## CC teams playing in national tournament

### Lady Bulldogs hold number one seed as NSCAA tourney begins this week

The Bulldogs' number one Clarendon College Lady Bulldogs met Mount Senario of Ladysmith, Wis., March 5, at 11:30 a.m. in the first round of the National Small College Athletic Association Tournament in Salina, Kan.

Clarendon must win three games to make it to the championship game Saturday at 6:30 p.m.

The last time Clarendon met Mount Senario was in the semi-finals of the 1995 national tournament where the Lady Bulldogs were beaten by one point.

"They ran a zone, so we've been preparing for zone defenses," head coach Joel Zehr said.

Eight teams will be competing for the national title, including Arkansas Baptist, who Zehr said will be tough to beat.

"They're a four-year school and have played some NCAA Division I schools. I think we have a really good chance. We're playing really well. I thought against Redlands (Feb. 24) we played really well. It will take three games of intense basketball to win the champion-

ship."

Clarendon played a final tune-up game for the national tournament with a Feb. 24 game at Clarendon College against Redlands College of El Reno, Okla.

The Lady Bulldogs led 31-22 at halftime through great defensive pressure, Zehr said.

Angie Kepley burned up the net with four 3-pointers in the first half.

Clarendon rolled to a 73-53 win after scoring 31 points in the second half.

"I think offensively we played real well and held them to 31, so that was pretty good defense," Zehr said. "Our post players did a good job of shutting down their posts."

## CC men ranked third as tourney starts

Clarendon closed out their regular season with two consecutive victories over visiting Redlands College and a road contest over Panhandle State University's Junior Varsity before heading for this week's national tournament.

The Bulldogs received a first-round bye in the National Small College Athletic Association's 12-team tournament, which begins Wednesday in Salina, Kan., on the campus of Kansas Wesleyan University.

Clarendon College will face the winner of the Arkansas Baptist-Louisiana Christian contest Thursday night at 8:15 p.m.

Clarendon was sitting in fifth place until moving up to third place in the last week before the seeding. "Some other teams lost, and we kept winning," head coach Joe Mondragon said.

Mondragon's Bulldogs must win three games between Thursday and Saturday to claim the national championship. Defending national champion Mount Senario of Ladysmith, Wis., is the pre-tournament favorite, Mondragon said.

"They have a lot of old kids; six or seven seniors," Mondragon said. "They have lots of kids back from last year's team."

"We feel if we continue to play the way we've been playing the last week and a half, if we step up, we have a good chance of advancing. It all depends on who gets hot."

Clarendon dominated Redlands College Feb. 24 in the Clarendon gym by rolling to a 40-30 halftime advantage before winning, 87-76.

"I thought we've been on a little downhill the last two, three weeks," Mondragon said. "I thought the first half was as good as we've played in a month. Redlands plays nothing but a zone, and that's all we've been seeing, and we've worked against a zone defense."

"We did a great job of running our zone offenses."

Sophomore Jason Kinney ran in eight points while Clarendon product Corey Fields had seven in the opening period.

Kinney knocked in 13 points in the second half, hitting a couple of critical 3-pointers.

Scoring for the Bulldogs were Kinney, 21; Fields, 14; Bryan Shed, 9; Angel Otero, 8; Marlon Green, 8; Kedrick Monson, 7; Wendell Harris, 6; Ryan Ross, 6; Lawrence Bailey, 4; Kimmett Brigham, 2; and Steven Browning, 2.

Panhandle State's J.V. gave Clarendon a chance to play the entire squad Thursday in their last game before the national tournament.

The Bulldogs led 50-34 at halftime before cruising to a 93-82 win. "We played a lot of kids and even called it a practice game," Mondragon said.

"It gave us the chance to play against somebody else and try some different offenses and defenses."

Shed canned 12 points and Fields had 11 in the first half, converting several steals and hitting a couple of 3-pointers.

Antonio Williams nailed eight points in the second half.

Scorers were Fields, 17; Shed, 16; Ross, 13; Williams, 12; Green, 12; Brigham, 5; Browning, 4; Bailey, 4; Otero, 4; Jamie Carter, 3; Monson, 2; and Josh Minkley, 1.

