Hall selected to be new county judge

Jack Hall was sworn in to become Donley County's new judge at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, April 30, 1997.

County Commissioners selected Hall from among eight applicants when the court met in a called session last Thursday morning, April 24.

Commissioner C.W. Cornell made the motion to hire Hall, seconded by Randy White. The vote was two to two. Commissioners William Chamberlain and Ronnie Hill voted against. Judge W.R. Christal broke the tie by voting in Hall's favor.

Hall, who is a retired coach and teacher from Clarendon Junior High, told the court he wanted to be judge because he saw it as a way to serve the community.

The new judge will serve until the next General Election in November 1998. Since the position has been filled by an appointment, whoever is elected at that time will be sworn into office as soon as the election is over, rather than waiting until January 1999.

Hall replaces Judge Christal who retired after nearly three decades of service to Donley County.

Others applying for the job were Robert McCombs, Clyde Price, Raymond Burch, Lucinda Myers-Long, Deborah Howard, Jimmie Cockerham, and Eugene Granger.

St. Mary's Catholic Church dedicates historical marker

A formal ceremony was held here Sunday to dedicate a new historical marker at St. Mary's Catholic Church.

St. Mary's pastor Fr. Ted Podson gave the welcome, and Bishop Emeritus Leroy T. Matthiesen of the Catholic Diocese of Amarillo read a history of the Clarendon church, which celebrated its centennial in 1992.

Special honorees at the ceremony were Sister Nellie Rooney and former local pastor Msgr. Richard Vaughan. Bud and Pearl Hermesmeyer were recognized as being 50-year parishioners.

Francis Dorsey of Lelia Lake was also recognized by Zell R. SoRelle, president of the Donley County Historical Commission, for her work in compiling the history of St. Mary's.

Founded in 1892, St. Mary's is the oldest

Catholic Church in the Texas Panhandle and is the third oldest in Clarendon behind the Methodist and Episcopal churches.

The church building at the corner of Montgomery and McClelland streets is still that which was built in 1892 to serve German and Irish immigrants who had moved to the area with the coming of the railroad.

In 1899, a school was built on the block west of the church. St. Mary's Academy was run by the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word from San Antonio and was a day coed and girls boarding school. It was forced to close in 1911 because of a typhoid epidemic.

The nuns moved to Amarillo and reopened the St. Mary's Academy there.

The school building was torn down and sold

for lumber in 1918.

The population of the church dwindled after the railroad roundhouse moved to Childress, and the church building fell into disrepair. The bell tower atop the church was blown off, and the gothic windows were replaced with rectangular ones.

In 1949, Bishop Gerken named Fr. Richard Vaughan to restore the church. The work was completed in 1951, and Bishop Fitzsimon dedicated the church as the Shrine of Our Lady of the Panhandle.

Several pastors have served the church since that time, and presently the St. Mary's is being served by Fr. Ted Podson. The parish is reportedly growing steadily again.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular meeting on Tuesday, April 22, 1997, at 7 p.m. in the Board Room of City Hall.

Mayor Pro-tem James Kuhn presided in the absence of Mayor Steve Smith.

The aldermen discussed the need to repair flood structures south of

Clarendon. Shawn Barker moved, seconded by Kyle Hill, to fix these structures as soon as possible.

The board accepted a low bid from Denman Building Products of Amarillo to replace the ceiling tiles in City Hall.

A bid was also accepted from Larry Hicks to paint cabinets inside City Hall.

Regents meet to discuss reassignments

The Clarendon College Board of Regents met last Friday, April 25, in called session in the VIP Room of the Bairfield Activity Center.

The board directed CC president Scott Elliott to reassign Dr. Janie Noble, Linda Vaughan, and Frank Amon at his discretion. The board stipulated that the three's new duties would not include purchasing authorization.

Noble, Vaughan, and Amon were indicted by a district grand jury recently on misdemeanor charges related to the purchase by Clarendon College of several computers from Amon's business, Computer Solutions, last fall.

