





"estimated" taxes are based on the new value and last year's tax rates. Taxing units generally set final 1997 rates in August or September; actual taxes due will not be known until that time.

Property owners are asked to look carefully at

that there are no mistakes. If the notice contains an old address, property owners should let the appraisal district know

The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time only, and tax bills do not go out until October. A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address and is not excused from paying additional penalties and interest on a tax bill not received because of an incorrect address.

Property owners are encouraged to contact the appraisal district with any questions. Property owners who did not receive notices but want information about 1997 values may call the appraisal district at (806) 874-2744. The deadline for filing a







Fletcher home to be featured on 'Tour'

The Donley County Senior Citizens is proud to sponsor the second annual "Tour of Homes" to be held on Saturday, June 21, 1997. This event will both benefit the nutrition program and give the public a wonderful opportunity to view five beautiful homes. The tour includes the homes of Gayla and Phil Fletcher, Kay and James Hayes, Audra and Jack Hall, Dee Ann and Weldon Sears, and Phyllis and Douglas Shelton.

This week's featured home is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Fletcher. The Clarendon College and University Training School owned the land where the house is now located, but no house or buildings were built upon it at that time. The college sold the land to Clarendon Independent School District in 1927.

Dr. J.W. Evans purchased the land on February 1, 1930, for the sum of \$1,020.00 with the intent of building a home for himself and his wife, Ella Ross Evans. Dr. and Mrs. Evans employed an architect and contractor from Gainsville, Texas, to complete their new home in the English Tudor Style. Through Dr. Evans died January 3, 1957, Mrs. Evans continued to won the home until her death on March 1, 1960

Joe H. McMurtry, who followed his brothers to the Panhandle of Texas from Archer County, and his wife, Archer Van Eaton McMurtry, purchased the home from the Evans Estate. They were traditional ranchers who lived and loved the cowboy ways, but they wanted a home in town for a life more cordial and entertaining.

Mrs. McMurtry especially loved her yard and gardens. Her flower beds were the talk of the town, brimming with African irises, daisies, larkspur, geraniums, roses, and many more wild flower blooms. Native rock as well as large pieces of petrified wood were hauled from the ranch to enhance the gardens.

Her interest not only lay in the outside; she was interested in the interior design of her home, making it a special place for her and Joe. In 1962, she enlarged the kitchen to make a butler's pantry to add more counter space and storage. She filled the house with beautiful and rare antiques, which she sorely missed when she became too ill to stay there any longer. The house was kept just as she and Joe left it, through he passed away in 1983, and she passed on also leaving the house in her estate

In 1992, Phil and Gayla Fletcher had the special opportunity to purchase the house. Their longing to have an old house in which to display their antiques finally

Though the Fletcher family changes and grows, some leaving, others coming back, the old house just keeps evolving into what they want it to be a house full of love, laughter, and memories.

The Bronco tracksters consisted of seniors Roy Williams, Dean Stanzione, and James Hoggatt; juniors Brent Gaines, Jason Archuleta, and Josh Allred; and sophomore Blake Bass. Coach Darrell Cash was the head track coach.

The Broncos competed at the Highland Park meet, the Panhandle meet, the All-American Classic in Abilene, and the Groom meet. They placed third overall at the District meet in Quanah. Those who qualified to compete at the regional meet were the 4 X 400 relay (Roy Williams, Dean Stanzione, James Hoggatt, Jason Archuleta, and alternate Brent Gaines); Roy Williams competed in the 400 meter dash and the 200 meter dash; and Blake Bass competed in Pole Vault. The 4 X 400 relay placed fifth, Bass placed ninth, and Williams placed first in both of his races, advancing him to his third State Track Meet in Austin. Williams leads the area, as well as the state, in the 400 meter dash with a time of 47.4 sec., and the 200 meter dash with a time of 20.9 sec. At the state meet, Williams won the gold medal in both of his events.

The Lady Bronco Track team consisted of juniors Clarissa Smith, Mandy Weatherton, Kathy Bryley, and Kasi Ashcraft; sophomores Kim Alexander and Stephanie Smith; and freshman Tonya Wilson. The coaches were Steve Schmidt and Katie Vanzee.

The girls competed in the Highland Park meet, the Panhandle meet, the Paducah meet, the All-American Classic in Abilene, the Hart meet, and the Amarillo Relays. The Lady Broncos placed second overall at the District meet in Quanah. Qualifying for the regional meet were the 4 X 100, 4 X 200 and 4 X 400 relays, Kasi Ashcraft in the 400 meters, the Shot Put, and the Discus; Clarissa Smith in the triple jump; and Kathy Bryley in the 200 meter dash. At the Regional meet the girls placed third overall, advancing the 4 X 100 relay, which holds the fastest time in all classifications of the Panhandle area, to the State Track Meet in Austin.

All members of the Lady Bronco Track team will return next year.



young business professionals.