## Aldermen hold regular meeting

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session and held a Public Hearing on Feb. 25, 1997, at 7 p.m. in the Board Room of City Hall.

The board heard from Bob McCombs on the Recycling Center. Baled cardboard is now being picked up on a regular schedule, and he is working on other projects.

Gordon Maddox, CPA, reviewed the audit for 1995-96. The board approved the audit.

A Public Hearing for the closing of the Grant 714189 was conducted by the Mayor. The board approved a motion to accept the completion of the grant.

A Public Hearing for the 1997-98 Grant Application for water and sewer was presented. Alderman Delmar Wiggs moved, with second by Kyle Hill, to apply for the Planning/Capacity Building Fund Grant. Motion carried.

Bids were opened for the computers for sale: Mark Luttrell, \$100; Janice Barbee, \$80; Claude Robinson, \$40; Charlene Mays, \$25; J.L. Everhardt, \$107.30; Roger Finch, \$50; Dennis Petty, \$78. The board approved a motion to accept the top two

bids.

AT&T asked the board to consider changing over to their company for long distance services. The board made no changes.

Clifford Alexander requested more time to clean up parked cars. The board approved allowing him 30 days (from Feb. 25, 1997) to move the cars.

The board heard from Kerri Gandy, the new employee for the Economic Development Board, on how things were progressing.

After an Executive Session, several items were tabled due to lack of a quorum.

## Broncos end season with 22-13 record, bi-district championship

Clarendon ended its post-season play in the area round with a 71-54 loss to Idalou Feb. 25 in Canyon.

The District 2-2A and Bi-District Champion Broncos ended their season 22-13.

Idalou started the game off strong, scoring four points before Clarendon answered with several buckets of their own.

The Wildcats ended the first quarter ahead 11-10. Kareem Abdullah and Brent Gaines made two baskets apiece while Jason Archuleta knocked in a field goal.

"We weren't playing good

defense," Avery said. "We were a little sluggish. We weren't playing our regular game."

Clarendon changed their strategy in the second quarter, and Abdullah and Stanzione made several steals, igniting the Broncos. Clarendon took its first lead at the 2:08 mark off an Abdullah basket and appeared to head into the locker room with a 26-20 lead.

Idalou responded right before half with a field goal to cut the advantage to 26-22.

Abdullah scored three baskets and a free throw while Elliott canned a trey and was 2-for-2 from the charity

stripe.

Stanzione made a basket and senior Scott Bivens was 2-for-2 from the free throw line as Clarendon outscored Idalou, 16-11, for the halftime advantage.

"We had battled back right before half, and that took a lot out of us," Avery said. "I was troubled about our foul situation. (Gaines) had three fouls, and Nathan (Sears), (Stanzione), and (Bivens) all had two fouls."

Idalou had its best quarter, scoring 26 points in the third period-nine points coming from the free throw line as Gaines and Stanzione

fouled out midway through the period. Avery was whistled for a technical as Idalou extended its lead from six to 12 points.

"I wasn't trying to get a technical. (Stanzione) had just fouled out, and (Gaines) had fouled out just before that, and I was trying to talk to (referee) when he t'ed me."

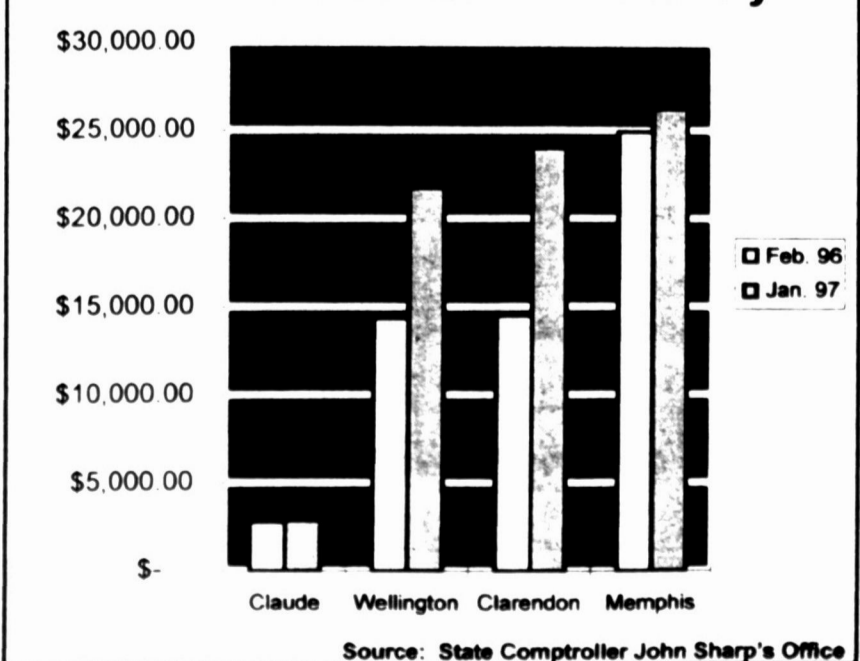
Idalou pushed the lead to 48-34 at the end of the third quarter as Abdullah, Sears, and Stanzione each scored a basket.

