by an average of \$18 billion dollars annually.

The study will also show that because the United States taxes capital gains at a higher rate than its major foreign competitors, reducing the capital gains tax will help American businesses compete around the globe.

Fortunately, some relief is in sight. In the next few days, the Ways and Means Committee is expected to announce that capital gains taxes will be reduced as part of the balanced budget agreement. Coupled with a family tax credit and some relief from inheritance taxes, these tax cuts will serve to not only boost the economy, but help working families and businesses as well.

**"From the Cradle to the Grave"**

There's an ancient saying about community colleges. That is, community colleges should seek to serve constituents "from the cradle to the grave."

That mission is one thing that makes community colleges arguably unique among their peer agencies in American public education. Over the past couple of weeks, I have been especially proud of the efforts Clarendon College has made in fulfilling that mission.

Our Career & Computer Camp, attended by 35 area youngsters, proved a worthy endeavor, to say the least. It afforded young people an opportunity to acquire new knowledge, develop new skills, and experience first-hand how computers are integrated into the day-to-day operations of area businesses.

I would suggest that there remain very few careers in American society that do not involve the computer in some form or fashion. Such will become only more prevalent in future generations. Computer literacy will ultimately be as fundamental a skill relative to job preparedness as the ability to fill out an application.

While the Career & Computer Camp - in which youth from 14 different Panhandle cities participated - didn't involve "cradle-age" constituents, it was a program that was nevertheless indicative of the college's efforts at developing important linkages with area youngsters. Such experiences will assist youth in formulating career plans.

On the other end of the continuum was our Elderhostel program. "Exploring the Texas Panhandle," which concluded last week. Through Elderhostel, senior citizens are provided an opportunity to study regional culture and industry. Besides diverse educational programs, the Elderhostel group engaged in leisuretime activities such as attending the extraordinary popular play "TEXAS," learning

to two-step, and experiencing chuckwagon cuisine at the Bar H Dude Ranch and Cowboy Morning (near Claude).

My wife, Claudia, and I were privileged to join in the scrumptious steak and biscuits dinner at Cowboy Morning on the edge of Palo Duro Canyon. It was there that I encountered a member of the Elderhostel group who caused me to once again consider the importance of the community college mission.

His name is Don, a free lance writer who I would estimate is in his mid-70s (although I am absolutely inept at guessing people's ages). Don suffers from a hearing impairment, which often forces him to communicate in writing with others.

Despite that, he is as enthusiastic an individual as you'll ever meet. When I introduced myself to Don, he said, beaming, "I have been really excited about this experience. I've learned a lot, and, you know, you're never too old to learn new things. I'm going to write an article about this experience and mention your college."

What a refreshing attitude! It was obvious that Don had a insatiable thirst for knowledge, and it spoke to me of the need for community colleges to make every effort to afford people opportunities to quench that thirst - no matter their circumstance.

At the Bar H, the energetic Elderhostel group witnessed a double rainbow - something some acknowledged having never before experienced. A double rainbow against the backdrop of the most expansive horizons on Earth in the Texas Panhandle - what a majestic sight!

Such reminds us of God's promise not to destroy, but to build. And the construction of anything begins with knowledge, something we should all pursue "from the cradle to the grave."

**College to offer Algebra short course on June 30**

Clarendon College will offer a three-week short course in College Algebra (MATH 1314), beginning June 30, 1997.

The three-credit course will be taught by Darryl Perryman, chairman of the college's math department. The class will meet Mondays through Thursdays from 8 a.m. until noon in the CC Administration Building.

"Traditionally, this has been a very popular summer course with students in our service area," Dr. Scott

Elliott, Clarendon College President said. "Students can earn three credit hours in a relatively short period of time. Mr. Perryman has taught the course for a number of years, and it's always proved successful with our students. It's a special opportunity for recent high school graduates to start their college experience."

Students may register at the CC Administration Building, every Monday - Thurs., from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., or register at the beginning of the class on

June 30. Payment is expected at the time of registration. Cost of the class is \$88 for in-district (Donley County) residents and \$94 for Texas residents. Cost of the algebra book is \$42 - used and \$55 - new.

To register for the College Algebra Short Course, students must have a copy of their high school or college transcript, GED certificate or a letter of permission from their high school principal or counselor, ACT and TASP scores.

