Grand Jury indicts three CC employees on misdemeanors

A district court grand jury returned indictments against three Clarendon College officials here last Friday, April 18, 1997.

According to records in the Donley County Clerk's Office, CC Executive Dean Janie Noble, electronics and technology instructor Frank Amon, and business manager Linda Vaughan were all indicted on misdemeanor charges in relation to the purchase of several computers last fall.

The decisions were sealed until the three could be served Monday afternoon.

Noble and Vaughan were charged with Class B misdemeanors, violation of bid statute. Amon was charged with a Class A misdemeanor, abuse of official capacity.

Arrest warrants were issued and were served Monday afternoon. County Judge W.R. Christal set bail at \$1,500 for Noble and Vaughan and at \$2,000 for Amon. They were released on their own recognizance.

All three filed waivers of arraignment in County Court and entered pleas of 'not guilty.'

County Attorney Stuart Messer said that a Class B misdemeanor carries a maximum penalty of six months in jail and a \$2,000 fine and that a Class A misdemeanor carries a maximum penalty of one year in jail and a fine. Punishment, he said, would have to be determined by a jury.

As to why Amon was charged with a Class A misdemeanor while Noble and Vaughan were charged with Class B misdemeanors, Messer

said only that that was the decision of the grand jury.

The case will now go through pre-trial steps, Messer said. He did not know when a trial date would be set.

The charges, which are now in County Court, stem from a computer purchase in October of last year wherein Clarendon College purchased several computers from Computer Solutions, valued in excess of \$25,000, without employing a bidding process.

Computer Solutions was owned by Frank Amon, husband of Dr. Janie Noble.

CC Board of Regents chairman Dr. R.L. Gilkey had no official comment Tuesday morning but did say there will be a called meeting of the board this Friday at 10:30 a.m. in the Bairfield Activity Center.

Local attorney Jerry Courtney, who is representing Amon, Noble, and Vaughan, said they were disappointed and baffled by the indictments issued by the grand jury. He said the decisions were especially baffling considering that individuals who were similarly accused were not indicted.

Courtney also could not explain why Amon was charged with the more serious charge of "abuse of official capacity" when college records show that his client wasn't hired to his position until January 2, 1997.

"The grand jury's decision makes no logical sense," Courtney said. "It appears some community nay-sayers had to have some sacrificial lambs served up."

Cold temperatures cause damage to wheat crop

The recent Canadian airmass that covered our area a couple of weeks ago caused some damage to Donley County Crops.

Luckily the damage was not as great as first expected. Early estimates put the loss at around 60% for rye and 10 - 15% for wheat.

The rye crop was hurt the worst, due to the stage of growth the rye was in when the cold weather hit. Rye was in the heading and flowering stage, the least tolerant stage of growth for cold weather. The most freeze sensitive part of the small grain plant is the anthers or pollen sacs.

Although many of the top leaves of the wheat or rye may look damaged, this is not the most im-

portant sign to look for in determining the extent of damage. The stems and the developing head are most important in determining damage. The stems will be weak at about 3 to 4 inches above the ground level. This weakness will cause the plant to fall over or lodge if the freeze damage is severe enough. It will also not allow moisture and nutrients to be taken up by the plant.

The main point to look for is the condition of the developing head. Frozen tissue in wheat is difficult to recognize for approximately 7 days after the freeze. Early symptoms look water soaked, followed by a brown, mushy appearance.

As tissue has time to dry, frozen wheat tissue becomes white. If the head is killed in early growth stage, growth of that tiller ceases, whereas younger

tiller stops as developed may continue to grow. The tiller stops growing because the growing point follows the head right up the stem. Once that growing point is killed, growth stops. The oldest heads are usually damaged most and also contribute more to yield than young tillers which may survive the freeze.

Our current warm weather should allow the degradation of the tissue to occur. We should be able now to determine the extent of the damage.

Broncos headed for regional track competition in Abilene

Senior Roy Williams ran his fastest 400M of the year Saturday during the Clyde Regional Qualifier's meet and cruised to first place.

Williams ran a 47.45 and is the top 400M man heading into Friday and Saturday's Region I Track Meet at Elmer Gray Stadium on the Abilene Christian University Campus.

Running prelims begin at 4 p.m. Friday with finals slated to begin at 2 p.m. Saturday. Sophomore Blake Bass' pole vault competition will be at 11 a.m. Saturday.

"(Williams) just ran well," head coach Darryl Cash said. "We finally got some decent weather, and he still hasn't been pushed. I think he can do better."

Dean Stanzione placed fourth in the 400M with a 55.62, and Jason Archuleta ran to a fifth place finish with a 56.28.

"We had (Stanzione and Archuleta) run just to get some practice for the 1600M relay," Cash said.

Williams continued his winning streak with a first place finish in the 200M and a time of 21.78. "He was pushed a little on that," Cash said. "He didn't feel like he ran particularly well."

James Hoggatt - the fourth runner on the relay - ran the 200M and was fifth overall with a 24.5.

Clarendon's 1600M relay team placed second with a 3:31.3 - four seconds faster than they ran during their District 2-2A winning time.

