

Students attending last Thursday's regular meeting of the Clarendon College Board of Regents presented the board with a petition concerning the role of Executive Dean Janie Noble at the school.

A copy of the petition obtained by the Enterprise bears the signatures of 78 students and calls for the board to "dismiss her [Noble] from her du-

Seventy-eight students is less than 20% of the student body on the main campus in Clarendon.

CC student Toni Pate addressed the Regents saying that Noble "harasses teachers" and that some students say she [Noble] is rude to them. But Pate also said "I haven't noticed it personally because I've only been the school, but rather it establishes around her once."

## Governor proclaims Drought, Wildfire Awareness Month

In order to raise statewide awareness and to motivate people to remain vigilant to the impact that drought and wildfire can have upon them, Governor George Bush has proclaimed February as Drought and Wildfire Awareness Month in Texas.

The climate of Texas is condueive to periods of moderate to severe drought and the ensuing fire danger. these factors affect all Texans. They vause loss of life and property, injury, and millions of dollars in economic and agricultural damage.

As the anniversary of last year's record breaking fire season approaches and vegetation continues to dry due to below normal rainfall, please remember to the following nuidelines to prevent fires:

People start most wildfires. A survey of rural fire department shows that more than half of all fires occur outside city limits, with a majority being wildland fires These fires burn more than one million acres annually. Increasingly people are making their homes in rural settings. There, homeowners enjoy the beauty of the environment but face the very real danger of wildfire.

Humes in rural areas should be designed and landscaped with wildfire safety in mind. Nelect materials and plants that help contain fire rather than fuel it. Use fire resistant or non-combustible materials on the roof and exterior structure of homes. I runt wood or combustible materials used in construction, decking, or trim with ULapproved fire-retardant chemicals. Plant thre-resistant shrubs and trees such as fir,

evergreen, eucalyptus, or hardwood. Leave 15-feet between tree crowns, remove limbs within 15 feet of the ground. Install smoke detectors on each level of the house, especially near bedrooms; test monthly and change batteries twice a year. Teach family members how to use the fire extinguisher (ABC Type) and show them where it's kept. Cover openings to floors, roof, porches, decks, and attic with 1/2 inch mesh screen

Identify and maintain an adequate water source such as small pond or stock tank, cistern, well, swimming pool, or hydrant Have a garden hose long enough to reach any area of the home and other structures on the property. Consider obtaining a portable gasoline powered pump in case electrical power is lost.

Take precautions specific to lifestyle and home location. Create a 30 to 50 foot safety zone around dwellings. Homes built in forests or high-brush areas should have a 100-foot safety zone. Homes built on steep slopes may need more protective measures; contact the local fire department for site specific recommenda-

Rake leaves, limb, and twigs. Mow regularly. Remove leaves and rubbish from within 20 feet of and under structures. Stack firewood at least 100 feet away and uphill from dwellings. Clear a 10-ft. area around propane tanks and the barbecue Properly dispose of fireplace and grill

Maintain an adequate water source such as small pond or stock tank, cistern, well, swimming pool, or hydrant. Have a garden hose long enough to reach all structures on the property. Keep a ladder that will reach the roof. Keep handy household items that can be used as fire tools: a rake, ax, handsaw or chain saw, bucket, and shovel.

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#### **Body Condition Scoring important for beef cattle production**

Profitability of our cow herd depends on a high percentage of cows calving every twelve months. Cows which fail to calve or take longer than 12 months to produce and wean a calf increase the cost per pound of calf produced. Reasons for cows failing to calve on a 12 month schedule include disease, harsh weather, and low fertility in herd sires. Most reproductive failures in the beef female, however, can be attributed to improper nutrition and thin body condition. Research has demonstrated that cows with low or inadequate body fat will not breed at acceptable rates

We do not need a difficult system to determine body condition, but it may be helpful to understand the standardized Body Condition Scoring (BCS) system for beef cattle. This is a system that uses a scoring of numbers 1 to 9 to suggest the relative fatness of the cow, one being very thin and 9 being extremely fat.

