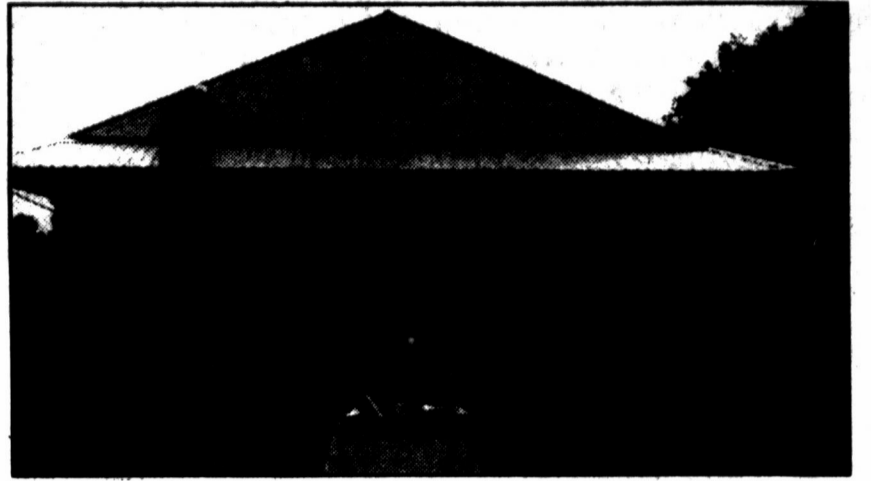
The Kiddie Parade will begin at 1:30 p.m., and the Grand Parade will follow at 2:00 p.m. The

Ag conference on environmental stewardship to be held in Canyon

Agriculture producers and landowners must make key decisions every year about conservation and protection practices for their farming and ranching operations.

A conference scheduled in late fall has been planned to aid area producers in making sound choices, says organizers of the Ag Producer's Role in Environmental Stewardship Symposium, set for Dec. 13, 1996, on the campus of West Texas A&M University in Canyon.

"Some of this country's best stewards of land and water quality are our farmers and ranchers," said Robert Buckley, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB), one of the agencies sponsoring the event.

"The conference has been designed to offer factual and up-to-date information on land and water quality issues important to today's

agricultural operator," said Brent Auvermalm, assistant professor of agricultural engineering and Extension Service specialist for environmental systems with the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Amarillo, who heads the program planning committee.

Questions most often asked by the producer have formed the agenda. Agency officials and university scientists will help address key issues, such as nonpoint source water pollution and the need for certified water quality management plans, as specified in recent actions by the 73rd Texas Legislature.

State Rep. David Swinford of Dumas will present the keynote briefing on S.B. 503, its history and the provisions allowing producers to develop site-specific management plans to meet state water quality

Broncs rain on Sunray's homecoming festivities

Senior Roy Williams rushed 44 times for 239 yards Oct. 4, leading the Broncos to a 28-21 victory over Sunray and giving Clarendon much-needed momentum entering their District 2-2A opener Friday against Quannah.

Kick-off is slated for 7:30 p.m. in Indian Stadium.

The young Quannah squad is coming off a 30-7 victory at the hands of perennial power Electra.

CHS Athletic Director Tooter Draper was impressed with Clarendon's level of play against Sunray last Friday and will not make any adjustments in the line-up in their district opener.

"We'll do the same offense, defense," he said. "We're going to pretty much stay the same and get better at what we're doing. We're not even moving people. We feel real comfortable with how everyone is playing each position."

Sunray, which made it to the 1995 Class 1A regional play-off round

before being thumped by Sudan, posted a 4-0 mark before their Oct. 4 homecoming contest with the visiting Broncos.

But Clarendon's exciting contest dampened Sunray's homecoming in the nip-and-tuck pre-district warm-up battle.

Sunray held a 7-0 lead after a 65-yard TD pass at the end of the first quarter, but Williams responded with a 53-yard run off the right tackle in the second quarter.

"They hit him about four times, and he spun out of it," Draper said. Sophomore Blake Bass' kick was good, and the Broncos were tied with the Bobcats.

The Bobcats fought back, marching 66 yards down the field, finally hitting pay-dirt at the 3:19 mark with a 5-yard run, and entered the locker room with a 14-7 lead.

"We were thinking we were still in the ballgame, and we started making some halftime adjustments," Draper said. "We started going over

blocking schemes, and Coach (Byron) Bass made some good blocking schemes at halftime."

The Broncos slugged 65 yards down the field to get within scoring range. Junior Kareem Abdullah had a 9-yard run and a 13-yard pass from quarterback Scotty Elliott in the charge.