"We were running against some good 3A schools," Cash said. "We still think we can go under 3:30 to 3:27. It's going to be a dogfight. There are three or four teams who can run a 3:26."

"It will be hard to get to state. There's just some good teams in our region; it's pretty loaded."

Bass surpassed his season-best on the pole vault with an 11-6 - his best in a meet. "We're hoping he can go 12-6, 13 at regional."

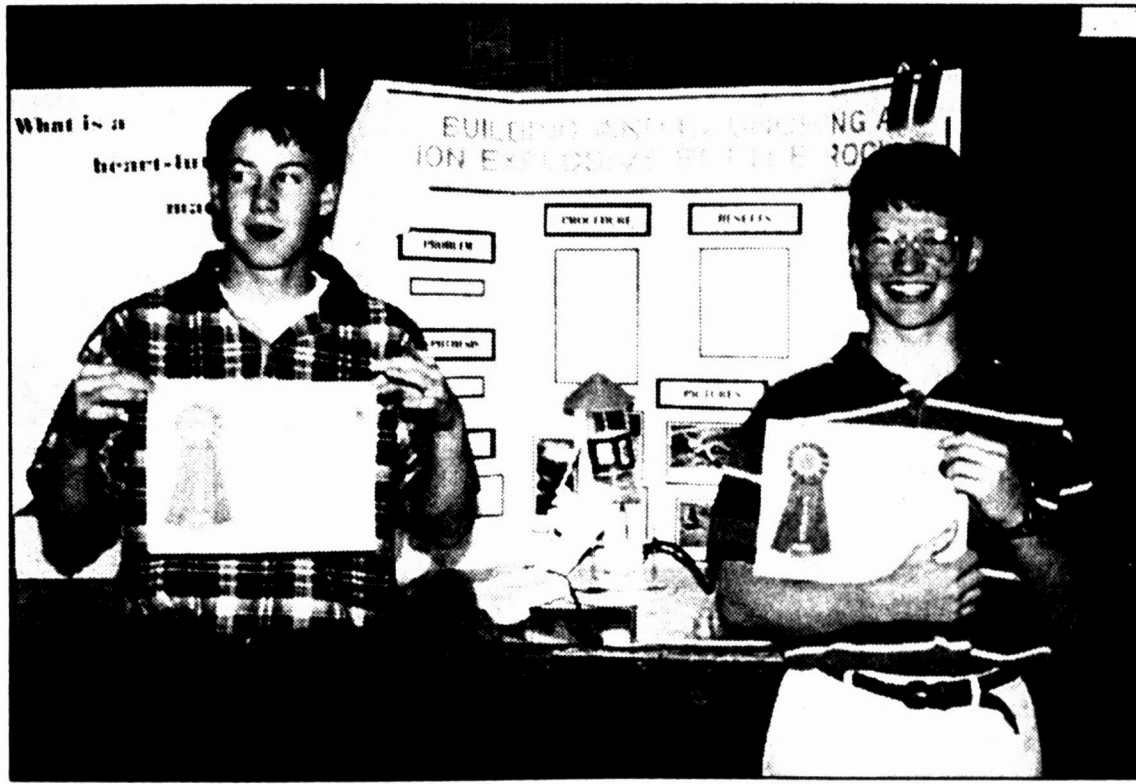
The top two finishers will advance to the state meet in Austin in two weeks.

This marks the third consecutive year the Trustees have warned the system is going broke. Unless Congress and the President reach agreement on the issue, it will also be the third year nothing is done to prevent it.

Congress passed a plan to save Medicare from bankruptcy 18 months ago. Although this plan was vetoed by the President, I believe it contains

four basic elements that should be in any plan.

First, spending on beneficiaries will continue to increase - Medicare benefits will not be cut. Second, the plan will clamp down on fraud and abuse. Third, seniors will be given the option of choosing between Medicare or the health care plan which suits their needs the best. Fourth and most importantly, the plan will save Medicare from bankruptcy.

Thirty seven million Americans currently rely on Medicare for their health care. If Washington can't get together to help this many people, then our country's in more trouble than any of us ever thought.

Elementary students participate in UIL Spring Literary Meet

Clarendon Elementary students participated in the 1996-1997 University Interscholastic League Spring Literary Meet on March 18th and March 21st. The meet was split between sites with all of the Number Sense, Writing Events, Dictionary Skills and Maps, Graphs, and Charts contests being held at the Clarendon Elementary Campus. The Speaking, Music Memory, Art Smart, Listening Skills and Spelling contests were held in Memphis at the High School and Travis Elementary campuses. Clarendon Elementary students from Second through Fifth grades placed Second in the Clarendon second, Wellington third, White Deer fourth, Quannah fifth, Memphis sixth, and Skellytown seventh.

Elementary Principal Mike Word stated, the students from Clarendon Elementary represented the school extremely well and were respectful in their behavior throughout the meet. It is very important to us that our students represent our school and community in a respectful manner, and they certainly did at the Spring Meet. There are eighteen events in which the students have the opportunity to participate.