OF PROPOSED  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
SPECIAL ELECTION  
AUGUST 9, 1997

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons cur-

rently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."

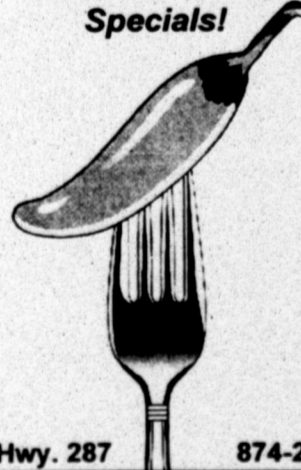

**Mobeetie author to be at First Bank & Trust this Friday**

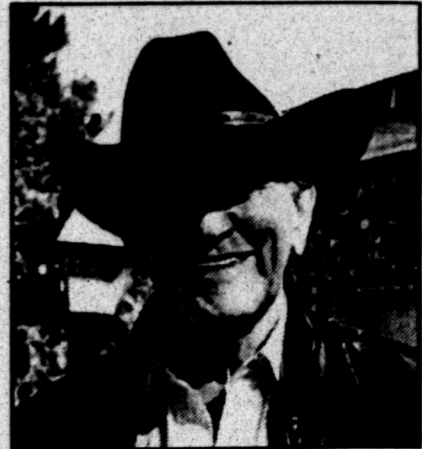
The author of a book based on the adventures of Bat Masterson in Mobeetie will be on hand at the First Bank & Trust of Clarendon to sign autographs and visit about the pioneer days of this area Friday, June 20, 1997.

Norman Dysart, author of *Like Whispers In The Wind*, grew up at Mobeetie and remembers listening to the tales of the 'old timers' as a child. With this book, he puts that oral history into writing, preserving it for the ages.

*Whispers* recounts the legendary Bat Masterson's arrival in Hidetown (as Mobeetie was originally known) in the late 1870s to hunt buffalo. Also featured in the novel is Bat's romance with Molly Brennan, The Rose of the Canadian. Brennan lost her life during a shoot-out between Bat and Melvin King. Dysart's book maintains the legend that she gave her life for Bat by jumping in front of a bullet for him.

The Bat Masterson story is the heart of Dysart's book, but it is surrounded by stories and facts that tell what life was like for the people who settled the Texas Panhandle as recalled by the pioneers themselves.

Unlike the textbook-type history of other books, Dysart's work could

almost be described as legendary history — featuring the mythic characters of the early Panhandle set in the legend of the Wild West. The people featured in the book really lived. The events in the book really did or probably did happen just as Dysart writes. In the end, no one can verify many of the stories of the old timers. But then... no one can dispute them either.

Norman Dysart will be in the First Bank & Trust Lobby from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. to sign copies of his book and to share tales of the pioneer days with Donley County residents. Refreshments will be served.

Organizers of Dysart's visit hope this will be an opportunity for some of our own pioneers and their descendants to tell the history of this area — for the old generation to pass their stories on to their children and grandchildren.