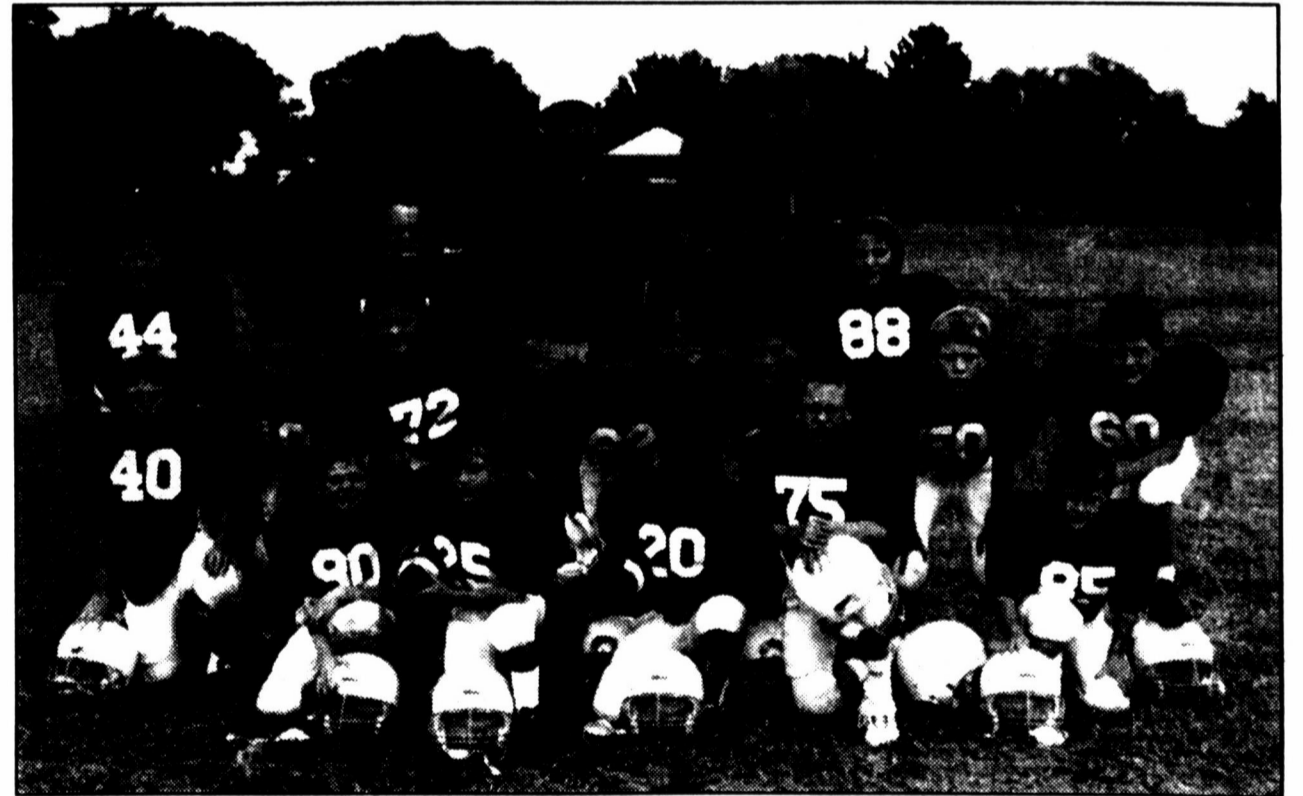
Elliott soon found Abdullah and hit him with a 15-yard TD pass at the 5:37 mark in the third quarter. Bass nailed another PAT, and the Broncos were tied.

But Clarendon's celebration was cut short as Sunray returned an 83-yard kick-off at the 5:24 mark and led 21-14.

"We had five missed tackles, and that kind of busted our bubble right then," Draper said of the kick-off return.

Playmaker Robert Bertrand recovered a Sunray fumble in the fourth quarter and gave the Broncos the ball on the 31-yard line just when