Second Grade Creative Writing is an event designed to promote creativity in an academic format and to encourage writing skills at an early grade level. The students' stories are evaluated as to relative excellence in creativity (60%), organization (30%), and grammatical correctness of style (10%). Students who participated in this event were (Photo 1) Regan Lemley, Shelby Watson, Jeremy Jeffers, and alternate Clint Watson. Shelby Watson placed 1st, and Jeremy Jeffers placed 2nd.

The 3rd Grade, 4th Grade, and 5th Grade Ready Writing contest is a written composition contest. Contestants are given a choice between two prompts. Each prompt defines the audience and provides the purpose for writing. Various writing strategies may be stated or implied in the prompt. The composition is judged on interest (50%), organization (35%), and correctness of style (15%). Students who participated on the 3rd Grade Ready Writing Team (#16) were Madison Gandy, Kristin White, Kristin McAfee, and alternate Chelsea Koenig. Kristin McAfee placed 5th. Students who participated on the 4th Grade Ready Writing Team were (#6) Andra Helms, Cierra Benavidez, Stephanie Fowler, and alternate Grady Swearingen. Stephanie Fowler placed 6th. The 4th Grade and 5th Grade Number Sense contest is a ten-minute test of mental mathematics covering basic arithmetic and mathematical functions. Contestants must perform mathematical tasks without doing pencil and paper computations and write their answers on blanks provided on an answer sheet. Students who participated on the 4th Grade Number Sense Team (#4) were Shanna Shelton, Jamie Simmons, Kari Steen, and alternate Ryan Carroll. Jamie Simmons placed 5th. The 5th Grade Dictionary Skills is a contest designed to emphasize and develop dictionary skills. Each test consists of approximately 40 objective and short answer questions. 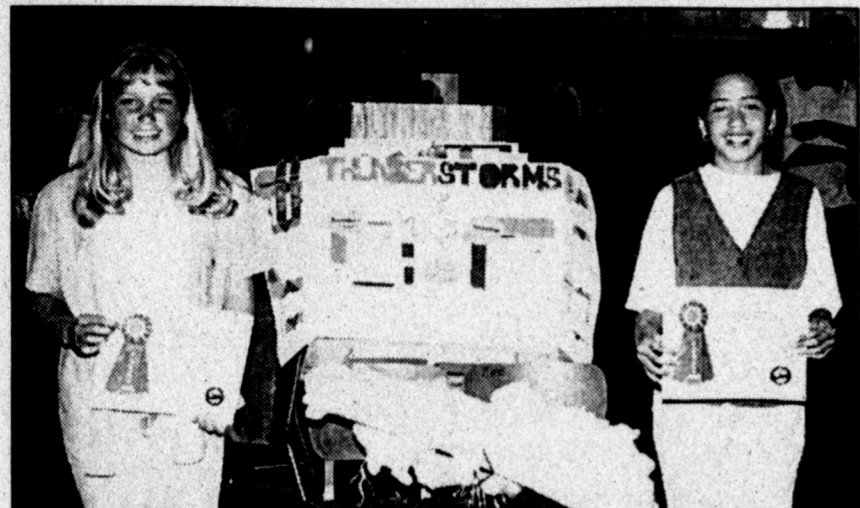

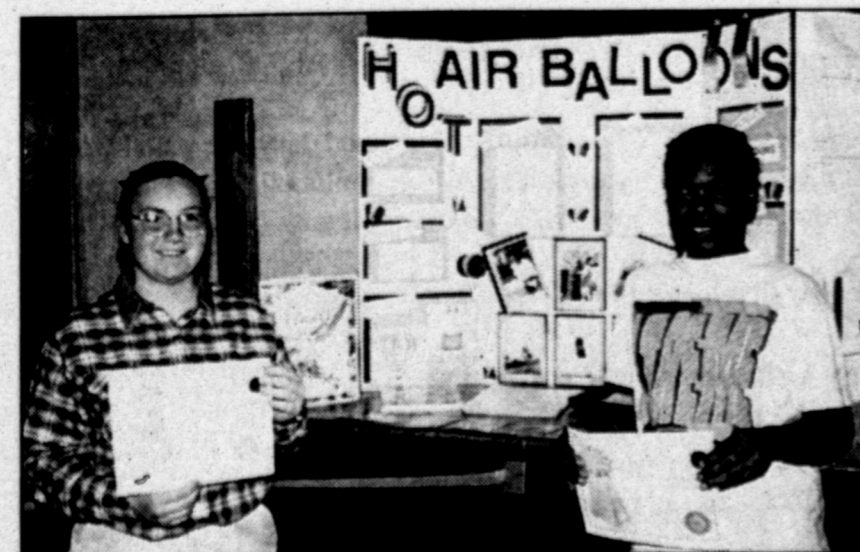

"I think all the relays stand real good chances," Schmidt said. "We just want to make sure we qualify to get into the finals on Friday, and then it will be tough on Saturday."

"But the girls have been focused all year."

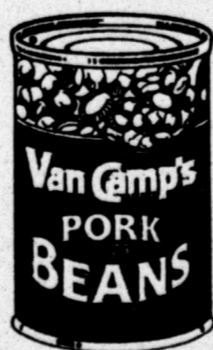