Noble, CC's Executive Dean, and Vaughan, the school's business manager, allegedly violated state bid statutes while Amon, who is Noble's husband, is charged with abuse of official capacity.

Regents further directed Dr. Elliott to fill any vacancies created by any reassignments.

Breast Cancer Screening Clinic set for May 16

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Clarendon Medical Center Nursing at Home, Hwy. 70 North in Clarendon on May 16, 1997.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, and mammogram and performing a breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a registered nurse. The total cost is \$75. A minimum of fifteen women needs to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointment only. 25 Years Ago in THE LEADER

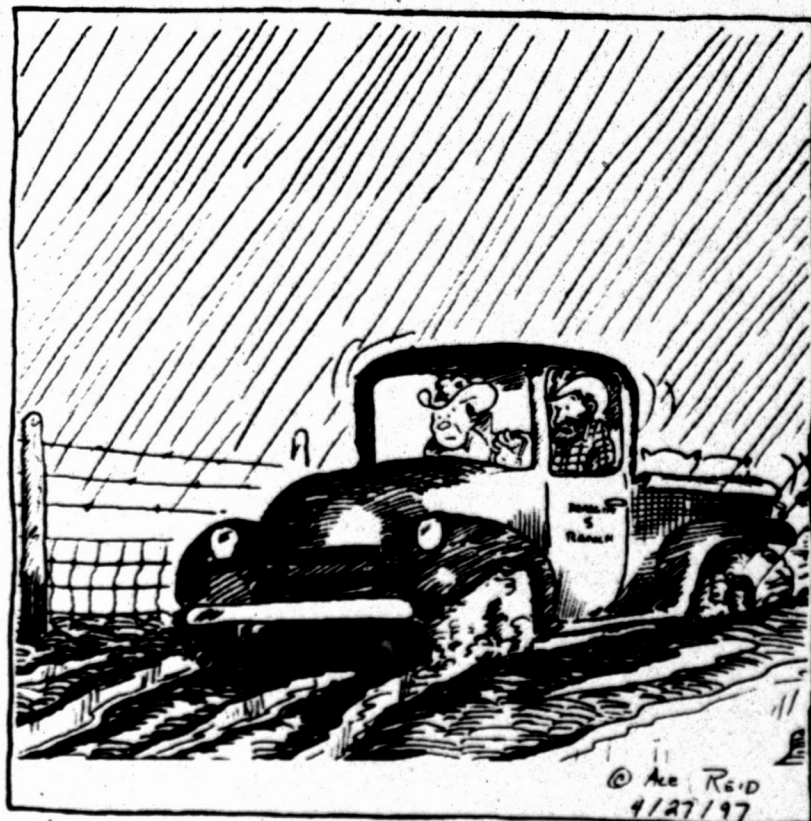

Does a Mockingbird mock? This

is only one of numerous questions interestingly answered in *Adventures with a Texas Naturalist* by Roy Bedichek. Beautiful photos and fascinating information concerning the golden eagle, folk-naming of birds and flowers, and other topics will appeal to Texas nature lovers.

It isn't difficult to find various writings about Charles Goodnight. One very rare writing is Laura V. Hamner's *The No-Gun Man of Texas*. The fragility of this 1935 adoption

does not allow this book to be checked out, but can easily be enjoyed in the library by adults.

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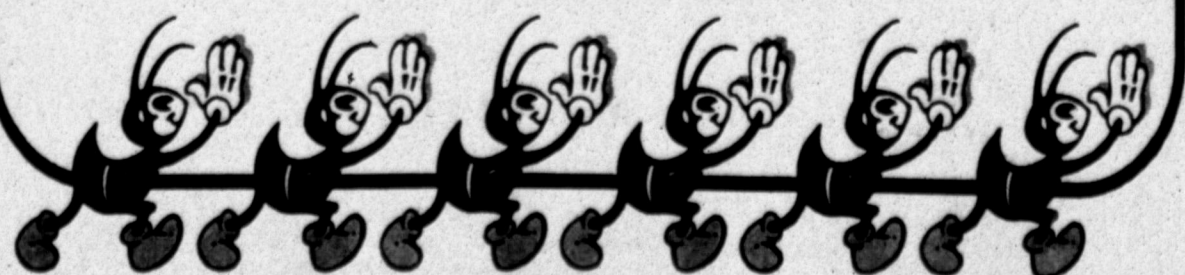