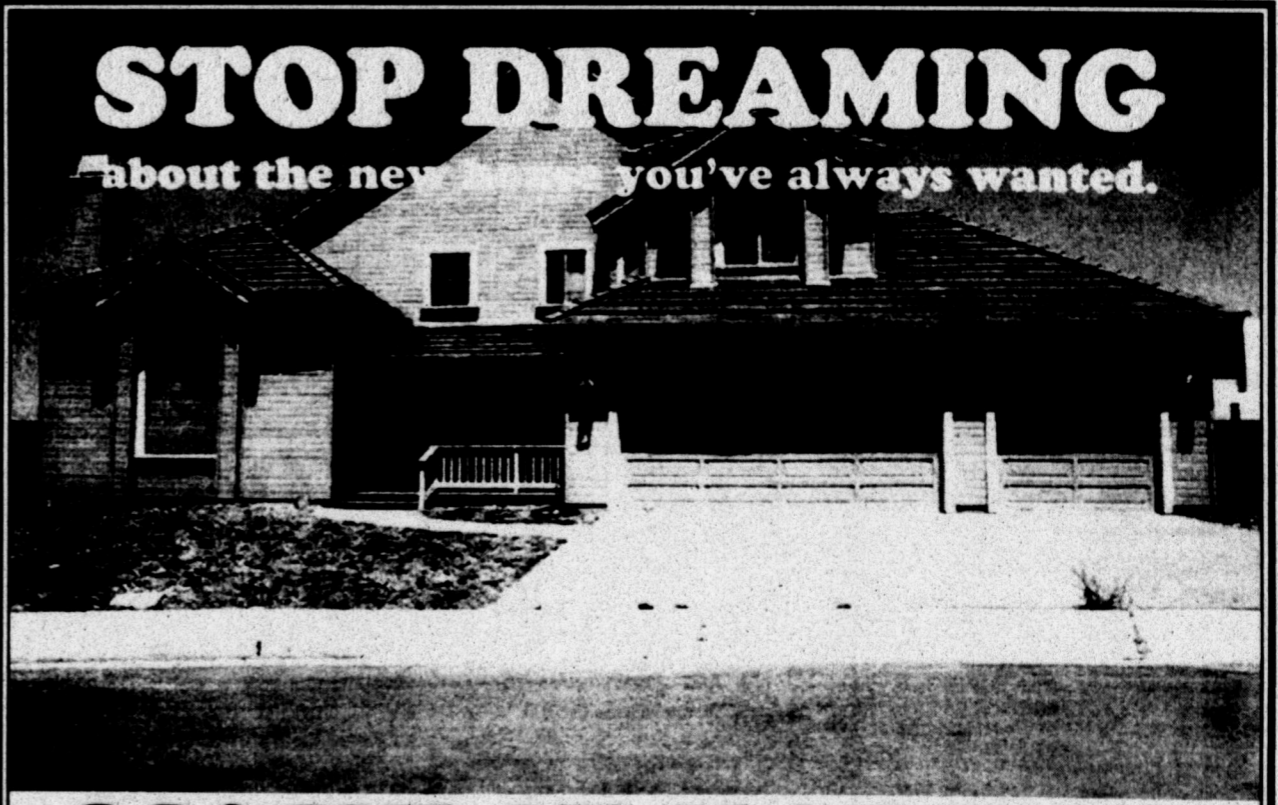

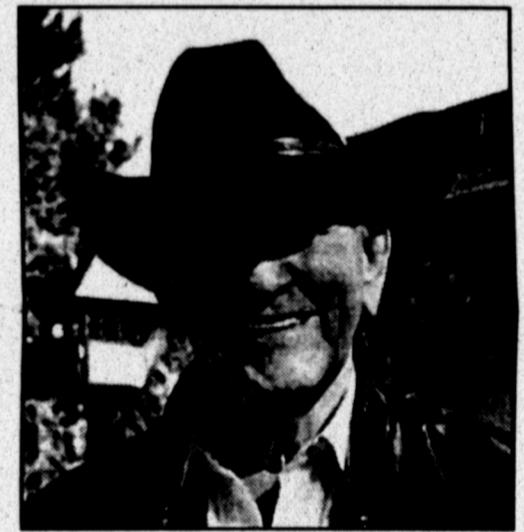

After a closed session, the board approved a motion by Weldon King, seconded by Willie McCauley, to request of Edwin Bills that a different spokesman be appointed for the

former fire fighters.

The board also heard from Steve Smith of the Texas Dept. of Transportation who reported that the state will be building a turn lane into and out of Howardwick on Highway 70. At this time there is not enough traffic to warrant a caution light being installed. A traffic check will be done when work is completed, and the speed limit will be set for the area then.

Margaret Petit was elected Mayor Pro-tem by a four to one vote.

Mary Johnson reported on the Howardwick Citizens Watch. The first watch was held on May 30 and

31 and June 1 to see how many cars came into Howardwick after 11 p.m. The second watch was held on June 6, 7, and 8 to see how many cars left Howardwick. The next watch will be to check on property, etc. If you are interested in helping, please contact Mary Johnson at 874-2292.

The board voted to get at least three bids to make repairs to city hall.

The board also accepted the resignation of Alderman Willie McCauley who is moving to Amarillo. Mayor Dishong presented Willie with a plaque for her seven years of service to the city.