Keep the program or system simple. A thin cow will look very sharp, angular and skinny while a fat cow looks smooth and boxy with bone structures hidden from sight or feel. All others fall somewhere in between. A cow with a 5 BCS should look average, neither fat nor thin. With that in mind let's discuss each Body Condition Score individually.

BCS 1 \* Emaciated - cow is extremely emaciated with no palpable fat detectable over back bone, edge of loin, edge of hip bones or ribs. Tailhead and ribs project quite prominently. Cow is weak.

BCS 2 \* Poor - cow still appears somewhat emaciated, but tailhead and ribs are less prominent. Individual spinous processes are still rather sharp to touch, but some tissue cover exists along the spine.

BCS \* Thin - the ribs are still individually identifiable but are not quite as sharp to the touch. There is obvious palpable fat along the spine and over the tailhead with some tissue cover over the dorsal portion of the ribs.

BCS 4 \* Borderline - Individual ribs are no longer visually obvious. The spinous process (backbone) can be identified individually on palpation but feel rounded rather than sharp. Some fat covers the ribs, edge of loin,

BCS 5 \* Moderate - This cow has good overall appearance. Upon palpation, fat cover over the ribs feels spongy, and areas on either side of the tailhead now have

BCS 6 \* High moderate - Firm pressure now needs "All three of our seniors have to be applied to feel backbone. A high degree of fat is palpable over ribs and around tailhead.

BCS 7 \* Good - Cow appears fleshy and obviously carries considerable fat. The fat cover over the ribs and tailhead is very spongy. "Rounds" or "pones" begin to become obvious. Some fat begins to appear around vulva and pelvis.

BCS 8 \* Fat - Cow is very fleshy and over conditioned. Backbone is almost impossible to palpate. Cow has large fat deposits over ribs, around tailhead, and below vulva. "Rounds" or "pones" are obvious.

BCS 9 \* Extremely fat - cow has lost definition. Contours disappear across back and sides as cow takes on a smooth, block-like appearance. Tailhead and hips are buried in fat and look blocky. The cow may appear short necked, and have heavy fat deposits in the udder region which will have negative impacts on milk produc-

How do you use the Body Condition Scoring? As I have mentioned, it can be a very useful tool in managing grazing and supplemental feeding programs. It is useful to evaluate cow body condition at weaning or at least three months prior to calving. This allows time to make possible adjustments in nutrition programs to have the desired body condition at calving.

The desired body condition for cows at calving should be BCS scores of 5 to 7. This means that cows will need different feeding programs than others based on body condition score. Cows with BCS less than 5 will need to be fed more to bring them up to desired condition score while cows above BCS of 7 will need to actually lose weight to fit within this body condition range.

Why is body condition or fat reserves important? During early lactation the cow must tap into her body reserves to produce milk. This early lactation period is when she is giving the most milk and putting her reproductive system back in order for rebreeding. It generally takes 40 - 45 days after calving for the uterus to begin recycling. Remember, we want her to calve every 12 months so she will need to rebreed 80 - 85 days after she calves. That means we have only two heat cycles to get her rebred. In order for the cow to do all this, she must have body reserves to draw upon. If a cow is provided inadequate nutrition and/or has no body reserves, the first thing she gives up is reproduction, then milk production. We lose in two ways, late rebreeding and a light calf.

Draper announced recently that about \$10,500 had already been raised for the projected \$17,960 facility, which would be located on the west end of the existing field house. Now, the Athletic Department is hoping that Bronco supporters will step forward and help to put the project over the

"For our teams to be consistently competitive, year-in and year-out," Draper said, "then we have to develop a contemporary weight training program. est of Class AA schools," Draper said. "That means we already have a tremendous challenge to be competitive on a numbers basis alone. 