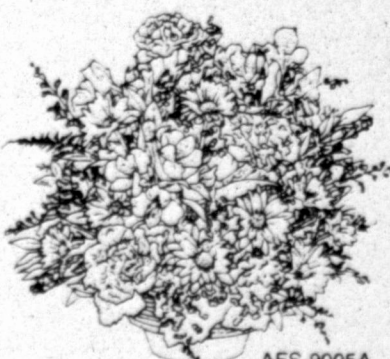

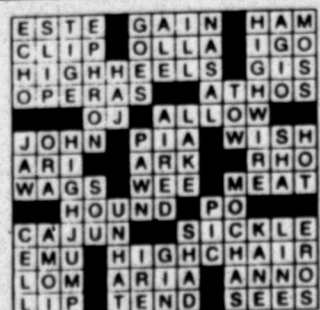

Williams breaks two records at regional track meet

TCU-bound Roy Williams shattered two records at the Region I Track Meet en route to his dream of pursuing a state championship May 9-10 in Austin at the State Track Meet.

Williams ran a 21.42 in the 200M, breaking the 21.44 run by Wellington's Jason Mathis last year.

The senior runner broke his own meet record set last year by blazing to a 48.02 and a gold medal. Williams ran a 48.27 last year in capturing the 400M championship.

"He's just real focused," head track coach Darryl Cash said. "He ran real well under terrible conditions. He's so focused on winning state this year; he's still working so hard."

"He'll probably go into state ranked first in the 400M and one of the top runners in the 200M. He's far from satisfied right now. He's worked hard

to earn his chance."

Cash had predicted a tough battle in the mile relay, and the Broncos got it. In the Friday night preliminary, Clarendon ran a 3:34 - three seconds slower than their best time but good enough to work their way into Saturday's finals.

The team was comprised of James Hoggatt, Jason Archuleta, Dean Stanzione, and Williams. Williams ran a :47 on the last leg, and Hoggatt ran a :52 out of the blocks. "Hoggatt ran well both days," Cash said.

Cash changed up the line-up for Saturday, switching Stanzione to the second leg to take advantage of his speed around the curve. The second leg of the relay collapses around the curve and moves to the inside lane.

"We thought we could move up a position on

that and cut somebody off," Cash said. "(Stanzione) ran a pretty good leg."

Junior Brent Gaines ran for Archuleta in the finals and handed off to Williams. The team ran a 3:36.2. Stamford won in 3:25.8.

"They competed hard. Fifth place out of that region was pretty good. Probably the state champion will come out of this region."

The only other regional qualifier was sophomore Blake Bass in the pole vault. Bass jumped 11 feet. His event was postponed until Sunday afternoon because of adverse weather conditions.

"The weather wasn't much better (on Sunday)," Cash said. "It was cold and windy. (Bass) jumped a foot higher than the last time we were in Abilene. He is capable of going higher. He'll be back next year and be in contention."

Lady Broncos finish third at regional meet in Abilene

Clarendon's Lady Broncos finished one point out of second place in last week's Region I Track Meet and is sending its 400M relay team to next week's elite state meet in Austin.

Clarissa Smith's third place finish in the triple jump Sunday afternoon pushed Clarendon out of a third place tie with Panhandle into sole possession of third with 45 points. Iraan finished with 46 points. Canadian repeated as Region I champions.

The triple jump was postponed until Sunday because of adverse weather conditions, head girls track coach Steve Schmidt said.

The junior Smith, who will be making her third consecutive trip to state in a variety of events, increased her best jump in the triple jump by two feet, finishing with a jump of 35-6.