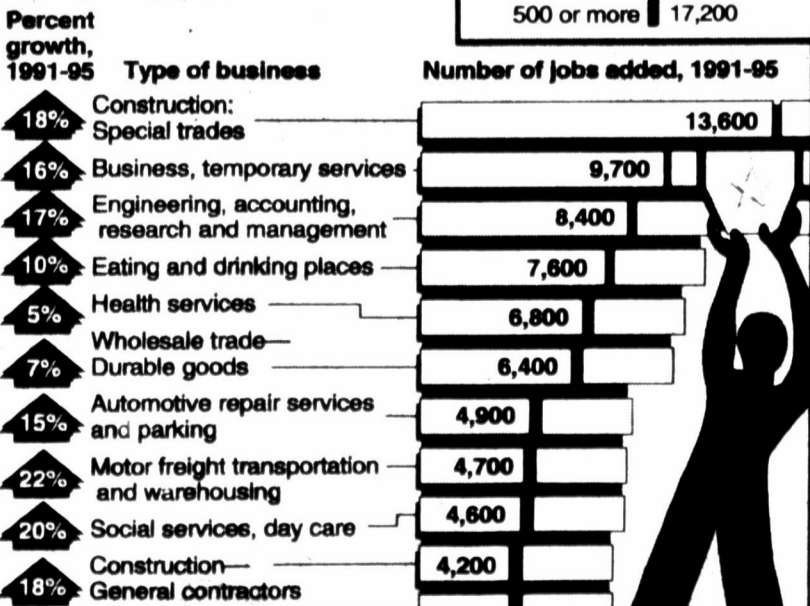

Donley eligible for emergency USDA loans

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman has named 26 counties in Texas as being eligible for Farm Service Agency emergency farm loans because of losses due to various disasters, including drought, high winds, freezing temperatures, sleet and snow from June 1, 1995, through June 11, 1996, and continuing.

Gray, Kerr, Navarro, and Starr counties were named as primary disaster areas on September 3, 1996. Also eligible because they are contiguous to one or more of the primary counties, are Armstrong, Bandera, Brooks, Carson, Collingsworth, Donley, Edwards, Ellis, Freestone, Gillespie, Hemphill, Henderson, Hidalgo, Hill, Jim Hogg, Kendall, Kimble, Limestone, Real, Roberts, Wheeler, and Zapata counties.

Farmers in all 26 counties have eight months to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses. To be eligible, they must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of normal production in a single enterprise, be able to repay the loan and any other loans, be unable to obtain credit elsewhere, have adequate security, and have multiperil crop insurance, if available.

they needed it most. Williams rambled on a 5-yard TD run and made the 2-point conversion at the 8:53 mark to give the Broncos a 22-21 lead. "We're really excited at this point," Draper said. "It's still too close. We were just going to go out and play, and we talked to the defense. We had been playing good defense all night."

Clarendon did not throw the ball at all in the fourth quarter, trying to eat time off of the clock. They held on long enough for one more TD with 39 ticks left on the clock.

Williams scrambled on a 7-yard run after the team moved the ball 51 yards down the field. The kick failed. Time ran out with Sunray in scoring position on the 25-yard line.

"We looked before the game and we felt like they were real focused even though it was homecoming," Draper said.

Draper credits the offensive and defensive line for improving tremendously over the season, especially Oren Shields, James Hoggatt, Ronnie Tabor, and B.J. Hamilton.

Helping Williams bust many of his runs was the play of Hoggatt who moved to fullback. "It was a new position for Hoggatt, and you know Hoggatt; he goes full-speed as a lead blocker."

Clarendon will enjoy the win but will work hard this week preparing for the opening of district play. "We're just trying to get better on what we've been doing. It felt great to win."

"With district coming up, we're pretty excited about it. We feel like we can be very competitive in the district. I don't think you can start district better than with a win."

Presentations by TSSWCB officials, including Buckley, will cover the benefits of a Water Quality Management Plan (WQMP), including the management practices that will best serve the needs of the Texas High Plains producer.

Participants also will learn about the alternative best management practices (BMPs) being demonstrated in the region that are funded by Section 319(h) under the Clean Water Act. Pesticide management strategies will be featured.

Several Texas High Plains producers will participate as panelists for discussions on the practical issues

and economic benefits associated with water quality management plans, and take questions posed by members of the audience.

Conference planners also are seeking approval from Texas Department of Agriculture to offer continuing education units (CEUs) for commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicator recertification credit.

The cost to attend is \$15, which includes the noon meal and breaktime refreshments. The deadline to sign-up is Dec. 5, 1996. Registration forms are available through TSSWCB Regional Manager, Charley Rodgers at (806) 839-1030; or Brent Auvermann, Texas ATOM Center, (806) 359-5401.

