## Enterprise brings home press awards

The Clarendon Enterprise walked away with five awards and an honorable mention in the Panhandle Press Association's 1997 Better Newspaper Contest this weekend.

The awards presentation Saturday morning was the highlight of the PPA's 87th annual convention held in Amarillo.

The Enterprise received first place plaques for Best News Writing (by Roger Estlack), Best Feature Stories (by Valerie Avery), and Best Serious Column, ("Off Campus" by Scott Elliott).

The paper also took home a second place plaque for Editorials, a third place award for Front Page Layout, and an honorable mention for Sports Writing.

"We're pretty excited," said Enterprise publisher Roger Estlack. "It's been many years since a Clarendon newspaper brought home any press awards, and we're glad that's changed."

"Several folks at the convention said our awards were particularly impressive since this was our first full year of publication."

Judges from the East Texas Press Association commented that first paragraphs of Enterprise news stories "do a good job of explaining issues while sparking reader interest" and called the writing style "concise and polished."

Estlack directs those praises to the proof reader, Helen Estlack.

Judges also praised Avery's story of Dr. R.L. Gilkey's retirement saying she did a "good job of presenting the human side of a medical doctor" and spoke of Dr. Elliott's column by lamenting how the newspaper industry lost such a great columnist to academics.

Clarendon's paper narrowly missed grabbing the coveted General Excellence Award. The top award went to the Floyd County Hesperian-Beacon, which had four first place plaques.

The Panhandle Press Association is made up of about 50 newspapers from the Texas Panhandle and South Plains, eastern New Mexico, western Oklahoma, and southwestern Kansas. The Enterprise competed in the contest with 16 other weekly papers.

## Estlack to serve as PPA vice president

Clarendon publisher Roger Estlack was elected vice president of the Panhandle Press Association when the group held its 87th Annual Convention in Amarillo this past weekend.

Estlack has served for one year on the PPA Board of Directors. His new position also puts him on the Board of Directors for the Texas Press Association.

The PPA held its election during a business meeting Friday afternoon. Officers for the coming year will be President Mike Coggins, Moore County News-Press; Vice President Roger Estlack, The Clarendon Enterprise; and Secretary/Treasurer Beki Lightfoot, Amarillo Globe-News. Other members of the association's board of directors are immediate past president Susan Clay, Dalhart Daily Texan; Debra Wells, The (Fritch) Eagle Press; Phil Miller, The Groom News; Wayland Thomas, The Pampa News; Mary Dudley, Perryton Herald; and Doug McDonough, Plainview Daily Herald.

## Clarendon College to rejoin WJCAC

Bulldogs to play more regional teams; Elliott named president of conference

Clarendon College will be returning to the Western Junior College Athletic Conference (WJCAC) next year according to CC President Scott Elliott.

CC rejoins the WJCAC after competing in the National Small College Athletic Association for several years. The WJCAC is a Division I affiliate of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), the leading organization in community college athletics.

The Bulldogs will compete in men's and women's basketball for the 1997-98 season, but has the option of adding additional sports in the future. Other colleges in the conference are also in the process of studying the addition of new sports.

"Rejoining the WJCAC represents a tremendous challenge for our college," Dr. Elliott

said. "We will be the smallest college in the league with by far the smallest budget and even the smallest gym. We'll be competing against colleges that have many times the financial and human resources for recruiting and scholarships as our college."

The Bulldogs will be joining one of the premier conferences in America and will be playing against some of the nation's best community college basketball talent, Elliott said. Moreover, the Bulldogs' conference schedule will have more of a regional flavor against traditional rivals, which will hopefully appeal more to area fans.

Elliott says he believes CC coaches Joe Mondragon and Joel Zehr are up to the challenge of facing more competitive opponents.

The Bulldog coaches are working to recruit

prospective players to play against top-flight competition and to give them the opportunity to showcase their talents before NCAA Division I scouts, who regularly observe WJCAC play.

"I'm excited about Bulldog Gymnasium becoming the Death Valley of the WJCAC again," Elliott said. "I'm told there was a day in the WJCAC years ago when teams just hated to come to Clarendon College and put themselves at risk in our gym and in front of our enthusiastic hometown crowds."

In the history of the WJCAC, a number of NBA greats played in Bulldog Gymnasium - stars like Spud Webb, Larry Kenon, and Larry Johnson.

Elliott said the Bulldogs will undoubtedly

schedule some traditional non-conference foes the first half of the 1997-98 season, such as Southern Nazarene, Redlands, Western Oklahoma, and Seward (Kansas) in preparation for the tough round-robin WJCAC schedule.

CC should be well represented in the WJCAC since Dr. Scott Elliott was elected president of the conference last week at the league's spring meeting in Levelland. Also attending to represent Clarendon College was Athletic Director and Men's Basketball Coach Joe Mondragon.

Elliott inherits the WJCAC reins from Dr. Harry Krenk, President of Western Texas College, who served for the 1995-96 school year.

"I am gratified that our college will have some influence in the operation of the conference," Elliott said.

workers digging through celebrity tax returns for fun, but now the General Accounting Office has found more than 1,500 IRS employees have been investigated for snooping and that the IRS can't even find more than 6,400 data tapes containing peoples' tax information," he said.

"Government workers have no business browsing through the private lives of people who work hard and pay not only taxes, but the salaries of the people who work at the IRS," Gramm said.