"It was really a great day for her," Schmidt said. "She almost got second. Her determination was a big part of her (jumping so well). We also increased the length of her take-off from about 85 feet to 110 feet, so she was able to get more of her speed up and able to carry her jump out further."

The team of Smith, Mandy Weatherston, Kim Alexander, and Kathy Bryley turned in a blistering

50.46 for first place in the sprint relay. They ran a 50.17 in the qualifying heat on Friday.

"We feel like we can dip into the .49s," Schmidt said. "If we can do that, we have a good shot to win (state). We were struggling because of the horrible weather and the sicknesses. They did a good job coming through in that relay."

Weatherston battled flu-like symptoms all weekend, and Alexander's asthma flared up Friday and Saturday, Schmidt said.

The mile-relay team of Smith, Weatherston, Alexander, and Kasi Ashcraft just missed out on a return trip to the state meet, finishing third in 4:13.84. "With (Weatherston) and (Alexander) so sick I told the relay that they didn't have to run if they didn't want to," Schmidt said. "We were just too weak. Still, finishing third in regionals and medaling, it's hard to be real disappointed. It still hurts knowing we have the top time in the Panhandle (4:04)."

Bryley finished third in the 200M with a time of 26.79. Amy Odhams of Memphis edged Bryley with a time of 26.69. "It was a real close finish," Schmidt said. "I was proud of her for

the year she had in the 200M. She was disappointed she didn't make it to state."

Ashcraft placed sixth in the shot put with a throw of 33-2. She also competed in the discus but didn't place.

The Lady Broncos were disqualified in the 800M relay - their strongest event - during the Friday night preliminaries after dropping a baton on the exchange. They still managed to run a 1:50 and would have easily qualified.

"We were out in front and probably could have been real careful on hand-offs and still won easily, but we didn't play it conservatively. They wanted to go hard and go for the best and obtain records."

The baton rolled out of the lane, and Clarendon went across two lanes to get the baton and finished the race.

"The meet director made the final call. We didn't obstruct anyone else's running, but there wasn't much we could do. Luckily, we have another chance next year to come back and stay healthy."

Clarendon had the fastest time in the Panhandle with a 1:45.02. It was hard to watch a team (Panhandle) with a 1:48 win the event in the finals."

"We haven't had a dropped baton in two years, and it happened at a bad time," Schmidt said. "It happens to everybody."

The state meet will be held May 9 and 10 in Austin.

"Probably 90 percent of the schools in Texas would be really happy about getting any event into state, so that shows the level our track team is at right now. We have a good chance to place, and we're disappointed we didn't have even more."

Abdullah headed to state tennis tournament

It took three sets in the final round of the Region I Tennis Tournament for junior Kareem Abdullah to secure a consecutive trip to the state level of competition next week in Austin.

Pairings for the eight-person tournament have not been set as of press time. Abdullah advanced to the state semifinals before bowing out last year.

Abdullah and sophomore Caleb Ashley of Canadian - a pair of unbeaten - split the first two sets in the April 24 finals in Abilene. Abdullah first won 6-4, but then lost 1-6 as the two battled 30 mph wind gusts.

"(Abdullah) went to a different racket, and he has more control with that, and it made such a difference," head tennis coach Wade Wilson said. "The kid hit the flat ball that's real hard and flat, and (Abdullah's) game is more of a slice game."

With the wind, the ball wasn't doing what it was supposed to do."

"He's such an athlete he overcame that."

Abdullah came back in the third set, winning 6-3. "He assured me between sets that he was going to win the (third) set," Wilson said.

The junior struggled in the semifinal round against number-four seed Casey Snelson of Eldorado. Snelson constantly charged the net, but Abdullah escaped with a 6-4, 6-4, win to advance to the finals.

Snelson eventually beat Ashley in the playback (7-5, 6-4) for the second seed and a trip to the state tourney.

Jake Reid of Stanton was much easier to control as Abdullah put him away, 6-1, 6-2, in the quarterfinals. Lupe De La Fuente of Hart lost in the opening round, 6-0, 6-0, to the top-seeded Abdullah.