Foul trouble would continue to plague the Broncos in the fourth period as Idalou was 15-for-21 from the charity stripe, and Clarendon fouled out two more players - Sears and Elliott.

Abdullah continued to play big in the fourth period, nailing two treys, a basket and going 2-for-2 from the free

## Sales Tax Rebates For February



## Sharp delivers February sales tax rebates

AUSTIN — John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, recently delivered a total of \$260.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,088 Texas cities and 117 counties and noted that the December shopping season was indeed a busy one for many Texas retailers.

February's payments to Texas cities and counties include sales taxes collected by monthly filers at the height of holiday shopping in December and reported to the Comptroller in January, plus quarterly returns for sales in October, November, and December, and all yearly filings for 1996.

The city of Clarendon received a total of \$23,973.17 for the period, a 65.47% increase over the same time last year.

Hedley saw a 33.05% increase in February's payment for a total of \$902.38.

Howardwick's payment dropped 26.61% to \$719.89.

Clarendon was whistled for 32 fouls while Idalou was hit with 17. The Broncos were 12-for-23 from the charity stripe while Idalou was 29-for-47.

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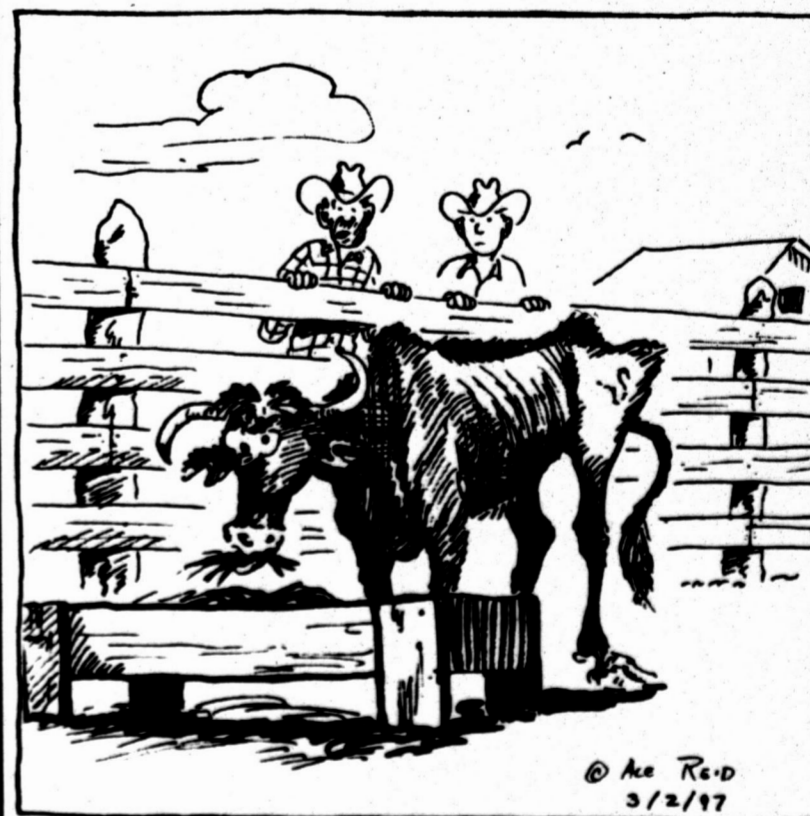