The legislation protects citizens from file snooping by making the abuse a federal misdemeanor carrying a \$1,000 fine and up to one year in jail. The proposal also requires the IRS to notify any taxpayer whose tax records are accessed improperly.

Gramm said that the bill also will require the IRS to demonstrate reason-

able cause for starting an audit and specifically prohibits random audits.

"Right now, it's legally simpler for an IRS accountant to summon a taxpayer for interrogation than it is for a police officer to search a twice-convicted felon," he noted. "The Supreme Court has taken exquisite care to assure that the most vicious criminal is regarded as innocent until proven otherwise, but when it comes to the IRS, the burden is on the taxpayer to prove to a powerful, skeptical bureaucrat that he's not guilty."

"No other federal workers have more power over the lives of individual Americans than the people at the IRS," Gramm said. "They can invade your privacy, freeze your bank account, and wreck your business. That kind of power should be exercised with extreme care, and events demonstrate that it is time to rein in the IRS."

**Donley SWCD to observe Soil & Water Stewardship**

The Donley Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) has announced they will join in the national observance of Soil and Water Stewardship Week to take place on April 27 through May 4, 1997, according to an announcement by Dick H. Bode, chairman of the district.

The theme of this year's observance is "Backyard Stewardship." This focus is especially appropriate as our need for stewardship is vital if we are to maintain the productive capabilities of our basic natural resources of soil and water. 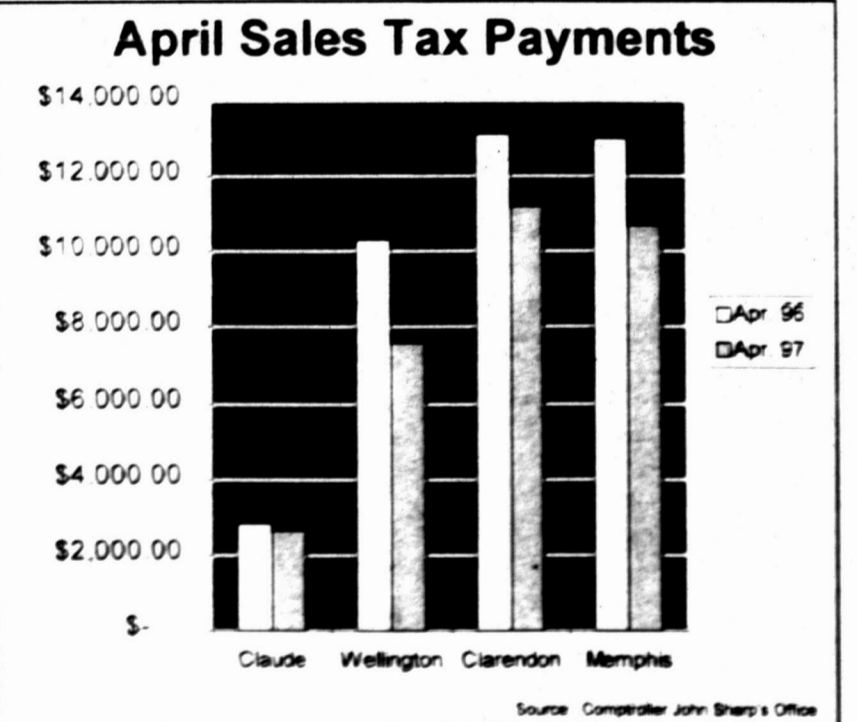

**Clarendon's sales tax rebate slips from last year**

AUSTIN — John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, delivered a total of \$142.5 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,085 Texas cities and 117 counties last week.

"While April sales tax rebates overall were somewhat below those for the same month last year, year-to-date rebates to Texas cities and counties are still up by 4.3 percent over the first four months of 1996, as the state economy continues a slow, steady rate of growth," Sharp said.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

Locally, the City of Clarendon's rebate for this period was down 14.79% over this time last year for a total of \$11,184.57. Hedley dropped 7.15% to \$284.75. And Howardwick fell 55.96% to \$1,386.85.

## County declared disaster area

Donley County was declared a "Disaster Area" by Judge W.R. Christal on April 11, 1997.

The county received torrential and devastating rain, wind, and hail on April 2 causing disastrous damage to the county and causing approximately 23 families to be stranded (except by boat or horseback), the declaration says.

The declaration further notes that bridges were destroyed, roads were washed out, and the storm dealt severe damage to fences, livestock, and early farm work in the northeast and central parts of the county.

Proper procedures are now being pursued to relieve this situation as soon as possible.

Good news for readers who appreciate large print books. Burton Memorial Library has received a new supply containing a large variety of interests.

Light romantic fiction is provided in *Snow In April* and *The Carousel* by best-selling author, Rosamunde Pilcher, as well as Betty Neels' *Hannah* and Belva Plain's *Carousel*. Irish novelist, Maive Binchey, displays her unique style in *Echoes*. *Try To Remember* by Vanessa James keeps the reader enticed as its heroine tries to regain a part of her memory that has been erased in an accident.

Agatha Christie's *Secret Adversary*, *Deadbeat* by Sue Crafton, and a Victoria Holt mystery promise to chill your spine as will *Case of the Terrified Typist* by Perry Mason creator, Erle Stanley Gardner.

Zane Grey fans will find several of his novels in large print, one being *Arizona Ames*. However, you may be especially interested in *The Lassister Luck* authored by his son, Loren Zane Grey.

## "Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch, or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber - not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

### When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1997 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

### Do you need to reappraise annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reappraise unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.
