CC teams playing in national tournament

Lady Bulldogs hold number one seed as NSCAA tourney begins this week

The nation's number one Clarendon College Lady Bulldogs met Mount Senario of Ladysmith, Wis., March 5, at 11:30 a.m. in the first round of the National Small College Athletic Association Tournament in Salina, Kan.

Clarendon must win three games to make it to the championship game Saturday at 6:30 p.m. The last time Clarendon met Mount Senario was in

the semi-finals of the 1995 national tournament where

the Lady Bulldogs were beaten by one point. "They ran a zone, so we've been preparing for zone defenses," head coach Joel Zehr said.

Eight teams will be competing for the national title, including Arkansas Baptist, who Zehr said will be tough

"They're a four-year school and have played some NCAA Division I schools. I think we have a really good chance. We're playing really well. I thought against Redlands (Feb. 24) we played really well. It will take three games of intense basketball to win the championship."

Clarendon played a final tune-up game for the national tournament with a Feb. 24 game at Clarendon College against Redlands College of El Reno, Okla.

The Lady Bulldogs led 31-22 at halftime through great defensive pressure, Zehr said.

Angie Kepley burned up the net with four 3-pointers in the first half.

Clarendon rolled to a 73-53 win after scoring 31 points in the second half.

Young man's dreams become reality

HOUSTON — When he was grow- spring of 1993. ing up on Arizona and New Mexico Indian reservations where his parents worked, young Bernard Harris used to draw little rockets on his homework

After he became Dr. Bernard A. Harris, Jr., he did a lot more with rockets than just draw them. He became an astronaut.

After earning degrees from the University of Houston and the Texas Tech University School of Medicine, completing a Mayo Clinic internalmedicine residency, and becoming an assistant professor of community medicine at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine, Harris served as a mission specialist and medical officer aboard the space shuttle Columbia for Spacelab Mission D-2. Along with six other astronauts, he spent what he calls "10 glorious days in space" in the

While aboard, the astronauts performed more than 90 experiments, including microgravity research in the life sciences, earth and space observation, robotics, and other technolo-

"Because this mission was intended to help prepare for extended space flights, almost half the studies involved the effects of weightlessness and space travel on the human body," Harris said.

Of particular interest to physician Harris was the goal of explaining how the cardiovascular system responds to acute changes in the amount of fluid in the blood vessels before, during, and after a space flight.

"Other studies were conducted specifically for their applications on

earth," Harris said. "For example, we fused two types