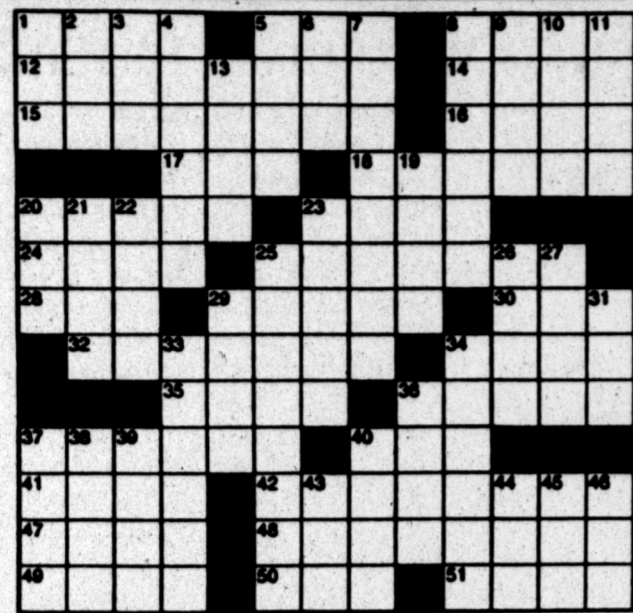

Young man's dreams become reality

HOUSTON — When he was growing up on Arizona and New Mexico Indian reservations where his parents worked, young Bernard Harris used to draw little rockets on his homework papers.

After he became Dr. Bernard A. Harris, Jr., he did a lot more with rockets than just draw them. He became an astronaut.

After earning degrees from the University of Houston and the Texas Tech University School of Medicine, completing a Mayo Clinic internal-medicine residency, and becoming an assistant professor of community medicine at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine, Harris served as a mission specialist and medical officer aboard the space shuttle Columbia for Spacelab Mission D-2. Along with six other astronauts, he spent what he calls "10 glorious days in space" in the

spring of 1993.

While aboard, the astronauts performed more than 90 experiments, including microgravity research in the life sciences, earth and space observation, robotics, and other technologies.

"Because this mission was intended to help prepare for extended space flights, almost half the studies involved the effects of weightlessness and space travel on the human body," Harris said.

Of particular interest to physician Harris was the goal of explaining how the cardiovascular system responds to acute changes in the amount of fluid in the blood vessels before, during, and after a space flight.

"Other studies were conducted specifically for their applications on earth," Harris said.

"For example, we fused two types

of white blood cells, creating a hybrid cell that could make antibodies against viral diseases. When performed in microgravity, this procedure produced hybrid cells with remarkably higher efficiency than in earth laboratories."

For Harris, space flight was a long-sought dream which he continued with his second flight on Discover and his first walk in space in 1995.

Today, he continues to be associated with the space industry, working with the Houston area's Spacelab Inc., venture-capital builders of space shuttle laboratory modules. He plans to promote the construction of orbiting and lunar habitats for future space explorers.

Harris, now 40, has come a long way, both figuratively and literally, since he was drawing rockets on homework papers.

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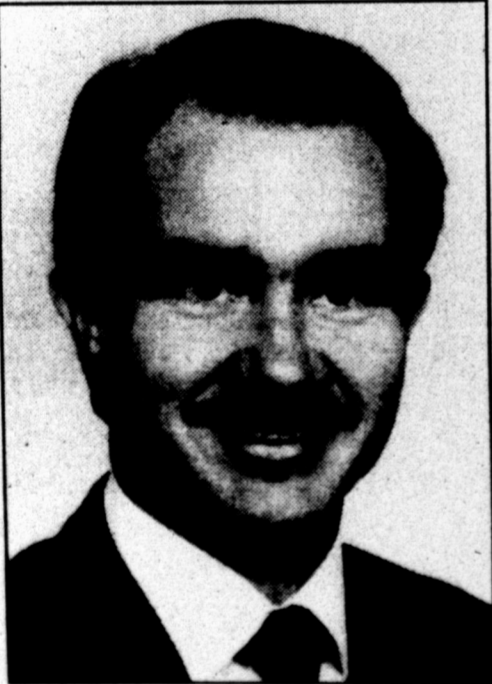