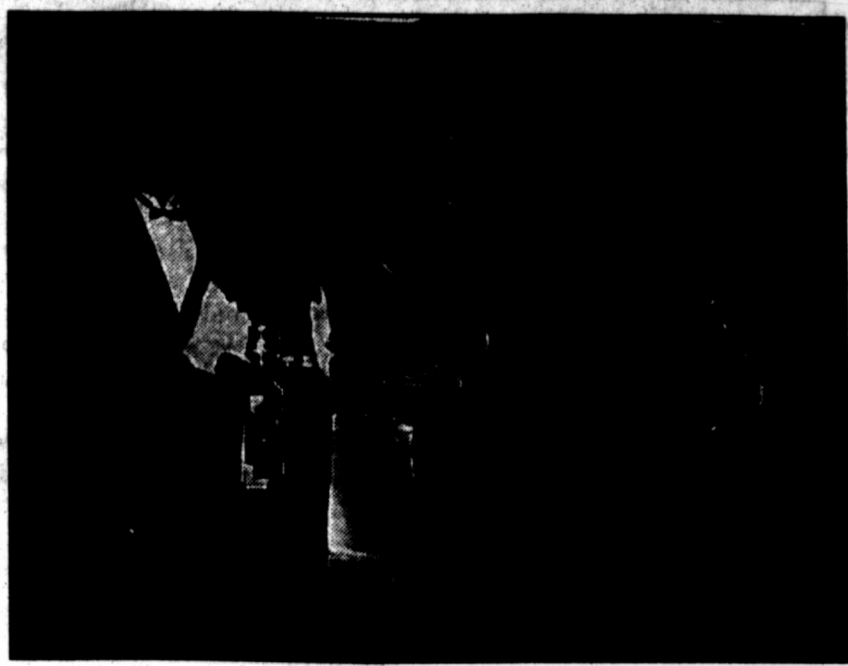

The Jamboree is sponsored by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce and is a family event. People of all ages are encouraged to attend.

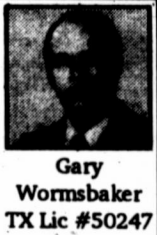
Numerous door prizes will be awarded. Those who attend will receive a numbered ticket. Tickets will be randomly drawn throughout the evening to select prize winners.

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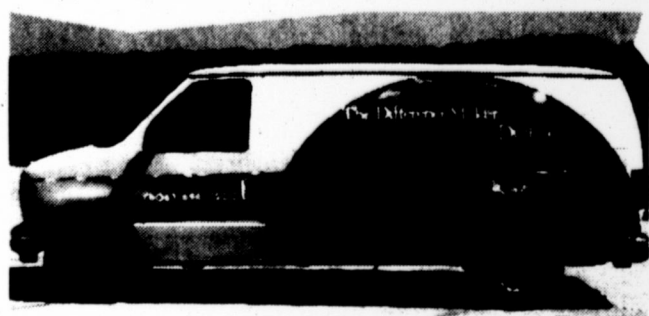

The Lady Broncos travel to Wheeler Saturday for their last meet before the District 2-2A meet. Starting time is at 9 a.m.

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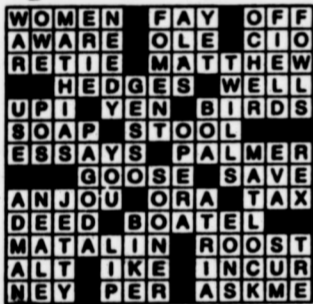

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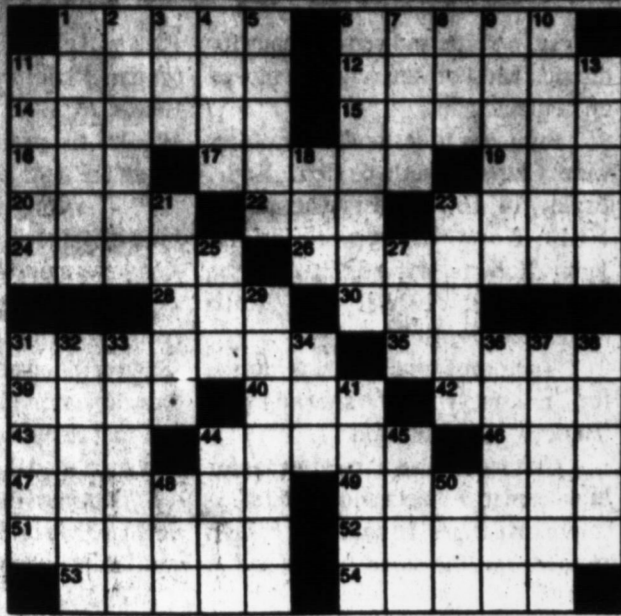

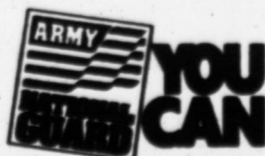
